## UCONN WINS NCAA 2014 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

UCONN Wins 2014 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship

(AP) - Coach Kevin Ollie delivered on the promise he made last month after UConn's final home game, bringing an NCAA Vhampionship back to Gampel Pavilion. Ollie and the Huskies, who beat Kentucky 60-54 on Monday night in Texas, arrived back on campus Tuesday evening for a raucous pep rally in front of about 7,500 fans at the Huskies' home arena. "On senior night I told you all to save this date, didn't I?" Ollie told the crowd Tuesday. "The only reason I said that is because I knew what kind of team I had, what kind of coaching staff I had and I knew I had the greatest fans in America behind us."

Ollie had grabbed a microphone after UConn's 69-63 win over Rutgers on March 5 and promised the crowd that UConn would be back in April to hang a banner. The title is the fourth for the program and the second in four years. It comes a year after the Huskies were banned from the NCAA tournament for failing to meet academic requirements, and after the school was left out of the expansion plans of both the ACC and Big Ten conferences.

"I think it's an incredible thing from being down and out of the tournament to where we are now," said 23-year-old Matt Thomson, a 2013 graduate from Fairfield who came back to campus to welcome the team home. "I think it shows the real passion of the players, the fans and this entire school. No one lost hope. We all believed that we were still UConn."

It's the fourth time that the UConn men and women were in the Final Four at the same time. The school is the only Division I program ever to win both titles in the same year, accomplishing that feat in 2004.

**Eight Dallas ISD schools ranked among the best in nation by The Washington Post** The Washington Post again ranked two Dallas Independent School District campuses among the five most challenging schools in America, and six more campuses earned recognition in the newspaper's 2014 review. The School for the Talented and Gifted and the School of Science and Engineering, both located at the Yvonne A. Ewell Townview Center, were ranked No. 4 and No. 5, respectively. Both schools, perennially listed among the top schools in the nation, were ranked No. 2 and No. 3 in Texas.

**President Obama signed a new Executive Order to strengthen enforcement of equal pay laws for women** To ensure equal opportunity and empowering women in the workforce. President said in his most recent State of the Union address, "when women succeed, America succeeds." We truly can't afford to have women held back or prevent them from reaching their full potential if we hope to maximize the strength and productivity of our workforce.

**Dallas ISD Police arrest longtime copper thief** Dallas Independent School District police arrested a man on Tuesday with links to at least 30 copper theft incidents at district schools. Greg Desha Ellis of Dallas has been charged with theft of material 50 percent aluminum/bronze/copper greater than \$20,000 after he was arrested for stealing copper from the air conditioning chiller at George W. Truett Elementary School on March 23. Following the arrest, detectives determined that he had stolen from approximately 30 other Dallas ISD schools.

**Affordable Care Act** March 31 was the official deadline to enroll. The state provided additional time to individuals and families who applied for coverage, but did not complete the enrollment process on time. They must finish by April 15. The next open enrollment period will begin Nov. 15, 2014. Individuals eligible for Medicaid can enroll anytime.

**The Army's new hair rules**, which ban a number of styles popular among black women, were approved only after surveying hundreds of senior enlisted female soldiers as part of a focus group led by a female sergeant major, an official said. Banned hairstyles include those that involve "hair sculpting," including "eccentric directional flow, twists, texture or spiking," according to the Marine Corps message. The banned styles include "locks and twists" - not including French rolls or twists - and buns or braids with loose hair extending at the end, except within the recently approved "micro braid" or "multiple braid" style. In the Air Force, female airmen are allowed to have braids, micro braids and cornrows that are in a natural looking color and conservative. Multiple braids should be uniform in dimension, small in diameter, and show no more than a quarter of an inch of scalp between the braids. Dreadlocks, shaved heads, flat tops and high-and-tight haircuts are not authorized for female airmen.





You would think that news of a high school student from a family of African immigrants getting accepted into all eight Ivy League universities would be met with universal celebration. If you thought that, think again.

First the news:  
In the next month, Kwasi Enin must make a tough decision: Which of the eight Ivy League universities should he attend this fall?

A first-generation American from Shirley, N.Y., the 17-year-old violinist and aspiring physician applied to all eight, from Brown to Yale.

The responses began rolling in over the past few months, and by late last week when he opened an e-mail from Harvard, he found he'd been accepted to every one. School district officials

## REMEMBERING A GREAT AMERICAN PRESIDENT

President Johnson, who served as vice-president in the administration of President John Kennedy, returned to Texas after deciding not to seek a second term as president. Great strides in civil rights, education and health care were made during his administration. The phrase, "Great Society" was coined during his administration.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act which became law when President Johnson signed the legislation on July 2nd 1964. It is more than fitting that President Johnson's life and accomplishments are celebrated in Texas, as they will be during the course of this year in Washington, and in other parts of our country. I am hopeful that his vision of a "Great Society" will live forever.

While in office, President Johnson demanded that states that had "polls taxes," a barrier to many African-Americans participating in the voting process, eliminate the practice. Hundreds of thousands of

new voters registered because of what President Johnson demanded. Like some of my congressional colleagues, I believe that President Barack Obama would not have been elected had President Johnson not acted as he did. President Johnson is a true American hero who deserves our admiration for all that he did to make this country a better place for all of its citizens.

The achievements of the Johnson Administration were not limited to civil rights. Creating Medicare was one of his major accomplishments. Prior to its enactment, nearly 70 percent of America's senior citizen population did not have health insurance.

All of that changed when President Johnson signed Medicare into law on July 30th, 1965, bringing mental comfort and security to millions of Americans 65-years of age and older. Prior to that time, the majority of our seniors could not afford healthcare coverage. Many died prematurely.

When he decided not to run for a second term as president, he returned to Texas. I was a member of the Texas Legislature, and on the day that he visited the capitol building in Austin, my son, Kirk, and I were present. President Johnson died of a heart attack one week later.

His funeral was held on the same day that my son celebrated his birthday. During his funeral service it rained as if the sky, itself, was crying. My son and I went to the burial site, and spent time with Mrs. Johnson and her daughters after returning from the cemetery.

While many in America viewed President Johnson only through the lens of the Vietnam War, hundreds of thousands of African-Americans in the southern United States admired him greatly. One presidential historian wrote that President Johnson was the only American president whose achievements in the field of civil rights approached those of President Abraham Lincoln.

provided scanned copies of acceptance letters from all eight Monday. Yale confirmed that it was holding a spot for Enin.

The feat is extremely rare, say college counselors — few students even apply to all eight, because each seeks different qualities in their freshman class. Almost none are invited to attend them all.

The Ivy League colleges are among the nation's most elite. (USA Today)

Comments posted on the news website reddit leave little doubt that even with all of Enin's accomplishments, many people will never see beyond his race. The comments show appalling ignorance not only about race in the United States, but about the college admission process itself.

A person with the sign-in name of Hairlesswalkingchimp wrote, "I'm gonna get real with you reddit; no matter how pissed this makes you it doesn't change the fact that he would not have had this absurd success if he was a white kid."

A writer identifying himself as Jetusas asked, "Are you just as pissed that 30% of admissions at Harvard are legacy?" How many are less qualified white people, I wonder?"

That's a point most critics miss. Universities, including Harvard and Yale, admit a certain number of students in each class based on whether a

parent attended the Ivy League institution. They call them "Legacy Admissions" and that's how George W. Bush got admitted into Yale, following in the footsteps of his father and his father's father. Other students are admitted because a parent made a major donation to the university.

"I am surprised that no one has mentioned that for the seven other schools he chooses not to attend, 7 students will be chosen from the schools' respective wait list, and let's be realistic, odds are they are white."

Overlooked in some of the posts is the fact that college admissions deans try to construct a balanced class, not robotically picking applicants based on grades and SAT scores.

"Ivy Leagues don't want well rounded applicants, they want a well rounded class," wrote house\_music\_420. "It's much easier to get in if you do something out of the ordinary and are really good at it instead of being pretty good at many things. I've talked to college admissions people and they all say that they are trying to build a well rounded class."

"For example 10 people from my high school applied to Stanford and the only one who got in had a 3.5 GPA (lowest of the 10) and a 2030 SAT (lowest of the 10) and he was in my class struggling mightily."

Comeonreally8 wrote, "I am an

admissions interviewer for one of the top ivies and I see a HUGE number of minority applicants with top grades, great SATs, and great leadership in their extracurriculars and they are rejected just as often as the non-minority applicants. So everyone saying 'OMG IT'S ONLY BECAUSE HE'S BLACK' calm down, being a minority is not some free pass to get into college. It is still incredibly challenging and rare to get into the top ivies. This kid sounds brilliant and I wish him all the success."

Wrote retop56: "This comment section is nothing short of hilarious. Yes, schools look for diversity in admissions, but it seems like a lot of people really think he did nothing except check a box that he's black and walk into 8 ivys."

One person wrote, "There are 1000s of spots for white students to get in but when they fail to do so, they blame it on the 50 black students that they let in every year."

A white writer, JadeChaosTheory, noted: "Just by being white we have a ton of advantages in general – minorities need the boosts where they can get it."

He explained, "He [Enin] could graduate college with flying colors and still struggle to find a job/move up in the workplace because casual racism is a real and prevalent thing and there is an innate fear of people of color in positions of power."

owned businesses and institutions.

In addition, during this same time period, the effectiveness and contemporary purpose of our traditional civil rights organizations such as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) have been called into question.

A few months ago the New York Times published a story that questioned whether Howard University and other Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) were still relevant and worthy of continued existence.

It is not a mere coincidence that some of these news articles and blogs are being written again by supposedly "well-intentioned" African Americans. We certainly support and defend the right to freedom of the press and the right of all people to express themselves. Of course, the press has the right to be wrong. With that right, however, goes a responsibility not to distort the truth.

This is not about neither freedom of the press nor freedom of speech. This is about the issue of racism and its proclivity to define and question reality. This is about the fact that we still live in a society that continues to be undergirded by the ideology of White supremacy that presupposes the false notion of Black inferiority. And as long as that is the case, there will be a need for powerful

Black institutions.

The Black Church is powerful. The Black Press is powerful. HBCUs are powerful. The NAACP and SCLC are still needed. While we have made considerable progress in the last 50 years, we still have not overcome racism and its negative impact on Black America. And that fact is sometimes conveniently overlooked by Black journalists who work for such White-owned outlets such as the Washington Post and The Root.

For me and my co-defendants in the civil rights case known worldwide as the Wilmington Ten, this is a personal matter when someone takes issue with the present-day "power" of the Black Press. In 1972, the Wilmington Ten were unjustly sentenced to a combined total of 282 years in prison in the state of North Carolina. We were falsely accused and wrongly convicted of arson and conspiracy to assault charges doing a 1971 racial riot over public school desegregation in Wilmington. A little more than a year ago, the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), the Black Press USA, launched an effective national campaign to get an official "Pardon of Innocence" for the Wilmington Ten.

For more than 40 years, many in the established media in the U.S. had published articles about the alleged "guilt" of the Wilmington Ten. In fact, the New York Times published a story in the late 1970s under the headline: "The Case

Against the Wilmington Ten." By the end of 2012, however, North Carolina Gov. Beverly Perdue agreed with the NNPA-led effort as she issued an unprecedented Pardon of Innocence to each member of the Wilmington Ten.

Gov. Perdue courageously stated, "This was a case of naked racism." We are, therefore, grateful to Gov. Perdue for her historic act and for her candor. We are also very grateful to all of the Black newspaper publishers and writers throughout the United States who continue to uphold the proud banner of the Black Press.

Let's us never underestimate the enduring value and respect of all our Black-owned businesses and institutions. Of course, we always open to constructive criticism and recommendations concerning how to strengthen the economic status of the businesses that are vital to our forward progress. However, it would be a tragic error to assume that because we now have a Black American as president of the United States, there is no longer a need to sustain the very institutions, organizations and businesses that have contributed so much to our progress.

I thank God for the powerful Black Press in America. We all should be more supportive of the Black Press, Black Church, HBCUs, and our ongoing struggle for freedom, justice and equality not only for Black Americans, but also for all people across the nation and world.

The psalmist rehearses in verse 3 and verse 5, "Come and hear, all ye that fear God; let all the people praise thee."

### UConn WINS 2014 NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP IN WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

AP- Connecticut won the 2014 NCAA National Championship in women's basketball, beating an undefeated Notre Dame 79-58.

Geno Auriemma and Connecticut stand alone in women's college basketball, and they reached the top in unprecedented fashion.

The Huskies routed Notre Dame 79-58 Tuesday night in the first championship game featuring undefeated teams, winning their record ninth national title. Auriemma broke a tie with Pat Summitt and Tennessee for most all-time, doing it in her backyard.

Breanna Stewart, who was the AP's player of the year, scored 21 points to lead the Huskies (40-0) while Stefanie Dolson added 17 points, 16 rebounds and seven assists. Auriemma took his senior center with a minute left and the pair embraced in a long hug.

The victory also means that UConn is now the center of the college basketball world with both the men's and women's teams winning the championship in the same year again. The men's team beat Kentucky in the title game Monday night. This pair of victories come a decade after the Huskies became the only school to accomplish the feat.

The two former Big East rivals, who have no love lost for each other, put on a show in a game that women's basketball hoped could transcend the sport. The coaches added to the drama of the game with their verbal sparring on Monday. But it was Auriemma who got the last word again.
