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


ELITE NEWSPAPER FOUNDER WILLIAM "BILL" BLAIR JR.'S LEGACY WILL LIVE FOREVER



Mr. William "Bill" Blair 1921-2014

The legendary humanitarian and business owner, William "Bill" Blair Jr., came into this life on October 17, 1921 in Dallas, Texas. He was the younger of two children born to Cora and William Blair Sr. His older sister, Susie Mae, was his closest friend. A gifted athlete and student, Mr. Blair was graduated from Booker T. Washington in 1939. Until the very moment that God called him to his eternal rest, he remained a founding member of the Booker T Washington Alumni Association of Dallas.

After completing high school, Mr. Blair enrolled in Prairie View A&M University. He then enlisted in the United States Army on the eve of World War II. A disciplined and exemplary soldier, he became the youngest 1st sergeant in our country's armed services. While in the military, Mr. Blair married his high school sweetheart, Mozelle Jordan. He was honorably discharged from the Army on September 10, 1945.

In 1946, Mr. Blair became a leading pitcher in the Negro Baseball League, playing for the famed Indianapolis Clowns, Birmingham Barons and a number of other teams. A hard-throwing left hander and at the encouragement of Satchel Page, Mr. Blair developed a pitcher named "12 to 6" that suddenly dropped to the knees of players when it reached home plate.

His pitching baffled players and he won the admiration of fellow Negro League Players such as Buck O'Neal, Satchel Paige, Cool "Papa" Bell, Jesse "Hoss" Walker, Buster Haywood and Winfield Welch. His baseball career included pitching a no hitter, and he was once considered by a white major league team. Mr. Blair's baseball career came to an end in 1951 when his over-worked pitching arm failed him.

She later completed her studies at the Bezael Bible Institute and the D. F. Johnson Institute, and received a Certificate of Completion from both schools in Christian Education.

LEADER OF THE WEEK

Dr. Roscoe C. Smith, Ph.D.

The Dallas Post Tribune has selected Dr. Roscoe C. Smith, Ph.D. as Leader of the Week. He is a proven master education administrator, passionate youth advocate, and visionary innovator. His 40-year career as a class-room teacher/principal/youth leader turned senior district administrator undeniably records his soaring success with under-achieving students. He retired in 1998 and has 13 additional active years as a tenacious political operative and education consultant.

His career highlights include his transformative work as Scoutmaster in 1963 when he cultivated Boy Scouts Troop #165 in Dallas from nine unpolished, under-privileged boys to 287 precision scouts in uniforms - officially "the largest troop in the world;" as District Chairman, parlaying Boy Scout's Comanche District in Texas to the nation's highest-ranked district; being credited in the Hope Star newspaper as the catalyst that for the first time produced a "juvenile delinquent free city" when he was City Park director in Hope, Arkansas in 1960 and also coached and managed winning athletic teams; being the top-ranked academic student in the Educational Administration Program when he earned his Ph.D. in 1972 from the University of Minnesota.

He achieved "firsts" and top rankings: Dallas' first African-American "Outstanding Young Educator" from Classroom Teachers of Dallas and Dallas Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1967; first African-American male promoted from teacher to administrator (Assistant Coordinator of Special Programs) at the Dallas Central Office in 1968; and in 1970, Dallas school district's first Director of Accountability where he increased annual federal funding from less than \$2 million to \$22 million, which attracted national attention.

SECOND ANNUAL MULTI-CULTURAL PASSOVER SEDER

History was made at Temple Emanu-El of Dallas, Texas last year. A multi-cultural, original Passover seder was co-created and co-enacted by Paul Quinn College students and the Young Adults from Temple Emanu-El. The tradition was continued this year for an historic seder at Paul Quinn College. The students, faculty members and President Michael Sorrell welcomed Temple Young Adults to Paul Quinn campus. They were joined by Rabbi Asher Knight, Cantor Leslie Niren and Melissa Duchin (Director of Young Adult, Outreach and Interfaith Programming at Emanu-El) for an imaginative Passover Seder. Collaboration between the two groups turned into a wonderful, shared learning experience for all who attended.

This unique joint seder evolved from a lecture series 2 years ago at Paul Quinn College. I was fortunate enough to introduce Rabbi Kimberly Herzog Cohen to President Michael Sorrell and the students at Paul Quinn College, when Rabbi Herzog Cohen agreed to deliver a lecture to the student body about the relationship between the Black and Jewish community in America. "Rabbi Kim," as we affectionately call her, conveyed the message of our duty to uphold justice and freedom for all people. The lecture was well attended by Paul Quinn students and questions following Rabbi Kim's well received lecture were thoughtful and honest. One student, Francis Webb, concluded with a question. "So when are we going to have a joint seder with Paul Quinn students and Temple Emanu-El members?" A result of this question and many months of planning and participation from Quinntines and Temple Emanu-El members, was the collaborative effort of a traditional Passover seder, with new creative elements to share both Black and Jewish cultures.

Again this year, Paul Quinn students, faculty and Temple Emanu-El participants read and sang their original multi-cultural Passover seder together as brothers and sisters. With open minds, open spirits, open discussion and joint enthusiasm, all in attendance enjoyed this unique telling of the Passover story of slavery to freedom. The title of their co-authored seder was

"Crossing Waters: An Original Seder." Traditional Jewish symbols and foods, such as matzah (unleavened bread symbolizing the haste in which Jewish slaves left Egypt) were served. These were combined with special foods, such as hot-water cornbread, which is made quickly like its "sister bread" matzah. Indeed, new horizons, new stories, new meanings and new friendships were created.

Traditionally, at a Jewish seder, the last line at the end of the Passover service is "Next year in Jerusalem." At this unique seder, the last line was, "Next year, for our third year together, at Temple Emanu-El." These two remarkable groups are already planning on next year's seder, when Paul Quinn students join Temple Emanu-El Young Adults on location back at Emanu-El. Valuable learning experiences ON and OFF campus resulted from this multi-cultural Passover seder. What a wonderful coalition these two groups have formed!

ELITE NEWSPAPER FOUNDER WILLIAM "BILL" BLAIR JR.'S LEGACY WILL LIVE FOREVER

Because of his accomplishments on and off the field, Mr. Blair was inducted into the Negro League Baseball Museum and was associated with the Negro Baseball Hall of Fame. He was instrumental in the development of the African-American Museum's Texas Sports Hall of Fame, and served on the Board of Governors of the Negro League Baseball. In 2008, Mr. Blair was symbolically drafted by the Houston Astros baseball team.

Mr. Blair started the Southwest Sports News which published the results of sporting events by African-American college teams throughout the United States. In 1951 the Southwest Sports News was renamed the Highlight News. Nine years later the publication's name was changed to the Elite Newspaper. A family owned publication, The Elite News quickly became the major print publication where churches, elected officials and social activists were able to present their messages to the community.

Mr. Blair was not content with simply publishing a newspaper. Desiring to recognize celebrated members of the community, he established The Elite News Awards Night, annually recognizing members of the community who had made significant social contributions. He also established the Elite News Religious Hall of Fame, inducting ministers of great distinction.

Throughout his life Mr. Blair worked with some of the major civil rights leaders in North Texas. He aided a numerous victorious politicians' aspirants,

among them Senators, mayors, members of the city council and state legislature. Recognizing the need to memorialize the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Mr. Blair began a program in 1986 to honor the legendary civil rights leader. Called the "People's Parade", the annual Martin Luther King Jr. Parade and Festival is a tribute to Dr. King and has become one of the largest parades in the country. It is attracting crowds as large as 250,000 people. The Martin Luther King Jr. Parade and Festival, at Mr. Blair's insistence, is held on the same day that the nation celebrates the life of Dr. King.

For many years, tributes to Mr. Blair have occurred across the country because of his many civic contributions. Two years ago, the city of Dallas renamed Rochester Park in east Dallas the William Blair, Jr. Park. An annual Easter egg hunt and back to school Backpack for children are held there.

Two years ago, recognizing the need for his work to live beyond his years, Mr. Blair donated some of personal works and papers to the University of Texas at Arlington. This gift was made to the university to enable researchers and students to study the life of Mr. Blair in decades and centuries to come.

Mr. Blair was preceded in death by his sister, Susie Mae Cullor; sons William "Sandy" Blair III, Jordan "Randy" Blair; daughter-in-law Barbara Blair and son-in-law, David Lynch.

He leaves to cherish his

memories his devoted wife of 71 years, Mozelle J. Blair; mother-in-law "Mama" Lillian Jordan; children, Debra Abron Blair (Vernon), Michelle Gilstrap (Paul), Robert Blair, Terri Lynch, Darryl Blair, Sr. (Lorie); daughters-in-law Brenda Blair and Muriel Rahn Hatcher; adoptive sons Albert Britton and Mark Jones, a host of grandchildren, great-grandchildren, great-great-grandchildren; beloved Aunt DeDe "Regina Farr Ross" and a multitude of other relatives.

"Once a task has begun never stop until it is done. Be the labor great or small, do it right or not at all." Mr. Blair departed this life on Easter Morning to join our Father in Heaven. His tasks on earth, great and small are all complete and now his task in heaven have just begun. The people who loved him bid him farewell by saying: Sleep well sweet prince. You have served us well!

W.T. White High School choir director Michael Parker has

In Richard Warren's best-seller "The Purpose Driven Life" he outlines a forty day step process of how to find your purpose in life. Long before this book was written, Dr. William "Bill" Blair, who changed addresses this week at the age of 92, demonstrated his life to the fullest, a clear defining purpose, not driving, but speeding in fourth gear with a cache of people.

One of the most popular Situation Spots in Dallas is the renown "Roundtable". Well attended by all with a 25 year legacy started by Dr. Blair. My favorite story by far occurred at the famous "Roundtable" years

ago between Dr. Marvin Robinson and Dr. Bill Blair. Marvin was telling this story about a track meet in which Marvin was one of the stars. Dr. Blair let the story be told and immediate afterward announced to Marvin that one of the names was incorrect. Marvin disagreed politely. He went home and looked it up. Being the gentleman he was, he returned to the "Roundtable" the next day to declare in public "that the master was correct", and with a laugh, "but, I was there".

Mrs. Carolyn Lucas, the lady in the pink Cadillac for over a decade, possibly said it best. "He wanted everybody recognized", which would account for his many community "driven" successful programs. Master Donte Wilson, a student who did a paper on the Negro Baseball League, inspired by Bill's guest speaker appearance at his school said; "he didn't talk old". Clarice Archer, a rising star in Nursing School at UT, Tyler, native of another country, called to see if she and friends could host or

'usher' at the homegoing celebration. Simone Sadler, my niece in Orlando, now 16 years old, who spent summers with me in Dallas, bountiful lunches with Bill Blair at Luby's, at the "Roundtable" on her second call was disappointed that her Dad would not allow her to leave school, travel for the funeral. She decided that she would hold her own memorial service in Orlando, Florida. She has received weekly copies of the Elite Newspaper for years.

Dr. Theodore Lee, Publisher of The Dallas Post Tribune said he always respected Bill Blair. Adding "He was aggressive and always on the move enhancing his community and the City of Dallas". As a mentor, Sharon Middlebrooks said "she never met a man that knew so much about this city". And Mrs. Maggie McClendon, 'a golden girl' at True Lee Baptist Church, said "he was a jolly good fellow and a good friend to my husband before he passed away".

The Dallas that embraced a young William Blair was far different from that we know today. Mr. Blair, whose father worked six days every week in a mill, faced a difficult life. But he made the most of what he had, and accomplished some remarkable things in his long and productive life. Always small in size, he amazed his football coaches at Booker T. Washington Senior High School,

As we approach May 17, the 60th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's Brown v. Board of Education landmark decision outlawing "separate but equal" schools, several studies show that our schools are more segregated now than they were three decades ago. And there are no indications that things are likely to change for the better in the foreseeable future.

A report by the Economic Policy Institute (EPI) titled, "Brown v. Board at 60," concluded, "Today, things are getting worse. The typical black student now attends a school where only 29 percent of his or her fellow students are white, down from 36 percent in 1980."

Actually there were two Brown decisions. The first, in 1954, outlawed racially segregated public schools, which had been defended as "separate but equal." Faced with foot-dragging by intransigent school officials in the Deep South, the Supreme Court issued a second ruling in 1955, sometimes called Brown II, declaring that the schools had to be desegregated "with all deliberate

becoming a very capable running back that successfully competed against players twice his size. There, he met his wife, Mozelle Jordan, who maintained the Blair household while building a respectable catering business.

After returning to Dallas as a military veteran at the end of World War II, Mr. Blair entered the newspaper business. Publishing a newspaper was not his first passion, but when white-owned publications would not print results from African-American college games and the Negro Baseball League, where he played as a pitcher, Mr. Blair went into action. He started something new.

Over the years his insight and his vision compelled him to create numerous institutions and events. While publishing the Elite Newspaper, he founded the Elite

News Religious Hall of Fame, which acknowledged the contributions made by members of the clergy in North Texas.

Mr. Blair worked closely with Reverend S.M. Wright, the nationally known Baptist preacher whose impact on life and politics was legendary. When the ministerial organization that Reverend Wright led needed a public voice, Mr. Blair made the pages of the Elite News available to the clergy group. Soon after, the Elite Newspaper became known as the official "voice of the church community."

Never one to stand on the sidelines of life, Mr. Blair started a Martin Luther King Parade in January of 1986. A few drummers, a trumpet player and some preachers marched with him down a street in South Dallas. Last year, the event drew a

crowd of more than 250,000 and the parade lasted nearly four hours.

His vision allowed him to believe that one could start small and grow into abundance. That is exactly what he did with many of the programs and concepts that he touched. He nurtured them as if they were lilies in his personal garden.

North Texas may never see the likes of Mr. William "Bill" Blair again. He made his presence known. He worked with young minds, including those who were not members of his family, teaching them the crafts that he had mastered.

Now, he has taken his much-deserved eternal rest after so many arduous years of planting seeds for all of us. We remain grateful that he lived among us, and bid him farewell.

speed."

But speed was nowhere to be found. Two years after the court ruling, no Black child attended schools with a White student in eight of the 11 former Confederate states, including Alabama.

The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights (LCCR), a coalition of nearly 200 organizations, noted, "It took ten years after Brown, but beginning with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the nation committed to desegregation and it worked. Courts and executive agencies consistently supported desegregation plans and from 1968 to 1988, as more schools integrated, academic achievement increased for African American students."

However, that progress stalled.

"...The legal and political tide turned against integration during the 1980s," LCCR observed. "Courts stopped ordering desegregation plans and began dismantling existing plans – both court-ordered and voluntary. Federal agencies stopped aggressive enforcement and by 1989 schools were beginning to resegregate, reversing many of the academic gains of the previous 20 years."

The court did agree to bow out after some Black leaders went along with the plan.

"The roster of witnesses lined up behind the school board shocked many in the black community," ProPublica reported. "It included some of the city's most influential black leaders, including a city councilman, a state senator, and Judge John England, Jr....Rumors spread within the community that England's and others' support had been part of a secret arrangement with white leaders."

A person with direct knowledge of the arrangement confirmed to me that a deal was indeed made whereby a new Black school would be constructed on the predominantly Black west side of town in exchange for supporting an end of the court-ordered desegregation. The court did agree to bow out after some Black leaders went along with the plan.

"The roster of witnesses lined up behind the school board shocked many in the black community," ProPublica reported. "It included some of the city's most influential black leaders, including a city councilman, a state senator, and Judge John England, Jr....Rumors spread within the community that England's and others' support had been part of a secret arrangement with white leaders."

Another reason schools are being resegregated is that segregated housing patterns have remained intact.

"Schools remain segregated because neighborhoods in which they are located are segregated," said the EPI report. "Raising achievement of low-income black children requires residential integration, from which school integration can flow."

Without dismantling segregated residential housing patterns and getting federal courts or the Justice Department to retain some jurisdiction over court-ordered desegregation plans, public schools are on a path to return to their pre-Brown status of being separate and unequal.

Making Strides for Preschool

early language and literacy and mathematics. Prekindergarten teachers have the same requirements as K-12 teachers in BPS and are paid accordingly. And it's working. A study conducted by researchers at Harvard's Graduate School of Education examined the impact of one year of attendance in the BPS preschool program on children's school readiness and found substantial positive effects on children's literacy, language, mathematics, emotional development, and executive functioning.

Tulsa is another city making great strides. Oklahoma has offered universal preschool to 4-year-olds since 1998. In the 2011-2012 school year, three-quarters of all 4-year-olds in the state were enrolled in the preschool program. High-quality year-round programs are also available to some at-risk Tulsa children from birth through age three through the Community Action Project (CAP) of Tulsa County, which combines public and private funds to provide comprehensive services for the youngest and most vulnerable children.

Oklahoma's preschool teachers are required to have a bachelor's degree with a certificate in early childhood and are also paid equally to K-12 teachers. Preschool is funded through the state's school finance formula, although districts can subcontract with other providers of early care and education by putting public school teachers in community-based settings and Head Start programs. Researchers from Georgetown

University have conducted multiple evaluations of the 4-year-old preschool program in Tulsa over the last decade and found evidence of both short and long term gains, with the most persistent gains in math for the neediest children who are eligible for free and reduced price lunch. A long term economic projection of the future adult earnings effects of Tulsa's program estimates benefit-to-cost ratios of 3- or 4-to-1.

New Jersey has offered high-quality state-funded preschool to 3- and 4-year-old children in 31 high-poverty communities since 1999 in response to a series of state Supreme Court rulings starting with Abbott v. Burke that found poorer New Jersey public school students were receiving "inadequate" education funding.

Researchers at Rutgers University's National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) have conducted a longitudinal analysis of the impacts of the Abbott preschool program on the cohort of children served in 2004-2005, and the fifth grade follow up shows participation has had a sustained significant effect on students' achievement in language arts and literacy, math, and science and reduced grade retention and special education placement rates.

Other cities also are finding new ways to move forward. In 2011 San Antonio, Texas Mayor Julian Castro convened a task force of education and private sector leaders to identify the best way to improve the quality of edu-

cation in the city. The task force concluded the most effective solution would be a high-quality, full-day four-year-old prekindergarten targeted at low-income and at-risk children. The San Antonio program was launched after city residents voted for a one-eighth of a cent sales tax increase in November 2012 to fund it. It will serve 3,700 four-year-olds annually when fully implemented.

Studies have shown children enrolled in high-quality early childhood programs are more likely to graduate from high school, hold a job, and make more money and are less likely to commit a crime than their peers who do not participate. High-quality preschool is a critical piece of the early childhood continuum — and we need to celebrate and support the cities, states, and political leaders who are successfully providing this experience for all children.

Congress needs to follow their good example now by enacting the Strong Start for American's Children Act to enable millions of the nation's children — not just thousands or tens or hundreds of thousands — to get quality early childhood education including home visiting through kindergarten and be better prepared for school and for life. This should be a litmus test for our vote this November. If leaders don't stand up for children, they don't stand for anything and they don't stand for a strong American future that requires educated children.

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio ran on a campaign to fund full-day public preschool for all New York City children through a modest increased income tax on residents making more than \$500,000 a year. Although Mayor de Blasio's tax proposal was not approved by the state legislature or supported by New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo, the legislature did approve statewide funding for pre-K that included a \$300 million increase for New York City's preschool program.

This means that for the first time fully funded full-day quality preschool will be available for all 4-year-olds in the city. New York City is moving forward for children — and it's not the only major city or and school district making such progress.

The Boston Public Schools system (BPS) offers a full day of prekindergarten to any four-year-old in the district regardless of income, although funding limitations prevent the district from serving all eligible children. BPS ensures the quality of its prekindergarten program through high-quality teachers, professional development delivered through individualized coaching sessions, and evidence-based curricula for

He that is our God is the God of salvation; and unto GOD the Lord belong the issues from death." Even other nations will pay homage to God as He demonstrates His power (vv. 28-31). As this psalm closes in verses 32-35, the psalmist calls on nations to recognize the awesome power of God by singing and rendering praise to Him - "Ascribe ye strength unto God: His excellency is over Israel, and His strength is in the clouds. O God, thou art terrible out of thy holy places: the God of Israel is He that giveth strength and power unto His people. Blessed be God" (vv. 34-35).

His innovative, visionary programs - heavy with parental/community involvement - were hallmarks of his leadership. He designed and implemented the Dallas school district's first Central Parent Advisory Council, which the National Advisory Council on the Education of Disadvantaged Children recommended to Congress and President Richard Nixon as a national model in 1972. He helped found state and national associations that secured needed program funding for under-served students in the 1970s. In 1981, he founded the Texas Parent Coordinating Council that made the Dallas school district a national leader in parental involvement.

Statistics show how he transformed low-performing schools. Fannie C. Harris Elementary had the Dallas district's lowest test scores when he became principal in 1985 but by 1989 was in the district's top 10 percent and the state's top five percent - and as a corollary, community crime


statistics dropped noticeably. Joseph J. Rhoads Elementary (now Learning Center) rose from lowest test scores in 1989 to receive awards for ranking #1 in Texas based on 1992-93 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) scores. Academically, the Benton Harbor, Michigan school district was the nation's lowest, but as an assistant superintendent from 1993-98, he guided curriculum/instruction so that mathematics and reading scores significantly rose and elementary science scores were higher than 56 percent of Michigan's 27 school districts. The Governor recognized those gains and Dr. Smith was inducted into Benton Harbor's Hall of Fame. Fifteen years later in Dallas, the African American Education Archives and History Program also inducted him into its Educators Hall of Fame in 2011.

Dr. Smith was born in Hope, Arkansas and earned degrees from Bishop College in Marshall, Texas, the University of North Texas, and a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership from the University of Minnesota. He was a teacher and principal

at five schools and held five administrative positions including director of Elementary & Secondary Education Acts (ESEA) Chapter 1 Program. From 2006-08, he was Principal Assessor for the Texas Education Agency's Region 10 and currently is an education consultant.

Outside education, he also was a campaign division manager in the successful state legislative race of former White House Chief of Staff Mack McLarty in Hope, Arkansas and later directed Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson's District 30 office in Dallas where he received Special Congressional Recognition.

Dr. Roscoe Smith, Ph.D and the late Velma Prince Smith, Ph.D., were married 53 years and have two daughters, four grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren. His more than two dozen honors and affiliations include lifetime memberships with the NAACP and Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity, Boy Scouts of America's highest honor - the Silver Beaver Award, and service awards from the Texas Legislative and U.S. Congress.




