## State Fair of Texas Awards \$1.3 Million to Texas Youth




2017 Pete Schenkel Scholarship Luncheon

Since its establishment in 1992, the State Fair of Texas® Youth Scholarship Program has continued to uphold the Fair's nonprofit mission of supporting agriculture, education and community involvement. To celebrate 25 years of supporting Texas youth through college scholarships, the State Fair honored its Dallas-area scholarship recipients at the annual Youth Scholarship Luncheon today. Students loved listening to this year's keynote speaker, Taylor Toyne, a Dallas native who founded local nonprofit For Oak Cliff and serves as a community impact associate at Commit!, another Dallas-based nonprofit that helps drive student achievement throughout Dallas county from cradle to career by leveraging data, community expertise and collaboration. Bill Cosby is blind.

It's been more than two years since the embattled, television and film legend, who was once known as "America's Dad," has spoken out publicly. During a recent interview with the NNPA Newswire, Cosby revealed that he's lost his sight.

Waking one morning about two years ago, he nervously called out to Camille, his wife.

"I can't see," he said. Doctors later confirmed the worst: that there was nothing that could be done to repair his vision.

"When he would perform, we'd draw a wide straight yellow line from backstage to the chair on the stage and he'd rehearse the walk, hours before the show," said Andrew Wyatt of the Purpose PR firm, a public relations agency in Birmingham, Ala. Wyatt has worked with Cosby for years.

Wyatt said that his star client has decided that it's time to talk. Together, Wyatt and Cosby said they grew comfortable that the NNPA Newswire would be more interested in "facts over sensationalism."

Cosby has shunned most media inquiries, since allegations of sexual misconduct surfaced in late 2014; some of those accusations dated back almost fifty years. In 2015, According to CNN, Cosby was charged with three counts of felony aggravated assault in a case involving Andrea Constand, a former Temple University employee.

Earlier this year, CNN reported that Cosby's, "criminal sexual assault trial will stay in Montgomery County Court in Pennsylvania, but the jurors will come from another Pennsylvania county."

In February, a federal judge dismissed a defamation lawsuit filed against Cosby by accuser Katherine McKee, according to USA Today.

"This marks the third defamation lawsuit against Cosby that was either withdrawn or dismissed recently, prompting some Cosby crowing," USA Today reported. "However, another defamation case against him, filed by six accusers, is still pending in the same federal court in Massachusetts."

While the beleaguered superstar declined to address any of his legal cases, his youngest daughter, Evin felt compelled to speak out.

In a statement, which can be read in its entirety on BlackPressUSA.com, Evin, 40, questioned the veracity of the allegations against her father.

"The harsh and hurtful accusations...that supposedly happened 40 or 50 years ago, before I was born, in another lifetime, and that have been carelessly repeated as truth without allowing my dad to defend himself and without requiring proof, has punished not just my dad, but every one of us," Evin said.

Devin T. Robinson X, an actor and renowned poet who's been featured on MTV, NBC, CBS and BET, said that Bill Cosby represents the finest example of someone being found guilty in the court of public opinion without ever facing trial.

"Punishing people before they're convicted in court only seems accurate when it serves a media narrative that doesn't hurt a specific demographic," Robinson said.

Dr. E. Faye Williams, the president and CEO of the National Congress of Black Women, Inc., agreed.

"If the President of the United States can go on working in the White House after he has bragged about doing gross, sexually-explicit and abusive things to women, without their permission, then justice requires that Bill Cosby should not be punished, unless he is convicted of crimes," said Williams.

Perhaps, the closest Cosby came to addressing his ongoing legal battles during the interview was when he opined about the true history of America.

"The history about African-Americans is a history of the United States; but the true histories, not the propaganda that is standard

in our nation's history books," Cosby said. "The great writer, James Baldwin, said, 'If you lie about me, then you lie about yourself.' The revolution is in the home. There is something about someone saying, 'I didn't know that,' that could cause a change in that person's thinking."

Cosby said he thinks about his illustrious career that, at least for now, has been placed on hold because of the court cases.

Few have achieved the legendary status enjoyed by Cosby.

His career has spanned more than six decades and includes a host of best-selling comedy albums and books, gold and platinum records, and five Grammy Awards.

With his role in "I-Spy" in the 1960s, Cosby became the first African-American co-star in a dramatic series, breaking TV's color barrier and winning three Emmy Awards.

After starring opposite Academy Award winner Sidney Poitier in the 1970s trilogy, "Uptown Saturday Night," "Let's Do It Again," and "A Piece of the Action," Cosby's star soared even higher in the 1980s when he single-handedly revived the family sitcom and, some argue, saved NBC with "The Cosby Show."

"Darn right," he said, when asked if he missed performing. "I miss it all and I hope that day will come. I have some routines and storytelling that I am working on."

Cosby continued: "I think about walking out on stage somewhere in the United States of America and sitting down in a chair and giving the performance that will be the beginning of the next chapter of my career."

Since 1992, the State Fair of Texas Youth Scholarship Program has awarded scholarships to more than 2,000 students for a total of more than \$10 million. To honor its past Chairman Pete Schenkel, each year the State Fair awards multiple college scholarships to selected applicants from five DISD high schools surrounding the Fair Park area – Irma Lerma Rangel Young Women's Leadership School, James Madison, Lincoln, North Dallas and Woodrow Wilson High Schools. In addition, the State Fair awards scholarships to selected applicants who have participated in youth livestock competitions at the State Fair of Texas and are enrolling in an agricultural-related or agricultural-benefiting curriculum.

Scholastic performance is important, with preference given to students ranking in the top 25% of their class. Recipients receive a \$6,000 grant, renewable in \$1,500 annual increments if the student meets the criteria for renewal. Students must attend an

accredited college or university within the state of Texas. Recipients must enroll in a minimum of 12 hours for the fall 2017 term. In order to qualify for scholarship renewal, recipients must enroll in, and pass, a minimum of 12 hours each semester. In addition, recipients must achieve a minimum 2.5 GPA their first semester and a 3.0 cumulative GPA for every semester thereafter.

The Fair congratulates these deserving students on their accomplishments and is happy to support them in reaching for and achieving their dreams. The State Fair of Texas is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and does not receive any government funding or support. Its nonprofit purpose is funded through the proceeds from the annual State Fair of Texas event. The net proceeds from the Fair are reinvested in Fair Park, in the form of capital improvements; given as scholarships to deserving youth throughout the state of Texas; used to support Fair Park museum facilities and community outreach programs; and used to improve the State Fair's operation. Recently I have submitted to NNPA a number of articles concerning Wells Fargo Bank, their lawsuits and practices concerning bank customers, many of them are our readers. I have more articles to come not only on Wells Fargo, but also Bank of America, AARP and AT&T. All of these are being written from the position of not only informing our readers, but identifying issues that are considered public policy concerns, especially by those charged with regulating these entities.

We must remember that our right to equal recognition and participation in discussions and ad revenues generated by these entities has nothing to do with audits, postal permits or numbers of readers. We are entitled to equal recognition. In the past, we have not received it because we did not know how to go after it.

The running of these articles in your newspapers and on your websites is key to one of the three things I always say corporate

America understands: bad publicity, loss profits and a vote cast against their interest.

In addition to these articles, we will be sending letters to the government agencies working with those we identify. The receipt of federal dollars from the government entitles us to fair and equal treatment in outreach. Our articles will generate and continue the level of public awareness needed to bring people to the table to talk business. Be sure that members of Congress and

decision makers in your area see the articles. Remember, you don't write the news, you just print it.

Hopefully, our efforts will generate letters to the editors. Hopefully, they will encourage your readers to think again about who they do business with when there is not return to us.

I am also tackling the practice of requiring us to be a 501 (c) nonprofit in order to receive funds when we should be in regular advertising budgets like mainstream America.

People were constantly reaching out to me about why doesn't your dad say something. I kept saying he's trying, but the media is only interested in the stories of the women. Friends of ours tried to help, but the media wouldn't print what they said or knew.

Our friends that spoke up were pressured to shut up. No one wanted to print their supportive words.

We live in a scandalous country where the more sexualized and provocative the story, the more attention it gets. We get all sorts of mixed up messages in our society.

### BLACK DOCTORS EARN LESS THAN WHITE DOCTORS

African-American physicians earn 15 percent less than White physicians—an average of \$262,000 compared to \$303,000—according to Medscape's 2017 Physicians Compensation Report.

Approximately 19,200 physicians across 26 areas of medicine were asked questions about annual compensation, race, gender, geography and job satisfaction.

The report, detailed by CBS News, revealed that African-American doctors are less likely to say they feel fairly compensated, with only half agreeing that they're earning what they should.

"Fifty-percent of African-American physicians don't feel fairly compensated," the report's editor Leslie Kane, a senior director of Medscape Business of Medicine, told CBS.

Racial and gender discrimination may certainly be a factor, Kane said, but there are other factors as well.

For example, if a doctor treats more Medicaid patients, their reimbursement is usually lower, since employer-insured patients tend to pay better.

"Tons of factors play into how much a physician makes," she said.

The survey found that the gender pay gap is narrower among younger doctors.

Male doctors ages 55 to 69 make 27 percent more than women, but the divide shrinks to 18 percent in physicians under the age of 34.

Being a doctor pays well, but there are still major discrepancies when it comes to paychecks within the medical profession. For the first time, the annual report looked at race as well as gender and other factors, revealing some significant disparities in pay.

Physicians' annual salaries averaged \$294,000, with specialists earning about \$100,000 more than primary care doctors.

Overall, average pay has risen by \$88,000 over the seven years Medscape has been conducting this survey—an increase attributed to intense competition for doctors among hospitals and health care systems.

The three highest-paying specialties were orthopedics (average annual compensation: \$489,000), plastic surgery (\$440,000) and cardiology (\$410,000). They earned well over twice as much as the average pediatrician (\$202,000) and family physician (\$209,000), the two lowest-paying categories.

A deeper dive into the data shows male doctors take home bigger paychecks in both primary care and specialty areas such as orthopedics and surgery.

Male primary care physicians made 15 percent more than women in 2016, while male specialists earned 31 percent more than their female colleagues.

Part of the reason may be that women are more likely to choose lower-paying specialties, Kane said.

"One of the things we look at is why there is this overall disparity. We look at what specialties women are going into and they go into less well-paying areas," she said.

"Fifty-three percent of pediatricians are women, one of lowest paid specialties. Thirty-nine percent of family physicians are women, also a lower-paying area," Kane said.

When it comes to the more highly paid medical specialties, only 9 percent of women are orthopedists and only 20 percent of general surgeons are female, Kane added.

African-American doctors typically work in primary care rather than specialties, the survey noted.


The annual compensation survey delved into race for the first time, said Kane, who has edited the report for seven years.

The report revealed higher salaries in rural states. Doctors in North Dakota are the highest paid in the U.S. followed by Alaska, South Dakota and Nebraska.

Washington D.C. counts as the lowest, while New York hovers toward the bottom of the list, which Kane and others chalk up to supply and demand; plenty of doctors cluster in big cities, while rural areas need to offer more money to attract staff.

Patients may be glad to know that regardless of pay, most doctors like what they do: eight out of 10 physicians said they'd still choose medicine if they had the chance to pick a career all over again.

### Peterson says he's agreed on 2-year contract with Saints



**(AP)** — Free-agent running back Adrian Peterson says he has agreed to a two-year contract with the New Orleans Saints.

The Saints have not announced a deal, but Peterson told ESPN in a statement Tuesday that he's agreed to play in New Orleans.

"It goes without saying that the Saints are really solid behind Drew Brees. I feel like my skill set can make them even more dominant as a unit," Peterson said in his statement. "They have a great offensive line, which is something that stood out to me as well."

Peterson, 32, has spent his entire 10-year NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings, surpassing 1,000 yards rushing in a season seven times and 2,000 yards once. His career-best 2,097-yard rushing season in 2012 came one season after he had reconstructive knee surgery to repair a torn ACL.

Peterson played in only three games last season before being sidelined by another knee injury, a meniscal tear that was surgically repaired. He also missed 15 games in 2014 because of a child abuse case in which he pleaded guilty to misdemeanor reckless assault. The victim was his son, then 4 years old.

Peterson's last full season was in 2015, when he had 1,485 yards and 11 touchdowns rushing.

Now, Peterson joins a club for which he could wind up as a backup running back in an offense that passes the ball most of the time. Mark Ingram, who is coming off one of his best seasons, is New Orleans' incumbent starter at running back. Brees led the NFL in passing last season with 5,208 yards.

Yet, in his statement, Peterson did not seem concerned about how frequently he'd get to carry the ball in the Saints' system.

"I could tell from talking to head coach Sean Payton over the last two weeks that he did his due diligence in evaluating how I could contribute," Peterson said.

### AP source: Raiders agree to deal with Marshawn Lynch

**(AP)** — The Oakland Raiders have agreed to a two-year contract to bring running back Marshawn Lynch out of retirement.

A person familiar with the deal told The Associated Press that the sides have agreed on the terms pending a physical for Lynch on Wednesday. The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the contract has not been finalized. NFL Network first reported the deal.

Once Lynch passes the physical, the Raiders will need to acquire his rights in a trade with Seattle. That's expected to be mostly a formality because the Seahawks don't want to pay Lynch the \$9 million he would be owed when he comes out of retirement.

The teams are expected to swap late-round draft picks in 2018.

Lynch also must apply to the NFL for reinstatement from the retired list before he can play with the Raiders. NFL Network said Lynch would get a \$3 million base deal this season, with a chance to make an additional \$2 million if he rushes for at least 1,000 yards.

Lynch retired following the 2015 season but decided he wanted to come back

and play with his hometown team. The Raiders met with him early this month to gauge his interest and wanted to get a deal done before the draft.

The Raiders have a need for a power running back after losing Latavius Murray in free agency. Second-year backs Jalen Richard and DeAndre Washington are both smaller backs and are not as suited to short-yardage and goal-line situations.

"Marshawn is one of the best running backs I've ever played against in my short career so far," Raiders defensive end Khalil Mack said last week. "It would be a great, great, great treat to have him on this side, on the dark side."

Lynch was perhaps the best power back in the league before he retired. He had double digits in touchdown runs every season from 2011 to 2014, and his 51 TDs on the ground are the most in the NFL since 2011 despite playing just seven games in 2015 and being retired last season.

The 31-year-old Lynch averaged 3.8 yards per carry in his limited action in 2015 before retiring. Before that, he was one of the game's top running backs, with more than 1,200 yards

rushing in each of the previous four seasons.

"I think he's the most physical guy I've played against," Mack said. "I remember playing against him, I believe, my second season. They ran a power right at me. I remember that play. You're talking about one of the most physical guys I've played against, running back-wise."

His production in Oakland should be helped by running behind a line that had three Pro Bowlers last season in left tackle Donald Penn, left guard Kelechi Osemele and center Rodney Hudson. In his final year with the Seahawks, Lynch averaged just 1.1 yards per carry before contact, the lowest for any back with at least 100 carries, according to Pro Football Focus.

For his career, Lynch has rushed for 9,112 yards and 74 touchdowns.

Lynch was born and raised in Oakland and played college ball nearby at California. He still has strong ties to the area through his Beast Mode company and would be a welcome addition for a fan base still stung by the team's move to Las Vegas for the 2020 season.
