Sidnee King, a 20 year-old broadcast journalism student at Howard University, admitted that she was nervous about her summer plans, the day before the 2016 "Discover the Unexpected" (DTU) journalism fellows were announced.

King said that she missed the DTU program launch on March 23, when officials from the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), Chevrolet and the School of Communications at Howard University revealed that eight student journalists would be selected to produce content for four NNPA member publications.

"She said, 'It's okay, you're going to figure it out, don't worry,' because I panic some times," said King.

King's mother reassured her that things would work out, and when they did, King couldn't wait to share the great news.

"So I just called her and told her that I figured out what I'm doing this summer and it includes an internship and a scholarship and all this good stuff, so she was really excited for me," said King, a native of Bloomfield Hills, Mich.

Gracie Lawson-Borders, the dean of the School of Communications at Howard University said that she hoped that people see the young journalists as the future storytellers of the Black community.

Women will bring peace in the world

On April 30th, hundreds of women, peace-builders, and peace activists from around the globe will gather in Dallas for the Annual "A World of Women for World Peace" Conference. During the annual event attendees will share strategies for building bridges toward global peace, a role for which women are uniquely qualified to assume.

I began the peace conference 15-years ago, shortly after the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. I was horrified by a picture of boy-soldiers from Liberia, ages 12 and 14, on the front page of Newsweek magazine. They were dressed in war gear and armed with machine guns. At the time, two of my grandsons were about the same age as these young boys, and I just thought "enough is enough!"

I knew that I had to do something about the situation. I knew that every soldier I saw had a mother, a sister, an aunt, or a grandmother. These

women in their lives were uniquely positioned to influence these soldiers, no matter where they are in the world. My efforts started with women who are the mothers of young boys like the ones I saw on the cover of that magazine, whose lives are sacrificed in the name of war. We must recognize and empower these women to facilitate peace-building, peace-making, and peace-keeping activities across the world.

We must also recognize the experts and leaders who help us to plant the seeds of peace. As a result, the annual peace dialogue was born. I know that when women are at the tables of power and influence, they can directly influence a peaceful resolution to many of the world's conflicts.

Over the years, proponents of peace from throughout the world have participated in the event. Conference participants have included elected officials, international peace activists, victims of violence and aggression and ordinary citizens. All of them have contributed significantly to the global effort to bring about peace. Last year, we held a peace conference in Taiwan.

This year's conference promises to be as exciting and productive as the others. Our featured panelists include Sister

Rosemary Nyirume from Gulu, Uganda; Mu Naw Di, a teenage survivor of conflict in Myanmar and Nikiya Natale, a distinguished immigration attorney for Refugee Services of Texas.

Sister Rosemary, cited as one of the most influential people in the world by Time Magazine, operates a shelter in her country for women and girls who have been the victims of rape, domestic violence, and war. She has also helped to change the lives of young girls who were once forced to become child-soldiers.

When writing about Sister Rosemary, the academy award winning actor, Forest Whitaker, said "The traumas she heals are unfathomable, but the reach of her love is boundless." Sister Rosemary's commitment to healing the wounds caused by war and conflict are illustrative of the meaning and purpose of "A World of Women for World Peace," and of the women whose lives are devoted to ending human conflict for the sake of our planet and for all of its inhabitants.

I am looking forward to this year's conference and hope that all of you will us re-emphasize in your own communities the necessity of peace and diplomacy, both here at home and across the globe.

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS" ROMANS 1:18-32 A NEED FOR GOD'S RIGHTEOUSNESS - MANKIND'S REBELLION AGAINST GOD

As we continue the marvelous letter of Romans, we endeavored to present Paul's argument that the Gentiles were guilty and stood con-

demned on the basis that they spurned the natural revelation in creation that revealed the existence of God; and through rejecting natural revelation that concluded God's existence, the Gentiles rejected God Himself and exhibited unrestrained immoral behavior (Romans 1:18-32). In chapter 2, Paul will now present his argument against the Jewish race, showing their need for the righteousness of God. Paul will show that the Jews who had many advantages (Romans 9:4-5) and were acquainted with the Law (Romans 3:2), did no better with regard to keeping the Law. As the Jews passed judgment on the Gentiles, they were really condemning themselves (2:1).

In verse 2, Paul declares that

God's judgment is according to truth; thus He will judge all men according to one standard - truth. God will always judge correctly, for Abraham said - "Shall not the judge of all the earth do right?" (Genesis 18:25). According to verse 3, most Jews would look in disdain at the Gentiles and conclude that they were beyond hope because of the gross sins that they committed in chapter 1. However, Paul knew that the Gentiles, as well as the Jews, needed God's grace. So, Paul pointed out the fact that if one rejects the truth of the gospel (Galatians 2:5), it is impossible to "escape the judgment of God."

In verse 4, the "goodness of

God" is a great motive for coming to repentance. The good-

ness of God is expressed through God's love; and to spurn His love is to despise the riches of His goodness and forbearance." The basic idea of repentance is to change one's mind with a resultant change in one's life. It is God's supreme desire "that all should come to repentance" (II Peter 3:9) and to confess Jesus as Lord (Romans 10:9).

According to verse 5, those who continue to exhibit a stubborn and unrepentant heart are treasuring God's wrath and His wrath will unleash upon them on the "day of wrath" when God's righteous judgment will be served. Furthermore, in verse 6, whereas deeds are not the basis for one's salvation, they do reveal a living faith to the

world (James 2:20) and provide a standard for judgment and reward (I Corinthians 3:13; Revelation 20:12). Whereas, good works can never secure our salvation, "patient continuance in well doing" is clear and ample evidence of our salvation (v. 7). On the other hand, in verses 8 and 9, those who disregard the truth by living wickedly, will experience "tribulation and anguish." Those who reject the truth, whether he is Jew or Gentile, will be judged by God according to truth. The truth of God's word is revealed to all, for "there is no respect of persons with God" (verses 10-11).

Paul preached the gospel to both Jews and Gentiles (Romans 1:16). Although the Gentiles were not privileged in

receiving the law as the Jews; however, the Gentiles who did not follow the light that they had in creation would still "perish without law." However, the Jews who had the law and did not keep the law, will be judged by the law they had received (v. 12). We must remember that the purpose of the law was not to save but to identify sin (Romans 3:20; 7:7). Those who lived under the law were never acquitted. God could acquit no one who had broken it. Only Jesus Christ can fully acquit a sinner! The very law that many Jews maintained that they kept, only served to indict them (v. 13).

In closing, the divine standard by which all men will be judged is God's truth - and His truth is fully revealed by His Son, Jesus Christ (vs. 14-16).

for 1860), then the 300 she freed cost \$300,000 in 1860 dollars, or about \$8.3 million in today's dollars (calculated from The Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index). That's quite a blow for a slaveholding society to absorb. Every time an enslaved person ran away, they struck a blow for freedom, and a blow against the economic stability of the South.

Enslavement was at the root of the development of contemporary U.S. capitalism. Black lives were the collateral that plantation owners used to purchase more land, to purchase more slaves, to purchase equipment, to expand. Enslaved people were, in many ways, a form of currency. Harriet Tubman gracing the \$20 bill makes perfect sense.

The new \$10 bill is supposed to be available in 2020, nearly four years from now.

The new \$20 bill may not be available until 2030. The design and production schedule have to be approved by the Federal Reserve Board. That shouldn't be much of a challenge - Fed Chairman Janet Yellen has hailed the decision to put Harriet Tubman on the \$20 bill, and many have applauded the other elements of currency design. Perhaps the Fed can be lobbied to speed the production schedule up. I can't

wait to cash a check and ask for my money in "Harriets."

As exciting as the currency design is, it is a symbolic, not a substantive change. Real change would close the income gap between men and women. Real change would close the racial economic gap. Real change would take a look at the reparations issue. In this last year of his Presidency, President Obama could use his executive order to appoint a commission to look into issues of racial economic justice. He could make an amazing, if belated, contribution by bringing the reparations issue to the economic forefront. The Black Lives Matter community has raised the reparations issue with both Democratic Presidential candidates Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders. President Obama would do his successor a favor by starting the public work on this key issue.

I suppose we have to reconcile ourselves to progress at a snail's pace, to symbolism, not substance. Still, the image of our economic freedom fighter on the twenty-dollar bill will be inspirational for all of us, especially for the young people who don't know all of the sordid details of our history of enslavement. I hope that as we talk about Harriet Tubman on the money, we also talk about the economic impact she had on the institution of

slavery by freeing those 300 people. This is part of the history we must never forget, and Tubman's presence on the \$20 will help us to remember.

The most exciting thing about the presence of Harriet Tubman on the \$20 bill is the way that the change came about. The public was engaged. Hundreds of thousands of people signed petitions, and participated with some of the online polls that various groups sponsored. The Treasury Secretary asked for public input, and he got it. He says he was surprised about the amount of input that he got. He should not have been. Both women and men were passionate about changing symbols of supremacy, ridding the currency of Andrew Jackson whose role in the oppression of Native Americans was shameful, including women on the currency. Perhaps this passion of symbolism can be converted in passion for substance. Perhaps we can use currency change to trigger a substantive movement for economic justice.

THE FLINT WATER CRISIS CAN STILL BRING OUT THE BEST IN AMERICANS

Our nation continues to marshal support for the people of Flint, Michigan, as the city rebuilds after its water supply was found to be contaminated with extremely dangerous amounts of lead. The long-term exposure of Flint residents to lead, which even in small amounts can cause grave health problems, has raised the public's awareness of this health crisis and prompted the call for immediate and enduring action - now and for years to come.

Perhaps the most devastating consequence of the Flint water crisis is the uncertain impact that prolonged lead exposure will have on the city's children. We know that infants and children under the age of 6 are exceptionally vulnerable to lead poisoning, which can severely hinder mental and physical development and produce a host of health complications, including learning and behavioral disabilities, slowed growth, poor muscle coordination, hyperactivity, and lower IQ.

More than 200 of the city's children have already shown signs of elevated blood-lead

levels, and the symptoms of poisoning can set in long after the child is no longer exposed - meaning that a child who appears well now can still face daunting health complications later in life.

We do not yet know the gravity of what has transpired in Flint. But we do know this: Flint's children deserve every opportunity to be healthy, and we must come together to develop a comprehensive strategy that guarantees the compassionate care they need to overcome short- and long-term challenges to health.

Flint has already seen an outpouring of support from community members, nonprofits, social service agencies and healthcare providers. Organizations including the Greater Flint Health Coalition, the United Way of Genesee County and Genesys Health System - an Ascension hospital serving Flint and its mid-Michigan neighbors - are working together to maximize the benefits of their support services and develop a long-term healthcare strategy for the generation of Flint kids who might be adversely affected.

But there is still much more work to be done, and it will take all clinical resources available to address Flint's long-

term health concerns for impacted children.

Underlying the crisis in Flint are the many socioeconomic barriers that Flint's low-income children and families faced long before the tragedy, including a lack of access to quality healthcare and affordable housing. In a city of more than 100,000 Americans - where 57 percent of residents are black and more than 40 percent live at or below the federal poverty level - there are virtually no grocery stores to be found. Together, we're working to change that and ensure that Flint's children are not left wanting - for nutritious food, early education and access to integrated social services - ever again.

The road ahead is long, and we cannot do it alone. It will take a national effort from healthcare providers, policymakers, civic leaders and individuals to equip Flint's children with the compassionate care they deserve.

Even the smallest act of service can help address the short- and long-term costs of this crisis. The Flint Child Health and Development Fund - created by a united committee of residents, healthcare providers and community organizations - will be used to provide social services, early childhood edu-

cation, behavioral health services and more to children in Flint. The Flint Child Health and Development Fund is so important to the local community that Ascension Michigan (Borgess Health - Kalamazoo, Crittenton Hospital Medical Center - Rochester, Genesys Health System - Grand Blanc, St. John Providence - Detroit, St. Mary's of Michigan - Saginaw, and St. Joseph Hospital - Tawas City) has supported the initiative by donating to this effort.

Even after the water runs clean in Flint once again, its children - and our community - may bear these scars for years to come. And so we must confront the health ramifications of the crisis and support positive health outcomes for Flint's children. It will require our foresight and collaboration to guarantee their long-term care.



Brief Sports News

NEW YORK (AP) -- New England Patriots quarterback Tom Brady must serve a four-game "Deflategate" suspension imposed by the NFL, a federal appeals court ruled, overturning a lower judge and siding with the league in a battle with the players union.

A three-judge panel of the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Manhattan ruled 2-to-1 that Commissioner Roger Goodell did not deprive Brady of "fundamental fairness" with his procedural rulings. The split decision may end the legal debate over the scandal that led to months of football fans arguing over air pressure and the reputation of one of the league's top teams.

DALLAS (AP) - Johnny Manziel is expected to be indicted Tuesday on allegations that he attacked his ex-girlfriend in January, an attorney for the troubled former NFL quarterback said.

Robert Hinton told The Associated Press that prosecutors have notified him they expect a local grand jury to sign off on a misdemeanor assault charge for family violence for the 23-year-old Manziel. The Class A misdemeanor carries up to one year in jail and a \$4,000 fine.

Hinton, a longtime Dallas defense attorney with ties to the district attorney's office, said he expected a judge to set a bond soon after Tuesday's indictment and that Manziel would then present himself for booking. He said there have not yet been any discussions about reaching a deal to end the case before trial.

Brittany Dunn, a spokeswoman for the Dallas County district attorney's office, previously declined to confirm media reports Monday that Manziel had been indicted. Prosecutors announced last week that they had presented

a misdemeanor assault case against Manziel.

PRO BASKETBALL

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) - Stephen Curry will miss at least two weeks for Golden State with a sprained ligament in his right knee, dealing a blow to the Warriors' hopes of following a record-breaking season with a second straight championship.

The Warriors said an MRI on Curry's knee determined he had a Grade 1 sprain of the MCL and will be re-evaluated in two weeks.

That timetable would lead to Curry missing the rest of the first round of the playoffs and likely at least the first four games in round two if the Warriors are able to advance.

Golden State leads Houston 3-1 in its first-round series. Game 5 is Wednesday night in Oakland.

Curry was injured on the final play of the first half of Sunday's 121-94 win in Houston when he slid awkwardly on a wet spot on the court and fell. He immediately grabbed his knee and jogged with a limp to the locker room.

BASEBALL

DETROIT (AP) - Detroit Tigers center fielder Tyler Collins directed an obscene gesture at boozing home fans after losing a ball in the lights.

"To be at home and to hear boos after that play hit a trigger inside of me and I lashed out completely inappropriately," Collins said after Detroit beat the Oakland Athletics 7-3. "I'm absolutely embarrassed it happened and I'm very sorry to everybody in Detroit."

Collins extended the middle finger on his left hand and waved it from right to left, and also appeared to yell an obscenity at the fans. He said he could not see the flyball hit by Oakland's Marcus Semien, and an error charged to left

fielder Justin Upton allowed Semien to reach third, bringing on the boos.

"Clearly, it's something that can't happen," Tigers manager Brad Ausmus said. "I spoke to Tyler immediately in the dugout, in the tunnel, after it happened and I spoke to him after the game. He regrets it."

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Let's Talk About Testicular Cancer

The website "Deadspin" recently ranked all the different types of balls in the world, from best to worst. The "worst" (#43) are hair balls. The "best" are Super Balls (the bouncy kind).

While I agree baseballs should be in the top five (#4), it's surprising testicles (i.e. male balls) are lower-middle of the pack, taking the #28 spot. The list launched on April 1st, too; the first day of Testicular Cancer Awareness Month.

It's probably safe to assume the connection between balls and the awareness month never occurred to Deadspin. That's normal: People don't think about testicular cancer very often. Nobody likes thinking about lumps on a man's ball, unless you're someone with an odd way of viewing the world.

"Most urologists have a pretty good sense of humor," said Dr. Tim Davenport from Tennessee, who uses robotic surgery to treat various cancers in men's nether regions.

Why don't men pay more attention to their balls? At least, pay attention in ways that could eventually save their life?

"Thinking about that stuff, the awareness is not where it should be because men feel like they're indestructible," said Davenport. "But to sum it all up, there are five things people need to keep in mind:

1.Remove the stigma of talking about guys' own health issues.

2.Take the time to do a quick and cost-free self exam.

3.Learn how to identify if something's wrong. Basically, see if it feels like a small, painless stone is attached to your testicle.

4.Have the courage to talk to your doctor immediately.

5.Keep a sense of urgency, because the sooner you treat a

problem like that, the lower your risk of morbidity. In other words, you end up paying a lot less money for treatment that's way less intense."

On top of conveniently speaking in list form for readers, Dr. Davenport knows what he's talking about. Most testicular cancer cases are curable if detected early. For the many men who succumb to the disease, however, sometimes it's a matter of not detecting or acting in time.

Testicular cancer is primarily a problem young men face between the ages of 15 and 35 years old. That's probably the worst time to face a potentially deadly disease in a man's life: Most young men never consider going to the doctor for anything, let alone for something many associate with a manhood problem.

"God gave us two testicles," said Davenport. "If we have to remove a testicle, it typically will not affect testosterone or your reproductive potential. But make sure you talk to your doctor: that's the most important thing."

Even though that's a simple reality, the idea of checking your own balls for lumps is still a tough sell. The key to changing the minds of young men is humor, according to the creator of the "Save the Doodads" campaign, Mike Leventhal of Men's Health Network (MHN).

And it's working. "Save the Doodads" is a national program, but is the only testicular cancer outreach/awareness initiative within Tennessee encouraging this important health dialogue. Leventhal recalled a moment when the mother of a 17 year old battling testicular cancer reached out to thank him and MHN for creating such an important initiative:

"Her voice was trembling with tears when I answered the phone. She explained that her son under-

went the last of his radiation treatments the day prior to her contacting me and his doctors believe he will be able to begin college in the Fall," said Leventhal. "But most importantly, he will live cancer free. Her gratitude for Save the Doodads extended far beyond herself, her son, and their extended family. She was thankful for MHN's efforts to inform communities about the risks of testicular cancer and the importance of early detection."

Leventhal partners with universities and their colleges of public health across the country to highlight the problem during special events on campus. Soon, he hopes to collaborate with middle and high schools to stress being proactive regarding their health.


"Let's be honest: A big part of the outreach is to raise financial resources," said Leventhal. "But that money goes straight into programs dedicated to education and reaching more guys. The best feeling we get is when we have fun implementing projects that truly help people."
