

SIGNS LOUISIANA DISASTER DECLARATION

The President has declared a major disaster exists in the State of Louisiana and ordered Federal aid to supplement state and local recovery efforts in the area affected by severe storms and flooding beginning on August 11, 2016, and continuing.

The President's action makes federal funding available to affected individuals in the parishes of East Baton Rouge, Livingston, St. Helena, and Tangipahoa.

Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organi-

FEMA said that damage surveys are continuing in other areas, and more parishes and additional forms of assistance may be designated after the assessments are fully completed.

FEMA said that residents and business owners who sustained losses in the designated parishes can begin applying for assistance tomorrow by registering online at <http://www.DisasterAssistance.gov> or by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY) for the hearing and aspeech impaired. The toll-free telephone numbers will operate from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (local time) seven days a week until further notice.

DCHHS Reports the 26th and 27th Zika Virus Case in Dallas County



Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) is reporting the 26th and 27th cases of Zika virus in Dallas County in 2016. These cases were confirmed through testing in the DCHHS lab. DCHHS has submitted the cases for review to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

A 50 year-old resident of Grand Prairie was infected with the virus during recent travel to the Dominican Republic. A 6 year-old resident of Dallas was infected during recent travel to Guatemala. For medical confidentiality and personal privacy reasons, DCHHS does not provide additional

identifying information.

While sexual transmission of Zika virus is possible, it is primarily transmitted to people by Aedes species mosquitoes. The most common symptoms of Zika virus are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting several days to a week.

DCHHS advises individuals with symptoms to see a healthcare provider if they visited an area where Zika virus is present or had sexual contact with a person who traveled to an area where Zika virus is present. There is no specific medication available to treat Zika

virus and there is not a vaccine. The best ways to avoid Zika virus are to avoid mosquito bites and sexual contact with a person who has Zika virus.

There are currently no reports of Zika virus being locally-transmitted by mosquitoes in Dallas County. However, imported cases make local spread by mosquitoes possible because the mosquitoes that can transmit the virus are found locally. DCHHS advises recent travelers with Zika virus symptoms as well as individuals diagnosed with the virus to protect themselves from further mosquito bites.

From 'Crack Baby' to Mentor, Shawn Blanchard Defies the Odds

In New York, Blanchard co-founded a mentoring program to reach out to young men with similar backgrounds as his growing up. He even temporarily adopted one of the young men in the program who was in particularly bad shape at the time. When he graduated, however, the young man had become class president, touted a 3.8 GPA and was accepted to every college he applied to.

News coverage from the temporary adoption prompted a publishing company to reach out to learn more about the story. When they heard about Blanchard's background, they asked him to write a book for them. His book entitled, "How About that for a Crack Baby," delves into the details of his past and how he overcame everything that was in his way.

"People can expect an emotional roller coaster," said Blanchard. "It's going to entertain you, it's going to

show you how you can do anything you want to do, it's going to challenge you to mentor and be mentored."

The young author moved back to Detroit to go to law school and the book came out five years later. He spent time teaching math at this alma mater, started a fitness company and became a co-owner of a custom suit company. Blanchard continued his work as a mentor in the mayor's office as the director of youth services. He's helping ignite President Obama's My Brother's Keeper initiative in the city of Detroit.

Today, Blanchard is the CEO of Shawn Blanchard Productions, which focuses on public speaking, publishing mentorship, entrepreneurship and the image of excellence.

"I'm excited about duplicating greatness," said Blanchard. "I want to keep making sure I raise the bar, so more people start falling into the rule instead of the exception."

DART police to get life-saving training on how to 'Stop the Bleed'



STOP THE BLEED

Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) invited media representatives to join DART police officers taking part in a specialized training session to learn life-saving techniques in emergency situations.

The training is part of a national initiative call 'Stop the Bleed', a campaign that looks to empower immediate responders and bystanders with the ability to act quickly and save lives.

Trauma surgeons and educational staff from Baylor Scott & White Health will teach officers how to use a tourniquet to stop bleeding from gunshot wounds or other

life-threatening injuries. Officers will also learn how to put pressure on the wounds to stem bleeding before medical personnel arrive.

The training session took place from 9 to 11 a.m., Wed., Aug. 17, at Dallas Area Rapid Transit Police Headquarters, 2111 S. Corinth St. Road, Dallas, TX, 75203 across from Illinois Station on the Blue Line.

Training consisted of a one-hour classroom presentation followed by hands-on demonstrations for officers to learn wound packing, applying tourniquets to others and themselves, and ensuring an injured victim's airway is clear for breathing.

Once trained, DART officers will be issued tourniquets that can be worn on their belt provided by Baylor Scott & White Health.

Just Mercy: One Lawyer's Fight

My Day by Dr. J. Ester Davis



Please, buy this book! Do not let the summer end without reading it. It will transform your understanding of mercy, justice and strengthen the need to exercise your vote.

What is the title? "Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson"

This is a true story about an African American attorney fighting for black boys.

Did you read it? Yes, indeed, I did. This summer has been riveted with news about black boys.

One news story after another has been blatantly centered in our midst. Another senseless killing of a black male. And there is no escape. It does not matter if you go to college, get good grades, you still need mercy because of the 'real war on black boys'.

"Just Mercy" is fiercely

compelling. "Just Mercy" is a true story for mercy to redeem us and a cry to fix our broken system of justice. It is about the living black males who only exist if they join the justice club. We know that our jails and prisons are filled with African American boys. And we find those numbers repeatedly quoted to us about populations painful and sad. But this book is about someone doing God's work, fighting for the voiceless, the outcast, the poor, and the oppressed. I read where Mr. Stevenson told a radio host that 'we have a justice system that treats you better if you are rich and guilty than if you are poor and innocent.' The book mixes commentary and reportage, triumph and failure, political rhetoric and common sense.

Not just a book, but for thirty years now, Attorney Stevenson has won relief for scores of condemned prisoners, exonerated a number of innocent ones and confronted abuse of the mentally ill, the mentally handicapped and

children in prison. Now along the way, Stevenson has encountered tragic defeats. He points to a specific case involving the politics of crime, punishment and the hypocrisy it breeds.

The mission is clear and the message is an ancient one all familiar to blacks. Criminal justice in America seems criminal. . . complete with errors, misleading quotes and racism. Criminal justice in America is hardhearted because of its resistance to reform and learn from the obvious mistakes history has unveiled.

Reform starts with the mighty vote in every state in America. The last day to register to vote is approaching. Register, go vote and take your neighbor with you.

SEAWORLD'S TEXAS AND FLORIDA RESCUE TEAMS JOIN FORCES TO SAVE ENTANGLED DOLPHIN



Texas Marine Mammal Stranding Network

This week, the SeaWorld San Antonio Rescue Team joined forces with the SeaWorld Orlando Rescue Team as well as The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and members of the Texas Marine Mammal Stranding Network to help rescue a bottlenose dolphin that was found entangled in fishing gear near South Padre Island in Texas.

After hours of searching, the devoted rescue teams retrieved the dolphin and removed more than three pounds of fishing gear that entangled the animal, including hooks, leaders, fishing line and more.

Once the dolphin was rescued and detangled, a SeaWorld Veterinarian and Animal Care Staff assessed the



animal, gave it a complete physical checkup, took blood samples and cultures and gave the dolphin antibiotics for possible infection due to the entanglement. The animal was released back in to the ocean.

Entanglement in fishing gear and similar items can lead to

suffocation or internal bleeding if hooks and lures are swallowed by the animal. To help prevent harm to wild dolphins and other animals, it is best to dispose of old line and hooks properly and be mindful of fishing locations where animals are known to surface to breathe, so they do not become caught in cast lines.

The public can always assist injured marine animals by calling the local Marine Mammal Stranding Network. The Texas Marine Mammal Stranding Network hotline number is 1-800-9-MAMMAL (1-800-962-6625).

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS"

ROMANS 8:12-27 VICTORY OVER THE ENSLAVING POWER OF SIN, PART II

Having discussed in Romans 8:10-11 that the Holy Spirit imparts life to the believers, Paul will now relate in Romans 8:12-13 that the Holy Spirit empowers the believer in his spiritual life. Because the Holy Spirit has given us life and guarantees our future resurrection, we are obligated to live a holy life. Although the believer lives in a temptation

plagued world, he is obligated to choose between the things of the flesh and things of the Spirit. Living after the flesh will bring about spiritual defeat; whereas, holiness should characterize the believer. Because believers are sons of God through faith in Jesus Christ, we are obligated to be led by the Spirit of God (Romans 8:14). Thus, every believer is to live each day in the power and control of the Holy Spirit.

Because believers have received the Spirit of sonship, they are not to be enslaved to sin or fear. Moreover, believers can approach God in an intimate manner calling Him "Abba Father" (v. 15). In verses 16-17 the Holy Spirit testifies to the fact

that we are God's children; and being children of God, we are His heirs (Galatians 4:7), and joint-heirs with Christ. Because believers share in the suffering of Christ, Paul wanted the believers to know that their present sufferings cannot compare with their future glory (v. 18). Knowing this truth, believers can be encouraged to bear present afflictions. Although believers look forward to sharing in Christ's glory, the entire creation looks in anticipation of being redeemed from the curse of sin; thus as God's plan of salvation is completed for His people, creation will look in anticipation from its bondage to the curse imposed because of Adam's original sin (vs. 19-22) see Genesis 3:14,

17-19. Returning to his original subject of believers' experiencing sufferings (v. 18), believers are groaning like nature looking forward to their full adoption when they will receive glorified bodies (v. 23). Finally, Paul expresses to these believers that their bodies will be delivered from the bondage of sin; therefore, those who respond by faith to God's promise will have hope, a confident expectation that their bodies will be redeemed. Thank God that in our moment of weakness, we have the Holy Spirit to help us (vs. 26-27). Again, thank God that the Holy Spirit intercedes for us when proper prayer eludes us.

Film Review: Miss Sharon Jones!

Sharon Jones & the Dap-Kings is a Grammy-nominated R&B band from Brooklyn. Their groove is funky like James Brown's. Jones' gyrations are as wild and ferocious as Tina Turner's. The group's soul shakes and their lead singer's indomitable spirit blend into something very special, heartfelt and familial. When Jones is diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, it rocks the band's foundation. Her fight for life and that harrowing journey is what's on view in this very emotional and inspiring documentary titled, "Miss Sharon Jones!"

According to the American Cancer Society, for all stages of pancreatic cancer combined the one-year relative survival rate is 20 percent and the five-year survival rate is 6 percent. Blacks are more likely to be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer than Whites.

Jones is the lead singer and the star attraction of her group. Her ability to perform and record determines whether the artists she loves can keep a roof over their heads and food on the table. She has a lot of responsibilities and a lot of reasons to want to beat her deadly illness. At just 4'11" she carries the weight of a mountain on her shoulders. Jones' willingness to share her feelings, fears and her

recollections of being told she was "too short, too fat and too dark" to have a successful singing career is never less than courageous. Her gutsy outlook on life puts viewers squarely in her corner. She's an everyday superwoman letting a lot of people ride on her cape.

In many ways, she is no different than others who undergo cancer treatments: surgery, week-upon-week of chemotherapy, a loss of energy, loss of hair, doubts and despair. In other ways her experience is so unique because of her public life and a support system that consists predominately of friends and medical/healing practitioners and not her immediate family. Veteran documentarian

Barbara Kopple (Oscar winner, "Harlan County U.S.A." and "American Dream") takes the audience behind the scenes as this ultra-cool music group with an old school feel goes through hell and back. Kopple's efforts are aided by judicious editing (Anne Fratto, Jean Tsien) and illuminating cinematography (Gary Griffin, Tony Hardmon, Kyle Kibbe).

For 94 heart-warming minutes, every emotion, every dramatic confrontation, setback and supportive gesture is on view. It's hard not to be touched by it all. It's as if Kopple's camera is an invisible friend that lets you hold Jones' hand along the way. Witnessing the singer's day-to-day battle is an extraordinarily humbling and enlightening experience.

This personal story will make you appreciate the very essence of life. By the end of the film, you'll desperately want Jones to recover, revive her career and make it back to center stage. Will she?

Bring a hanky and get blessed by a beautiful spirit. "Miss Sharon Jones!" is pure joy.





New DART Service Starts August 29 for Oak Cliff, Downtown Dallas and Design District



Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) customers should plan to obtain new timetables when the newest portion of the Dallas Streetcar opens Monday, Aug. 29. The extension, just under one mile, reaches the Bishop Arts District and has two stops: Zang Boulevard at 6th Street and between Davis and Seventh streets (Bishop Arts). Hours remain 9:30 a.m. to midnight, but frequency improves to every 20 minutes along the entire Dallas Streetcar service area of 2.4 miles and six stops.

With the streetcar extension, Route 722 (D-Link) becomes an expanded downtown-only service and no longer goes to Oak Cliff. The current southern loop over Davis and Jefferson is being replaced by New Route 723 Bishop Arts Service.

Downtown D-Link Debuts To avoid duplicating coverage, Route 722 (D-Link) will become a downtown Dallas-only service, operating over a bi-directional route between the Kay Bailey Hutchison Dallas Convention Center and Uptown, eliminating the current clockwise and counter-clockwise loops. From the Convention Center,

buses will travel on Lamar, Wood, Houston, Ross, Field, Main, Harwood, Marilla, Cesar Chavez and Pearl, then loop over Flora and Olive to Cedar Springs and turn back over Pearl to basically the same route in reverse.

The new D-Link will extend to Farmers Market and numerous other downtown hotels and attractions. The free route will operate every 15 minutes, 11 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. Monday-Saturday. Service into the Victory Park area will be provided by Route 749 (formerly 49), both the Green and Orange Rail lines, and the Trinity Railway Express. The late-evening D-Link extension to Cedars will be discontinued, but customers can still connect to Convention Center or Cedars Stations on the Red or Blue DART Rail lines.

Oak Cliff Gets New Route 723 (Bishop Arts Service)

The outer portion of the current D-Link route will be replaced by new Route 723 (Bishop Arts Service), every 20 minutes from 9:34 a.m. to 11:54 p.m., seven days a week. It will operate in a counter-clockwise loop over Davis, Polk, Jefferson and Zang. Local fares apply since

Route 723 will no longer be a part of D-Link.

Route 49 Becomes 749 (Stemmons/Design District Service)

Route 49 will become new Route 749 (Stemmons/Design District Service) with its own distinctive bus stops. The re-branded route will provide a direct connection between Southwestern Medical District/Parkland Station, the Dallas Design District, Stemmons corridor hotels, Market Center and the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center, plus many other downtown Dallas attractions. Service along Wood, Market and Commerce will be deleted from the route. The schedule will remain unchanged and regular DART fares will be charged.

Customers should look for new timetables and schedules before Monday, Aug. 29. They can also call DART Customer Service at 214.979.1111 or go online to DART.org for details on schedule adjustments to routes 12, 27, 35, 208, 360, 362, 377, 400, 506, 513, 524, 534 and 583.
