

A DRAMATIC FILM ABOUT A PIVOTAL YEAR IN THE LIFE OF A YOUNG BARACK OBAMA

As the United States transitions from one presidency to the next, and a nation examines issues of diversity and acceptance, the Netflix original film *BARRY* resonates. On December 16, 2016, millions of members in 190 countries around the globe will have a chance to enjoy this powerful artistic exploration of a pivotal year in the life of the future 44th President of the United States, during which he developed the foundations for his views on race, government, and what it means to be American.

A young Barack Obama, known to his friends as "Barry," arrives in New York City in the fall of 1981 to begin his junior year at Columbia University.

In a crime-ridden and racially charged environment, Barry finds himself pulled between various social spheres and struggles to maintain a series of increasingly strained relationships with his Kansas-born mother, his estranged Kenyan father, and his classmates. Barry is the story of a young man grappling with those same issues that his country, and arguably the world, are still coming to terms with 35 years later.

Filmmaker Vikram Gandhi (Kumáre, HBO's "Vice"), a Columbia University alumni, was inspired to tell the story of Barack Obama's time at the university to write the story and direct this narrative feature. Gandhi approached

fellow alum Adam Mansbach (author of "Go the F**k to Sleep") to help tell that story, and from that collaboration Mansbach penned the script. Barry stars newcomer Devon Terrell in a deeply felt breakout performance as the young student, and features a strong supporting cast including Ashley Judd (Divergent, Double Jeopardy), Jenna Elfman (Friends With Benefits, Big Stone Gap), and up-and-comers Anya Taylor-Joy (The Witch), Jason Mitchell (Straight Outta Compton), Ellar Coltrane (Boyhood), and Avi Nash (Learning to Drive, "Silicon Valley").

Barry was produced by Black Bear Pictures and Cinetic Media. Dana

O'Keefe, Teddy Schwarzman, Ben Stillman, and Vikram Gandhi produced the film. Daniel Steinman executive produced.



Black Businesses in Chicago Benefit from Goldman Sachs Program

Nearly 500 Chicago businesses have joined thousands of entrepreneurs across the country in an initiative to create jobs.

The entrepreneurs are participants in Goldman Sachs "10,000 Small Businesses," a scholarship-based program that convenes small business owners to learn critical business skills and create growth plans for their companies.

Ron J. Anderson MD Clinic to open on Parkland campus



For nearly three decades Ron J. Anderson, MD was Parkland Health & Hospital System's president and CEO and a champion of healthcare for the uninsured and underinsured in Dallas County. He was committed to improving the health of those in need and was a driving force behind the campaign that led to passage of a bond package in 2008 to build a new Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Although he died in 2014, Dr. Anderson's presence will be felt when the new ambulatory clinic bearing his name opens on Jan. 17, 2017 on Parkland's Harry Hines campus. Under his leadership, a network of community-based health centers was developed and today a dozen clinics are located in historically underserved neighborhoods throughout Dallas County.

The five-story, 227,420 square-foot clinic is approximately the size of four football fields. Comprised of 171 exam rooms, the clinic also houses four MRI's, five CT scanners, three radiology and seven ultrasound rooms with expansion capacity. A pharmacy, which will operate 24/7, is located on the first floor.

Connections from the clinic to the main hospital are available on the lower level or on the second floor via a sky bridge, Nickerson said. Supplies and equipment can be transported to the building through an underground tunnel.

Black Businesses in Chicago Benefit from Goldman Sachs Program

"We currently focus on providing engineering design support along with program and project management to the electrical utility," Moore said. "Our prime client right now is Exelon Corporation."

Exelon is a Fortune 100 energy company, signifying Moore's success in winning contracts with larger clients.

Moore's story is not unique. The Goldman Sachs "10,000 Small Businesses" curriculum is designed by Babson College, the leading business school for entrepreneurship. Just six months after graduation, nearly 69 percent of alumni grow revenues.

Approximately 48 percent of the alumni create new jobs within that same timeframe. As

a comparison, 23 percent of U.S. small businesses added new jobs in 2015.

For Moore, the program was a key step to understanding growth opportunities for her business.

"The '10,000 Small Businesses' program has helped me direct my energy to the right places," Moore said. "KDM was already a growing company with lots of opportunities, but '10,000 Small Businesses' and the faculty helped me focus on one opportunity at a time and see those opportunities from different perspectives. This allowed me to differentiate between what was good for us and what wasn't."

While participants in '10,000 Small Businesses' hail from a wide array of industries, they

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS"

ROMANS 16:1-27

PERSONAL GREETINGS TO WONDERFUL CHRISTIAN HELPERS

In the final chapter of this grand epistle, the Apostle Paul extends commendable remarks with regard to individuals who aided him in the gospel ministry. The first individual that received praise from Paul was Phoebe in verses 1-2. Phoebe occupied a prominent place in the church; she was a servant of the church in Cenchrea, a seaport east of Corinth.

Having praised Phoebe for her work in verses 1-2, Paul in verses 3-4 sends greeting to a special couple he met as tent-makers in Corinth whose names were Priscilla and Aquila. They were very dear to Paul and had a profound ministry in Corinth (Acts 18:1-3). This wonderful couple was a great aid to the ministry of Apollos in Ephesus (Acts 18:19), for Acts 18:26 says – "And he

(Apollos) began to speak boldly in the synagogue: whom when Aquila and Priscilla had heard, they took him unto them, and expounded unto him the way of God more perfectly." Not only was this couple a great help to Paul in his ministry, but the Apostle Paul disclosed that Aquila and Priscilla risked their lives for Paul (v. 4).

Moreover, Paul continues to send a special greeting to another Christian by the name of Epaenetus, who Paul said was the "first fruits of Achaia unto Christ" (v. 5). Epaenetus' name in the Greek means "praised." In verse 6, Mary is mentioned for her labor. She labored to the point of exhaustion. What a wonderful testimony, for our churches need more "Marys"! The two individuals referred to in verse 7

were held in high regard by the Apostle Paul. He probably met them in one of the numerous prisons of the Roman Empire. From verses 8-16, Paul continued to communicate high praises to various Christian individuals, conveying his tender affection for these individuals. Paul ends this commendable tender section by saying in verse 16 – "Salute one another with a holy kiss." As we greet one another with kisses, let's make sure that they are holy!

In his final remarks to this church, Paul cautioned the believers to watch out for spiritual enemies. We are to stay away from false teachers who are not serving Christ (vs. 17-18). False teachers are good at deceiving the minds of naïve people. Paul was glad that these believers were obedient,

but he was concerned that they were "wiser unto that which is good, and simple concerning evil" (v. 19). Paul noted in verse 20 that Satan's power in influencing false teachers will be destroyed, for verse 20 says – "And the God of peace shall bruise Satan under your feet shortly. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you. Amen." From verses 21-24, Paul sends greetings from many associates who were with him as he wrote this epistle to the Romans. Paul closes this grand epistle with a wonderful benediction in verses 25-27 which begin "Now to him that is of power to establish you according to my gospel, and the preaching of Jesus Christ."

SUPREME COURT LEAVES \$1B NFL CONCUSSION SETTLEMENT IN PLACEBY JIMMY GOLEN

The Supreme Court on Monday rejected the final two challenges to the estimated \$1 billion settlement between the NFL and thousands of its former players who have been diagnosed with brain injuries linked to repeated concussions. Players who already have been diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease, Parkinson's, Alzheimer's or dementia could begin receiving payments in 90 to 120 days.

"This is a historical moment for the retired player community who, in the face of great adversity, took on the NFL," said attorney Christopher Seeger, who represented the class of more than 20,000 former NFL players now eligible for payments for the next 65 years.

"Despite the difficult health situations retired players face today, and that many more will unfortunately face in the future, they can have peace of mind knowing that this settlement's benefits will finally become available to them and will last for decades to come."

The league has estimated that 6,000 former players - or nearly three in 10 - could develop Alzheimer's disease or moderate dementia. Payments could be as high as \$5 million for those with Lou Gehrig's disease, also called amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, or ALS; the average payout is expected to be closer to \$190,000.

Seeger said more than 11,000 have pre-registered for benefits.

"We will make sure that every single eligible retired player takes advantage of this settlement's benefits," he told reporters in a conference call. "We will be undertaking a massive education effort to ensure that all former NFL players know about the settlement's benefits and understand how to file a claim."

The class-action lawsuit filed in Philadelphia accused the NFL of hiding what it knew about the link between concussions and chronic traumatic

encephalopathy, the degenerative brain disease that has been found in dozens of former players after their deaths.

Senior U.S. District Judge Anita B. Brody approved the deal last year after twice sending it back to lawyers over concerns the fund might run out.

The deal was upheld by the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in April.

"We must hesitate before rejecting that bargain based on an unsupported hope that sending the parties back to the negotiating table would lead to a better deal," Judge Thomas L. Ambro wrote for the unanimous three-judge panel that affirmed the settlement.

But two separate petitions - one from the family of late Buffalo Bills fullback Cookie Gilchrist, and the other from a group of 31 players that included including 1996 Super Bowl MVP Larry Brown and Hall of Famer Charles Haley - asked the nation's highest court to stop the settlement. Their requests for a Supreme Court hearing were rejected without comment from the justices on Monday.

The NFL admitted no fault as part of the settlement, though a league official did acknowledge during congressional testimony that there is a link between football and CTE. The deal avoids the need for a trial and means the NFL may never have to disclose what it knew and when about the risks and treatment of repeated concussions.

Still, Seeger said, much progress has been made.

"When this lawsuit was first filed, discussions over concussions and player safety in the NFL were rare, and holding the NFL accountable seemed almost impossible," Seeger said. "But with the help of these players, more and more attention is placed on the issue of safety and head injuries in sports. Those who had the courage to file suit and take on this cause deserve tremendous credit for what they have achieved."

In a statement, NFL spokesman Brian McCarthy

said the league was pleased with the decision.

"We look forward to working with class counsel and Judge Brody to implement the settlement and provide the important benefits that our retired players and their families have been waiting to receive," McCarthy said.

Critics complained that the settlement approved by Brody does not cover future CTE cases. The lead negotiators said they instead set aside compensation for treatment for some CTE symptoms. That does not include the depression, aggression and mood swings reported by some former players who experienced repeated concussions.

Other payments are expected to be around \$4 million for past CTE deaths and \$3.5 million for advanced Alzheimer's disease. "They will not need to prove that their diagnosis is the result of NFL football to receive an award," Seeger said.

Players' lawyers who negotiated the deal with the NFL - and stand to split \$112 million in fees - say the settlement will help families get needed financial awards or medical testing that might take years if the case went to trial. Ambro agreed.

"Compensation for players who are coping with these symptoms now is surely preferable to waiting until they die to pay their estates for a CTE diagnosis," the judge wrote.

Seeger closed his comments by thanking former New England Patriots and Philadelphia Eagles fullback Kevin Turner, who was the lead plaintiff in the litigation. Researchers announced last month that Turner suffered from CTE to a degree that they had not seen for an athlete who died in his 40s.

"It's really important that people understand that without the commitment that Kevin made, it wouldn't be possible to get where we are," Seeger said. "I end this on somewhat of a sad note that Kevin couldn't be here to see this."



"I just want to offer my condolences to his family. We love Konrad Reuland," Harbaugh said. "Every single guy in that locker room loves him who knows him."

Reuland, who was born in Mission Viejo, Calif., played collegiately at Stanford and originally signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent ahead of the 2011 season. After he was cut twice by the 49ers, Reuland was signed by the Jets. He played in 26 games over the 2012 and 2013 seasons.
