

LA Prosecutors Decline to File Charges Against Bill Cosby



(AP) - Los Angeles prosecutors on Tuesday declined to file any charges against Bill Cosby after a woman recently claimed the comedian molested her around 1974.

The rejection of a child sexual abuse charge by prosecutors came roughly 10 days after the woman, Judy Huth, met with Los Angeles police detectives for 90 minutes.

The Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office rejected filing a misdemeanor charge of annoying or molesting a child under the age of 18 because the statute of limitations had passed.

Days before Huth spoke to police, she accused Cosby in a civil lawsuit of forcing her to perform a sex act on him in a bedroom of the Playboy Mansion when she was 15 years old. Cosby's attorney said that Huth attempted to extort \$250,000 from the comedian before she sued and that she'd attempted to sell her story to a tabloid a decade ago.

Cosby is seeking a dismissal of Huth's lawsuit, arguing it is blocked by the statute of limitations.

Huth told police that Cosby molested her and that she had no further contact with him after the incident, according to a summary of her allegations included with the prosecutor's decision.


In rejecting the case, prosecutors evaluated the charge Cosby would have faced in 1974. Prosecutors took into account legislative changes that extend the statute of limitations for certain crimes, but found no way that Cosby could be legally prosecuted.

A COMMUNITY STATEMENT CONCERNING THE TURMOIL AT DR. BILLY EARL DADE MIDDLE SCHOOL

The Dr. Billy Earl Dade Middle School opened in 2006 with much optimism and enthusiasm for a school of excellence to serve the middle school students in sunny South Dallas. The former elementary school transitioned well to a middle school feeding into Madison High School, giving the two high schools in South Dallas pure feeder patterns. The excitement continued as the principal was one who was well known to the community and many of the students, teachers and ancillary staff were committed to making this an oasis in sunny South Dallas.

For two years, the principal and staff worked toward improving the academic progress of students while at the same time fostering basic social skills development of students, giving students a sense of their personal worth, and engaging the community and community partners in what was slowly but surely could become a beacon of hope and sunshine in sunny South Dallas. The Bond Program provided for a new school, and the Dedication of the new school took place November 2012 under the administration of the principal and staff who had transitioned the school from elementary to middle school. However, the optimism that had carried forth from 2006 through the dedication of the new building in November 2012 was cut short when the principal and teachers were summarily replaced before the move to the new building in the fall of 2013. This transitional staff was replaced with a principal who had no experience as a secondary principal and no experience in sunny South Dallas. To add to this lack of experience, the school was staffed with approximately 13 Teach for America teachers and 7 first year teachers. These individuals with NO prior teaching experience replaced experienced teachers.

From this grand book, Jesus Christ is the principal person, being linked to two noble characters of the Old Testament, David and Abraham. In this book, Matthew will present Christ as the Messiah, the King of the Jews. He will trace the long ancestry of Jesus, indicating that He (Jesus) is a legal heir to the throne of David through Joseph, his legal father, not birth father. Jesus Christ will come through forty-two generations as the rightful heir to the throne of David.

Having proven that Jesus is the legitimate heir to the throne of David, in verse 16, we are introduced to the fact that Mary and Joseph were married. In those days, and according to Jewish cus-

tom, marriages were planned and sealed by parents. The couple was considered married, but didn't live together; that is, the woman remained with her parents and the man obviously lived with his parents for a period of one year. The one year betrothal period proved the faithfulness of the couple. During this most crucial year, the bride especially had to remain faithful to her spouse. If her faithfulness to her spouse was violated, the marriage would be considered annulled. However, if the bride had remained true to the marital pledge of fidelity during the one year period of betrothal, then the marriage would be consummated, and the couple would then begin to live together.

At the outset of our text, Mary and Joseph were in that one year period called the "betrothal period," and Mary was found with child (v.16, v.18). Mary and Joseph had not come together to engage in a sexual relationship, yet she was found with a child. Joseph, being an honorable man, did not want to embarrass Mary publicly, so he decided to "Put her away privily" (v.19). In essence, Joseph was contemplating divorcing the one to whom he loved. He cer-

tainly loved Mary, but he did not want to publicly embarrass her. On a serious note, Joseph could have had her stoned to death for violation of the pledge of fidelity (Deut. 22:23-30).

While Joseph was deeply considering this situation, and in a dream, an angel informed him that her state was due, not through human mean, but through a Divine agent (the Holy Spirit) (v.20). This child that Mary was carrying would be called Jesus, and He will be Saviour for His people (v.21). These words from the angelic being must have been a great source of joy to the heart of Joseph. This verse (v.21) informs us that Christ's central reason for coming into this world was not to gain popularity, but to "save His people from their sins." In verse 21, the context denotes that Jesus came to save the Jews from their sins. Moreover, not only has He come to save the Jews, but He has come to save the Gentiles, as well. Our Saviour has come to save all men from their sins.

If mortal man would only believe in Christ's finished work on the cross, and His burial and resurrection, he can be saved, for Romans 10:9

says, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." The same Saviour who offers salvation to His people also offers salvation to all men, for John 5:24 says, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life. Through trust in Christ, every man born spiritually lost can be saved eternally, and that man will spend eternity with God. The only Saviour qualified to die for you and I, had to be virgin-born. Thank God that He used a God-fearing and chaste woman as Mary to bring a Saviour into the world. Our 10-Point Plan for Police Accountability

50 years ago, it was young people on that bridge in Selma, Ala. young people sitting-in in Greensboro, N.C.; young people riding Freedom buses all over this nation, challenging conventional laws and the status quo; and young people like Schwerner, Goodman and Chaney losing their lives in Philadelphia, Mississippi. A multicultural band of young people, united with historic civil rights organizations, legislators, clergy, and everyday Americans who decided that it was time for our country to do better and be better, have been the impetus for so many of the changes we've witnessed as a nation through the decades.

Millions of Americans have now taken to the streets and to social media not because the problems that have caused the outrage just began yesterday, but because sometimes difficult circumstances present a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to bring about historic change. Now is that time. Now is our time.

This conversation and the

subsequent action that will result from it will continue because we remain committed to the idea that these cases - Michael Brown, Eric Garner, Akai Gurley, Tamir Rice, John Crawford, Marlene Pinnock and others - do not end where they are. In addition to the opportunity for the Justice Department to conduct independent investigations, we each have an opportunity to participate in our great democracy by helping to ensure that the America of tomorrow is better than who we are today.

For our part, the National Urban League has developed the following 10-Point Justice Plan for Police Reform and Accountability. We believe that these action steps will be a major step forward in helping to repair police-community relations in cities across America, in significantly reducing inappropriate use of excessive force by law enforcement, particularly against unarmed citizens and in holding police accountable for misconduct:

1. Widespread Use of Body

Cameras and Dashboard Cameras

2. Broken Windows Reform and Implementation of 21st Century Community Policing Model

3. Review and Revision of Police Use of Deadly Force Policies

4. Comprehensive Retraining of All Police Officers

5. Comprehensive Review and Strengthening of Police Hiring Standards

6. Appointment of Special Prosecutors to Investigate Police Misconduct

7. Mandatory, Uniform FBI Reporting and Audit of Lethal Force Incidents Involving All Law Enforcement

8. Creation and Audit of National Database of Citizen Complaints Against Police

9. Revision of National Police Accreditation System for Mandatory Use by Law Enforcement to Be Eligible for Federal Funds

10. National Comprehensive Anti-Racial Profiling Law

The phenomenon we have seen in America since the announcement of the non-indictments of officers in the killings of Michael Brown and Eric Garner is new to a generation, but not to the nation. Young people have always helped to fuel historic social change. We must not forget -

America's fatal "legal drug" Problem

criminal justice costs, according to a report by Trust for America. The highly-regarded group states that only one of ten Americans with a drug abuse problem receives any type of treatment for their illness.

Deaths from the use of prescribed drugs have risen significantly during the past twenty years, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Most of these deaths were the result of the misuse of substances that were prescribed by licensed health professionals.

Males were 60 percent more likely to die from the use of prescription drugs than women, according to data from the CDC. People between the ages of 45 and 50 experienced a higher death rate than any other age group, the data stated. In one of its reports, the

agency states that in 2012, 53 percent of all drug overdose deaths in our country were caused by drugs that were prescribed legally.

A major problem, according to many health officials, is the over-prescription and use of painkillers that contain potentially addictive narcotics. A growing number of medical experts believe that such pain killers should not be available to patients because of their potential for abuse.

Officials at the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration in Dallas describe the abuse of prescription drugs as a "major concern." The federal officials are alarmed at the increase in the number of deaths caused by prescription drugs.

Throughout our state and our country, health care experts and patient advocate groups have demanded that

doctors become more vigilant in prescribing pain relievers, suggesting that they not prescribe potentially addictive medications.

States such as Texas have gotten involved in the battle against addictive drugs and their overuse. The state has an online drug monitoring program that allows doctors and pharmacists to view the drug histories of their patients. The program has helped to curb some abuse.

Many of us know people who are taking prescription drugs that are potentially addictive. In our homes and in our neighborhoods we must increase awareness regarding the harm that can be caused by the improper use of these substances. We owe this much to those that are close to us, and to others who are members of our larger communities.

To further complicate matters, the central administration ignored information that two rival schools would be combined into one. No plans were made to proactively address these teen rivalries. The results: Dade went back academically in every measurable area, chaos was the order of the day, and the principal who was selected by the DISD Senior Administration was released to become a principal facilitator - one who coaches other principals! Another selection of the DISD Executive Administration was brought in for the next year -- and summarily removed six weeks into the school year! The stellar replacement for this middle school placed in turmoil by actions of the DISD Executive Administration is another elementary principal who has no secondary experience. Simultaneously, the experienced assistant principals were removed and replaced by another group of those who have no ties to this community -- coming in well after the start of the school year. The student demographics for Dade are 69.5% Black; 29.3% Hispanic and 1 percent other. The administration is:

1. Principal: Hispanic Female; 4 Assistant Principals: 2 Female Hispanics; 1 White Female; and 1 Black Female (an all-female administrative team for a campus in turmoil and where there is a clear need for strong male models for both the female and male students.) Additionally, the Executive Administration decided to remove teachers and replace them with Instructional Coaches from around the District - the result - day 1, over half of the Instructional Coaches were no shows, so the classes were doubled up; a food fight

ensued, and the chaos continued. Day 2 - three of the Instructional Coaches resigned leaving classes without assigned teachers; students continued their protests for the removal of trusted teachers and leaders. The Superintendent canceled the Parent Meeting to brief parents -- a meeting scheduled on Middle School Parent Conference Night which was an optimum time to reach the most parents, and a continued sense of chaos and disorganization continues. These missteps orchestrated by the Executive Administration of DISD are a disservice to the Dade School Community.

• We, the community, call upon the Superintendent to host a town hall meeting to address the future of Dade Middle School to ensure a semblance of stability and opportunity for student growth;

• We call upon the Superintendent to give respect to the parents of Dade students by addressing this directly with them and answering any questions they may have;

• We call upon the Board of Trustees to review this situation which has placed a troubled school in greater harm; to remove a current DISD School Board member from a public school is highly unacceptable and an appropriate remedy MUST be developed and enforced.

• We call upon the Superintendent to cite specific statutes that would allow for the ejection of an elected official from public school property, within that member's Trustee District. We call upon the superintendent to address the criteria for permitting one trustee to attend staff meetings while excluding other trustees. We call upon the

superintendent to adhere to his amended contract that requires him to foster positive relationships among school board trustees.

Concerned citizens of the Dade School community desire a stable learning environment filled with high expectations, dedicated, competent educators with a successful track record of working with diverse urban students.

Cosby has never been charged in connection with any of the allegations. A 2005 lawsuit by a Pennsylvania woman was settled before it went to trial.

Cosby's attorneys have denied some of the allegations and dismissed others as decades old and "discredited."

Since the allegations emerged, Cosby's career has unraveled, with nearly a dozen performances canceled in his ongoing standup comedy tour. NBC has said it will not move forward with a Cosby sitcom that was under development, and Netflix indefinitely postponed a special that was set to premiere last month.

COWBOYS TAKE CONTROL OF N.F.C. EAST BY BEATING EAGLES

The Associated Press - Dez Bryant caught a career-best three touchdown passes from Tony Romo, and the visiting Dallas Cowboys rallied to beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 38-27, on Sunday night after wasting a 21-0 lead. DeMarco Murray had a pair of touchdown runs to help the Cowboys move ahead of the Eagles into first place in the N.F.C. East. The Eagles dominated the Cowboys during a 33-10 road win on Thanksgiving, but Dallas took control of the division with two weeks left. The Cowboys jumped to a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter before Philadelphia rallied behind Mark Sanchez.

Chris Polk had scoring runs of 1 and 5 yards, and Darren Sproles ran from the 1 to give the Eagles a 24-21 lead late in third quarter. But Romo and the Cowboys answered quickly with two touchdowns in a span of 2 minutes 51 seconds. Murray scored on a 2-yard run to cap a 78-yard drive. J. J. Wilcox then intercepted Sanchez's pass, and the Cowboys started the fourth quarter at the Eagles' 42. Romo then hit Bryant in stride for a 25-yard scoring pass.
