GWENDOLYN BROOKS is the first African American Poetry Finalist for *In the Mecca*.





We sign online petitions in support of some cause or another; we send letters to our representatives in DC; we do our obligatory marches and demonstrations; we celebrate historical events and fawn over memorials of fallen Black heroes. Some of that is fine, but if those actions are not backed up by economic muscle, they will not advance us one iota.

If Bernie Sanders can raise \$20 million in \$27.00 increments, why can't we do the same thing? I'll tell you why; Black dollars don't make any sense. We are so focused on the current political prospects of this candidate or that one, and we have lost complete sight of what is really important-and vital to our future: economic empowerment.

Why do we cloak ourselves in Garvey's legacy of rallying millions of Black people and raising millions of dollars from Black folks but do not pick up where he left off, by pooling some of our tremendous annual income to help our own people?

A massive pool of Black dollars could leverage reciprocity from politicians and from the marketplace. If we were as serious about action as we are about our rhetoric, many of our problems would be solved in a "New York minute," as they say. But it seems we'd rather just call radio talk shows and voice complaints about what the White man won't let us do, or what he's doing to us, or how corrupt his elections are, how we should pack up and leave (with no money, at that), and a myriad of other

On the other hand, I am proud to be a member of the One Million Conscious Black Voters and Contributors (OMCBV&C), a group of folks from thirty-five states who are not just talking about pooling resources but are actually doing it. Together we have made a real difference in the lives of various Black folks; we have supported Black radio by buying advertisements and sponsoring individual shows, in addition to just listening and calling in.

We support Black-owned businesses by buying their products and services, and we are committed to a collective approach to obtaining reciprocity in the public policy arena by voting as an unwavering bloc.

We are dedicated to one another and to our collective goals and objectives, and we will not break ranks simply to please some politician, nor will we succumb to their attempts to buy us off. Our funding pool is from the "work of our own hands," as Martin Delany taught us. Our resolve is built on the shoulders of those strong elders who have made their transitions. We are organized and well on our way to becoming the largest group of conscious black people in this nation.

Most importantly we are about action not rhetoric. We are willing to make the requisite sacrifices necessary to reach our goals of economic and political empowerment, and we have demonstrated that willingness through our actions.

Let's face it; Black folks have little or no chance of achieving the many things we discuss unless we are organized and prepared to utilize our collective leverage to obtain reciprocity from the system in which we find ourselves. When are we going to follow through on the solutions we put forth in our conversations? As I wrote

some time ago, "What is the result of our rhetoric?"

Politically and economically, we are in last place. Are we so complacent about our position in this nation that it has caused us to be paralyzed, frozen in our tracks, even at the thought of moving forward? Raising Cain instead of, or at least in addition to raising money to help ourselves, is a hopeless strategy for empowerment. Imagine one million conscious Black people pooling our money to fund the Harvest Institute or the political campaign of a candidate we "decided" would run. Our schools, museums, media, financial institutions, conferences, businesses, co-ops, movements, foundations, endowments, and any other Black owned entity could all be funded by a committed group of conscious Black folks.

Bernie did it; what's holding us back? As the old saying goes, "There's nothing between us but air and opportunity." Go to www.iamaoneofthemillion.com and let's start taking care of ourselves. We can start with \$27.00 each.

The Connection between Climate Change and the Zika Virus

We have all heard about the scary disease, Zika virus, which is sweeping its way north from South America, and causing birth defects. We have also heard that early last week, Dallas County confirmed two cases of Zika virus, and that it can be transmitted sexually. What we have not heard, and what most people are not talking about, is the fact that global warming creates conditions for the spread of such mosquito-borne diseases as Zika Virus.

First, let me give you information about this most recent outbreak.

This particular outbreak of the virus began in Brazil in 2015 and has spread among South American countries. At this time, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is monitoring the cases of Zika virus in the Americas in conjunction with the World Health Organization (WHO), which has put the Zika

virus outbreak on "public health emergency of international concern" status.

Now, let me give you a little background on the virus itself. The Zika virus was first identified in the Zika Forest in Uganda in 1947 as part of a study to identify viruses that were carried by mosquitoes. Researchers in the study discovered a monkey that had contracted an unrecorded virus, what we now know as Zika. The mosquitoes that spread Zika and other diseases, called aedes aegypti, originated in Africa and have migrated globally since.

A warming planet creates an environment more conducive to the spread of infectious diseases. In fact, scientists at the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change already predicted years ago that a warming planet would cause the movement of infectious and tropical diseases. A warmer environment can cause pathogens to become more virulent and spark the development of entirely new

strains, significantly increasing the risk of contracting a disease. The spread of infectious diseases like Lyme disease, Zika virus, West Nile Virus, and Rocky Mountain spotted fever, carried by insects such as ticks and mosquitos, are on the rise due to more favorable breeding and migration conditions as a result of climate change.

With the spread of this particular virus, Zika, and its complications with microcephaly, a serious birth defect, we must do all that we can to contain the spread and also recognize the challenges we face with global warming. Right now, the National Institutes of Health is partnering with industry and organizations around the globe to do more research on the Zika virus and to find a treatment or viable vaccine.

Each month the scientific evidence on climate change grows and it is confirming what the majority of climate scientists have been saying for some time. The Earth is warming, and its con-

sequences are mammoth and unpredictable. The spread of Zika virus is one of those consequences.

Last week, I joined a coalition of my colleagues in Congress urging President Obama to take additional steps in the fight against Zika with research, treatment, and prevention. I urge my constituents to stay informed on prevention, transmission, travel notices, and cases of Zika virus at <http://www.cdc.gov/zika>

Throughout my tenure in Congress, I have called for a serious legislative approach to recognize and combat global warming. With increasingly serious and unpredictable consequences of global warming such as Zika virus, denying global warming is not only careless, it is dangerous. We need a new political climate to ensure that we can responsibly discuss the climate of our world.

BRONCOS WIN SUPER BOWL 50



(AP) - With his prolific passing and complete control of the game at the line of scrimmage, Peyton Manning helped usher in the NFL's wide-open era of high-scoring offenses and pass-happy game plans.

Manning's possible farewell game in Super Bowl 50 was a throwback to the 1970s when his father Archie was running away from dominant defenses such as New England and Seattle left Manning with just one Super Bowl title in his first 13 playoff trips.

Von Miller forced fumbles that set up both of Denver's touchdowns, led a defense that harassed MVP Cam Newton and helped carry Manning to his second Super Bowl title with a 24-10 victory over the Carolina Panthers on Sunday.

"Whenever you're doing something for your buddies, it means a little bit more," Miller said. "As human beings, we're selfish

but when you're doing something for somebody else, that's when the magic happens."

For so many years, Manning's career was defined by his gaudy regular season numbers that weren't enough come play-off time. A lack of help from teammates or the inability to thrive against stellar defenses from teams such as New England and Seattle left Manning with just one Super Bowl title in his first 13 playoff trips.

So perhaps it was fitting that after carrying teammates for most of his career, he was carried over the finish line in this game by Miller and the coordinator Wade Phillips' "Orange Rush" defense.

"I certainly knew that (with) this defense, this team would have a chance," Manning said. "Our defense has just been, from the get-go, they've

been nothing but awesome. Being hurt and struggling early in the season wasn't a lot of fun so I was grateful to get back healthy and to try and play my part these last couple of weeks."

But now after throwing for more yards, more touchdowns and winning more starts than any other quarterback in NFL history, Manning could be ready to hang it up. Manning wouldn't say after the game whether this was his final one.

"I got some good advice from Tony Dungy," Manning said of the first of four coaches with whom he's been to the Super Bowl. "He said, 'Don't make an emotional decision.' This has been an emotional week, an emotional night. I'm going to take some time to reflect."

My Day: Ocean Promotions

Where are the STEM jobs and who is hiring? Equally as important who and where are the colleges and institutions of higher education that are doing the training? In the neighborhoods and communities, what local schools (ISD's, Charters, Private) are zeroing in on the new science, aka STEM jobs for the future. (Sidebar: Be amazed. Google the new 797?)

I recently read a most enlightening magazine. I was simply sermonized!!! An entire magazine on STEM jobs at STEM JOBS.com. It was in the lobby at Lamar High School, Arlington. It starts with the Air Force Reserve. Some specific part time jobs in the Air Force Reserve allow

one to sign up for a bonus of up to \$20,000. The sky is no longer the limit for STEM jobs and training. The Oceans of the World are actually the new frontier.

Just a few notes on this new frontier for our new world. A marine physicist means you interact with the oceans. You will also design and build many specialized research tools, including "remotely operated vehicles, sophisticated seafloor instruments and innovative remote-sensing systems." A marine physicist salary is \$72,000. The universities now training are Carnegie Mellon University, Penn State and Tuskegee, Rochester Institute of Technology. Scholarships, boot camps, mentoring and education initiatives are all available everywhere. If not, make it happen.

So, what is the bottom line? If you and your family are NOT involved in some area of the 'new frontier', turn around and get in this line. The new world will only be kind . . . to the informed mind. PLEASE remember that.
