

FORMER PRESIDENT BILL CLINTON VISITS PAUL QUINN COLLEGE



U.S. President Bill Clinton addressed students at the historically black college in south Oak Cliff. Paul Quinn College School leaders called this a historic day. This is the first time that a sitting or former President has visited the college.

An old friend from his days working as a presidential campaign staffer in 1972, U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson, D-Dallas, introduced him.

The former president outlined Hillary Clinton's goals, including making college affordable, reducing student debt, making America a "clean energy superpower" and modernizing the country's infrastructure.

He suggested the idea of free college tuition for the "middle class on down" and a tuition payback program that would allow students to pay off loans in 20-plus years at reasonable interest rates in arrangements similar to a home mortgage.

Bill Clinton spoke for more than 30 minutes to a full room, he tried to fire up voters in North Texas to support his wife's presidential bid.

106-Year-Old Says She Can 'Die Happy' After Obama Meeting

(AP) - At 106 years old, she's seen more than a dozen presidents come and go, but Virginia McLaurin says she can finally die happy after meeting President Barack Obama.

Video of the centenarian shaking her groove with excitement quickly went viral on the Internet after last week's Black History Month reception at the White House. The grandmother told The Associated Press that when she saw the president and first lady Michelle Obama in the flesh, "I was so happy, I started dancing." "I've come a long ways, a long ways," McLaurin said in an interview outside her Washington home. "I just didn't think I'd ever live to go this far in the world."

For McLaurin, who said she was born in South Carolina in 1909, the White House invitation was a long time in the making. It's been more than a year since she started a White House petition asking to meet the president - and offering to come to his house to make it easier.

"I didn't think I'd ever live to see a colored president," McLaurin, who is black, said in a YouTube video accompanying the petition. Her petition didn't garner enough signatures to meet the White House threshold for an official response, but it didn't keep her from securing an invitation to Thursday's reception, where Obama reflected on the legacy of U.S. slavery and called America "a constant work in progress."

Dressed in a teal blue suit with matching nail polish, McLaurin nabbed a few moments of one-on-one time with the president and Mrs. Obama during a photo line for the reception's guests, where a White House videographer captured shaky video of her jumping up and down with excitement. Independent news organizations weren't allowed to see or record what the White House described as a private moment. "I know he said something, but I don't remember," McLaurin said of Obama. "My hearing is kind of bad. The meeting turned McLaurin, who said she's lived in Washington since the 1930s, into something of an overnight celebrity. She said her phone had been ringing since 5 a.m. Monday, depriving her of a chance to eat breakfast or lunch.

So what's next for a woman who said her dream has been fulfilled?

"I don't know," McLaurin said. "I could just die happy."

Hillary Clinton Meets with Civil Rights Groups, Black Millennials

A few days before presidential hopeful Hillary Clinton racked up a huge win in Nevada's Democratic primary, largely thanks to the overwhelming support that she received from Black voters, the former Secretary of State met with civil rights leaders for a frank discussion about the 21st Century Agenda for Jobs and Freedom.

According to exit polls from the Democratic primary in Nevada conducted by CBS News, Senator Bernie Sanders (D-Vt.) won 53 percent of the Hispanic vote while Clinton garnered 45 percent of the Hispanic vote. Sanders narrowly won among White voters, earning 49 percent of their vote compared to 47 percent who went with Clinton. But 76 percent of African Americans that turned out for the primary voted for Clinton compared to just 22 percent who supported Sanders.

As presidential candidates covet Black voters, civil rights leaders want to make sure that the needs of the Black community are also addressed.

"For the first time in American history, we will watch a Black family leave the White House and we do not want to see the concerns of Blacks leave with them," said Reverend Al Sharpton, the founder and president of the National Action Network.

The 21st Century Agenda for Jobs and Freedom, crafted about three years ago around the 50th anniversary of the March on Washington, outlines a number of challenges affecting the Black community and identifies five main domestic goals to address those challenges.

The goals of the agenda include: achieving economic parity for African Americans, promoting equity in educational opportunities, protecting

and defending the voting rights, eliminating healthcare disparities and achieving comprehensive criminal justice reform.

Last Tuesday, Clinton met with leaders from nine different civil rights groups including the National Urban League, the NAACP, the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation, the National Action Network, the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, the National Bar Association and the National Council of Negro Women.

The coalition of civil rights groups hosted a similar meeting with Sanders in Washington, D.C. last Thursday.

Marc Morial, the president and CEO of the National Urban League said that the nine historic civil rights organizations represented tens of millions of Americans and that all of their organizations were multicultural and multi-ethnic.

Morial also made it clear that the meeting was not an endorsement of Hillary Clinton's run for the White House.

"Each of us is either a 501(c)(3) or a 501(c)(4) organization. Our organizations do not endorse or recommend candidates for public office," said Morial. "This is a meeting that we have convened and we have organized in an effort to provide to every candidate who is running for president of the United States, be they Republican or Democrat, with the opportunity to hear from us on issues of civil rights, social justice and economic justice in America, today."

Clinton said that her staff has "always found an open door and a responsive ear to help us forge the kind of policies that we think can directly address many of the issues" that the leaders raised during the meeting.

"My campaign is really about

breaking every barrier. I believe that America can not live up to its potential unless every single person has the chance to live up to theirs," said Clinton.

The former Secretary of State also met with more than a dozen "emerging leaders" that represented the next generation in the leadership of the civil rights groups that attended.

"While we are proud to be historic organizations, with legacies from the NAACP and the National Urban League being over 100 years old, others being 50 to 25 years old, we are also proud that, in every case, every one of our organizations is standing up and emphasizing the new generation and emphasizing the leadership role that the new generation can, will and must play in the future of this country," said Morial.

Leigh Chapman, the president of the National Bar Association's young lawyer division that represents lawyers under 40 and lawyers who have practiced less than 10 years, said that access to education without the burden of lifetime debt, ensuring full participation in the political process, eliminating barriers to voting, and ending mass incarceration were a few of the issues that they wanted the next president to address.

Christopher Wilds, a legal fellow at the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund (LDF), said that for 75 years LDF has been engaged in protecting the rights of African Americans and other minorities in the areas of political participation, education, criminal justice and economic justice.

"Although young people of color are often disproportionately impacted by legislative judicial and policy decisions, we rarely have or hold the position to directly control those positions, said Wilds. "Growing use of discriminatory voter ID laws, the current attacks on affirmative action, the disini-

vestment in African American communities, the continued targeting of youth of color by police and the criminal justice system all to often work together to turn the American Dream into a nightmare."

Clinton said that it was absolutely critical for the next president to work on a full array of issues that stand in the way of every American living up to their full potential.

"I am not a single issue candidate, we don't live in a single-issue country and we have work to do," said Clinton. "And that work can only be done in partnership with one another to advance the cause of civil and human rights and to live up to the ideals of our country."

Clinton continued: "Whether it's student debt or it's a judiciary that is not as diverse as it needs to be, or whether it is criminal justice issues or voters' rights issues we have work to do."

Clinton added that her campaign, and her presidency, if she was so fortunate, must reflect the thinking, the planning and the proposals of the young leaders who attended the meeting.

Morial said that the former Secretary of State "demonstrated an ease and a familiarity with many of the issues that were discussed" and that the group found "great support" for many of the issues contained in the 21st Century Agenda.

"Our aim is not partisan politics, our aim is not to decide on a candidate to endorse," said Morial. "Our aim is to impress upon these candidates the challenges of these times and the important creative and thoughtful ideas that we have to solve the problems that this nation faces, with particular emphasis on the challenges faced by communities of color and urban communities, those who have been locked out and left out of the economic system in the 21 century."

"A MARVELOUS HISTORIC PSALM OF PRAISE"

PSALM 106:1-48

We come now to another beautiful historic psalm of praise where the psalmist is praising God for the wonderful deeds toward Israel. This psalm, like psalm 105, will unfold the faithfulness of God despite the failures of His people. God is indeed faithful and merciful unto His people, and we ought to join the psalmist in Psalm 107:1-2, as he says, "O give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good for His mercy endureth for ever. Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, whom He hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy."

The psalmist begins this remarkable psalm by uttering praise to the Lord for His goodness and His mighty acts demonstrated toward His people (vv. 1-

5). Certainly God has blessed His people and we ought to be a grateful people. Verse 2 begs the question, "Who can utter the mighty acts of the LORD? who can shew forth all His praise?" Are you really thankful for the rich blessings of the Lord? In view of God's goodness, the psalmist makes a confession with relation to the sins of his forefathers, for verse 6 says: "We have sinned with our fathers, we have committed iniquity, we have done wickedly."

In verses 7-12, the psalmist relates the sins of Israel in their rebellious activity at the crossing of the Red Sea despite God's demonstration of power.

He points out "Our fathers understood not thy wonders in Egypt; they remembered not the multitude of thy mercies; but provoked Him at the sea, even at the Red sea. Nevertheless, He saved them for His name's sake, that He might make His mighty power to be

known" (vv. 7-8). After God had delivered Israel, they sung triumphantly about God's saving power (Exodus 15:1-21). The psalmist continued to recount the numerous examples of unbelief Israel committed in the wilderness despite the Lord's faithful dealings among His people (vv. 13-33). The psalmist makes clear, "They soon forgot His works; they waited not for His counsel: But lusted exceedingly in the wilderness, and tempted God in the desert (vv. 13-14).

As people of God today, we need to always be thankful to God for His abundant blessings in our lives, and let us join the psalmist in Psalm 105:1-3 as he says, "O give thanks unto the Lord; call upon His name: make known His deeds among the people. Sing unto Him, sing psalms unto Him: talk ye of all His wondrous works. Glory ye in His Holy name: let the heart of them rejoice that seek the

Lord."

With reference to verses 34-46, the psalmist again recalls the many acts of disobedience of the nation of Israel; however, the Lord still displayed His covenant faithfulness to Israel. Specifically, he points out, "They did not destroy the nations, concerning whom the LORD commanded them: But were mingled among the heathen, and learned their works. And they served their idols: which were a snare unto them" (vv. 34-36). The psalmist concludes this wonderful historic psalm by praying

for God's deliverance of Israel, for he says: "Save us, O Lord our God, and gather us from among the heathen, to give thanks unto thy holy name, and to triumph in thy praise. Blessed be the Lord God of Israel from everlasting to everlasting, and let all the people say, Amen. Praise ye the Lord" (vv. 47-48).



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
