# Pardons of Innocence: The Wilmington Ten exclusive showing

The Dallas Examiner and the African American Museum will kick off Black History Month with free and exclusive showing of Pardons of Innocence: The Wilmington Ten on Feb. 3 at 1 p.m. at the African American Museum, located at 3536 Grand Ave.

Pardons of Innocence: The Wilmington Ten is a documentary that reveals the dramatic and controversial incidents surrounding Civil Rights Movement in North Carolina that evolved into the false prosecution of eight Black male students, a White female community organizer, and fiery civil rights activist, Rev. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., for protesting racial injustice.

Featured exclusive interviews in the film include Gov. Beverly Perdue, who tells how powerful people across the state of North Carolina tried to stop her from granting pardons of innocence to the Wilmington 10; Joseph McNeil, Wilmington native and member of the legendary Greensboro Four, who tells why Black students had to stand up for freedom and against racism during the 1960s and 70s; Dr. Chavis, leader of the Wilmington Ten, who relives the events that led up to that racially violent week in Wilmington in February 1971; Rev. Jeremiah Wright, pastor emeritus of Trinity United Church of Christ in Chicago, recalling how he and other clergy from the United Church of Christ came to Raleigh in 1977 and met with then Gov. James Hunt to implore him to pardon the Wilmington Ten, only to be rejected.

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## NNPA, NAACP Sign Historic Partnership Agreement

The National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), a trade group representing

more than 200 Black-owned media companies, signed a historic, strategic partnership with the NAACP, one of the most influential civil rights group in the world,

during the NNPA's Mid-Winter Conference in Las Vegas.

"Sometimes you have to take a step back and reconnect in order to move forward," said NAACP chairman



Leon W. Russell. "Signing this agreement is taking that step back and it says it's time for us to recommit to each other and work together to move our people forward."

NNPA President and CEO Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., who once served as president of the NAACP, called the partnership historic.

"This [signing] consum-

mates a working relationship of two of the world's largest organizations focused on the empowerment of Black people," said Chavis.

## NNPA, NAACP Sign Historic Partnership Agreement

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NNPA National Chairman Dorothy Leavell added that she's very pleased with the new partnership.

"I attempted to do something similar in the nineties and I'm very determined now," said Leavell. "We are going to set a precedent and I hope we will be able to repeat this with many other national organizations, because if we solidify our strength, things will be different for all of us in the United States of America."

Derrick Johnson, the president and CEO of the NAACP, said one of the things he and Russell share in common is the rich tradition of the NAACP.

"Anytime we move away from that [tradition], we lose our way," he said. "The NAACP would not be here, if

not for William Monroe Trotter, a civil rights activist, newspaper editor and real estate businessman based in Boston, Massachusetts; the NAACP would not be here today, if not for Ida B. Wells, a newspaper writer...the NAACP would not be here today, if not for W.E.B. DuBois and his "Crisis" magazine. I commit today, that we will be joining the NNPA."

Johnson added that the NAACP is as strong as its volunteers and the Black Press is as strong as its readers, many of whom are NAACP members.

The signing, which took place on Friday, January 26 was attended by a number of NNPA members, staffers from both organizations and Gary, Indiana Mayor Karen Freeman Wilson, the first African American woman to hold the office of mayor in

the state of Indiana.

"We have to take the resources that we have in our collective communities and we have to use these resources in a way that educates our children and benefits our people," Wilson said. "We also have to support [Black] businesses."

Wilson added that Black consumers have to let go of the stereotype that Black businesses are inferior to White businesses.

Wilson also noted that African Americans aren't receiving a fair shake from the federal government and, in her city, finances are a challenge she's trying to meet head-on.

"Many of the answers depended on the state, but last night, a light bulb went on and it was that we can't wait on the Republican governor to save Gary," she said.

"So, I said to my team that whatever the governor does or doesn't do, we are going into the war room and we will stay there and not come out until we have a plan."

Wilson joined Russell, Johnson, Chavis and Leavell in advocating for a strong relationship between the NAACP and the Black Press.

"If Black newspapers didn't tell our stories, no one ever would have," said Russell, echoing the founders of the Black Press, Samuel E. Cornish and John B. Russwurm who stated 191 years ago: "We wish to plead our own cause. Too long have others spoken for us. Too long has the public been deceived by misrepresentations, in things which concern us dearly."

## Did Prosecutors Destroy Evidence in Cosby's Sexual Assault Case?

As Montgomery County prosecutors continue to pursue a verdict in the Bill Cosby sexual assault case involving former Temple University employee Andrea Constand, lawyers for the entertainer have filed several motions, including two arguing that the case against him should be dismissed.

And, while such motions are considered procedural and are rarely granted, the "Uptown Saturday Night" star has presented a compelling case for dismissal.

According to court documents filed by Cosby's lawyers, the court should dismiss all charges against Cosby because, by Montgomery County, Pennsylvania prosecutors' own admission, they have not only failed to disclose evidence, but have also destroyed exculpatory evidence.

"Specifically, the prosecution recently disclosed for the first time that, prior to the first trial in this case, a prosecutor and two detectives interviewed a critical witness, Marguerite Jackson who told them that in 2003

or 2004, the complaining witness, Andrea Constand, a co-worker and friend, had told her that she had not been sexually assaulted, but she could say that she had, file charges, and get money," the bombshell filing said.

It continued: "Yet, the prosecution failed to disclose to the defense that they met with [Jackson] and that they destroyed the notes of their meeting."

Cosby spokesman Andrew Wyatt released the court documents to the NNPA Newswire on Thursday, January 25.

Neither Cosby's attorneys nor prosecutors offered comment on Thursday.

Cosby's team also argued that it's reasonable to infer that the prosecution allowed Constand to testify falsely at the first trial that she did not know or remember Jackson.

Also, based on a Jan. 17, 2018 telephone conference call with the court, Assistant District Attorney Stewart Ryan admitted that he and two detectives spoke with Jackson and learned that Constand and Jackson worked together, had been friends, and had shared hotel rooms on multiple



occasions.

Despite their knowledge of the relationship, Cosby lawyers alleged that prosecutors stood silent while Constand testified under oath that she didn't know Jackson, and they persuaded the court to bar the defense from exploring the topic with Constand through cross-examination.

Judge Steven O'Neill also denied Cosby's lawyers' motion to call Jackson as a witness.

"The cumulative effect of the wrongdoing in this case, and the politically and emotionally charged context of this case, elevates the misconduct to a level of a constitutional violation and prosecutorial overreach depriving Cosby of any meaningful right to a fair trial," Cosby's attorneys

wrote Thursday. "Such misconduct warrants dismissal of the charges."

In another motion, Cosby's attorneys argued that prosecutors also have failed to prove that they brought the case within the 12-year statute of limitation and there's no way to prove it, because they admittedly are unsure of the timeline.

Constand alleged that Cosby assaulted her in early 2004—though previously she admitted their encounter could have been in 2003. Prosecutors didn't file charges until 2015.

It's unclear when O'Neill will issue a ruling on the motions.

Jury selection has been scheduled for March and the trial is expected to begin in April.

### Tuition-free college for Dallas ISD students

**DALLAS —** Dallas ISD is expanding opportunities for its students with the creation of Collegiate Academies inside most of the district's comprehensive high schools.

Academy students may earn up to 60 hours of college credit and an associate's degree – tuition-free – while also earning their high school diplomas.

Crystal, a sophomore at the James Madison Collegiate Academy, shares her thoughts on the benefits the school offers its students.

"The James Madison Collegiate Academy lets me experience things I have never experienced before," Crystal said. "Having the opportunity to experience a college setting and take college classes in my

own Madison community makes a big difference. Most people in my community don't have the chance to start college while they are in high school—or even go to college at all—so the chance to graduate with my high school diploma and associate degree at the same time is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity."

The collegiate academies are designed to serve incoming ninth-grade students who have the determination to attend college. Each collegiate academy accepts 100 ninth-grade students per year. The collegiate academy model begins in ninth grade, and students are only be accepted into the program as freshmen. They will move together as a



cohort as they progress through high school.

Each collegiate academy will have a higher education partner and offer its own academic pathway leading to an Associate of Applied Science degree. The career pathways available to students will range from health sciences, information technology and cyber security to culinary arts, animal sciences, law enforcement, and others.

### Griffin's departure leaves Clippers in free-agent hunt



(AP) — Suddenly, the Big Three is down to one. With star guard Chris Paul in Houston and face-of-the-franchise Blake Griffin traded to the Detroit Pistons, only DeAndre Jordan is left from the power trio that propelled the Los Angeles Clippers to relevance. Jordan becomes a free agent this summer and could be gone, too, if he isn't traded by the Feb. 8 deadline. Lou Williams, leading the NBA in scoring off the bench with 22.2 points per game in his 13th season, might be trade bait, too.

Griffin's stunning departure on Monday — seven months after he signed a \$171 million, five-year contract — has paved the way for the Clippers to have plenty of salary-cap room next season, putting them in position to snag a big-name free agent.

"With the future flexibility comes great opportunity," said Lawrence Frank, executive vice president of basketball operations. "It's going to be an exciting time, not just presently but also going forward."

The once-beleaguered franchise has never lured a major free agent, just as it has never gotten past the second round of the playoffs.

"We feel we'll always be an attractive place for play-

ers to come," Frank said. "With the goal being that we want to be in a position to compete for an NBA championship, that flexibility is paramount in order to add the talent we want to add to the team."

Exactly, Frank said, why the Clippers had to deal their resident superstar.

"As much as we valued Blake and all his contributions, we knew there may be a ceiling on the group as presently constructed and we were going to have to make some hard decisions," he said. "We couldn't be afraid to be bold."

Still, the move appeared to catch Griffin and his teammates by surprise.

"I know he was shocked," forward Sam Dekker said. "This is his team. This is all he knows. I'm sure he's nervous and it kind of made him probably sit down for a second and re-evaluate everything."

Austin Rivers, son of coach Doc Rivers, said, "No one saw it coming. I didn't even believe it when I heard it."

In exchange for their five-time All-Star forward, the Clippers got forward Tobias Harris, guard Avery Bradley and center Boban Marjanovic, along with draft picks.

"As long as I look around this place, I don't see any (championship) banners,"

the elder Rivers said. "And until we do that, we've got to keep mixing it up."

When Paul headed for Houston, the Clippers got Patrick Beverley in return and acquired Danilo Gallinari in a sign-and-trade deal.

That hasn't worked out so well.

Beverley has missed most of the season after having knee surgery in November. Gallinari returned Tuesday night from yet another injury, having missed 35 games this season with a variety of issues.

At 25-25, the Clippers are unlikely to win 50 games for a sixth straight season. Griffin played a major role the first five times that happened in franchise history.

But he was often injured during his nine years in Los Angeles, starting with a broken left kneecap that delayed his rookie season.

"You're looking at the other teams out there and comparing yourself. If you're not good enough or if you don't think you can beat them or if you think you need more help, then you have to do something about it," Rivers said. "To do something, sometimes you have to take chances. You have to mix it up and change it and see where you can go in the future."

### Harden has first 60-point triple-double in NBA history



(AP) — James Harden knew he'd have to do a little more on Tuesday night with the Houston Rockets missing key players.

Even he couldn't have imagined he'd do this much.

Harden became the first player in NBA history to score 60 points as part of a triple-double and the short-handed Rockets beat the Orlando Magic 114-107.

"I just gave it all I had tonight," Harden said. "We all did. We all fought for 48 minutes, we got key stops when we needed to and we made big shots."

Harden scored 18 points in the fourth quarter to eclipse the 57 points Calvin Murphy scored in 1978 to break Houston's single-game scoring record. After Harden broke the record, cameras in the arena showed a shot of Murphy, who works on the television broadcast team, smiling and clapping for the Beard, who also had 10 rebounds and 11 assists.

The game was tied at 107 after a basket by Marreese Speights with just under four minutes to play. Neither team scored for more than two minutes after that before Harden took over, scoring the next six points to make it 113-107 with 45 seconds left.

He set the scoring mark when he stepped back and made a 3-pointer before crashing to the court after being fouled by Mario Hezonja. He then made the free throw to give him 60 points and bringing the crowd to its feet.

"Amazing (and) topped it off with a four-point play at the end," coach Mike D'Antoni said. "But we had to have every minute from him."

Harden, who also had four steals and a block, grabbed his 10th rebound a few seconds later to give him his third triple double this season. He made 17 of 18 free throws and was 19 of 30 from the floor with five 3 pointers.

He said he didn't realize

he was the first player with 60 points in a triple-double.

"It's a good feeling, I guess," he said. "Just try to go out there and make an impact every single night on the game, however I can. Whether it's scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, whatever it is. And tonight I guess I was doing everything."

Hezonja and Speights scored 17 points each for the Magic, who dropped their third straight.

The Rockets started the game without Chris Paul, who has a sore groin, and Trevor Ariza, who is dealing with a strained hamstring. They lost another player when Eric Gordon, who is second on the team in scoring with 19.5 points a game, left early in the second quarter with lower back stiffness.

"I looked at coach and said: 'Eric can't go,'" Harden said "He said go get 'em and after that I didn't come out of the game."

Harden's big night came as he played 46 minutes and 26 seconds, which was a career-high for a regulation game, with Houston missing so many players.

"I was shocked to see that," Speights said of Harden not getting worn out by playing so many minutes. "He didn't really get subbed out and that shows the growth in his game and the maturity in his game."

It was his fourth 50-point game this season and Tuesday's performance bested his previous career-high of 56 points set in November against Utah.

"I have never seen a performance like that," teammate Gerald Green said. "I caught myself just being a true fan throughout the whole game ... what he did today was remarkable."

Orlando led by two points with about 9 1/2 minutes left before the Rockets used a 10-4 run to make it 101-97 with about seven minutes to go. Harden made two 3-pointers in that stretch, and wowed the crowd on the second one

that he came as the shot clock was about to expire and with Shelvin Mack right in his face.

Houston didn't lead for long though, as Speights was fouled while making a 3-pointer and added the free throw to tie it seconds later.

The Magic had a 2-point lead with about 5 1/2 minutes left before Houston used a 6-2 run, with all its points from Harden, to take a 107-105 lead with about four minutes left.

Harden piled up 16 points in the first quarter and had 24 by halftime despite his early 3-point shooting woes. Orlando led 55-54 at halftime.

Magic: Aaron Gordon missed the game with an injury to his left hip that he suffered on Saturday night. He will likely sit out Wednesday as well. ... Simmons and Mack added 15 points each.

Rockets: Ariza injured his left hamstring on Sunday. ... Coach Mike D'Antoni said he doesn't expect Paul to miss much time with his injury. ... Clint Capela finished with 12 points and 13 rebounds.

## DCHHS reports three additional flu-related deaths of season

DALLAS (Jan. 30, 2018) – Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) is reporting three additional flu-related deaths in Dallas County totaling 52 flu-related deaths for the 2017-2018 season. The patients range in age from 75 to 83 and were residents of Dallas. All patients had high risk health conditions and died after complications from the seasonal flu. For medical confidentiality and personal privacy reasons, DCHHS does not provide additional identifying information.

"Staying home when you are sick and practicing good health habits like covering your cough and washing your hands helps stop the spread of germs and prevents respiratory illnesses like the flu," said Ganesh Shivamaiyer, DCHHS interim director. "If you have a high risk condition, remember to keep a safe distance from individuals who have flu like symptoms."

"Older adults, individuals with chronic health conditions, pregnant women, young children and infants are more vulnerable to flu illness," said Dr. Christopher Perkins, DCHHS health authority/medical director. "With influenza activity on the rise, individuals in these groups should take special precaution as we continue throughout the season."

Simple actions can be taken to help prevent the spread of seasonal influenza. If you haven't done it already, protect yourself with a flu vaccination. Cover your cough with a tissue or cough into your sleeve. Wash your hands and keep your hands away from your face. Avoid close contact with people who are coughing or appear ill. Stay home if you are sick or keep family members home if they are sick.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends a yearly flu vaccine for all persons aged 6 months and older, with rare exception. Individuals should discuss flu vaccine concerns with a health care provider. The flu vaccine DCHHS provides is an all-in-one shot that protects against multiple flu strains including the H1N1virus. The adult flu vaccine is given in the adult immunization clinic on the first floor at the DCHHS building located at 2377 N. Stemmons Frwy in Dallas. The children's vaccine is available at all DCHHS immunization clinics. Clinic hours are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.
