Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin's Hospitalization Reignites **Controversy Over Transparency Amid Health Concerns**



Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin found himself back in the spotlight as he was urgently admitted to an emergency hospital on Sunday afternoon for symptoms related to a bladder issue, just weeks after his previous hospitalization. The 70-year-old cabinet official's decision to withhold information from the White House about his earlier health episode has triggered a renewed wave of criticism and scrutiny.

The latest incident, detailed in a report by USA Today, saw Secretary Austin move to Walter Reed National Military Medical Center for treatment—the announcement, made by Pentagon press secretary Air Force Maj. Gen. Pat Ryder

disclosed that Austin is undergoing treatment for symptoms indicating severe bladder issue, raising concerns about the gravity of his health condition.

This recurrence comes on the heels of Austin's earlier hospitalization, a matter that was not promptly disclosed to the White House, and Congress, officials. Pentagon The deliberate delay in communication has intensified scrutiny and fueled outrage among right-leaning media pundits and lawmakers.

During his prior hospitalization, Austin delegated his duties to his deputy, but the decision to withhold pertinent information from key stakeholders has ignited








The Colossian Believers' Reception of the Transforming Power of the Gospel

Colossians 1:1-14

Part II



As stated in our Introductory Notes, the Epistle of Colossians is one of Paul's prison epistles. The Epistles of Ephesians, Philippians, Philemon, and Colossians were written during Paul's first imprisonment in Rome in A.D. 61. It was during Paul's ministry in Ephesus (Acts 19:10, 26) that the gospel had made its way outward to Colosse, a city located on the Lycus River in the Roman province of Asia. The church that came from this effort was primarily Gentile (Colossians 1:27).

Epaphras, who was instrumental in taking the gospel to the Colossians, had visited Paul and brought news of the church (Colossians 1:7-8). Some of the news was disturbing, for false teaching was threatening the faith of believers. So, to combat this issue, Paul presented some sound teachings, especially about the Person and work of Christ. Our

text, Colossians 1:1-14, may be outlined as follows: I. The Beneficial Effects of the Gospel in the Lives of the Colossian Believers – Colossians 1:1-8; II. Paul's Prayer for the Colossian Believers' Spiritual Growth – Colossians 1:9-14.

II. Paul's Prayer for the Colossian Believers' Spiritual Growth Colossians 1:9-14

Paul's thanksgiving for the Colossian believers was followed by a heartfelt prayer for their continued spiritual growth. The expression, "For cause," in verse 9, refers to the good report Epaphras had brought. This good report spurred Paul to engage in unceasing prayer for the Colossian believers' progress. Paul was well aware that spiritual growth depends on spiritual comprehension.

Paul prayed that the believers "might be filled

with the knowledge of His will." "Knowledge" here refers to knowledge that comes by experience. Paul prayed further that "full knowledge" might be known "in all wisdom and spiritual understanding." "Understanding" refers to having critical discernment; that is, having the ability to discern the difference between right and wrong, truth and error, important and unimportant.

The Colossian believers were exposed to a heretical teaching that claimed to have superior knowledge; therefore, the believers needed to have "full knowledge" of God's will to combat this error. Having prayed for the believers' spiritual comprehension in verse 9, Paul now prays that the Colossian believers would display their spiritual comprehension in godly conduct (vv. 10-11). Comprehension, which is very valuable, must be revealed in godly character.

One who knows God's will is obligated to practice it. To walk worthy of the Lord is to conduct oneself in a manner becoming to one who bears His name. Our conduct must be pleasing to God in every respect. Believers having an obedient attitude will produce fruit, and the strength to bear fruit comes from the Holy Spirit within (v. 10).

In verse 11, the power of God enables believers to maintain stability in unfavorable circumstances. "Strengthened with all might" in verse 11 denotes "empowered with all power." God's mighty Arm is stretched out to give the needed stability. God's infusion of Divine power brings patience, long suffering, and joy. God's awesome power is available to help us persist in the face of unbearable circumstances! The virtue of long-suffering refers to our reaction to persons. It involves holding or putting a check to our anger

and irritability. As believers, we can experience the power of God's uncommon joy. Only by the power of God can we be steadfast and long-suffering with joy (v. 11).

Finally, in verses 12-14, Paul prayed that the Colossian believers be thankful. He revealed three things for which they should give thanks. First, they should thank God that He qualified them to share in the inheritance of the saints in light. Our inheritance still awaits us in the realm of God's light, but we have title to it already. Second, in verse 13, thanks should be given to God for rescuing us from the power of darkness. At one time, we belonged to the domain of darkness over which Satan rules (Ephesians 6:12), but now God has delivered us from that horrific domain of Satan. Third, we should thank God because He "hath translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son" (v. 13). The word "translated" means we have been transported from Satan's kingdom of darkness and transported to the kingdom of God.

Christ is here called "His dear Son" or "the Son of His love." The greatest bond of love exists between the Father and the Son. And the Father's love for mankind was displayed in the giving of His Son to expiate our sins. The Son is the One "in whom we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins" (v. 14). Redemption speaks of setting free by the payment of a ransom. We are ransomed away from the slavery that once held us. Through this redemption, purchased by His blood, we now enjoy the forgiveness of our sins. The power of darkness no longer controls

Nearly 100 other guests, including members of the Congressional Black Caucus and administration officials, attended the event. Rep. Terri Sewell (D-Ala.), a featured speaker, commended the families for their personal sacrifices and tireless work to preserve and protect their ancestors' legacies. "At a time when our fundamental freedoms are once again under attack, we are grateful to President Biden not only for convening this event but for his commitment to furthering the progress that our foremothers and forefathers fought and died to achieve," Sewell stated.

Will Parents Be Incarcerated

For The Actions And Decisions Of Their Children?

I can say with certainty my parents gave me a foundation built on love. I always felt cared about and safe. They poured their humanity into me every day.

Having a good name was important. Keeping a good name was even more important. You kept your good name by making good decisions. As children, we made some immature decisions, however those decisions did not cause hurt, harm or danger to anyone.

Being mischievous back in the day simply meant carrying out childish pranks. For example, you might leave an empty carton of juice in the refrigerator. The question would arise, who did it?

We had neighborhoods in Winston-Salem NC where everyone knew everyone. As

kids, we were always in and out of someone else's house. We were all pretty much social and there weren't any deep, dark secrets.

With a sense of pride and thanksgiving, I can say we had a caring East Winston community. If something strange or unusual was happening with us, parents would know about it and do something about it.

If you are of a certain age, you probably had similar experiences to mine. The formula was love, caring and communication. These three traits kept us out of confusion and gave us emotional stability.

My dear childhood friends, William Earl and Bishop Graham, whom I have known since elementary school, often talk about the joys we had simply being kids. Laughing, playing and joking were things we did in abundance. Our responsibilities were to do our best in school and to act like we had some sense. We managed to do both.

Being quiet and a loner didn't happen in our neighborhood. We played outside every chance we had even in cold weather. Being inside was not appealing to us. Being with our friends was ten times better than watching television or listening to a radio.

Guns were not a part of our community. Deep in my spirit, I don't believe adults owned guns. That was just the way it was. Now it seems that everyone at least knows someone who owns a gun. Suffice it to say, things are just different these days.

Children and teens now have ready and immediate access to weapons. How can that be? It can be because parents leave guns out and visible coupled with the fact they are loaded. Restrictions on who can purchase them are weak, too.

are weak, too.

Some parents have only minor restrictions on their children which sometimes lead to bad outcomes. The other side of that debate is that you want your children to be responsible and to learn how to make wise choices. That's the fine line that parents find themselves in today. Some parents become querulous and complaining while others remain silent and still.

I suspect the Crumbley family in Michigan grappled with that question. A few weeks ago, Jennifer Crumbley was found guilty of four counts of involun-

tary manslaughter. The jury found that she bore some responsibility for her son, Ethan Robert Crumbley, age 15 killing four students and injuring seven other people. This tragedy happened on November 30, 2021, at Oxford High School outside of Detroit Michigan.

The husband, James Crumbley is set to go on trial next month. He, too, is charged with four counts of involuntary manslaughter. Reports say that Mrs. Crumbley is the first person to go on trial for a mass shooting carried out by their child.

This case will have reverberations with parents across America. Joe Tamburino,a criminal defense attorney said, "The case will create a huge precedent for further cases. Think about it, the next time there's some type of school shooting, they could arrest the parents. This is going to change the landscape."

Parenting today is both rewarding and challenging. There are no easy answers and solutions. Being thoughtful and proactive can be safeguards for parents as they raise and rear their children. We are living in perilous and uncertain times.



Maybe it was Usher's star-studded halftime show that inspired the Kansas City Chiefs and their superstar quarterback Pat Mahomes in the second half to win their third Super Bowl in four years with a thrilling 25-22 OT victory over the San Francisco 49ers in Las Vegas. Or, perhaps, it was inevitable just Mahomes, a Black quarterback, was inspired by the pregame singing of "Lift Every Voice" and the bold "End Racism" sign painted at each end zone. Or could it have been a combination of all of the above, along with the specter of playing a 49ers where Colin Kaepernick took a stand for Black Lives Matter, that's cost him a football career?

Whatever it was, Patrick Mahomes again proved why he's worth every penny of his mega \$500 million-plus contract and why, on the football field at least, he overshadows all the Travis Kelce-Taylor Swift noise. Mahomes helped Kansas City overcome a stifling 49ers defense and San Francisco's potent offense after being stymied in the first half. The Chiefs trailed 10-3 at the half, and it appeared they couldn't figure out how to break through the

49er's defense, while the Chiefs' own defense had all kinds of trouble limiting Brock Purdy and his offense.

While they gathered in the locker room after two quarters, Usher took center stage and not only whipped out all of his classic hits but brought out several A-list superstars to punctuate the Apple Music Halftime Show. With Alicia Keys joining in with her hit, "If I Ain't Got You," and the collab "My Boo," chart-topper H.E.R. rocked the Allegiance Stadium crown with a blistering solo on U Got It Bad. Will.i.am then joined Usher on "OMG," and Jermaine Dupri, Lil Jon, and helped close Ludacris Usher's set with "Yeah."

After the halftime spectacle, the teams return to the field and the Chiefs got the ball to start the second half, but they didn't solve the 49ers. At least not immediately. However, Kansas City's defense finally figured out Purdy, and the trick plays. punctuated Francisco's first-half dominance, and Mahomes worked his magic. After yielding an overtime field goal to the 49ers, the Chiefs had to at least match that to keep the game going under the new NFL OT rules that allow both



teams to have the ball on offense. A pivotal 4th down conversion helped propel the Chiefs before Mahomes threw a 3-yard touchdown pass to Mecole Hardman. and Kansas City became the NFL's ninth repeat Super Bowl champs. "With all the adversity we've been through this season to come through tonight. ... I'm proud of the guys," said Mahomes, who earned his third Super Bowl MVP award. "This is awesome.

Legendary." The 28-year-old Mahomes becomes the fourth starting quarterback to win three Super Bowls — joining Brady, Joe Montana, Terry Bradshaw, and Troy Aikman — and second youngest.

"I am going to celebrate tonight, celebrate at the parade, and then work my way to get back in this game next year," Mahomes said. "I am going to do whatever I can to be back in this game next year. Three-peat."

John Sykes, Chairman of the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame Foundation, expressed enthusiasm for the diverse list of nominees, emphasizing the impactful contributions of hip-hop artists. "This remarkable list reflects the diverse artists and music that the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame honors and celebrates.

These hip-hop artists have

created sounds that have impacted generations and influenced countless others" he stated.

The nominees unveiled in partnership with ABC/Disney+ at the TCA in Los Angeles and through the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame's social channels.
