PRESIDENT BARACK OBAMA'S STATE OF THE UNION ADDRESS

(AP)- President Barack Obama urged Congress to help restore opportunity for Americans but pledged to take action himself Tuesday in his fifth State of the Union address before Congress. Some highlights from Obama's economic and other proposals:

-MINIMUM WAGE: An executive order to raise minimum wage paid by federal contractors to \$10.10. He called on Congress to increase the federal minimum wage for all workers to \$10.10. Last year, Obama asked Congress to raise the rate to \$9 by the end of 2015, but Congress has not taken that step.

-RETIREMENT SECURITY: Create a new savings account program to help people start saving for retirement. Obama is asking the Treasury to create a bond called MyRA that can be offered through employers as a "starter" retirement account. Call for Congress to create automatic IRAs for all workers who don't opt out. Obama has included this in previous budget requests but Congress hasn't acted on it.

-IMMIGRATION: Renew call for Congress to pass comprehensive immigration overhaul this year, including a path to citizenship for about 11 million immigrants in the U.S. illegally. Bipartisan legislation has passed the Senate, but the House prefers a piecemeal approach. House Republicans are meeting this week and are expected to outline their principles for an immigration overhaul.

'Dallas' Too Busy Growing To Hate



CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVIST ADELFA CALLEJO SUCCUMBS AT 90



Adelfa Botello Callejo, Dallas lawyer and immigrant rights pioneer, has died at the age of 90.

Callejo was critical in the fight for immigrant rights especially those of Mexican immigrants and Mexican-Americans in her native Texas. In her lifetime she led numerous protests on behalf of immigration reform, police violence against Mexican-Americans and redistricting that did not allow Latino voters to be adequately represented.

Callejo was the first Latina to graduate from Southern Methodist University's (SMU) law school back in 1961. She was successful enough in business and law to eventually donate \$1 million to SMU's Dedman School of law. The school named its Latino Studies Institute in her honor calling it the 'Adelfa Botello Callejo Leadership and Latino Studies Institute.'

Unable to find a law firm that would hire her, she started her own law firm in Dallas. The activist was born to a

Mexican father who picked cotton while her Mexican-American mother worked the fields. She grew up in a small Texas town during a time when Latinos were segregated from the general population in terms of education and privileges - that never stopped her from protesting or succeeding. Callejo has been recognized, including receiving the Martin Luther King, Jr. Justice Award, for her tireless efforts toward eliminating racial barriers and improving the quality of education for Latinos.

Callejo served as president of the Mexican American Bar Association of Texas.

The immigrant activist battled both colon and breast cancer and most recently brain cancer. Ever the fighter she successfully fought one bout of brain cancer back in 2012. Callejo was recently told the brain cancer had returned and passed away this past Friday.

A funeral mass is scheduled for 10 a.m. Thursday at the Cathedral Shrine of the Virgin of Guadalupe, 2215 Ross Avenue, in downtown Dallas. The service will be celebrated by Bishop Kevin Farrell, following a one hour reception.



-CLIMATE AND ENERGY: Set new fuel efficiency standards for trucks. Introduce first-of-its-kind emissions limits on power plants. Work with states and communities on climate change resiliency and cutting pollution. Cut red tape to help states build factories that use natural gas. Propose new incentives for trucks that use alternative fuels like natural gas. Urge Congress to end tax benefits for the oil industry and use revenues to invest in advanced vehicles that use cleaner fuels.

-TAXES: Expand the earned-income tax credit, which helps boost the wages of low-income families through tax refunds. Some Republicans and conservative economists have called for similar expansion of the credit. Overhaul tax code to eliminate

wasteful loopholes while lowering rates for businesses to incentivize hiring in the U.S.

-HEALTHCARE: Encourage Americans without insurance to sign up through new exchanges by March 31 deadline. Urge Republicans to give up attempts to repeal Obama's health care law.

-EDUCATION: Connect 15,000 schools and 20 million students with high-speed broadband in the next two years. Award grants to redesign winning high schools to prepare students for today's job market. Improve access for low-income students and lower costs. Renew call to Congress to fund universal pre-school.

-JOBS: Launch more high-tech manufacturing hubs, in addition to two that were launched this year. Direct Vice-President Joe

Biden to lead review of federal job-training programs. Partner with leading U.S. companies to help long-term unemployed.

-AFGHANISTAN: Wind down war in Afghanistan by removing most troops and completing mission by end of this year. Work to negotiate security agreement with Afghanistan so small force can remain to train Afghan forces and pursue al-Qaida.

-FIGHTING TERRORISM: Limit use of drones in foreign countries. Overhaul U.S. surveillance programs to restore public confidence. Renew call for Congress to lift transfer restrictions so Guantanamo Bay prison can be closed.

-IRAN: Pursue negotiations with Iran toward a long-term nuclear deal. Threaten to veto new sanctions that Congress passes during ongoing nuclear talks. Vow to push for more sanctions if talks with Iran don't succeed.

More good news keeps coming for consumers in early 2014. On the heels of new mortgage rules that took effect January 10, the following week four banks making payday loans pulled their products from the market. Announcing a halt to their triple-digit interest rates were Wells Fargo, Regions, Fifth Third and US Bank. Together, these lenders have combined assets of \$2.1 trillion, serving customers through 30,000 branches and more than 21,500 ATMs across the country.

Sometimes known as advance deposit loans, or trademarked names such as US Bank's Checking Account Advance or Wells Fargo's Direct Deposit Advance, the loans operate in the same manner as payday loans hawked by stores. Customers borrow a few hundred dollars and then the bank repays itself from the borrower's next direct deposit, assessing a fee plus the entire loan amount.

Research by the Center for

may be able to reduce breast cancer risk by either taking cholesterol-lowering drugs or eating a healthy, low-cholesterol diet.

Personally, I would rather up my intake of colorful meals than colorful medicines. Fruits and vegetables have zero cholesterol, which is just one reason why you'll find scores of them on lists of "cancer-fighting foods." Whole grains are cholesterol-free too. In fact, no

But meat, eggs, and dairy products all pack a cholesterol punch. A single egg has 212 milligrams, three and a half ounces of shrimp has 194, and three and a half ounces of chicken liver delivers a whopping 631 milligrams.

I lost the person that I was closest to, my grandmother, to breast cancer when she was just 64 years

old. So reducing my breast cancer risk is important to me. And cutting animal products out of my diet is an easy way to do that.

Going vegan is one of the best decisions I've ever made, and I hope that, until there is a cure for breast cancer, others will join me in taking this important step for their health.

BANKS BID FAREWELL TO PAYDAY LOANS

Responsible Lending (CRL) has found that the typical bank payday borrower:

Is charged a fee of \$10 per \$100 borrowed, amounting to an annual percentage rate (APR) of 300 percent; Has a one in four chance of also being a Social Security recipient; Is twice more likely to incur overdraft fees than bank customers as a whole and often remains in debt for six months of a year.

Consumer advocates and civil rights leaders have been shining a bright light on banks that chose to engage in this kind of lending over the past two years. Below are a few examples of that consumer activism.

In early 2012, 250 organizations and individuals sent a letter to federal banking regulators expressing concerns. A year later in 2013, more than 1,000 consumers and organizations told the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau about elder financial abuse, including bank payday lending. CRL in coordination with CREDO, an organization that funds progressive non-profits, delivered a petition with 150,000 signatures in an appeal to federal regulators.

By April 2013, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency proposed regulatory guidance on bank payday loan criteria. Weeks later amid still-grow-

ing consumer concerns, Florida's U.S. Senator Bill Nelson and Sen. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts in May 2013 sent a joint letter to the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC).

"As Chairman and member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging, we take very seriously our responsibilities to seniors and elderly consumers who expect and deserve fair and transparent financial services," said the Senators. "Social Security was created to provide seniors with financial support to help them cover basic living expenses not for banks seeking new sources of revenue by exploiting retirees with limited means. Therefore it is critical that banks be discouraged from using government benefits as proof of income, and we would hope such a provision would be included in the final guidance."

By November 2013, FDIC and OCC finalized regulations and advised banks that a borrower's ability to repay a loan must be considered when issuing these loans. In December 2013, the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights (LCCR), representing more than 200 diverse national organizations, unanimously adopted a resolution urging states, Congress and federal agencies to increase regulatory oversight and enforcement of all payday lenders.

"Low-income people and peo-

ple of color have long been targeted by slick advertising and aggressive marketing campaigns to trap consumers into outrageously high interest loans," said Wade Henderson, LCCR president and CEO. "We're simply advocating for reasonable regulatory oversight that ensures that low-income people won't be swindled out of the little money they do have at their disposal."

Reactions to the bank decisions resulted in cheers from consumer advocates. For example, Dory Rand, president of the Chicago-based Woodstock Institute, said, "We applaud these decisions to stop offering these dangerous products. For too long, these products – like storefront payday loan products – have wreaked havoc on borrowers' finances and trapped them in a cycle of debt."

In short, it was the constant call for consumer protections that ultimately led to banks foregoing payday loans. By combining efforts on a single issue, advocates accomplished together what none might have done alone.

I am hoping the rest of 2014 will be energized by the success of these early 2014 consumer victories. Perhaps federal regulators will soon put an end to all consumer debt traps. As we celebrate this key consumer victory, let us strive towards more financial reforms.

Awakened from a Dream

for those whose checks were cut off on December 28, nearly a month ago. They talk the talk and they don't walk the walk. They are marching to the dream of a different drummer.

I am writing after the fact because it is never after the fact. The hypocrites who rail about social and economic justice need to be held to some standard. They need to be confronted about their hypocrisy around the dream.

They need to read all of King, not just the passages that mollify them and make them feel good. They cannot dream a dream of social equity without working for economic equity.

I have the same criticism for my hip-hop brothers and sisters who can set almost anything to music. Why not take the words "cash the check" and educate our young people about what Dr. King really said. The generation who can electric slide from the Negro National Anthem (I am not kidding – I've seen it) ought to be able to slide their way to a freedom song. Instead they mostly myopically enjoy the music, not the words.

My preacher brothers and sisters, too, take snippets of the King dream and turn it into a sermon.

Why not tell the whole story about Dr. King being rejected by his supporters when he connected poverty and racism with Vietnam. Supporters turned their backs on him. The foundation that once embraced his work dropped him because he told the truth. People who vied for his company suddenly shunned him. Now, in death, he is a hero.

In 1968, 72 percent of all White people disapproved of Dr. King, as did 55 percent of all Black people. Black folks have racial fealty, but not racial radicalism. Were it not for racism, too many African American people would embrace some aspects of conservatism. That's why too many of us celebrate President Barack Obama without analyzing the work he has done.

Indeed, Africa American people have a schizophrenic relationship with President Obama. We like his swag, his confident representation of a powerful Black man. We are ambivalent about the ways he has used his power, too often to essentially ignore the challenges that the Black community faces. He says this year will be his year of action around income inequality, poverty, and unemployment, and we all under-

stand that action trickles down. Will it trickle down to us? Our president, he of Black man swagger and confidence, will not say.

What will this year of action mean? Five areas have been selected as experimental areas where funds and focus will be targeted. Each of these areas has challenges, but it would have been powerful if he had highlighted the area, just a stone's throw away from the White House, where African American men and women have unemployment rates that exceed 20 percent, where teens who want to work cannot find jobs, where the King dream is nothing more than a nightmare for them, where their pain is hardly addressed.

Hypocrisy and hip-hocphy. Elders and younguns both speak of the dream but hardly embrace it. There is a week of commemoration and then we move on. If the dream is real, it is not a week-long dream; it is an affirmation of those things Dr. King cared about – the eradication of poverty, social and economic equity, voting rights, and peace. We have attained none of these dreams, yet we commemorate the dreamer.

over his enemies, the Edomites. The Edomites were greatly defeated and never became a force against Israel again.

Psalm 60 teaches that God will deliver His saints during trouble and assures them of ultimate victory. In the midst of trouble, we need to wait patiently on Him, for

Psalm 40:1-3 says, "I waited patiently for the LORD; and He inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings. And He hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God: many shall see it, and fear, and shall trust in the LORD."

The background scripture for this psalm and didactic (teaching) psalm is II Samuel

chapter 8. In verses 1-3, David pleads for God's help because of the adverse predicament or situation Israel was in, "O God, thou hast cast us off, thou hast scattered us, thou hast been displeased; O turn thyself to us again" (v. 1).

David was fully aware that only God could help Israel be victorious. As believers, we must understand to gain spiritual victory, God must help us. By the Lord's awesome power as stated in verses 4-5, He alone can bring victory out of defeat,

"That thy beloved may be delivered; save with thy right hand, and hear me" (v. 5).

When anyone is led by God's power, victory is attainable. In verses 6-8, David reveals that Israel will be victorious and triumph over their enemies because God is in control of the land. David states, "God hath

spoken in His holiness; I will rejoice" (v.6) as he lists the victories that God will grant him.

Thank God that He is Sovereign and is in complete control of every parcel of land, despite the arrogance of man, for Psalm 24:1-2 states "The earth is the LORD's, and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein. For He hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods."

Our God created everything and He has the power to sustain His creation (Colossians 1: 17). This marvelous psalm ends in verses 9-12 with David declaring that victory is only in God, "Through God we shall do valiantly; for He it is that shall tread down our enemies" (v. 12).







Donald's mother, Illinois, and father, Donald, Sr., are both tennis teaching professionals and introduced him to tennis at age three. They run the South Fulton Tennis Center in College Park, Georgia. Donald was the only sports figure in Newsweek magazine's "Who Next?" feature on 12/27/04.

Donald is characterized by quick feet, hands, and an unorthodox style of play (left-handed) that made it easy for him to win many points against most junior players.

Going into professional tennis at full-swing in 2005, Donald had everything needed to do well. Unfortunately, things didn't work out for him as planned. He struggled to make the main draw or had to qualify to play pro events.

The good news is that, now, Donald has begun to show signs of making progress in major events as he demonstrated in the 2014 Australian Open. He made it to the third round after winning two tough matches in the grueling hot sun Down Under.

"Under" His second match went five sets, the full course, that he won against a seasoned pro on the circuit.

The remainder of the year for Donald should be a walk after his tough workout in the Australian Open. At present, he is the only African-American that ranks high enough to play in most major events on the circuit. Hopefully, Donald can reach the top in the pros as he did in the juniors. Time is in his corner, as shown by Victoria Azarenka, the number two lady in singles, who shared the number one spot with Donald when they played junior tennis.







THE MAGNITUDE OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH

During the month of February the nation pauses to acknowledge the significant contributions made by people of African-American ancestry to American greatness. The practice began in 1926 when Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard trained black historian, proclaimed that a time should be set aside to reflect on the achievements of blacks in America.

Dr. Woodson, who headed the Washington, D.C. based Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, chose February because President Abraham Lincoln and the great abolitionist Frederick Douglass were born during that month. Originally, the recognition occurred for a period of one week. In 1976 it was extended to an entire month.

From its very inception, those who promulgated Black History

Month articulated that the celebration was not only important to African-Americans, but to all Americans. The black inventors, writers, engineers, business owners, political leaders, lawyers, medical professionals, clergy and athletes who have made monumental contributions to American life have enriched all of our citizens.

Those who have contributed are not simply African-American heroes, they are American heroes. Their accomplishments were not simply made for black people in this country. They were made for all people. When the World War II war hero, Doris Miller, a cook in the U.S. Navy left his ship's kitchen to operate a machine gun to battle attacking enemy planes, he acted to protect the lives of all his fellow seamen. Many of those who were saved because of his heroics were not African-Americans.

When Bessie Coleman became the first African-American female from the south to serve in the House of Representatives she encouraged legions of women, black, brown and white who had been told that there was no place for them in the halls of power where decisions that affected the lives of people, including their own, were made.

I could fill countless numbers of pages with the names of African-American heroes, they have accomplished great things in their lifetimes. It is vitally important that we remember them and their work as they have helped to change all of our lives, and the life of a nation.

Even today, African-Americans make vital contributions to American life. The president of our nation, an African-American, leads the most powerful nation on the face of the earth. When he makes a decision it makes it in the best interests of all Americans.

We must always remember, however, that these amazing achievements belong to all of us. The history of African-American people, like the history of other ethnic groups in our country, has enriched all of our citizens, and has contributed to the standing that America has in the world today.
