LONDON (AP) — When accomplished, glamorous American actress Meghan Markle married Prince Harry in 2018, she was hailed as a breath of fresh air for Britain's fusty royal family. That honeymoon didn't last.

Now the couple wants independence, saying the pressure of life as fulltime royals is unbearable. And a debate is raging: Did racism drive, Meghan, away?

When Prince Harry, who is sixth in line to the throne, began dating the "Suits" actress — daughter of a white father and African American mother — the media called it a sign that Britain had entered a "post-racial" era in which skin color and background no longer mattered, even to the royal family.

South Oak Cliff High School community turns out in large numbers to celebrate \$52 million in renovations





3-and-out: PGA Tour moving Byron Nelson from Trinity Forest

DALLAS (AP) — The PGA Tour will tournament. move the Byron Nelson away from Trinity Forest Golf Club after the tournament is played there for only the third time this May.

The links-style course south of downtown Dallas was built in 2014 on the site of a former landfill. The Nelson moved there in 2018 after 35 years at the TPC Four Seasons in suburban Irving, Texas, about 25 miles away.

The PGA Tour hasn't said where the Nelson will be played after this year's

Disappointing attendance at Trinity Forest and decreased revenues for charity were significant factors in the decision. The course has an unusual look for a PGA Tour venue because it has no

Trinity Forest officials said in a release that PGA Tour officials cited weather issues during the first two years that exposed deficiencies with tournament infrastructure, and that it was determined by the course and the Salesmanship Club of Dallas, which hosts the event, that those issues couldn't be remedied easily.

The start of the third round in last year's tournament was delayed six hours by heavy rains and play was suspended by darkness, leading to 27 holes on the final day for the leaders. There were also weather issues in 2018, when the final round had a four-hour rain delay and it was nearly dark for the final putt of the tournament.

The Salesmanship Club's Momentous

Institute, a nonprofit that provides education and therapeutic services for about 5,500 children and family members each year, benefits from the Nelson's net proceeds. After peaking at more than \$6 million a year when at Four Seasons, last year's tournament netted less than half of that.

Three-time major champion Jordan Spieth, who played his first PGA Tour event as a 16-year-old at Four Seasons, is a member of Trinity Forest. So is CBS NFL broadcaster and former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Tony Romo.





Senator Doug Jones Emphasizes the Importance of the 2020 Black Voter Turnout in **Exclusive Fireside Chat with NNPA**

The importance of Black voter turnout, the Reauthorization of the Voting Rights Act, bipartisan politics, the Futures Act and environmental justice, counted among the topics candidly tackled during a historic fireside chat between National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) President and CEO Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr., and Alabama's Senator Doug Jones, a Democrat.

Held inside the Hart Building at the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C., the engaging hour-long conversation marked the first time

that a sitting U.S. Senator sat down for a live-streamed video with the Black Press of America.

During the discussion, Jones said that voter turnout - particularly that of African Americans – was crucial to his stunning upset of Republican Roy Moore in the 2017 Alabama Special Election.

"The right to vote was hard fought for African Americans in this country, and I think too many people take that for granted. I think we proved that in the special election in 2017, that every vote counts," said Jones.

Jones said voting rights had been under attack since the 2013 Shelby V. Holder decision, which eliminat-

ed a lot of voter protections.

"It's not the same as the old Jim Crow laws, but there's still efforts out there to suppress votes and keep people from having that free access to the booths," he stated.

Jones noted that he's working to restore "teeth" in the Voting Rights Act, but doubts that the current GOP-led Senate and President Trump's administration would approve.

"I don't see it happening, so it's all the more important to get out and vote in the 2020 elections," Jones stated.

"We did get more African Americans as a percentage out than even when President Obama did in his first race, a fact that I was very proud. The Black community came out and worked hard. It's community engagement; it's a 365-days a year job. And, that's why the Black Press is so important because it keeps the community engaged," he stated.

Late last year, Trump signed the Futures Act, a bipartisan measure that would put more funding into Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other minority-serving institutions.

The president of one of the country's largest historically black colleges, Texas Southern University, in Houston, was placed on paid administrative leave Friday by university regents.

The board provided no explanation for the decision but said in a statement they were "committed to ensuring all activities at the university are conducted in an ethical and transparent manner in accordance with the university's mission, vision and values."

The recommendation to place Lane on immediate administrative leave as an "additional audit committee and external investigation continues" was read aloud and later approved at the board's meeting Friday.

But two regents have harshly criticized the way Lane was removed, with one calling the process "flawed" and another say-

ing it was "bush-league, amateurish... spiteful and mean-spirited" to not notify the president in advance.

Another regent, Derrick Mitchell, defended Lane during the Friday meeting, saying there were some on the board "who have been out to undermine" him from the start.

"I think that this has been, that the process was flawed," Mitchell said during the meeting. "And I think that what we as a board may be doing is an injustice."

Price abstained from the vote to place Lane on administrative leave and Mitchell voted no.

Chief Financial Officer Kenneth Huewitt will be interim president of Texas Southern, which was established the by Legislature in 1947 and has about 9,700 students, 80% of them African American. A spokesperson for the university referred questions about Friday's decision to spokespeople for the board of regents, who did not respond.

The news comes about two months after an internal investigation found "certain improprieties related" to Texas Southern's admissions process, leading the board to launch a comprehensive review of the university's admissions, extending to enrollment, financial aid and scholarship protocols at each of its colleges. The review is being led by independent auditors, attorneys and experts.

A statement announcing the review in November said the "person involved with these improprieties" was no longer employed at Texas Southern and that information had been turned over to local authorities. "The University will have no further comment until the investigative process is complete," it added.

In 2006, another former Texas Southern president was fired and nearly faced prison over allegations that she spent some \$500,000 in university funds on personal items, like furniture. The trial of former President Priscilla Slade ended with a deadlocked jury and she agreed to a plea deal in 2008.



Suspect arrested after student fatally shot at Texas high school

Reports differed about whether the shooting had occurred inside or outside the suburban Houston school.

BELLAIRE, Texas (AP) — A student was shot to death Tuesday at a suburban Houston high school, and a suspect was arrested hours later, officials said.

Grenita Latham, interim superintendent of the Houston Independent School District, confirmed the shooting victim at Bellaire High School had died. She gave no other information and took no questions as media reports differed about whether the shooting had occurred inside or outside the school.

A suspect was arrested Tuesday night, according to a school district statement issued about 3 1/2 hours after the shooting. It provided no details about where the shooting occurred in the school complex, whether the suspect was a student or what led to the arrest.

Tyler Perry: 'No need' to fight or protest about Oscar snubs

NEW YORK (AP) — The lack of diversity and notable snubs in this year's Oscar nominations left Tyler Perry annoyed, but he says it's not worth getting upset because it's a system that is not going to change.

"There is no need in going back and forth, or fighting, or protesting. It is what it is. This is how it is in Hollywood, and it's how it will always be," Perry told The Associated Press on Monday hours after the nominations were announced.

Not only were there no female nominees in directing for the 87th time in Oscar history — a direct snub to Greta Gerwig, director of "Little Women," as well as several other worthy candidates. There was also only one person of color, Cynthia Erivo, among the 20 acting nominees. Golden Globe winner Awkwafina ("The Farewell") was denied a chance at an Oscar.

Globe nominees Jennifer Lopez, for her role in "Hustlers," and Beyoncé, for original song "Spirit" from "The Lion King," were also overlooked.

"I feel like Jennifer Lopez should have been nominated. She did a great job. I feel like Awkwafina did a great job," Perry said. "Beyoncé should have been nominated. But it is what it is."

Dallas VA hospital officers fatally shoot man with knife

DALLAS (AP) — Security officers fatally shot a knifewielding man who was seeking psychiatric help at a Dallas Veterans Affairs hospital, police said.

The man went to the Dallas Veterans Affairs Medical Center late Wednesday seeking help for "psychiatric issues," the Dallas Police Department said. The man was holding a knife when he encountered VA hospital police officers, Dallas police said.

The VA officers followed the man as he started to walk away and tried to take away the knife. When they were unable to do so, the officers opened fire on the man, Dallas police said.

The man, whose name has not been released, was taken to an area hospital, where he died from his injuries, according to Dallas police.

The shooting did not involve Dallas Police Department officers but that agency is leading the investigation, police said in a press release.

Mother dies months after daughter killed in house by officer

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The mother of a Texas woman fatally shot by a police officer has died in the house where her daughter was killed, an attorney for the family said.

Yolanda Carr passed away Thursday morning in the Fort Worth home where an city officer shot her daughter, Atatiana Jefferson, in October, according to lawyer Lee Merritt. The cause of Carr's death was not immediately known, but she had been getting treatment for congestive heart failure, he said.

Jefferson, 28, had recently moved into her mother's home to care for her when she was shot through a window by Officer Aaron Dean. Carr was hospitalized when her daughter was killed and had been missing a "critical" caregiver since, Merritt said.

"They've been reeling from one tragedy to the next," Merritt said of the family.

Dean, now 35, shot Jefferson through a back window after responding to an early morning call about an open front door. On body camera footage of the call he cannot be heard identifying himself as police before firing into the house. He resigned in the days after the shooting and has been charged with murder.

Dallas ISD to immediately implement stricter security protocols at sporting events

DALLAS ISD - Superintendent Michael Hinojosa said Dallas ISD is immediately implementing new protocols following a Jan. 11 shooting at a district basketball game.

Effective Jan. 13–17, bags, purses and backpacks will not be allowed into sporting events. Starting Jan. 20 only clear bags will be allowed into sporting events. The district will also use wand metal detectors as people enter district sporting events.

At a Jan. 13 press conference, Hinojosa thanked the courageous Dallas ISD police officers working the basketball game who immediately leapt into action after the shooting incident, preventing any further tragedy. He also credited the Dallas Police Department for their invaluable assistance that led to a suspect being placed in custody.

In the long term, Hinojosa said the district will convene a task force to work with the city to help address citywide gun violence and related issues. He also said a possible future bond could finance further security measures and equipment at district schools and facilities.





LOS ANGELES (AP) — A look at some of the historic achievements and trivial tidbits from Monday's nominations for the 92nd Academy Awards.

A record 62 women, representing nearly a third of nominees, were nominated for Academy Awards this year, but none for best director.

Scarlett Johansson is nominated in two acting categories, for best actress in "Marriage Story" and best supporting actress in "Jojo Rabbit." This is the 12th time an actor has pulled off the feat. Cate Blanchett did it in 2008 for "Elizabeth: The Golden Age," and "I'm Not There," Jamie Foxx did it in 2005 for "Ray" and "Collateral," and in 1994 there were two actresses nominated in two categories: Holly Hunter for "The Piano" and "The Firm," and Emma Thompson for "The Remains of the Day" and "In the Name of the Father." No one has ever won two acting awards in the same year.
