"U.S. sues Texas after Gov. Greg Abbott declines to remove floating border barrier" was first published by The Texas Tribune, a nonprofit, nonpartisan media organization that informs Texans - and engages with them - about public policy, politics, government and statewide issues.

The U.S. Justice Department announced Monday it is suing Texas and Gov. Greg Abbott after the state declined to remove the floating barrier deployed earlier this month on the Rio Grande near Eagle Pass.

The lawsuit, filed in an Austin federal court, alleges the barrier was installed without necessary authorization from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"Because Texas installed the Floating Barrier without seeking the Corps' authorization, the Corps and other relevant federal agencies were deprived of

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

TEACHING YOUR CHILDREN INTEGRITY

Integrity means to be of sound moral character. It means to do the right thing whether anyone is looking or not. In other words, it means being incorruptible. It also means our word is our bond. We are committed to our promise, even if something better does come along. When we demonstrate integrity, we have reached a high level of maturity.

A high level of integrity means that we fulfill our obligations to the best of our ability as and when promised. This is what we want to teach our children. We want them to know and to take seriously their promises.

"Integrity is doing the right thing, even when no is watching." one Oftentimes we talk about this idea of integrity without grasping what it truly means. But integrity is not a single action. It is a mindset that needs to developed. Integrity is born in the mind and heart of a person. It comes from who you really are as a man or woman, boy or girl, and what you really believe about right and

wrong, good and evil. And integrity is exhibited not in just one act of goodness, but in your whole character.

Those of us who are responsible for raising children are responsible for instilling within our children the importance of integrity, and the only way we can do this is to be peo-

ple of integrity ourselves. When you speak to your children, they need to be able to trust that you will be true to your word. So if you want to raise a child who values integrity, you must demonstrate that integrity is important to you. How does do that? one

Remember: what is important to you is what becomes important to your child. You cannot teach integrity if you have none.

Among other things, you can teach integrity by doing the following:

> 1 Drive the speed limit.

> 2 Never ask your children to lie for you.

> 3 Apologize when you wrong your children.

4 When you send your child into a store with more money than he/she needs to buy a particular item, when the child comes out. see if he/she offers the change.

5 Deal with the child accordingly. 6 Never tolerate even the smallest lie.

PAUL'S EPISTLE TO THE GALATIANS

ABSOLUTE SPIRITUAL FREEDOM IN CHRIST

GALATIANS 5:1-26 (PART 2 OF 3)



In verse 9, the prevalence of the damnable false teaching of the Judaizers is expressed in the proverbial statement "A little leaven leaveneth the whole lump" (I Cor. 5:6; Matt. 16:6). Like leaven in bread, the false teaching of the Judaizers would spread and contaminate the whole church if measures were not taken to eliminate it.

In verses 10-12, for all the dangers presented by the legalism being taught in Galatia, Paul was confident that the Galatians' faith was genuine and that they ultimately would agree with his teaching and not be carried away in error. He was also confident that the one who was teaching the error, whoever he was, would

"bear his judgment." The judgment mentioned in verse 10 is "Divine judgment".

In verse 11, there was an allegation made against Paul stating that he had preached the necessity of circumcision but was now preaching a different message. Paul pointed out that if he had taught that the rite was necessary for salvation, he would not have experienced such a persecution from the Jews. The gospel of grace he preached, however, was centered in the cross – the crucifixion – of Jesus as the payment for sin. This teaching was offensive to the Jews, who promoted works such as circumcision as the means of acceptance by God.

In verse 12, Paul was so adamant about the gospel of grace that he could tolerate nothing that would compromise it. He then wished that those who put such confidence in an act of the flesh would mutilate themselves as their pagan neighbors did in their twisted attempts to please God.

II. Remaining Steadfast in the Proper Use of Liberty - Galatians 5:13-15

In verse 13, it is imperative that believers remain grounded in their freedom in Christ, but that freedom is not a license to indulge any and all fleshly desires. The freedom Christ give is freedom from sin and its power and consequences, as well as, freedom from enslavement to a religious

system that can offer no hope of victory over sin. Properly understood, liberty in Christ cannot promote sin. Instead, it should lead to loving service to others. Obedience to the biblical injunction to love one's neighbor as oneself (Lev. 19:18) sums up the whole law. In fact, it fulfills or completes the law (v. 14). Love is the expression of faith.

In verse 15, it was assumed that there was strife within the Galatian churches; and if so, the Galatians needed to be reminded to love one another rather than to consume one another.

III. Remaining Steadfast in Christian Liberty by Walking by the Holy Spirit

– Galatians 5:16-26 The real key to averting the kind of conflict Paul discussed in verse 15 is applying our faith by walking or living in the Spirit. As children of God indwelt by the Spirit, we must submit to His power and control, trusting Him to give us victory over temptation and to bring us into conformity with God's

will. When we walk in the Spirit, we will not fulfill the "lust of the flesh" (v. 16). We will not give in to ungodly and selfish desires.

Verse 17 explains that there is a continuing internal conflict between the indwelling Spirit and the flesh. The flesh is the old disposition (tendency or inclination) to sin that continues even in those who have been born again. In essence, genuine freedom in Christ does not mean freedom to live apart from all restraint. True freedom comes from willingly submitting to the control of the Holy Spirit.

Paul has already discussed that Christ has freed us from the bondage of the law (Gal. 3:25; 5:1) and given us the Holy Spirit to lead us and empower us to please God. Thus, as Christians, we are characterized as those who are "lead of the Spirit" and so are "not under the law" (v. 18). We are free in Christ to live in the realm of the Spirit!

Florida Board of Education **Approves Anti-Black** History Curriculum

One of the most controversial rules drawing significant pushback is the alteration of the standards of instruction for African American history.



Florida's Board of Education voted to approve several new rules this week, including teaching that African Americans benefited from their enslavement.

The new curriculum has sparked outrage and accusations of racism, setting up a new school year unlike any other because of these changes and other laws passed by state lawmakers and signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis.

One of the most controversial rules drawing significant pushback is the alteration of the standards of instruction for African American history.

Critics argue that the new standards attempt to rewrite Black history in a deeply concerning manner.

Democratic state lawmakers made their objections known at the board's meeting on July 19, expressing particular concern over one instructional change

implying enslaved individuals benefited from their enslavement.

"Any kind of standards that indicate that slavery benefited Black people is such an insult," said State Rep. Rita Harris.

Added Rep. Anna Eskamani, "The notion that enslaved people benefited from being enslaved is inaccurate and a scary standard for us to establish in our education system."

The new rule faced additional opposition from a coalition of Black leaders and community groups, who wrote a letter to the school board asserting that the standards intentionally omitted or distorted crucial historical facts about the Black experience.

Despite the widespread criticism, the board plans to implement the new rule on African American history instruction, along with several others, in classrooms

across the state during the upcoming school year.

The move adds to the state's ongoing debate over African American history in education, further exacerbated by the education department's rejection of a preliminary pilot version of an Advanced Placement African American Studies course for high school students, citing an alleged lack of educational value.

Under the new standards imposed by the board and DeSantis, teachers will instruct middle school students about how enslaved people developed skills they could use to benefit themselves.

The curriculum omits the brutal horrors of slavery, the inhumane treatment of African Americans, including the rape and torture of enslaved people, selling and separating families, and

The Coyotes swiftly terminated Galchenyuk's contract, citing a material breach of terms.

"We are aware of the incident involving Alex Galchenyuk and strongly condemn this type of behavior," the Coyotes said in a statement.

"Once the club was made aware of the allegations, we immediately began the process of terminating his standard player's contract through the proper channels in conjunction with the National Hockey League."

Officers arrested Galchenyuk, who faces charges of private property hit-and-run, disorderly conduct, failure to obey, resisting arrest, and threatening or intimidating.

This incident comes as Black players and fans.

the NHL is already grappling with diversifying its player base and fan demographic.

Recent surveys indicate that only 10 percent of Black Americans consider themselves avid fans of the NHL.

The league predominantly consists of white players, with 97 percent being Caucasians.

The remaining 3 percent represent players from various backgrounds, including 34 active Black players.

Throughout its 102-year history, the NHL has only had one Black head coach among its 377 coaches.

The NHL's ongoing efforts to foster inclusivity and diversity have been hindered by incidents like this, reinforcing the perception that the league may not be welcoming or supportive of

DALLAS — On July 27, 2023, North Texas VA Health Care System, in cooperation with Veterans Benefit Administration, will host a Summer VetFest to inform Veterans, their families, and survivors about the PACT Act and encourage them to apply for the health care and benefits they have earned. The event will be a casual summer gathering featuring Veterans, their families, Veteran advocates, and the VA health care

and benefits professionals who serve them.

More than 480 North Texas Veterans have signed up to sit with a VBA representative to apply for PACT Act-related benefits (or submit an intent to file), enroll in VA health care, get screened for toxic exposures, and more. This event is a part of a nationwide VA campaign in July, when VA will host more than 50 Summer VetFest events across all 50 states, DC, and Puerto Rico.

Veterans will have a 'one-stop-shop' to apply for benefits, enroll in VA health

care services, learn about VA health care services like, Battle Field Acupuncture, Healthy Teaching Kitchen, andmore.

Thus far, 312,000 Texas Veterans have applied for PACT Act-related benefits and since the PACT Act was signed into law on August 10, 2022. VA encourages all eligible Veterans and survivors to file a claim — or submit their intent to file a claim for PACT Act-related benefits now. Most Veterans who do so by August 9 will have their benefits, if granted, backdated to Aug. 10, 2022, the day that President Biden signed the bill into law.

the opportunity to evaluate risks the barrier poses to public safety and the environment, mitigate those risks as necessary through the permitting process, and otherwise evaluate whether the project is in the public interest," the lawsuit says.

The lawsuit also alleges that the floating barrier obstructs navigation on the river and demands that the state remove the barrier.

Last week, the Justice Department sent a letter threatening legal action against the state if it did not respond with a commitment to remove the barrier by 1 p.m. Central time on Monday. Abbott responded with a letter to President Joe Biden on Monday morning committing to keep the barrier in place.

Abbott defended his decision to do so as the "commander-in-chief of our State's militia" and

blamed the Biden administration's immigration policy for the conditions at the border.

"It has been under your watch that migrants have suffered an unprecedented crisis of inhumanity," Abbott said in the letter to Biden. "If you truly care about human life, you must begin enforcing federal immigration laws."

Abbott's office didn't immediately respond to an email from The Texas Tribune seeking comment.

The controversial barrier, accompanied by rows of razor wire, was deployed by the state earlier this month as part of Operation Lone Star, an aggressive state border security initiative launched in March 2021, shortly after Biden took office. Under the operation, Abbott has sent hundreds of Texas Department of Public Safety troopers and the Texas National Guard to the border and has paid to bus

thousands of migrants from Texas to Democrat-run cities around the U.S.

The Justice Department lawsuit was preceded by a diplomatic complaint about the barrier from the Mexican government and a lawsuit filed by an Eagle Pass kayaking business.

It also comes nearly a week after the Houston Chronicle reported a series of allegations from a state trooper who complained to a superior in an email that a DPS official in Eagle Pass ordered troopers to push migrants — including small children and mothers with nursing babies — back into the Rio Grande. DPS says it is investigating these claims.

tragically murdered in Money, Mississippi, on August 28, 1955, after being accused by a white woman of whistling at her.

His brutal killing became a catalyst for the Civil Rights movement when his mother, Mamie Till, chose to hold an open-casket funeral, and a photograph of her son's disfigured body was published in Black media, bringing national attention to the horrors of racism and sparking outrage across the nation.

The Roberts Temple Church of God in Christ in Chicago, where Till's funeral took place, Graball Landing in Mississippi, thought to be the site of his body's discovery, and the Tallahatchie County Second District Courthouse, where an all-white jury found the white men responsible for his murder not guilty, make up the 5.7 acres of the newly designated national monument.

During the ceremony, Biden acknowledged the significant role played by the Black Press in shedding light on Till's tragic story and the broader struggle for civil rights.

He applauded the bravery and unwavering dedication of publications like JET Magazine, the Chicago Defender, and other newspapers and radio announcers who fearlessly reported on the events surrounding Till's

murder, ensuring that the truth reached the American people.

"The reason the world saw what Mrs. Till-Mobley saw was because of another hero in this story: the Black Press," Biden remarked, receiving applause from the audience.

He emphasized the importance of shining a light of truth on the painful aspects of the nation's past, acknowledging that darkness and denialism cannot erase history.

Vice President Kamala Harris, also present at the event, echoed Biden's sentiments and emphasized the critical role that the story of Till and the courage of Mamie Till played in fueling the civil rights movement.

She emphasized her connection to the cause because, while serving in the United States Senate, she sponsored the Emmett Till Antilynching Act, which President Biden later signed into law and made lynching a federal crime.

Harris emphasized that embracing the complete history of the United States, even its painful chapters, is essential to pursuing justice and equality.

She thanked the many leaders at the ceremony, acknowledging their contributions to progress in the civil rights fight.

"Our history as a nation is born of tragedy and triumph, of struggle and success. That is who we are,"

Harris asserted.

"And as people who love our country, as patriots, we know that we must remember and teach our full history, even when it is painful - especially when it is painful.

"Today, there are those in our nation who would prefer to erase or even rewrite the ugly parts of our past; those who attempt to teach that enslaved people benefitted from slavery; those who insult us in an attempt to gaslight us, who try to divide our nation with unnecessary debates." She concluded:

"Let us not be seduced into believing that somehow, we will be better if we forget. We will be better if we remember. We will be stronger if we remember."

The Biden administration has taken strong action by designating the site as a national monument to ensure that future generations will remember and preserve the history of racial injustice.

The move comes at a time when some states are facing debates over how to teach their historical past in public schools, with Biden and Harris advocating for an inclusive and accurate education that confronts the darker chapters of American history.

The ceremony took place on what would have been Emmett Till's 82nd birthday, emphasizing the occasion's significance.

Malcolm's daughters had formally requested authorities reopen the murder investigation based on new evidence.

a deathbed letter of confession from a former police officer, Raymond Wood, who allegedly claimed that the New York police and the FBI conspired in Malcolm's murder.

Wood asserted that his job was to ensure the arrest of Malcolm's security team days before the fatal shooting in Manhattan.

Malcolm had distanced himself from the Nation of Islam at the time of his death, which some speculated added complexity to the motives behind the assassination.

"Any evidence that provides greater insight into the truth behind that terrible tragedy should be thoroughly investigated," Shabazz said in 2021.

The Home Depot Foundation, a nonprofit organization affiliated with Home Depot, had entered into a contract in October 2017 to perform construction improvements on the Boggs' home, ensuring ADA compliance and meeting Denise's needs. However, the Boggs allege that Home Depot and its affiliates breached the contract and discriminated against them based on their race and disabilities.

Home Depot, which operates over 2,200 stores across the United States, including numerous locations in New York State, has yet to issue a public statement regarding the lawsuit.

Earlier this year, U.S. District Judge Philip M. Halpern rejected Home Depot's motion to dismiss the race and disability discrimination suit filed by the Boggs.

Judge Halpern ruled that the couple sufficiently proved that Home Depot employees had prioritized work for white, Hasidic Jewish residents, causing the abandonment of the Boggs' home renovation. Halpern dismissed Home Depot's argument that the Boggs' did not have the right to enforce the renovation grant provided by the nonprofit Towards Action Independence Inc.

home and that Home Depot's alleged racial discrimination impacted their ability to utilize their property.

Halpern further ruled that Home Depot must face the couple's breach of contract claim due to the terms of the grant contract and the Boggs being third-party beneficiaries.

Additionally, Halpern rejected Home Depot's argument that the disability discrimination claim under the New York Human Rights Law should be dismissed, stating that the law applies when a place of public accommodation discriminates at a private residence. "This is an elderly Black family in a predominately white and Hasidic Jewish neighborhood," said the couple's attorney, Onyuwoma W. Igbokwe. "They obviously didn't have the financial capability to take care of their home. Home Depot was supposed to step in there and help them out."
