

# DALLAS ISD SUPERINTENDENT MIKE MILES ANNOUNCES NEXT BIG STEPS FOR DESTINATION 2020



The next phase of Dallas ISD's transformative Destination 2020 effort will include the launch of personalized learning, a focus on social-emotional learning, expanded pre-K opportunities and a goal to open as many as 35 additional schools of choice by 2020.

Superintendent Mike Miles rolled out the ambitious blueprint during a community-wide gathering of more than 400 people on June 17 at W.H. Adamson High School. Set to core beliefs of academic achievement, high expectations and excellence, Miles' presentation served as a challenge to create positive change for the district's nearly 160,000 students. "We can't just take the same things and do them better. We have to think differently," Miles said in his presentation. "...We have to do different things well."

Among those different actions is a goal of opening an additional 35 schools of choice by 2020. Miles said the success of students currently enrolled in the schools of the Yvonne A. Ewell Townview Center as well as Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts are clear evidence that Dallas ISD must provide similar opportunities to other children. "We have other kids who need more choices," he said.

Miles also addressed Personalized Learning, a new initiative to provide individual students an education that fits their needs and abilities. By 2020, he said, Personalized Learning will be the primary mode of instruction in at least 15 schools. "Let's make sure our kids get what they need, when they need it while maintaining high standards," Miles told the crowd.

A third pillar of Miles' presentation was social-emotional learning, a style of education that helps students understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals establish positive relationships and make responsible decisions. Dallas ISD plans to increase its offerings in that realm to help middle school and high school students develop the mindset needed to maximize their success. "We have to teach students how to persevere, how to be their best," Miles said. "We're not trying to replace other organizations (and role models), but we have to do our part."

The initial moments of Miles' presentation focused on the success of the "heavy lifts," or major efforts achieved since the launch of Destination 2020. Notable steps include the development of a new evaluation system for principals, the approval of the Teacher Excellence Initiative evaluation and compensation effort, and expanded pre-kindergarten.

In the end, Miles said the transformative mindset growing in Dallas ISD has already paid dividends. He pointed to the improvement of the district's Human Capital Management department in filling teacher vacancies as of June 15 in the last three years as proof that change is taking place.

The district has improved from hiring 265 teachers by that date in 2012 to 664 teachers in 2013. By 2014, the district had filled 1,971 teacher vacancies filled by June 15.

They thought differently and tried a host of strategies that had not been tried before, Miles said. "They turned that paradigm on its head."

## President Obama Promotes Peace Opposes those who want War

(AP) - Less than three years after pulling American forces out of Iraq, President Barack Obama is weighing a range of short-term military options, including airstrikes, to quell an al-Qaida inspired insurgency that has captured two Iraqi cities and threatened to press toward Baghdad. "We do have a stake in making sure that these jihadists are not getting a permanent foothold," Obama said Thursday in the Oval Office.

However, officials firmly ruled out putting American troops back on the ground in Iraq, which has faced resurgent violence since the U.S. military withdrew in late 2011. A sharp burst of violence this week led to the evacuation Thursday of Americans from a major air base in northern Iraq where the U.S. had been training security forces.

Obama, in his first comments on the deteriorating situation, said it was clear Iraq needed additional assistance from the U.S. and international community given the lightning gains by the militant group Islamic State of Iraq and Levant. Republican lawmakers pinned some of the blame for the escalating violence on Obama's reluctance to re-engage in a conflict he long opposed.

For more than a year, the Iraqi government has been pleading with the U.S. for additional help to combat the insurgency, which has been fueled by the civil war in neighboring Syria. Northern Iraq has become a way station for insurgents who routinely travel between the two countries and are spreading the Syrian war's violence.

The United States Conference of Mayors (USCM) is the official non-partisan organization of cities with populations of 30,000 or larger which includes nearly 1,400 total members. Mayors, their families, support staff, and corporate sponsors will attend the annual conference.

Under the leadership of U.S. Conference of Mayors (USCM) President Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson and host Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings, more than 200 of the nation's mayors from cities large and small will convene in Dallas at the OMNI Hotel to discuss the economic health of the nation's cities, transportation, education, housing, help for returning Veterans and the minimum wage. Mayors will release new economic data showing economic output and jobs numbers for each of the nation's 363 metropolitan areas on Friday morning at the OMNI during an Opening Press Conference with USCM Leadership.

Mayors will also hear from several guest speakers including Maria Shriver who will discuss The Shriver Report and what mayors can do to address the 1 in 3 American women living on the brink of poverty. In addition, there will be two Special Sessions: One on Sunday re Climate Protection with EPA Administrator McCarthy and Energy Secretary Moniz and the other on Monday re Sports, Race and Politics in America featuring NBA All-Time Leading Scorer and NY Times Best-Selling Author Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Sacramento Kings Principal Owner Vivek Ranadive, Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter, Indianapolis Mayor Greg Ballard, Journalist, TV Host and Author Roland Martin, a current NBA Player/Coach TBA and USCM President Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson. USCM is also pleased that New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio will address the general body, Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti will participate in a discussion on transportation, Seattle Mayor Ed Murray will participate in a discussion on education/early learning and the minimum wage and Boston Mayor Martin Walsh will bring greetings.

Dear Editor,

Warmer temperatures are a welcome change after a long, cold winter—but as the mercury rises, it's crucial to protect our animal companions by never leaving them in parked vehi-

cles. Every year, PETA receives dozens of reports of animals suffering and dying in hot, parked cars. Cruelty-to-animals charges are routinely filed in such cases.

It only takes minutes for a parked car to cook an animal alive: On a warm

day, even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a parked car can reach more than 160 degrees. Parking in the shade and/or leaving water in the vehicle won't help. Symptoms of heatstroke include restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, lack of appetite and coordination, dark tongue, and vomiting. Dogs can succumb to heatstroke in just 15 minutes, resulting in brain damage or death.

Please, when it's even a little warm

outside, never leave any living being in a parked car, even for "just a minute." If you see a dog left in a car, have the owner paged or call 911 immediately—the dog's life depends on it. Visit [www.PETA.org](http://www.PETA.org) to learn more.

decreasing student debt.

The President's "Pay as you Earn" initiative will cap federal student loan payments to ten-percent of their monthly income. Students with private loans can refinance their loans at today's lower interest rates. This action will allow graduates the financial breathing room to start investing in their futures, without the disproportionate burden of student loan repayments hanging over their heads.

Each year, 20 million young Americans enroll in college. Of that number, 12 million borrow to meet the obligations of their educational expenses. Given the nation's slow economic growth, many of these graduates are (and will be) unable to secure employment within the six-month grace period. In 2013, the unemployment rate for college graduates between the ages of 22

and 27 was 5.6 percent according to Bloomberg.

More concerning is the fact that many of our nation's youth are denied access to higher education. According to studies by the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center, college enrollment in America has declined by 12.8%, partially due to rising college costs. They simply cannot afford it and are frightened by the massive amounts of debt that they will have to assume.

Under the executive order, student borrowers that make regular loan repayments may have their remaining balances forgiven after 20 years of regular payments. Teachers, nurses, military personnel and other public servants will be eligible to have their remaining debt forgiven after only ten years of regular loan repayments.

As a society, we must invest in our students and in their ability to pursue higher education. The global ranking of American students, particularly in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math is on a steady decline. We can regain the position of prominence we once enjoyed, and that our nation desperately needs, if we invest in our students. Burdening them with massive debt is a tremendous disservice to them and to our country.

Higher education has always been viewed as society's great equalizer. The president's most recent executive order and the progressive measure before Congress will ensure that our colleges and universities will continue to be the bastions of equality that the founders of this great nation intended them to be.

The first detailed study of the relationship between diversity and the bottom line in the Hollywood entertainment industry has found that although diversity pays - literally - people of color and women are still woefully underrepresented throughout film and television.

The study titled, "2014 Hollywood Diversity Report: Making Sense of the Disconnect," was conducted by the Ralph J. Bunch Center for African-American Studies at UCLA. It looked at 172 theatrical films released in 2011 and 1,061 television shows that aired during the 2011-12 season. It looked at race and gender and key production roles, including cast diversity, the show's creator, the writer, the director, awards and domestic and international box office.

Frequent moviegoers represent just 10 percent of the population, but purchase half of all movie tickets, the report stated.

"It is important to note here that minorities are overrepresented among the ranks of frequent

moviegoers, those who contribute most to overall box office," it said. "In 2011, minorities accounted for 44.1 percent of frequent moviegoers, a figure that exceeded their 36.3 percent share of the overall U.S. population."

But you wouldn't know it by the roles people of color play in the industry.

"Historically, there has been a death of gender, racial, and ethnic diversity in film and television - both in front of and behind the camera," the report stated. "This reality has meant limited access to employment for women and minorities and to a truncating of the domain of media images available for circulation in contemporary society...Media images contribute greatly to how we think about ourselves in relation to others."

"When marginalized groups in society are absent from stories a nation tells about itself, or when media images are rooted primarily in stereotype, inequity is normalized and is more likely to be reinforced over time through our prejudices and practices."

The report found that although people of color represent 36.3 percent of the population, in film:

Of the 172 films examined for 2011, only 10.5 percent of the lead roles were played by people of color and most of them were in such Black-targeted movies as "Jumping the Broom" and Tyler Perry's "Madea's Big Happy Family." Women, who make up 51.2 percent of the population,

were cast as leads in only 25.6 percent of the movies.

Over half of the films (51.2 percent) featured casts in which minorities were 10 percent or less.

People of color directed 12.2 percent of the films studied, most directed at a targeted audience. Women directed 4.1 percent of the films.

Minorities wrote 7.6 percent of the films, mostly ethnic-niche films; women wrote 14.1 percent.

In television:

People of color were in only 5.1 percent of the lead roles.

Women accounted for 51.5 percent of the lead roles in comedies and dramas, matching their share of the population.

People of color accounted for 15.4 percent of the broadcast reality shows.

Of show creators, only one was a person of color - who created "Grey's Anatomy," "Private Practice" and "Scandal," all on ABC.

The report proves that diversity pays.

"The 25 films that were from 21 percent to 30 percent minority posted a median global box office of \$160.1 million - a figure considerably higher than the medians for all other diversity levels," the report found. "By contrast, the 88 films that fell into the 10 percent minority or less interval did not fare as well in terms of global box office, posting a median figure of \$68.5 million."

The report added, "If we consider return on investment, which factors a film's budget into the analy-

sis, we see a similar pattern." In fact, the return on more diverse films was "significantly greater," the report found.

Yet, Hollywood continues to travel down the same old tired road.

"The 2014 Hollywood Diversity Report has documented an apparent disconnect between the industry's professed focus on the bottom line and actual staffing practices in film, broadcast television, and cable," the report stated. "That is, while films and television shows with casts that reflect the nation's racial and ethnic diversity were more likely to post high box office figures or ratings during the study period, minorities and women were nonetheless woefully underrepresented among the corps of directors, show creators, writers, and lead actors that animates industry productions."

The report concluded, "This disconnect does not bode well for the future of the Hollywood industry. Women already constitute slightly more than half of the U.S. population, and more than a third of the population is currently minority and the population continues to diversify at a dizzying rate."

## New York City: A Big Opportunity to Fix a Big Problem

Most discussions of economic inequality focus on the need for more equity in employment and income. There is no doubt that expanding job opportunities and providing living wages for workers in communities of color are essential to closing the great divide between the vastly affluent and the rest of us. But even more troubling is the huge wealth gap, invariably linked to glaring disparities in homeownership and entrepreneurship that continue to break down along color and gender lines.

The National Urban League's

2014 State of Black America Equality Index™ found that Black households have just \$6 in wealth for every \$100 in wealth of White households - or a median wealth of \$6,314 vs. \$110,500. The Obama administration, leaders across the nation and globe and a number of progressive mayors across the country - including New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio - have identified the need to close that gap. A key part of the solution is increasing the number and worth of government contracts available to minority and women-owned business enterprises (M/WBE). As Mayor de Blasio is learning, while not an easy task, he has a substantial opportunity to fix a big problem and put forth a scalable model for how New York City can and should engage with M/WBE.

Mayor de Blasio took office in January determined to "leave no New Yorker behind." But a recent article by freelance journalist John Surico concludes that "the contracts between the city's bureaucracy and its businesses do not reflect a commitment to diversity." Surico adds, "For thousands of companies in New York City, obtaining a city contract is one of the most important financial benefits of civil government. Last year alone, roughly 40,500 transactions between the public and private sectors translated

into this \$16.5 billion in revenue for vendors." While M/WBE firms comprised 7 percent of New York City's vendors and were awarded 23 percent of the city's sub-and-prime contracts in 2013, they only received \$439 million, or 2.7 percent, of total contract dollars.

Despite the existence of the federal Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA) and dedicated minority business development offices in New York and most major cities, this disparity is echoed throughout the country. Reasons for this include cumbersome and complicated contracting rules and the often prohibitively high cost of navigating the procurement process. Unfortunately, too many minority and women-owned businesses also still find it difficult to secure critical bank loans. Everyone agrees that small and minority-owned businesses are essential to America's economic recovery, but not everyone has stepped up to give them the support they need to succeed.

That is why the National Urban League has made entrepreneurship support, tax credits and small business financing a key part of "Jobs Rebuild America," our \$100 million partnership across the public, private and nonprofit sectors to improve outcomes for job seekers,

vulnerable youth and entrepreneurs in hard-pressed urban communities. We were also pleased that last year, the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation invested \$5 million in five Black-owned banks across the country both to support the dwindling number of Black banks and to strengthen the ability of these financial institutions to make loans to neighborhood businesses. We also applaud measures taken by the Obama administration, including the current effort by the MBDA to bring more minority businesses into high growth industries such as green technology and clean energy.

Mayor de Blasio has pledged to increase New York City's usage of minority businesses from 3 percent to 10 percent. He shares our understanding of the importance of minority and women-owned businesses to revitalizing struggling urban communities, closing the wealth gap and improving the American economy. But none of us can do this alone and good intentions are not enough. Washington, local governments, big banks and major corporations across cities and the nation must do more to remove barriers and erect stronger incentives to unleash the entrepreneurial potential of minority and women-owned businesses.

## "A PSALM OF ANTICIPATION OF GOD'S KINGDOM" PSALM 72:1-20

The Messianic reign of Christ will be characterized by harmony among the animals (Isaiah 11:6-7) and even in creation (Romans 8:18-22). The Millennium kingdom will usher in a time of peace and justice because Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, will reign. In verses 1-4, the psalmist

begins this psalm with a prayer, asking that God would grant a king who would judge righteously; and in judging righteously, peace would prevail. The king's reign will be characterized as follows: "He shall judge the poor of the people, he shall save the children of the needy, and shall break in pieces the oppressor" (v. 4).

As the king reigns in righteousness, his rule will cause the righteous to prosper (vv. 5-7). Verse 7 states, "In his days shall the righteous flourish; and abundance of peace so long as the moon endureth." The psalmist declared that the dominion of his kingdom will be extensive and recognized by all kings (vv. 8-11). Verse 8 begins with his dominion being from "sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth," and verse 11 acknowledges that "Yea, all

kings shall fall down before him: all nations shall serve him."

His dominion would be recognized because He is a defender of the poor and needy (vv. 12-14). Consolation is found as "He shall spare the poor and needy, and shall save the souls of the needy" (v. 13). In recognition of his righteous reign, gifts will be given to him (vv. 15-17) even the gold of Sheba shall be given to him and prayer shall be made continually. Ultimately, God's name will be extolled (vv. 18-20). As the final verses state, "Blessed be the LORD God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things. And blessed be his glorious name for ever: and let the whole earth be filled with His glory; Amen, and Amen" (vv. 19-20).

### Young Tennis Star on the Rise

Taylor Townsend Plays Wimbledon

Unless something happens to get in the way of Taylor Townsend, 19, originally from Chicago, IL, a third rounder in her first Grand Slam, the French Open, and a most recent recipient of a Wild Card in Wimbledon, she'll reach the top ten in women's tennis real soon. Taylor was an outstanding player as a junior with wins in most of the major events for junior players around the world. "Ahhhhh! I just got the best news of my life!!! Thank you Wimbledon and The All England Club," was Taylor's response when she received the news. Wimbledon is the tournament to shine, an event that places tennis playing professionals on their highest level of achievement.


