DALLAS CITY MANAGER A.C. GONZALEZ ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT



Dallas City Manager A.C. Gonzalez

Dallas City Manager A.C. Gonzalez has informed Mayor Mike Rawlings and the City Council that he will retire in January 2017. Gonzalez became City Manager in July 2013, when he was appointed interim City Manager. He was hired permanently in January 2014 by a unanimous vote of the City Council.

During his two-decade tenure with the City of Dallas, Gonzalez has garnered a number of achievements, spearheading projects that have changed the face of Dallas. These include development of the Omni Dallas Convention Center Hotel, the Love Field Modernization Program and the Dallas Stars Reunion Arena lease negotiations, which brought the professional sports franchise to Dallas.

Prior to being appointed City Manager, Gonzalez served as First Assistant City Manager, overseeing Aviation, Dallas Fire-Rescue, Municipal Courts, Office of Emergency Management and the Dallas Police Department. Over the years, he has also managed Convention and Event Services, Housing/Community Services, Economic Development and Planning and Development Services.

In those roles, Gonzalez led the effort to build the Omni and organized street car advocates to implement the first modern street car system in Dallas. He was responsible for several Tax Increment Finance zones and negotiated numerous development projects that have grown the city's tax base.

As City Manager, Gonzalez also expressed a desire to address the culture, systems and people within the organization and to provide the community with unprecedented access to their local government. As a result of his efforts, the City now has its highest Transparency Report Card rating, a new and improved website, increased public access to council, board and commission meetings and development of a new open records platform.

Other achievements include improved customer service, more emphasis on teamwork and collaboration within departments, urban design and strengthening neighborhoods through a new program called Neighborhood Plus. Strides were made in Building Inspections and in creation of the Center for Performance Excellence to manage productivity training citywide.

Dallas ISD Graduating Senior Class Receives More Than \$104 Million In Scholarships

Dallas ISD's graduating class has reported receiving more than \$104 million in college scholarships.

Nearly 3,000 college scholarships have been awarded to 1,066 seniors. More than 7,500 seniors are expected to graduate this year.

Superintendent Michael Hinojosa said the scholarship dollars represent dividends from a worthwhile investment.

"These scholarships are just the first dividends from the countless hours invested in pursuit of academic excellence, an investment that will continue to pay off far into the future," Hinojosa said. "The total reflects the quality of our graduates and the strong support they have received from teachers, counselors and parents. Both our staff and students deserve congratulations for this impressive accomplishment."

The scholarship data is self-reported by seniors to their



high school counselor or college access advisor. As a result, it's likely that the amount of

offered scholarships exceeds the \$104.1 million that has been reported so far.

GAO REPORT: SEGREGATION INCREASING AT SOME U.S. SCHOOLS

A recent report by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) found that the segregation of African American and Hispanic students nationwide is getting worse. In particular, a notable increase in segregation among K-12 public schools was pointed out in the study. The study also found that charter schools may often take students from public schools and enroll them into less diverse schools. The study also found that Hispanic students were "triple segregated" by economics, race and language

Barriers. The report was released on the 62nd anniversary of the landmark decision in the 1954 U.S. Supreme Court case *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka*, which declared that segregated schools were unconstitutional. On May 16, a judge in Cleveland, Miss., found that schools in the town were just as segregated as they were a half-century ago. "The delay in desegregation has deprived generations of students of the constitutionally guaranteed right of an integrated education," U.S. District Judge Debra Brown wrote. At a press conference on Capitol Hill, Congressional Black Caucus Chairman G.K.

Butterfield (D-N.C.), House Education and Workforce ranking Democrat Rep. Bobby Scott (D-Va.), and House Judiciary ranking member Rep. John Conyers (D-Mich.) along with Reps. Xavier Becerra (D-Calif.), Sheila Jackson Lee (D-Texas) spoke on the issue. Reps. Conyers, Butterfield and Scott will author a bill that would require schools to "designate at least one employee" to work on complying with diversity requirements. "The percentage of schools where 75 percent of students are both low-income and Hispanic or African-American has increased from 9 percent in 2001 to 16 percent in 2014," Rep. Conyers said. The report also found that schools that were segregated offered fewer courses in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) related fields and college preparatory classes. "Segregation in public K-12 schools isn't getting better. It's getting worse, and getting worse quickly," Rep. Bobby Scott of Virginia said. Senator Bernie Sanders tweeted that, "There are 6,727 highly-segregated schools in our nation, where one percent or less of the school population is white. #BrownVBoard." In a statement about the report, National Urban League President Marc Morial said that the findings in GAO report confirm "that the promise of Brown remains a promise that has gone largely unfulfilled." Morial continued: "In too many communities, students of color are now more segregated with less access to equitable educational opportunities than in decades prior." NAACP Legal Defense Fund Director Sherrilyn Ifill said that the report shines a light on worsening education inequities that that cannot be divorced from our nation's legacy of racial discrimination that has perpetuated racial and socioeconomic isolation. Ifill said: "It is our imperative on the 62nd anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in *Brown v. Board of Education* to ask, 'How will we act to address current disparities like resource inequities and discriminatory discipline practices?'" THE ESSENCE OF THE NEW BLACK HISTORY MUSEUM IS THE TRUE AMERICAN STORY

When the National Museum of African American History and Culture opens in September, Lonnie Bunch, the museum's founding director said that it will not only tell us a great deal of information about Black folks, but "it will tell us even more about what America is and what it can become."

Bunch, who previously served as the associate director for curatorial affairs at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C. and as a curator of history for the California African American Museum in Los Angeles, Calif., said that, in some ways, the African American community has led the charge in forcing America to be America and broadening discussions around freedom and citizenship.

"When you look at any president, from George Washington on the number one issue they had to deal with at some point was African Americans," said Bunch. "I really wanted people to recognize that this is all of our stories not just one community's story."

The decade-long search for artifacts that will live in the museum has been arduous, joyfully surprising and completely necessary for Bunch and his team of curators.

"Even if we took everything from the Smithsonian, it would only give us 20 percent of what we needed anyway," said Bunch. "The Smithsonian is a place where so much of your credibility is based on the material that you have."

Although Bunch and his team were dedicated to the search, he confessed that he wasn't sure what he'd find.

"I was always struck by my own work early in my career and how I would go into a home and I would talk to an

elderly woman or a young man and they would open a door and suddenly there would be wonders in front of me," said Bunch. "So, I had to believe that there were wonders out there that I couldn't even imagine that were sitting in people's homes."

Still, Bunch was doubtful when Charles Blockson, a famous collector and African American historian, reached out to him concerning personal items that had once belonged to Harriet Tubman. "I just knew that he didn't have anything," said Bunch. Still curious, he travelled to Philadelphia, Pa., to meet with Blockson.

When he got there, Bunch said that Blockson opened a box and pulled out rare photographs from Harriet Tubman's funeral, her personal hymnal and an amazing shawl that the civil rights heroine had worn before she died.

"While I was blown away by seeing this Harriet Tubman material, I was more humbled by the fact that he said, 'and this needs to come to the Smithsonian for free,'" said Bunch. "He said, 'I don't want to sell it. I want people to engage with this material.' And that kind of generosity makes all of this worthwhile. The realization that even if people don't know it, they've been waiting for this moment, to be able to share that story."

Bunch realized that every artifact couldn't be the size of a hymnal.

After talking to a few "train people," Bunch traveled to Chattanooga, Tenn., to meet with a collector who had a Southern Railway segregated railroad car from the 1920s. When it was running, three-fourths of the car was reserved for Whites. Black passengers walked through a swinging door that said "Colored" to get to their sec-

tion. The railroad car was restored and lowered into the museum before exterior construction was completed.

"This is the kind of thing that will help people understand segregation in ways I don't have to explain," said Bunch.

The collection also includes a guard tower from the notorious Angola Prison, a pinewood slave cabin from South Carolina, George Clinton's Mothership, a pair of Michael Jordan's iconic Air Jordan basketball sneakers, a jumpsuit worn by the late Godfather of Soul James Brown, a letter signed by the revolutionary Toussaint L'Ouverture, and a training plane used by the Tuskegee Airmen.

The museum officials also wanted to spark conversations about the present-day challenges facing the Black community.

"A Justice 4 Trayvon placard and a Black Lives Matter T-shirt underscore the issues of persistent inequality and police brutality," according to the New York Times.

Bunch said that he wanted visitors to the museum to realize that the waters of history have touched all of us and that even though you're not famous, your family's story is just as relevant.

"Often we think, 'well, I'm not related to Frederick Douglas,' or 'I'm not Sojourner Truth,' or 'I didn't break down this door in 1968,'" said Bunch. "So much of history is about the family that left the south for the north or the father who joined the union for the first time to get a job in Detroit."

Bunch continued: "We're not all Martin Luther King Jr., but we've all profoundly shaped what this country can become."

When it comes to helping people to understand the historical and personal value of

their family heirlooms, it's less about what the museum collects, said Bunch, and more about what they're able to preserve.

And the Black Press, unlike any other institution, has helped to preserve those stories and the lived experiences of the Black community.

"The Black Press really has been the guardian of the Black community since 1827. It is the Black Press that illuminated all of the dark corners," said Bunch. "It's the Black Press that both told the unvarnished truth about racial mistreatment and about lynchings."

Bunch also noted that it was JET magazine that showed the picture of Emmitt Till when nobody else would.

The Black Press led so many of the fights against injustice and racial discrimination.

Bunch said that it was the Black Press that protested President Theodore Roosevelt's move to expel the 25th United States Infantry Regiment, a unit of the Buffalo Soldiers, in the "Brownsville Affair" in early 1900s. The Black Press also championed the integration of baseball in the 1940s.

"In some ways, it's the Black Press going back to 'Freedmen's Journal' that articulates an America that had to live up to its stated ideals," said Bunch. "In some ways, it's the Black Press, better than the founding documents that articulated what American could be and should be."

Bunch said that the Black Press is a really important part of America's story and it was an important part that this museum had to explore.

According to Bunch, early copies of Black newspapers including the Chicago Defender, an iconic African American weekly newspaper, and linotype machines used to print newspapers dating back to the early 1900s will also be displayed. Visitors will learn how the Black Press covered a variety of issues throughout American history.

Bunch continued: "From my vantage point, what I want people to realize is that there has been and there will always be a need for alternative visions and alternative voices and the Black Press has always done that and will continue to do that as we move into the future."

Brief Sports News

FOOTBALL
Baylor has hired former Wake Forest coach Jim Grobe to replace Art Briles and lead its football program through a tumultuous time.

A little more than an hour after Grobe's hiring was made official, Baylor announced that athletic director Ian McCaw had resigned, severing another tie with the sexual-assault scandal that has tarnished the school's reputation.

Briles was let go last week after the release of a report commissioned by the school that accused the successful coach of not responding to or inappropriately handling allegations of sexual assault and violence by members of his team.

Grobe, 64, has been out of coaching for two seasons. He spent 13 years with Wake Forest, leading the team to some of its best seasons. Grobe was 77-82, including an Atlantic Coast Conference title and Orange Bowl appearance in 2006. The Demon Deacons went to five bowl games under Grobe, half the school's overall total.

SOCCER
CIUDAD VICTORIA, Mexico (AP) - About 24 hours after he was kidnapped, Mexican soccer star Alan Pulido found himself alone with one of his captors and saw his chance. He wrestled away the man's pistol and his cellphone and dialed Mexico's emergency number, and within minutes, he was free.

An official summary report of three calls to an emergency operator obtained by The Associated Press shows the 25-year-old forward for Olympiakos in the Greek league threatened and beat his captor while on the phone, demanding to be told where they were.

On a first call, with the kidnapper overpowered, Pulido peered out of a window and described the white two-story house with two cars, grey and red, parked in front.

In the next call, Pulido told the operator that state police had arrived outside. The operator told him to fire the pistol so they would know they were in the right spot, but Pulido said he had no bullets. He said police themselves were starting to shoot and described his shorts and tank top so they wouldn't confuse him with the now-unconscious captor.

Once police arrived, he made a third call to confirm with the operator that they were trustworthy.

MANCHESTER, England (AP) - Marcus Rashford signed a new contract with Manchester United through June 2020, a reward for the teenage striker's breakthrough this season that could earn him a place in England's European Championship squad.

United announced the deal, saying Rashford has an option to extend the contract by a further year.

The 18-year-old Rashford was plucked from the youth teams and given his senior debut in February because of an injury crisis at United. He scored two goals in his debut - a Europa League game against FC Midtjylland - and two more against Arsenal three days later in his first Premier League start.

He scored the winner in his first Manchester derby and netted within three minutes of his England debut on Friday. England's Euro 2016 squad will be announced Tuesday, and Rashford looks to have done enough to have persuaded coach Roy Hodgson to select him as one of his forwards for the tournament.

OLYMPICS
RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) - The Rio de Janeiro Olympic venue facing the most serious construction delay has hit another snag, with City Hall saying it is changing contractors for the track cycling velodrome.

In a statement, the city said it rescinded the contract of the principal builder and had authorized a subcontractor to take over.

Last week, the president of world cycling's governing body said he was "very, very concerned" about the venue.

Rio organizers repeated there will be no time for a test event, but said the track surface had been installed. Organizers said they are still planning a "training session" June 25-27 - six weeks before the Olympics open Aug. 5.

PITTSBURGH (AP) - The NHL remains open to sending its players to the 2018 Winter Olympics just so long as the league's owners aren't required to pick up the majority of the check.

Commissioner Gary Bettman said before Game 1 of the Stanley

Cup Final there have been no substantive discussions with the NHL Players Association about closing up shop for several weeks in February 2018 so over 100 players can represent their home country in Pyeongchang, South Korea.

The commissioner added it may not matter if the International Olympic Committee and the International Ice Hockey Federation decline to subsidize the league in the way they have since NHL players were cleared to play in the Olympics in 1998. The issue is currently unresolved.

Bettman said the league's executive committee will be ready to make a decision on expansion at the next board of governors' meeting in June.

PARIS (AP) - While essential for the French Open, a roof over center court at Roland Garros is "not crucial" for Paris' bid to host the 2024 Olympics, the city's bid leader said as heavy rain washed out play at the clay-court Grand Slam for the first time in 16 years.

The French Open is the only major tennis tournament without a structure allowing play to go on during rainy days. After years of delays, the French tennis federation is planning to have one over center court by 2020, but extension works are currently put on hold by legal action from local residents and environmental activists.

MADRID (AP) - Pau Gasol is considering not playing at the Olympics because of the Zika virus.

The Spanish basketball player said there is too much uncertainty about the situation in Brazil and anyone going to Rio de Janeiro for the games should "think about" whether it's worth the risk.

The Chicago Bulls player said other Spanish athletes have also expressed their concerns about the virus and are also considering skipping the games.

Without giving names, Gasol said he talked to other athletes who told him they may not participate in the games.

Brazil has been badly hit by Zika, the mosquito-borne virus linked to severe birth defects and possible neurological problems in adults.

Three Skyline Grads, Super Bowl Champions Honored at Special Event
