Dallas Welcomes The 108th Annual Session of the National Baptist Congress June 8-13, 2014



The National Baptist Congress is a traveling Christian educational institute designed for leaders and workers in churches and denominations throughout the nation. The National Baptist Congress was founded as an educational arm of the National Baptist Publishing Board (NBPB), now known as R.H. Boyd Publishing Corporation (RHBPC), for training church workers and leaders alike-to effectively utilize the various resources for Christian education and discipleship.

During this annual event, registrants are exposed to current trends in Christian education methodology, as well as strategies for effectively implementing the work of the Church. Congress traditionally begins on the second Sunday in June and continues for five days. The 108th Annual Session of the National Baptist Congress will be hosted in Dallas, Texas June 8 - 13, 8:00 AM - 10:00 PM at the Sheraton Hotel 400 North Olive Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

The first Congress was held in 1906, and was the brainchild of Reverend Richard Henry Boyd. He envisioned a training vehicle to prowhere church workers could learn, share, and fellowship with other Christian workers from across the nation. Today's Congress continues to target its offerings to the contemporary needs of the Church. Dr. T. B. Boyd III, president of RHBPC, was inspired to add an innovative dimension to the Congress structure-the Youth Congress. This division, held simultaneously with the Congress, trains and prepares youth for Christian leadership. The Youth Congress attracts children, youth, and young adults (ages 4-24), and provides a plethora of activities including a parade, dramas, a Drill Team competition, Dance Ministry, youth choir performances, an Oratorical Scholarship Contest, a talent show, and concerts featuring contemporary gospel/inspirational artists. In addition, there are a variety of courses and workshops designed to spiritually educate, motivate, and empower young people. After more than a century, the Congress' mission remains steadfast in training and equipping generations of pastors, ministers, teachers, missionaries, and other workers to fulfill the calling that God has placed on their lives. FORT WORTH ISD SUPERINTENDENT WALTER DANSBY RESIGNS



(AP) - The superintendent of the Fort Worth Independent School District Walter Dansby has resigned after trustees met in closed session for several hours. The resignation was accepted in a 6-3 vote.

Mr. Dansby in January 2012 took over leadership of the FWISD, with more than 80,000 students. The 63-year-old Dansby will work through June 9 - the last day of school. Dansby, who's been with the district for 40 years, will retire at the end of January 2015. Dansby, with a base salary of nearly \$339,000, says he leaves with no regrets and looks forward to retirement.

In a letter to the community on the Fort Worth ISD website, Dansby wrote: "This is one of the hardest messages I've ever had to write. As you all know by now, last night the Board accepted my resignation as superintendent of the Fort Worth ISD. After 40 years working for this District as a teacher, coach, administrator, and finally as superintendent -- it's nearly impossible to summarize all I am feeling right now. So I am going to choose to focus on one overwhelming feeling - gratitude."



TEXAS PUBLISHERS: KROGER IGNORES THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY

"Have you been invited?" It's a simple question that the Black Press has asked its community for several years, with the underlying message, "Don't go where you haven't been invited."

Many publishers of Black newspapers have expressed that stores that do not carry African American products, advertise in African American-owned media, and refuse to carry African American newspapers and magazines for its customers, have sent a clear message that Blacks are not invited. er of The Texas Informer newspaper, said she got the message loud and

The Informer is an African American newspaper that has served Anderson, Angelina, Cherokee, Houston and Rusk counties for 19 years.

During a routine delivery in August of 2013, Walter Session, Informer owner and co-publisher, arrived at Kroger grocery store to find that the newspaper shelf, that had stood for many years inside the store entry, had been removed. He immediately found the store manager Christine Tate and stated that the newspaper shelf had been removed, and he wanted to know where he can place the Texas Informer. She said that he could not leave it there, that it was not her decision, but that of the corporate office. However, the mainstream newspaper was still in the store.

After having delivered to Kroger for 10 years, Tate informed Walter that he could not continue to place his newsiper in the store, because it sidered solicitation. She told him that it was not her decision, but that of corporate and if he wanted to continue to offer the publication to the store's customers he would have to contact the corporate headquarters in Cincinnati. Walter contacted headquarters, but each time he called their corporate office, customer service took a message with the response that someone would give him a call. No one did. The issue became one of many long battles n the struggle to run a minority publi-

"When you have an African American newspaper you fight a lot of battles," Maxine said.

But having to pick her battles, Session decided not to pursue the lost distri-bution drop and concentrate on mov-

During an interview, Tate denied the conversation with Walter and suggested that the person to talk to regarding the matter would be Brian Mixon, another store manager.

At first, Mixon claimed Kroger Corporate made the decision to stop carrying the African American news-paper. But he quickly retracted his statement and claimed the regional office in Houston would have made the decision. Rather than expound upon the decision, he suggested contacting the consumer affairs office in Dallas. The Kroger Company

James Smith, a long-time reader of the Texas Informer newspaper, said he was very concerned when he saw the newspaper was no longer available at the store. He stated that the absence of the newspaper affects the local African American community as well as other ethnicities in the area that read the publication.

"Many other groups, Asians and what have you, not just Blacks read the paper," he said. Other publications, such as The Power

Pages News, have reported receiving the same clear message from Kroger that they weren't invited. The publication has served Collin and its surrounding counties for almost 20 years. Publisher and founder Hattie Kelly said that her newspaper has sought adver-tisement from Kroger for several years

Black newspapers depend on advertising funds to provide jobs in the com-munity - such as secretaries, reporters, graphic artists, etc., even summer internships for students.

Other Texas publishers have experienced the same response from Kroger, according to Mollie F. Belt, vice president of the Texas Publisher's Association.
Belt is also the publisher and CEO of

The Dallas Examiner. Her newspaper doesn't receive any ads from the gro-

Karen Carter Richards, CEO and publisher of Houston Forward Times, said Kroger flat-out refuses to advertise with any Black newspaper in Houston. 'We don't do any advertising in any

American newspapers, Theresa Bordelon, Kroger's regional hub manager told Judy Foston, Houston Forward Times' publicist. This is not expected to change any time soon. Even though Kroger's is ranked 23rd on the list of Fortune 500 companies, it has no advertising budget allowed for its African American consumers.

In 2013, it set aside \$198,058,196 for advertising. Mainstream television stations, newspapers and radio stations received the bulk of the advertising, which is common. It carved out a small portion for other minority media, but refused to include African American media. However, Blacks spend \$1 billion

being their second choice. "Are we really invited in their stores?" Belt asked. Or has the Black communi-

"After so many years of being told 'No,' I've just stayed away. But now I feel it's time to take action as a group," said Kelly, who is the president of TPA. Forming a united front, the publishers of TPA - representing African American newspapers across Texas - hope to spread their message to their readers. Fifty years ago, one would not expect businesses to invite them in through advertising or carrying products designed for the African American community. Blacks took what they could get because that's the way things were. But the Black community no longer has to accept being left out. TPA suggested that the African American community demand equality from their grocers.

Without fear of repercussions, Blacks can ask their managers for products that are designed to meet their needs; write to corporate offices and express their concerns about the lack of advertising geared toward their needs, and printed in the publications they read most; and insist that they carry African American publications in their stores. Furthermore, TPA has suggested that African Americans do business with people who do business with Black businesses.

Warmer temperatures are a welcome change after a long, cold winter—but as the mercury rises, it's crucial to protect our animal companions by never leaving them in parked vehicles. Every year, PETA receives dozens of reports of animals suffering and dying in hot, parked cars. Cruelty-to-animals charges are routinely filed in such care. such cases.

It only takes minutes for a parked

day, even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a parked car can reach more than 160 degrees. Parking in the shade and/or leaving water in the vehicle won't help. Symptoms of heatstroke include restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, lack of appetite and coordination, dark tongue, and vomiting. Dogs can succumb to heatstroke in just 15 minutes, resulting in brain damage

Please, when it's even a little warm

posting new MediaMatters.org, the media watchdog group, sums up the conservative strategy under the headline, "Don't Litigate It, Don't Ever Talk About It: Right-Wing Media's Solution to Racial Discrimination."

The report recounts the media storm touched off by "The Case for Reparations," Ta-Nehisi Coates' excellent cover story in the Atlantic magazine. Media Matters said, ...The Atlantic has given right-wing media a fresh opportunity to argue that the best way to address racially discriminatory laws or policies such as housing segregation – is to never speak of them, let alone liti-

gate them under civil rights law." Media Matters observed, "In Coates' essay, which ultimately calls for a congressional study on the long-term effects of the treatment of African-Americans in the United States, he explores the country's history of racism and oppression, from slavery to the Jim Crow laws to the present. Although right-wing media have been known

to erroneously claim that racism is no longer a problem, the systemic effect of state and federal laws that favored whites and oppressed people of color is still felt today."

For example, "...agencies like the Fair Housing Administration often refused to insure mortgages in neighborhoods that they deemed unsuitable, perpetuating systematic housing segregation that in turn fueled other disparate racial impacts that continue today, such as separate and unequal schools. Despite the fact that redlining was outlawed in 1968 with the passage of the Fair Housing Act, the housing market is still hostile to black buyers and renters, even in neighborhoods that have taken steps to improve

residential housing segregation."
But you would not know any of this if you only consumed conservative propaganda.

According to Media Matters, "Naomi Schaefer Riley, who once called for the elimination of black studies from college campuses, wrote in a recent New York Post column that we've talked enough about race. According to Schaefer Riley, Americans are 'done with a national dialogue on race' and Coates' essay 'offers nothing new.' She also complained that Coates' diversers for Hand 10 Liber Coates' advocacy for HR 40 [John Conyers bill to study reparations] was evidence that 'our country's media elites are still stuck on a liberal baby boomer racial narrative,' and concluded that the way forward now is not discussion, but 'colorblindness.'

And she was not alone.

"Right-wing outlets like The Wall Street Journal, NRO, and radio host Rush Limbaugh have come out against governmental efforts to remedy past harms using litigation to enforce fair housing laws and promote residential integra-tion programs. When the Department of Justice went after banks who had racially discriminated against people of color, the WSJ called the lawsuit an attempt to 'shake down banks for not lending enough to minorities,' and complained the agency was attempting to impose an unconstitutional 'quota' system on lenders. The WSJ also claimed that the lawsuit, and other initiatives on the part of the DOJ, had done nothing more than 'saddle a lot of minorities with foreclosed homes, huge debt burdens, and bad credit scores.'

And Rush Limbaugh rushed to add his two cents.

"For his part, Limbaugh has argued that the Housing and Urban Development Department's mandate to 'affirmatively further' fair housing was nothing more than 'social engineering' and a plot on the part of the government to 'force' people to move to integrated neighborhoods.' conservative-dominated

"Even worse, the Supreme Court has contributed to modern

racial divisions by rolling back affirmative action policies, gutting key provisions of the Voting Rights Act, and making it nearly impossible for public schools to implement proactive integration initiatives that would help diversify heavily segregated schools. Such decisions have allowed states to impose restrictive voter identification laws, have whitewashed college campuses, and nearly driven a stake through the heart of Brown v. Board of Education, the case that outlawed state-mandated segregation in public schools. Unsurprisingly, right-wing media also determined that the recent 60th anniversary of Brown, one of the most significant civil rights victories in history, was no time to discuss racial inequali-

The article continued, "If Chief Justice John Roberts had his way, we'd all follow right-wing media's lead and stop talking about race. As Roberts famously stated, 'the way to stop discrimination on the basis of race is to stop discriminating on the basis of race.' In her dissent opposing the majority's decision to uphold Michigan's ban on affirmative action, however, Justice Sonia Sotomayor countered, 'the way to stop discrimination on the basis of race is to speak openly and candidly on the subject of race, and to apply the Constitution with eyes open to the unfortunate effects of centuries of racial discrimination."

Mayor Baraka – A New Direction for Newark

Add Newark to the list of big cities now being headed by a new wave of progressive mayors. On the heels of New York Mayor Bill de Blasio's successful "economic inequality" campaign last year, another urban crusader, Ras Baraka, was elected mayor of Newark on May 13. A Newark native, city councilman, high school principal and son of the citv's most well-known poet and activist, the late Amiri Baraka, he will be sworn in on July 1.

Baraka succeeds interim mayor, Luis Quintana, who became the

former mayor, Cory Booker, was elected to the U.S. Senate. Facing an unemployment rate of 13 percent, a resurgence of homicides, and a budget deficit of \$93 million, Baraka ran a populist campaign highlighted by his local roots, his experience as an educator and a promise to fight to regain local control of Newark's public schools, which have been under the jurisdiction of the state for the past two decades.

Education was an overriding issue in the campaign, as it has increasingly become in communities across the nation. Baraka staunchly defended public education and received enthusiastic support and financing from the Newark Teachers Union. He also stressed his progressive roots, as the son of renowned poets, Amina and Amiri Baraka, a family that has lived in Newark for more than 70

acting mayor last October when gressive background during the making to local authorities. campaign, Baraka touted his 20 years as a community organizer, his stint as deputy mayor in 2002 and his 2010 election to the Newark Municipal Council, representing the South Ward. He has also served as principal of Newark's Central High School and taught elementary school for 10 years.

Undaunted by opposition from Cami Anderson, New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie's appointee as superintendent of Newark's public schools, Baraka has been in the forefront of widespread community resistance to the state's One Newark reorganization plan, which involves closing and consolidating some neighborhood schools to make space for more charter schools. While not categorically opposed to charter schools, Baraka rallies against what he sees as a top-down, profit-driven privatization of Newark's schools. He is calling for more community input and, ultimately, a return of decisionAs urban America faces a

plethora of challenges stemming from worsening educational, income and economic inequality, a growing number of cities and mayors are fighting back with progressive policies that put people above profit, support living wages, and are designed to give more working families a real shot at the middle class. In addition to the new mayors of Newark and New York Marty Walsh, a former union leader, is the newly-elected mayor of Boston. Also, Edward Murray, who became mayor of Seattle in January, has called for raising the city's minimum wage to \$15 an hour. Like Murray, who describes his administration as "committed to progressive principles and practical solutions," Ras Baraka and a new wave of progressive mayors are taking the lead for urban America as Washington continues to be mired in gridlock.

The identity of the "cloud of witnesses" demands our immediate attention! Who are the "cloud of witnesses?" The great "cloud of witnesses" is a figure of speech that points to the great number of faithful believers mentioned in chapter 11. Spurred on by the worthy examples of faith by the Old Testament worthies of Hebrews chapter 11, we are exhorted to "lay aside every weight" and "the sin which doth so easily beset us" (v. 1).

The first obstacle, a weight, is anything that hinders us. The second obstacle that must be laid

aside is sin. These two obstacles unnecessary hindrances and sinful behavior — are to be set aside in order to "run with patience the race that is set before us." We are exhorted to run this race with patience. The word patience carries the idea of endurance and perseverance. Even though we have the privilege of looking at the examples of believers, both past and present, the greatest example of all is "Jesus the author and finisher of our faith" (v. 2). Above all else, we need to focus our attention on the great Trailblazer of faith – Jesus Christ.

The great Author (Leader) of our faith, Jesus Christ, finished His mission and experienced "the joy that was set before Him" (v. 2). Our Saviour endured the shame and ignominy of a cruel cross. Anticipating joy, our Saviour endured the awful shame of the cross, even to the point of being despised by others. We will never

comprehend horrendous crucifixion. Crucifixion was considered such a lowly form of death that Roman citizens automatically were exempt from it. Jesus met a criminal's death.

As the author continues to exhort these saints, he directs them to look to Jesus as a model of patience. Jesus looked beyond the shame to His reward, His exaltation to "the right hand of the throne of God" (v. 2). Not only should these believers look to Jesus as the model of patience but they should "consider Him" as the One who faced severe opposition from others that resulted in His death (v. 3). In undergoing severe troubles, these believers needed to remember that our Lord faced severe oppositions Himself. If He faced opposition, what else could they

Yes, there was a reward to be obtained, but there was a difficult

race to be completed. As these believers "consider Him," they were exhorted by the writer to devote careful and serious thought to the subject of how Jesus suffered in His path to the cross. Oh, how He suffered to secure our salvation! He was indeed focused as He suffered for us! He subjected Himself to the shame of a cruel cross, acting as our substitute for II Corinthians 5:21 says — "For He hath made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in It was all-important that these believers meditate on their Lord's example so that they might not "be wearied and faint in their minds" (v. 3). As these believers faced severe persecution, they needed to consider the brave examples of Jesus in order to keep their minds from becoming weary

Sloane Stephens Crashes the Scene in Paris...



ith the group of ers, Serena Williams, Li Ni, and Venus Williams being eliminated early at the 2014 French Open in Paris, France, Sloane Stephens of the USA advanced to the second week of this Grand Slam Event.

The French Open Grand Slam event is a tough challenge for many players, especially players from the USA and other countries that practice and play most of their tennis on hard surfaces. The French Open is played on clay, a soft dirt surface that slows the ball down during play, and requires a lot of patience, endurance, and concentration. Players who lack these qualities and try to blow their opponents away by hitting the balls hard, rushing the net, and volleying to win as quickly as possible, usually end up in the loser's bracket when playing on clay.

Sloane has taken on the challenge in her unique style of play that gives her the edge against most opponents when playing on this surface. Introduced to the game of tennis at nine by her mother, Sybil Smith, acquiring basic athletic traits from her father, former New England Patriots player John Stephans, and growing up on clay, have added to her success at the French.

Reaching the third round this year at the French Open was for Sloane a challenge that she endured without really understanding how it all happened. "I don't know if there is anything different in my game than before, or, anything that has happened in my life to cause me to play my best tennis under these conditions. I just seem to move into the game better physically and mentally when it comes to a Grand Slam, especially when playing on clay," Sloane responded to questions about her success on clay during the post-game interview. Sloane laughed when she made these statements, a per



sonal gesture that said to those who watched her match, that she was well focused, calm, and played with confidence that she could get to every ball and win on her athletic ability.

Simona Halep (4), the highest seed still in the tournament, is her next opponent. Sloane defeated her in straight sets during their last encounter. When asked if Simona would be a threat, Sloane responded with caution, poised demeanor, and seriousness that she displays on the court when playing against tough opponents. This means to those who watch her play that she is going to give it her best regardless.
