

Dallas ISD Kimball High School Celebrates its Second Consecutive 4A State Basketball Championship

(ESPN)- Dallas Kimball pulled out a come-from-behind 78-75 win over Houston Yates for its second straight 4A state championship. Kimball trailed state nemesis Yates, 75-73 with just over twelve seconds left as forward Sheldon Yearwood held the ball at the free throw line. Yearwood's pass went to junior Torrey Henry, who threw up a wide-open 3-point attempt. Kimball (34-5) celebrated its 4th boys state basketball championship, the second in as many years, over Yates (33-6).

GREAT EDUCATORS SUCCUMB

Outstanding Citizen and Educator Dr. James Oliver Griffin Succumbs

Dr. James Oliver Griffin, lived a life of service and as a mentor to those whose lives he touched. He was among that courageous cadre of educators who helped pave the way for better educational opportunities during the years of school desegregation in the Richardson Independent School District. As principal of Hamilton Park School prior to desegregation, Dr. Griffin oversaw the education of the school's predominately African American student population. He provided visionary leadership for teachers and students of all races and sought to make the school an example of racial cooperation.

After retirement from RISD, he matriculated at Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Tx. Dr. Griffin has given extensive service to the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) on multiple levels (local, area, district, regional, national): Moderator of the Southwest Region of the Christian Church, President of Texas Christian Missionary Fellowship, Vice President of the National Convocation, member of the General Board of the Christian Church, and Vice President of the Pension Fund of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

The Angels in Heaven rejoiced to welcome Quince L. King Wood, age 83, of San Antonio, on Tuesday, Mar 6, 2012. She was born Feb 10, 1929, the fourth of five children, to Albert and Myrtia King in Leona, Texas. Her loved ones who preceded her in death were her parents; her husband of 52 years, Matthew Wood; one brother, Johnnie L. King; two sisters, Ollie M. Polk and Adell V. Vonner; and her son-in-law, Bennie M. Dillard.

Quince completed St. Paul Shiloh High School in Oakwood, Texas in 1946. She furthered her education at Huston-Tillotson University in Austin, Texas where she attained a Bachelor of Science degree in 1950. Upon completion of higher education, Quince united in matrimony to Matthew Wood, who was in the U.S. Army, and began her career as a school teacher in Texas. She also taught in a number of military schools in Germany. Later, Quince received nurse training and worked as a new-born baby assistant for several years.

Quince's love was volunteering and she was a very active member of several organizations within her church and community.

32 YEAR DALLAS ISD EDUCATOR SUCCUMBS MR. BOBBY GENE "BOB" BYRUM

Mr. Bobby Gene "Bob" Byrum served the Dallas Independent School District for 32 years, including serving as assistant principal at South Oak Cliff and Pinkston high schools. He succumbed Saturday, March 10, 2012, of natural causes at UT Southwestern University Hospital.

Mr. Byrum was born on March 26, 1933, in Emory TX, the son of the late Thomas and Louise Byrum. He was the sixth of seven siblings. The family relocated to Dallas, TX when he was a small child. On November 19, 1955 he married Betty Jean Byrum, who survives.

Mr. Byrum received his Bachelors and Masters degree from Stephen F. Austin University. He served in the U.S. Army for two years. After his discharge he was employed by the Dallas Independent School District, as math teacher and coach. He retired as Assistant Principal of Pinkston High School in the mid-1980s. He operated a real estate business afterward, and was a member of the Masons.

He is survived by his two daughters and sons-in-law, Shelly and Cary Daniels of Lake Dallas, TX, and Shannon and Michael Keuer of Corinth, TX, as well as grandchildren Cary S. Daniels, 22, of Lake Dallas, TX, Bridget Carlson, 32, of Ft. Lee, VA, and Garrett and Samantha Keuer, 12 and 10, of Corinth, TX.

Dear Editor:

Declawing is a painful mutilation that involves severing not just a cat's nails, but whole phalanges (up to the first joint), including bones, ligaments, and tendons. Depriving cats of

these necessary and important body parts can cause personality changes (some cats become depressed, withdrawn, fearful, or refuse to use their litter boxes), difficulty balancing and walking, and chronic back and joint pain as the cat's shoulder, leg, and back muscles weaken.

Cats may not have thumbs, but they deserve to keep all the digits they were born with. Claws, couches, and curtains can coexist peacefully if you trim the tips off cats' claws weekly, provide plenty of scratching posts, and cover furniture with contact paper or another slippery material temporarily, if needed. Jesus' famous Sermon on the Mount, which is also known as the Beatitudes, in the book of Matthew focuses on specific blessings if a person exhibits certain characteristics. These blessings reflect a state of being that a person might find themselves in. Each pronouncement also states a very specific reward that the person would

receive as well. Jesus was also letting the people know that if they find themselves in this kind of situation, they should be happy about their circumstances.


For example, Jesus said in Matthew 5: 3-5, 8: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. ..Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God." Which situation do you find yourself in today? If you are in any of the situations that are mentioned in the Beatitudes, then Jesus is telling

you to be happy about your circumstance because there is a reward for you.

However, in the closing of the Beatitudes, Jesus reminds us of who we are as a people that belong to Him. He says in Matthew 5:11-12, "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you, and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Jesus is reminding us that if we are being persecuted in His name, then this is to be expect-

ed because they did it to Him and it was also done to prophets who lived long before us. As a matter of fact, Jesus says that we should "rejoice and be glad," because once we get to heaven, our reward will be great. How many of you have been persecuted because of your faith in Christ? How many of you have mourned? Whatever your situation is, the Father wants you to know that you will be taken care of. He sees what you are going through and He is going to provide you comfort in some kind of way. You can count on it. Amen? Amen.

The word "wherefore" in verse 7, builds upon Paul's argument of the oneness that unity brings in the body of Christ; and because that fact is true, Paul exhorts Christians to "receive one another, as Christ has received us" (v. 7). Just as Christ is our perfect example of humility and service (vs. 3-4), He too is our example for full acceptance of others. The exhortation to

"receive ye one another" (Romans 15:7) is addressed to the entire church, not just one segment of it as in Romans 14:1. Whether you are strong or weak, Gentile or Jew, believers are supposed to accept one another without any conditions attached.

Our perfect example in accepting one another is Christ. Thank God that Christ has accepted us on the basis of faith alone, regardless of our ethnicity or social status. Whether we are Jew or Gentile, black or white, rich or poor, powerful or impotent, we are

all welcome in the fellowship of faith. Praise God! When Christ accepted us, He did so "to the glory of God (Romans 15:7). It also brings glory to God when we (Christians) receive one another in love. In verses 8 and 9, Christ's lofty example is now given additional emphasis as it relates to both Jews and Gentiles.

Christ is seen as "a minister of the circumcision for the truth of God (v. 8)." "Minister" is a term that denotes servanthood. To say that He was a servant of "the circumcision" suggests that He became a Jew and

submitted to all the Jewish laws (see Galatians 4:4-5). He was a minister "for the truth of God" - strictly speaking, it means that Christ appeared among the Jews on behalf of God's truth. He came to confirm the fact that God is truthful in all His words and deeds! Speaking strictly again, Christ came "to confirm the promises made unto the fathers." His coming to the Jews guaranteed the truth of the promises God made to the patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The "Tanning" of America — Beyond the Racial Divide and Moving on to the Digital Divide!

In a recent article published by the National Urban League, "The State of Black America 2012-Tanning of America Makes Growth, Prosperity, and Empowerment Easier," Steve Stoute comments on the fact that our culture "is the golden thread that meshes together the exceptional quality, ingenuity, creativity and value of these products, (Apple, Nike, Coca-Cola, and Jay-Z's music) that makes the American Dream accessible all across the globe. He speaks about the phenomenon of "tanning" or "the mental complexion" of America.

In essence, Steve is talking about the common experiences and values that go beyond race or even socio-economic lines. It is a good metaphor and one in which explains almost simplistically the idea that though there may be real differences in skin tone, our desires and our abilities are only limited to lack of education, lack of resources, or lack of desire. Two of these three things can be controlled by those of us willing to work hard to ensure there is equality in education and resources. The third item—lack of desire, could even be controlled to some degree if we ensure the other two items are in place. There are many who may have the desire to learn, or build, or do.... if they knew what they were missing. Broadband and technology could actually help those who lack the desire to be more interested in education, technology, innovation, or entrepreneurship.

Technology, as Steve explains in his article, is something that "millennials," or those born between the years 1977 – 1997, understand much better than those born before this era...so, therein lies the problem! It is mostly those born before 1977 who have difficulty understanding the need for digital equality. Those who were born when cell phones were the exception rather than the rule, and when spectrum was only talked about when referring to the colors of the rainbow, don't quite "get it" when it comes to understanding the importance of having access to the internet.

The question of whether or not broadband is necessary in today's marketplace, education system, or job market, has long since been answered. Opportunities abound on the internet and innovation is sparked. Creativity is sprouting from elementary schools at startling rates and young entrepreneurs

are getting younger and younger. Those who are technologically curious today are becoming the inventors of tomorrow. Those who have access to broadband and the internet can forge ahead uninhibited by fears of the unknown.

We must continue to encourage innovation and creativity. We must provide our schools and our communities with the resources they need to spur curiosity. We must contribute to programs, such as those that the National Urban League is promoting. We must continue to support these programs and learn more about them in order to provide our children more opportunities to become the entrepreneurs, the scientists, the teachers of tomorrow. But we must encourage them today. And we must provide them the resources today.

"Ain't nothin' changed, but the date." Sadly, no truer words have been spoken, especially given the sweeping initiatives by Republicans today to turn back the clock to the Jim Crow Era, where individuals' rights were legislated away creating "a separate but equal" society. Currently 31 states, and more poised to jump on the bandwagon, have passed laws requiring voters to show I.D. at the polls in order to cast their ballots.

This 21st century voter suppression strategy by Republicans, to keep certain groups from voting, is all too familiar and reminiscent of Freedom Summer of 1964 when Civil Rights organizations including the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (MFDP) brought in white and black college students to register Black voters. The coalition of civil rights groups also created Freedom Schools and taught

African American students about black history, the Civil Rights Movement, and leadership skills, as well as math and reading.

These efforts by the civil rights organizations during Freedom Summer, along with the Selma-to-Montgomery March of 1965, paved the way for the Voting Rights Act of 1965 signed into law in August by President Lyndon Johnson. The law prohibits states from implementing discriminatory voting practices including imposing certain qualifications and prerequisites such as literacy tests and poll taxes on prospective voters. It also prohibits states from denying the right to vote based on their race or the color of their skin.

In Selma, Alabama in 1965, civil rights organizers from the Dallas County Voters League (DCVL), SNCC and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) conducted registration drives, organized classes to help African Americans pass the literacy tests and held marches to the county court house to register African Americans to vote.

To publicize their voter registration campaign, the first Selma-to-Montgomery March for Voting Rights in Alabama was organized for Sunday, March 7, 1965, and is often referred to as "Bloody Sunday." The march of nearly 600 was led by now Congressman John Lewis (D-Georgia), the young leader of SNCC, and Reverend Hosea Williams of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). The group headed out of Selma and over the Edmund Pettus Bridge where they were met by state and local police who attacked

them with clubs and tear gas. The horrific melee was captured by photographers and TV cameras that broadcast the bloody images of unarmed civilians brutalized by law enforcement across the country and around the world. This event was a turning point for the Civil Rights Movement in America because it unveiled the terroristic acts of law enforcement, the Ku Klux Klan and other hate groups endorsed by the state, against African Americans.

On March 9, Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. joined with 2,500 activists in a "symbolic" march across the Pettus Bridge to show the world that they would not give up on voting rights for African Americans. The third march, which began on Sunday, March 21, 1965 in Selma with an estimated 3,200 marchers, finally arrived in the state capitol of Montgomery on March 25 after a 54-mile trek that took four days, under the protection of the U.S. Army, the Alabama National Guard, FBI Agents and Federal Marshals.

So now, we're dealing with the same issues. What happened? What went wrong? How did we end up back where we started in 2012? I noticed a change during the 2008 presidential campaign when Republican contender John McCain tapped Alaska Governor Sarah Palin for his running mate. Sarah was venomous and spunky, espousing rhetoric that we hadn't heard in, oh so many years. The coded messages steeped in racism would insight a dormant beast that awoke rearing its ugly head hungry for the red meat of racist oratory.

Sarah Palin was the ring-leader who attracted thou-

sands of like-minded individuals at her rallies. Her supporters carried signs slandering Candidate Obama and depicting him as a "foreigner," a Muslim and a radical. Palin's boisterous rallies were an opportunity for the right wingers and white supremacists to air their extremist views targeting minorities, gays and anyone they deemed as outsiders. This environment of hate and racism was aired with abandon on the national cable shows, network news programs, talk radio, blogs and in print media. A lot of eyeballs and ink was used to accelerate Palin's message that would evolve into Tea Party pabulum that is fed to the disheartened masses that are looking for a way out of this mortgage/foreclosure nightmare and joblessness abyss.

The good news is that Black folks and other disenfranchised citizens are not asleep at the wheel. The platform has expanded – we are engaged in the struggle to fight voter suppression, immigrant rights and workers rights. The Selma to Montgomery March of 2012 led by Reverend Al Sharpton and others, 47 years after the first march, is a prime example of oppressed peoples working together toward a common goal. We must join together and right the wrongs that a frightened segment of the American population is attempting to foist on the rest of the country. We must speak up, let our voices be heard, change the laws to protect the rights of all – just like we did during the Civil Rights Movement.



splendid endings. Get Your Student Ready for STAAR
March 2012
Dallas ISD Trustee Carla Ranger, District 6

Each spring, Dallas Independent School District students participate in a variety of tests. This month marks the launch of the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness, or STAAR, designed to replace the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS). The new tests are more rigorous and will focus on readiness for success in subsequent grades and courses and, ultimately, for college and career.

Students will be tested in the core subject areas—reading, writing, mathematics, science, and social studies. Students in elementary and middle school will take tests on the same subjects they did in the past, depending on the grade level.

For high school students, the STAAR will be divided into 12 end-of-course exams—English I-III writing, English I-III reading, biology, world geography, Algebra I, chemistry/physics, world history/U.S. history, Algebra II/geometry—that they will take during high school.

Students in grades three through nine will take the new STAAR for the first time at the end of March.

Students currently in 10th through 12th grades will continue to take the TAKS test until they graduate. These students, as well as students repeating ninth grade, took the TAKS test March 5-9.

From March 26-29 and April 23-27, students in third through eighth grade will take the first of the new STAAR tests to determine how well they know the state curriculum for certain subjects on their grade level. Students who are in ninth grade for the first time and middle school students taking courses for high school credit will take the STAAR end-of-course exams from March 26-29 and May 7-18.

Also, for the first time since the state began its standardized testing program, the time limit for students to complete each test is four hours. The Texas Education Agency (TEA) established the time limit based on feedback from school personnel. The time limit will prepare students for other state and national assessments, which are usually timed. The TEA will review the four-hour time limit after this first administration and determine if the policy needs to be reconsidered or adjusted for specific grades or subjects.

The STAAR test includes a number of accommodations that address needs of English language learners and students receiving special education services

who meet particular participation requirements. The admission, review, and dismissal (ARD) committee for a student who receives special education services will determine the appropriate test.

The district is offering Saturday prep sessions to help students get ready for the STAAR end-of-course exams, so contact your school to secure a slot if needed. Sessions are open to all students at each location, and are scheduled to be held at North Dallas High School, Skyline High School, and Nolan Estes Plaza on the following Saturdays and for the following subjects:

March 24 STAAR Prep Sessions
9 a.m. - noon
English I Reading, English I Writing

April 14 and 28 STAAR Prep Sessions
9 a.m. - 2 p.m.
Algebra I, Biology, World Geography

Dallas Independent School District Executive Administrator Shirley Newsome Speaks with A Dallas Post Tribune Representative

It was a privilege to visit with Ms. Newsome and hear her thoughts and opinions about student learning in the Dallas Independent School District.

Following are Ms. Newsome's thoughts on various subjects:

Our visit comes during criticism from other newspapers and the controversy surrounding the all-male fifth graders field trip. The field trip was an opportunity for young males to see positive role models. All fifth grade males in the district had a chance to go to the movie theatre to see the movie Red Tails, about the Tuskegee airmen who fought during World War II.

Ms. Newsome stated she "regrets the negative spin" put on the experience of taking fifth grade boys to see Red Tails. "It was a wonderful experience". For many, it was their first time in a movie theatre. Many boys left the theatre wanting to be a pilot. They wanted to research and understand what it takes to be a pilot." Ms. Newsome also stated, "It allowed students to see positive images of men of color and as well as develop positive images of themselves."

African-American Student Performance

Presently, African-American students are performing at the bottom of every tested area. To improve the performance of African-American students, and all students, a program called the African-American Success Initiative has been implemented. The \$1 million program looks at teaching practices, governance issues, curriculum, and leadership issues. The program is to identify what are the "reasons that keep African-American students at the bottom performance level, understand the issues, and implement changes that create a nurturing and caring environment."

In addition, Student Advocates have been assigned to certain campuses to assess the climate and issues and also to structure meetings with students to under-

stand what their needs are. Ms. Newsome stated the students were asked, "What do you think we need to do to help you do better?" The response from students was been "teachers and administrators don't care."

Ms. Newsome states, "We are morally bound, ethically bound, honorably bound, and professionally bound to help the student." What came out of this response was creating a Caring Classroom Initiative. The attitude "is that students are diamonds in the rough...our job is to make them shine." The Caring Initiative is to create an environment that is caring. The teacher is to care about them and their future. But, Ms. Newsome admitted "we have a long way to go." We must create campuses that are caring which ask questions such as "do you care enough to insure student success? Do you expect great things out of the student? The culture of care has been part of the principal and teacher development training and will continue to be the focus.

Recent School Closings

Ms. Newsome explained there are changing demographics in the Southern sector of Dallas ISD. Students that once attended school in these areas are now enrolled in DeSoto, Duncanville and Lancaster Independent School Districts.

Thus, a 'perfect storm' was created by the financial crisis within the Dallas ISD and the drop in student population. The closing of the schools were "a matter of survival." The schools with small populations, which were mostly in the Southern sector, the cost per student was \$11,000.00 versus \$5,000.00 in other schools. "Financially," she stated, "we just can't do that." Ms. Newsome stated, the impacts of this decision will "strengthening the schools that are left...consolidated schools will now have sufficient numbers where they can have viable programs."

Her Role and Leadership Style

Ms. Newsome presently wears several 'hats' in the Dallas ISD administration. She serves as Area

The power of soy

Soy's biggest nutritional claim to fame is its complete protein, one of the only plant proteins that contains all nine essential amino acids our bodies need from our diets to function properly. This makes it an ideal substitute for meat, poultry, and eggs.

In fact, a half cup of cooked soybeans supplies about one-third of your necessary daily protein, for a mere 149 calories (versus about 230 for one serving of cooked ground beef). That protein and the fiber it contains make it incredibly filling. Plus, soybeans are cholesterol-free and lower in heart-unhealthy saturated fat than meat and dairy.

Soy also packs a number of phytochemicals, including isoflavones, which may work together to help fight conditions like cardiovascular disease, osteoporosis, and breast cancer. (Though you might have heard that women with a history of breast cancer should avoid soy, recent research suggests that's probably not necessary, says Karen Collins, R.D., nutrition adviser to the American Institute for Cancer Research.)

To score soy's benefits,

get up to three servings a day, mostly from less processed forms like soybeans, soy milk, soy nuts, and tofu. "When soybeans are eaten close to their original state, you get more of their good-for-you attributes," says Dawn Jackson Blatner, R.D., author of *The Flexitarian Diet*.

You may get slightly more nutrients from fermented soy foods like miso and tempeh, since the fermentation process can make those nutrients more absorbable by the body, says Blatner, but all forms of the legume deserve a place on your plate.

Two exceptions: First, avoid soy isoflavone supplement pills and powders. Research hasn't yet determined how much of it's safe to take, says Collins. Plus, unlike whole soy foods, they don't give you the full range of phytochemicals and other nutrients, such as B vitamins, which help with bodily processes like metabolism and keep your DNA healthy.

And though foods made with soy protein isolate (like soy burgers and soy dogs) do usually pack less saturated fat than their meat counterparts, they also tend to be loaded with sodium and additives, so don't make them a staple.



Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) will display its new 40 and 26-foot buses along with a Mobility Management (MV-1) van at the Friday through Sunday show, March 23 to 25.

DART buses on display are part of an order of 459 new compressed natural gas (CNG) buses built by North American Bus Industries, Inc. of Anniston, Alabama. DART plans to introduce heavy duty, low floor buses to replace the current fleet of liquefied natural gas (LNG) and clean diesel buses that began service in 1998. The new buses are scheduled to be in service beginning in 2013 and the full fleet conversion is scheduled to be complete in 2015.





Mrs. Althea Ruby Jones Hillard was born in Allen, Texas February 26, 1914. Her family moved to Sherman, Texas when she was three months old, and remained there until her father passed, December 21, 1930. She graduated from Fred Douglas High School in May 1930.

In order to live a better life and have more opportunities, her mother moved to Dallas, Texas, in 1931. They joined St. John Missionary Baptist Church in 1931; at the time Rev. R.T. Andrews was the Pastor.

Immediately the family became involved with certain ministries. Mrs. Hillard played the piano for church school; her mother joined the Deaconess Board, and her sister, Orneice, being nine years younger than Althea was with children her age.

Mrs. Hillard was told about a job downtown at a Department Store, A. Harris & Co. which was an enjoyable experience. She met a customer, Mrs. Mary Key, who was married to a dentist. Mrs. Key said that Althea was a very nice person and with her personality, she would do well in her husband's office and he could teach Althea to be a nice Dental Assistant. She began to work, caught on very quickly and worked four years with the Keys before they moved to Cleveland Ohio. Then there was another Dentist who asked Mrs. Hillard to work with him. That job lasted 35 years. Mrs. Hillard stated, "Dr. E.H. Browne, was very nice to

work with. I entered El Centro Community College in a Dental Assistant Program and completed it, there was a lady that sold Dental Instruments and invited me to come join "Dallas County Dental Assistant Society" (DCDAS). Immediately, I was elected to be the Sunshine Chairperson, from there each year I advanced to other offices until I became President-being interested to advance I began attending the State meetings, that met in San Antonio and still does, they meet every May, I went up in the Chairs and finally became Texas Dental Assistants President (TDA).

I began to attend National meetings, Chicago, Louisiana, Las Vegas, and other places.

In 2010, I received my 25-year Pin as a Past President-Silver Star. I am still active in local and State meetings."

In 1986, St. John Missionary Baptist Church lost two Deacons (by death) ten days apart. Being Financial Secretary, Mrs. Hillard worked with them every Sunday, John W. Roland and Oscar Branch. During that time, Dr. Manuel Scott was the pastor. She approached him and suggested a Scholarship Fund. HE said GO FOR IT! In May 2009 the Branch, Roland-Hillard Educational Scholarship (formerly known as Branch-Roland Scholarship) celebrated 22 years of giving to graduating High School Seniors since it's inception in 1986, one hundred thirty


