


God is able to help us move beyond our fear into our victory. We have to be willing to let Him help us and we have to acknowledge that we need God's help. However, we tend

As proof of Christ's self-sacrificing attitude, Paul quoted from Psalm 69:9 - "The reproaches of them that reproached thee are fallen upon Me." Christ truly did bear the reproaches of ungodly men (Romans 15:3). Jesus bore the constant insults of unbelievers during His life and death. He bore them patiently because He determined not to please Himself. Having drawn encouragement for Christians from

Christ's example as foretold in the Psalm, Paul wrote more broadly of encouragement drawn from scriptures (Romans 15:4). As Christians with a settled assurance in God's word, we gain patience because we are convinced that what God has promised, He will do. One who stands in this assurance will certainly gain patience and experience comfort.

As Paul prays in verses 5 and 6, he expresses his desire that God would grant like-mindedness or unity. Paul referred to God as "the God of patience and consolation." "Patience" means endurance under pressure; "consolation" is encour-

agement or comfort. God is indeed the source of endurance and encouragement, but He dispenses them through His word. One who neglects Bible study cannot expect to have strength to endure under pressure or to be encouraged in the changing circumstances of life. When believers are drawn to God through the resources of His word, they also are drawn to one another. They become "likeminded one toward another according to Christ Jesus" (Romans 15:5). Like-mindedness after the pattern of Christ will enhance the effectiveness of the church. Paul prayed that the Romans might "with one

mind and one mouth glorify God" (Romans 15:6). Despite their continued differences in diet and observances, they could lay these aside to worship God united. "One mind (accord) and one mouth" emphasizes unity of purpose, which enables Christians to glorify God together. The highest privilege of the church anyway is to glorify God (Romans 15:6), which means to esteem or magnify Him through word and action. God is especially honored before men when we display love for our fellow believers (St. John 13:35).

To Be Equal: Octavia Spencer Wins Best Supporting Actress Oscar

Octavia Spencer brought the gilded audience at Hollywood's Kodak Theater to its feet Sunday night as she tearfully accepted the Academy Award for Best Actress in a Supporting role for her portrayal of Minny Jackson, a proud, outspoken maid in the Oscar-nominated movie, "The Help." Ms. Spencer, whose break-out role in "The Help," comes after years of mostly small parts in dozens of films, was overwhelmed with gratitude for the honor and thanked Steven Spielberg, her home state of Alabama and her fellow cast members, including Viola Davis who was nominated for Best Actress.

Spencer becomes only the 13th African American to win an acting Oscar in the 84-year history of the Academy Awards and just the sixth Black woman since Hattie McDaniel took home the Best Supporting Actress Oscar in 1940 for her role in "Gone with the Wind." We congratulate Octavia Spencer for her achievement. Her performance in "The Help" sheds new light on what life was like for Black women domestics in the South during the dawning days of the 1960s civil rights movement. The dignity and strength of the characters she and Viola Davis portray give new perspective to the unique struggles of African American women, and demonstrate the overwhelming power of faith, community and sisterhood.

We are also encouraged by the Academy Award winning success of previous Black women actors, including Hattie McDaniel, Halle Berry, Mo'Nique, Jennifer Hudson,

and Whoopi Goldberg, who have broken the Oscar color and gender barriers. But, this small sorority of Black women Oscar winners makes it clear that Hollywood has a long way to go in diversifying the content of its story-lines as well as the color of its characters, especially for African American women. It might help if the Academy diversified its own ranks. More than 90 percent of its members are white, more than 75 percent are male.

While there have been several movies in recent years like "Red Tails," "Hotel Rwanda," "Malcolm X," "Glory" and "Invictus" (about the life of Nelson Mandela), that cast black men in heroic roles, there have been few films about black women heroines.



(AP) -- Peyton Manning's record-breaking run as quarterback of the Indianapolis Colts ended Wednesday, when owner Jim Irsay announced the team would release its best player. "We all know that nothing lasts forever," Manning said. "Times change, circumstances change, and that's the reality of playing in the NFL." "This has not been easy for Jim," Manning said, "and this has certainly not been easy for me." The 35-year-old Manning will become a free agent, and is expected to generate interest from a half-dozen or so NFL clubs, provided he's healthy. Manning is coming off a series of operations to his neck and missed all of last season when his team's record, not coincidentally, plummeted to 2-14.

DALLAS MAYOR MIKE RAWLINGS ANNOUNCES GOAL TO RECRUIT 150 COMPANIES TO PROVIDE 400 SUMMER INTERNSHIPS FOR DALLAS PUBLIC AND CHARTER SCHOOL STUDENTS

Stating "there is no greater contribution a city can make than educating our children," Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings today announced a goal to recruit 150 Dallas businesses to support 400 summer internships as part of the Mayor Mike Rawlings Intern Fellows program. The eight-week internships will give Dallas public and charter high school students an opportunity to soak up real-world knowledge and eye-opening experiences at Dallas' top corporations, large non-profits and legal and professional firms.

Mayor Rawlings was joined at Dallas City Hall by representatives from AT&T, Education is Freedom, the Dallas Regional Chamber, Dallas ISD, Uplift Education, Commit and participating companies, which range in size from small businesses to Fortune 500 companies to nonprofit organizations and hospitals.

The businesses are asked to pay the interns the recommended rate of \$9 per hour, provide a basic job for each intern working 20 or 40 hours per week, and to assist with transportation costs (if needed). Companies are asked to provide students an opportunity for job shadowing of executives and to observe a company's operations. Probably one of the most important aspects is to set up one-on-one conversations with managers and executives regarding college and career prospects and to share information about the company's industry and variety of career options.

Businesses and organizations that have responded to the Mayor's call for the first time include ANSIRA; Artizone LTD; AZAR Foundation; Corinth Properties; Dallas Convention Center; Dalton Tile; Eastfield College; Energy Future Holdings; Ernst & Young; Gold Metal Recyclers; HNTB; Junior Achievement of Dallas; Kimberly-Clark; Promise House, Inc.; Ryan LLC; SouthFair Community Development Corporation; Todd A. Williams Family Foundation; University of North Texas System; University of Texas at Dallas; UT Southwestern Medical Center; W.H.O. Foundation (Women Helping Others); and Wells Fargo.

Businesses and organizations that have had interns in the past and are back supporting the program include ALON USA, Andrews Kurth LLP, Brinker International, Capital One, Children's Medical Center of Dallas, Citi, CitySquare, Dallas Convention & Visitors Bureau, Education is Freedom, Essilor, Haynes and Boone, HKS Inc., Hunt Consolidated, JPMorgan Chase, Oncor, Parkland Health & Hospital System, PricewaterhouseCoopers, Richland College, Southcross Energy, Texas Health Partners, Texas Instruments, The Beck Group and Weber Shandwick.

The deadline for companies to sign up is April 1. On April 4, human resource professionals from the participating companies will interview students at a real-life job fair to be held at the Dallas Sheraton Hotel. The eight-week internships will begin on June 6 and will conclude with the Mayor Rawlings' Intern Fellows celebratory luncheon on Friday, August 3. To facilitate and administer the program, the Mayor's Office and the Dallas Regional Chamber are partnering with Education is Freedom (EIF), a college access and success program based in Dallas.

The program is open to students 16 and older who are sophomores or juniors at any Dallas public or charter high school who are eligible to work in the U.S. Students must have a minimum 2.5 GPA and solid attendance record and must participate in at least one full day of training prior to beginning their sessions. The comprehensive training sessions focus upon office etiquette, communication skills, professional dress, financial planning and other topics.

All soy products are made from soybeans, mostly grown here in the United States. You can buy whole soybeans dried or canned, or in the produce section or freezer aisle as edamame, the common name for soybeans picked before they're fully mature.

Feel Secure! DART Has Increased Security Personnel

Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) has added a uniformed security presence on every train with a combination of police, fare enforcement officers and armed security guards. DART operates up to 42 trains, in sets of two or three rail cars, during its peak service. The uniformed staff will be on the vehicles during regular operating hours.

The commitment includes 140 personnel. This was done by adjusting staff assignments and the use of overtime and security guards. DART has used armed security guards for several years in a variety of capacities. No end date has been established for this new initia-

tive.

This is the latest in a series of steps taken by the agency to increase the visibility of police and other uniformed security staff following some recent incidents that have happened on agency property. These actions include sweeps of stations by DART Police and stepped up enforcement of the agency's Code of Conduct in an effort to maintain system safety and the passenger's sense of security. While DART has long enjoyed excellent working relationships with law enforcement agencies within its service area, the agency and those agencies are exploring ways to enhance that

cooperation. DART already participates on a number of joint security and safety efforts with those agencies.

DART continues adding closed circuit cameras at all light rail stations. That project is scheduled for completion in March. The agency will begin a pilot program for cameras on trains later this year. In addition, the new bus fleet scheduled to be put in service later this year, will feature vehicles with cameras. Also this spring customers will be able to send text messages to DART Police to report suspicious behavior. This is in addition to calling 911 or 214-928-6300.

NOWITZKI HAS 28 FOR MAVS IN 95-85 WIN OVER KNICKS

(AP) — Dirk Nowitzki scored 28 points and bailed out the Mavericks after they lost the lead following a 7½-minute scoreless stretch to start the fourth quarter, and Dallas beat the New York Knicks 95-85 on Tuesday night.

Nowitzki made a 14-foot fadeaway jumper with 4:34 left, starting a game-clinching, 14-0 run by the Mavericks in which their All-Star forward scored nine points.

That was after the Knicks, who had trailed by as many as 19, scored the first 15 points of the fourth quarter and went ahead 78-77 when Amare Stoudemire penetrated to make a shot. It was their first lead since scoring the game's first four points, and didn't last long.

Stoudemire had 26 points.

Tyson Chandler, who got his NBA championship ring from the Mavericks before the game, had six points, eight rebounds and a technical foul.

When Nowitzki made a short baseline shot

with 2:27 left to stretch the lead to 88-78, Chandler was standing at the scorer's table waiting to get back into the game. He was motioning for a travel call against his former teammate, and even tapped an official running by before Knicks coach Mike D'Antoni called timeout.

Chandler got called for the technical during the stoppage in play, and Nowitzki made the free throw.

Rodrigue Beaubois added 18 points for the Mavericks, while Jason Kidd had 15 points and six assists.

Jeremy Lin had 14 points and seven assists.

When the Knicks beat the Mavericks nearly 2½ weeks ago before the All-Star break, Lin had 28 points and 14 assists. That ended a six-game winning streak for Dallas, and started the stretch of six losses in eight games before Tuesday night.

The Mavs, who lost at Oklahoma City on Monday night, wrap up a stretch of nine games in 12 days with three road games in three nights, starting Thursday in Phoenix.

Dallas fans were cheering loudly with 13 seconds left in the third quarter when Nowitzki, with JR Smith pushing against him, finally moved around and drew the foul while driving toward the basket. Nowitzki made both free throws to

make it 77-63, but the Mavericks didn't score again until he dominated in the game-turning spurt.

The Mavericks played without starting center Brendan Haywood and post player Brandan Wright.

Coach Rick Carlisle said Haywood still has some swelling after rolling his ankle on the opening possession in the loss at Oklahoma City, but hoped the center would be back soon. Wright missed his third consecutive game after a concussion.

Carlisle said Haywood will travel with the team for the three games in three nights. Wright will not make that trip.

Haywood became the Mavs starter after Chandler left the Mavericks in free agency during the off-season.

In a short ceremony before the game, Chandler became the last player from the Mavericks' 2010-11 team to get his NBA championship ring.

Chandler got a \$56 million, four-year contract with the Knicks in a sign-and-trade that was part of a three-team deal at the start of training camp.

A video of Chandler's highlights from last season was shown before the 7-foot-1 center got a nice ovation from Mavericks fans. Carlisle and owner Mark Cuban presented him his ring.

of the 2010 draft. The Mavs wanted to keep Lin but they already had Jason Kidd, Barea and Rodrigue Beaubois under contract.

"Obviously, look at the roster," Lin said. "There wasn't much space a year and a half ago. They've done a great job of putting together a championship team. That's why they won the championship. For me, I thought at that time Golden State might be a better fit for me. But I'm still very thankful."

Based on his play with the Mavs in summer league, Lin was signed by the Warriors prior to training camp last season and spent his rookie season with the club.

"When playing in the summer league you're not playing for one team, unless you're under contract, but even then you're not playing for one team," he said. "Any time you step on the floor everyone is watching. My goal was to play as hard as I could. I didn't want to put too much pressure on myself, give my best effort onto God and let everything fall where it may."




