IN CUBA, PRESIDENT OBAMA CALLS FOR BURYING 'LAST REMNANT' OF COLD WAR

(AP) -- Capping his remarkable visit to Cuba, President Barack Obama on Tuesday declared an end to the "last remnant of the Cold War in the Americas" and openly urged the Cuban people to pursue a more democratic future for this communist nation 90 miles from the Florida coast.

With Cuban President Raul Castro watching from a balcony, Obama said the government should not fear citizens who speak freely and vote for their own leaders. And with Cubans watching on tightly controlled state television, Obama said they would be the ones to determine their country's future, not the United States.

"Many suggested that I come here and ask the people of Cuba to tear something down," Obama said. "But I'm appealing to the young people of Cuba who will lift something up, build something new."

Later, Obama sat beside Castro at a baseball game between Cuba's beloved national team and the Tampa Bay Rays of America's Major League Baseball. Leaving the game early for Jose Marti International Airport, Obama was met there again by Castro who walked him to Air Force One.

Lincoln Boys Basketball Team Celebrates State Championship

"Comeback kids" aptly describes the Lincoln Tigers weekend in San Antonio earlier this month at the 2016 UIL State Basketball Championship. The team came from behind to win both games on their way to claiming a state title.

In their Friday night game against La Marque, the Tigers found themselves down nine at halftime. The Tigers came back to win the game 62-59, which advanced them to the state championship game the following day against Silsbee.

Then, against Silsbee, the Tigers came back from a 15-point deficit to win the 2016 4A title. Lincoln Head Boys Basketball Coach Cedric Patterson says his team's "refuse-to-lose" attitude is the reason his team could recover from such deficits to win a state championship.

This year's Lincoln roster added the school's fourth state title in the school's history. The Tigers claimed their last title in 2002 when they finished the season 40-0. That team featured a college-bound cast of talent, including Chris Bosh of the Miami Heat.

An even larger testament to the 2016 team's character is that the team is the first in more than 20 years to claim a state title with double-digit losses. The Tigers entered post-season play with 14 losses before battling their way to the big dance in San Antonio.

The Tigers were led by guard Kortrijk Miles, a junior, who tallied 28 points and 11 rebounds in the team's win against Silsbee.

Miles, along with teammates Kennedy Milton and Jabari Richardson, were named to the Class 4A 2016 UIL State Tournament Team selected by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. Miles was named Most Valuable Player.

News You Ought to Know

(AP) - After years of anti-American posturing by its leader, Argentina has a new president whose outstretched hand has been eagerly accepted by the United States. President Barack Obama on Wednesday rewarded the South American nation with a state visit aimed at keeping that promising trajectory on track. Obama has made no secret of his preference for Argentine President Mauricio Macri over his left-leaning predecessor, Cristina Fernandez, whose meandering missives were a source of frequent frustration and eye-rolling in the White House. So Obama was all too glad to see her replaced in December by Macri, who has affably accepted U.S. help with his mission to modernize Argentina's struggling economy.

(AP) - Refugees and migrants in Greece staged protests Wednesday at the country's border with Macedonia and on islands near the Turkish coast, with officials still unsure when an international agreement to reduce migration will take full effect.

Several hundred protesters camped out at the border disrupted food distribution by charities in the sprawling tent camp that has sprouted near the village of Idomeni and demanded the border be reopened.

Belgian Authorities Hunt Brussels Bombing Suspect

(AP) -- Belgian authorities searched Wednesday for a man pictured at the Brussels airport with two apparent suicide bombers, amid growing suggestions that the bombings of the Brussels airport and subway were the work of the same Islamic State cell that attacked Paris last year.

Several people who may be linked to the Brussels attacks were still on the loose and the country's threat alert remained at its highest level, meaning there was danger of an imminent attack, said Paul Van Tigchelt, head of Belgium's terrorism threat body. The attacks killed 34 people, including three suicide bombers, and injured 270 others, authorities said.

Belgium began three days of mourning, and government offices, schools and residents held a moment of silence to honor the dead, marking the moment in a mood of defiance mixed with anxiety that others involved in the attacks are still be at large.

Belgian prosecutor Frederic Van Leeuw identified two of the Brussels attackers as brothers - Ibrahim El Bakraoui, a suicide bomber at the airport, and Khalid El Bakraoui, who targeted the subway.

The Islamic State group, which was behind the Paris attacks, has also claimed responsibility for the Brussels bombings.

BLACK WOMEN IN THE PEACE MOVEMENT

Black women in the international peace movement.

Some words seem rarely mentioned in this highly toxic political season. We've heard about bombs and walls, but very little about peace. One is almost tempted, when some of the candidates are speaking, to burst into song - give peace a chance. In this Women's History Month, it makes sense to reflect on women and the peace movement, and especially on the African American women who have been peace activists and have played a significant role in this movement.

The Women's International League of Peace and Freedom (WILPF) was founded in 1915 in the midst of World War I. Its first chair, Hull House's Jane Addams, cared deeply about world disarmament. Early on, though, there were criticisms of WILPF and the peace movement because African American were too often invisible. In a book poignantly titled, *No Peace Without Freedom, Race and WILPF*, Joyce Blackwell writes about tensions within the path breaking peace organization. In a similar book, "A Band of Noble Women: Racial Politics in the Women's Peace Movement," Melinda Plastas writes that African American women combined the effects of race, gender and war, and "demanded a place for

was another of the African American women involved in WILPF. She led the Washington, D.C. chapter, and also served as a vice president of the organization for two terms.

Those women - as do some of our non-African American sisters like Media Benjamin and Arandhati Roy - come to mind in the middle of this raucous political season. Sane, calm voices are missing in these presidential debates. We are also missing a future focus that takes the futility of increasing militarism into consideration. With the immigration crisis sparked by conflict in Syria, the violence maintained by ISIS, unrest in the Middle East, and tension with Russia, not to mention the number of US troops still in Afghanistan and Iraq, wouldn't it be appropriate for us to hear about alternatives to militarism.

That brings me to California Congresswoman Barbara Lee, the only person who had the courage to oppose President George W. Bush's push for military action after September 11, 2001. She appropriately asked whether our country was rushing into war. Subsequent events suggest that we did rush - "weapons of mass destruction" were never found. Many of us are quite familiar with Barbara Lee's peace activism, but far fewer of us know much about Mary Church Terrell

and Addie Hunton. While African American peace activists were few in the WILPF early days, their contributions were significant and, more importantly, they paved the way for activists like Barbara Lee to advocate a peace agenda and a peace budget.

Those who profit from the military industrial complex seem so welded to the notion of war that they won't give peace a chance. And they'll take war however they can - at home, as police departments are increasingly militarized (do we really need tanks in city streets), or abroad, where it is easy to create an enemy. Black women's history of peace activism should be lifted up this month, especially the work of Mary Church Terrell and Barbara Lee.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the prominent theme in this section of the Apostle John's presentation, for without the resurrection of Christ, the grand Gospel message would indeed be incomplete (I Corinthians 15:1-4). In chapter 20 of John's presentation, he records the various appearances of the Saviour after He was raised from the dead; thus, these appearances confirmed that Christ indeed had emerged from the grave in triumphant glory!

This same theme of Christ's triumphant victory over sin, death, and the grave dominated the powerful preaching of the Apostles in the book of

ST. JOHN 20:1-10

CHRIST'S TRIUMPHANT VICTORY OVER DEATH

Acts (Acts 2:24-36; 3:15; 4:10; 5:30; 10:40; 13:34). As I contemplated while reading this chapter, one serious prevailing thought brought gratitude to my heart: "I am grateful that all members of the blessed Trinity were engaged in the resurrection of Christ (Romans 6:4; St. John 10:17-18; Romans 8:11). It is awfully instructive that chapter 20:1 begins with the reference to "the first day of the week". Christ's resurrection on the "first day of the week" marks a new beginning, for Christ had finished His work of redemption, in relation to the Old Testament, as the Sabbath stood as a reminder of God's consummate work in the old creation (Genesis 2:3).

In verse 1, the supreme devotion of Mary Magdalene is brought to bear, for she never forgot the fact that Christ had delivered her from the oppression of being in bondage to Satan. She was not only seen at the

cross, but the first at His grave. Her deep and abiding love is displayed, for she never forgot that Christ expelled seven demons from her (St. Luke 8:2). There is an amazing phenomenon that takes place in verse 1: "the stone had been taken from the sepulcher." According to Matthew 28:2, the stone had been removed by an angel; thus, this action proved that God had intervened.

Having perceived that the stone had been removed, Mary Magdalene tells Peter and John (v. 2). In her excitement, she tells others about her discovery! Now, anxious and excited, both disciples went to the sepulcher, with John out-running Peter (vs. 3-4). In verse 5, we see the anxious expectation of the Apostle John; however, as he inspects, he doesn't immediately go into the sepulcher. On the other hand, as the curious Peter arrives, he goes into the

sepulcher (v. 6). In verses 6 and 7, the Apostle John supplies us with ample and sufficient evidence that Christ was victorious over the grave, having left His grave clothes in the sepulcher! With all of the ample evidence at hand, John could only conclude that Christ had risen from the dead (v. 8).

Having heard Christ speak of His resurrection for three years, these disciples did not comprehend the message (v. 9). Having received an eyewitness account of the resurrection, the disciples went to their homes. These disciples went to their physical or earthly homes after receiving the grand message of Christ's resurrection. But, before we go to our heavenly home, we need to spread the message that "Christ lives today." And should someone ask us how we know He lives, we can confidently say - "He lives within my heart." Yes, He lives, oh yes, He lives!

Presidents Obama, Castro Watching, Rays beat Cuban Team

(AP) - When Kevin Kiermaier slid into home for the Tampa Bay Rays' first run of the day, President Barack Obama flung his arms wide in the sign for "safe."

Then he turned to his left and shook the hand of his seatmate and Cuban counterpart, Raul Castro.

The scene was a remarkable milestone for sports diplomacy as the two presidents try to set aside more than 50 years of Cold War hostility during which about the only thing the countries agreed on was a shared love of baseball.

Obama and Castro even joined in when fans were doing "the wave."

In the landmark game, the first visit by a major league team to the communist island since 1999, the Rays beat the Cuban national team 4-1 on Tuesday.

But the day will be remembered less for the final score than for the two men sitting in the front row at Estadio Latinoamericano, the last stop on Obama's trip to Cuba this week in a bid to further pave the road toward normalized relations.

The near-capacity crowd roared as Obama and Castro



entered and walked toward their seats right behind home plate, waving to fans and greeting other dignitaries.

Chants of "Raul! Raul!" broke out.

Rarely has so much pomp and circumstance accompanied an exhibition game. Former All-Stars Derek Jeter and Dave Winfield and Major League

Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred were among the president's greeters. Secretary of State John Kerry was also in the VIP box, as well as several of Cuba's highest officials.

Before the first pitch, Rays players walked over from the dugout to say hello and

passed flowers and small Cuban flags through the netting to first lady Michelle Obama and first daughter Sasha.

"Appreciate you guys," said the president, clad in a white shirt and sunglasses. Castro was slightly more formal in a blazer.

Obama shared an extended handshake with ace pitcher Chris Archer, who once was a minor leaguer for the Chicago Cubs. He gave Obama, a White Sox fan, a glove owned by Moore.

The stadium observed a minute of silence before the game in memory of the Brussels attacks.

THE CINCINNATI BENGALS SELECT COREY COLEMAN DURING MOCK DRAFT



In a mock draft last week, the Cincinnati Bengals selected Corey Coleman as their pick at

No. 24. Corey is a 5-11, 190 lb junior wide receiver from Baylor University.

If Corey is drafted by the Bengals "he said that he doesn't want to be a project. During the NFL combine in Indianapolis last week, Coleman said that he wants to be that guy that can come in and play off the jump. If it's on punt return, or on kick return. He doesn't want them to feel like they have to teach him for two years. That has been the Bengals' stance on rookie receivers. Wherever he ends up, Coleman believes he will adapt quickly.

In 2015, Coleman caught 74 passes for 1,363 yards (18.4 average) and 20 TDs.

And In December 2015 Coleman won the first Biletnikoff Award for Baylor. He became the first Baylor player honored as the nation's

top receiver. He is just getting back to running again following a sports hernia surgery in December, and ran the 40 at his pro day on March 16. He could post a sub-4.4 time.

He was a top performer in the drills he participated in at the combine: bench press, vertical jump and broad jump.

Baylor coach Art Briles says: "He's a passionate, tough individual, and a lot of times that doesn't go hand in hand with receivers. But he's got skill, speed, versatility and toughness. He's definitely got it all."

NFL.com says: "Dangerous vertical talent with the ability to get over the top of defenders who fail to recognize his blazing quickness off the line of scrimmage. Coleman can get instant separation to create favorable passing windows and is one of the top playmakers in this draft."

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In Cuba, President Obama calls for burying 'Last Remnant' of Cold War

They chatted in relaxed fashion, any awkwardness or tension apparently gone from the previous day's news conference that saw Castro hit with tough questions from U.S. reporters.

How quickly political change comes to Cuba, if at all, is uncertain. But the response from at least some Cubans was certain to be seen by Obama as validation of his belief

that restoring ties and facilitating more interactions between Cuba and the United States is more likely than continued estrangement to spur democracy.

"What the United States was doing was not working," Obama said. He reiterated his call for the U.S. Congress to lift the economic embargo on Cuba, calling it an "outdated burden on the Cuban people" - a condemnation that was enthusiastically

cheered by the crowd at Havana's Grand Theater.

The president's visit was a crowning moment in his and Castro's bold bid to restore ties after a half-century diplomatic freeze. While deep differences persist, officials from both countries are in regular contact, major U.S. companies are lining up to invest in Cuba, and travel restrictions that largely blocked Americans from visiting have been loosened.
