THE CITY OF LONG VIEW, TX PAYS TO END NEGOTIATIONS WITH NUGENT

(AP) - An East Texas city paid \$16,250 to end contract negotiations with controversial rocker Ted Nugent, who was under consideration as the headliner for Longview's Fourth of July celebration. Longview's payoff last month came after Nugent's earlier comments and song lyrics became an issue during a campaign swing with Texas gubernatorial candidate Greg Abbott.

In January, Nugent called President Barack Obama a "subhuman mongrel." The comments resurfaced when Nugent campaigned in February with Abbott, who said he did not endorse such language.

City spokesman Shawn Hara told the Longview News-Journal that the controversy surrounding Nugent was just one factor that led the city to call off negotiations. The amount paid was about half Nugent's performance fee.

"(There were) a variety of reasons. Cost, structure, is it the right musical act for this type of event - a city-sponsored, family-oriented overall event," Hara said. "They decided no, we don't want to move forward, it is not the right act for this. At that point we decided to end discussions."

Mayor Jay Dean said Nugent's act didn't fit with the family-oriented program the city wanted.

Keith Rothra, outgoing chairman of the Gregg County Republican Party, said he didn't buy the city's explanation that Nugent's comments were just one of several reasons they broke off talks.

"We have paid \$16,000 to Ted Nugent for political correctness," he said.

Abbott did not back away from inviting Nugent to campaign, but said he believed Nugent had recognized his language was wrong. His Democratic opponent, Wendy Davis, called his decision to campaign with Nugent "repulsive."

Nugent apologized after Gov. Rick Perry and U.S. Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky disavowed the remark about Obama. Perry had Nugent perform at his inauguration in 2007.

Nugent has also made comments in the past suggesting that immigrants in the country illegally should be treated like "indentured servants" until they earn citizenship.

Dear Editor,

A series of long-running studies have identified a troubling racial gap in breast cancer mortality rates. Research suggests that African-American women are on average 40 percent more likely to

die from breast cancer than Caucasian women.

The findings are jarring for all women, since we all have a vested interest in defeating breast cancer together. I, too, am considered high-risk and reducing that risk is important to me. That's one of the

reasons I'm vegan.

According to Dr. Jane Plant, a British scientist, cancer survivor, and author of The No-Dairy Breast Cancer Prevention Program, "Undoubtedly, the best anti-cancer diet would be to go completely vegan." Meat and dairy products are full of cholesterol, saturated fat, excess protein, hormones, and other harmful substances that increase breast cancer risk. But a vegan diet maximizes intake of foods that help us fight cancer—

fiber-packed grains and beans and phytochemical-packed fruits and vegetables.

March was celebrated as Women's History Month. And while women have made great strides in this country, there is still much that needs to be done to bring them on par with men in America, particularly in the area of equal pay for equal work.

It is neither fair nor prudent that we live in a society in which women earn approximately 80 percent of what men who are doing the exact same work are paid. In 2010, the last year for which data was compiled, the median income for a woman in America was

\$36,931 compared to \$47,715 for their male counterparts. This is simply unacceptable and must be changed.

The practice sends an appalling message to young women who are seeking professional careers. Are we saying to them that they are not as good as their male colleagues? As a society, are we suggesting to them that we place greater value on the work of men than we do on their work? This type of thinking is a relic of the past, and it must remain there.

When I was elected to Congress in 1992, I was the only female in the Texas Congressional delegation. In Washington, I became one of 48 women who were members of the House of Representatives. In the Senate there were seven women.

Today, our numbers have increased, and women chair many of the committees in the House and Senate where much of the work in the Congress is accom-

plished. There are presently 20 female Senators and 82 women in the House.

Having women in positions of leadership has made a significant difference in the way that the Congress functions. For the most part, women are less aggressive, and approach issues and policy questions with less acerbity than their male counterparts.

Women have made significant strides in business. Some of our largest corporations such as General Motors and Facebook have women in very senior positions. Yet, our corporate boardrooms remain bastions of male dominance.

In his statement proclaiming Women's History Month, President Obama stated that our nation's history has been enhanced by the achievements of women. He wrote that women have, "led movements for social and economic justice, enriched our culture and charted bold directions in our foreign poli-

cy."

Iconic women such as Dorothy Height, who led the National Council of Negro Women, Adelfa Callejo, who fought for minority rights in Dallas, Lindy Boggs, who served our country as a distinguished member of the U.S. House of Representatives and as an ambassador, and so many others, have left a legacy of greatness that must be followed and honored.

Our remembrances of these women and others of monumental acclaim that are no longer with us must strengthen our resolve for even greater achievement. Future generations of women must be able to build upon the foundations that will be left for them.

The work for change must continue as long as women are victims of domestic abuse, physical assault in the military and depressed wages. Yes, we must celebrate women, but we must remain cognizant that the struggle for gender equality must not cease.

Obama Worse than George W. Bush on SBA Loans

The percentage is down sharply from 8.2% of overall SBA loan volume in fiscal 2008. By number of loans, black-owned small businesses got 2.3% of the federal agency's roughly 54,000 loans last year, down from 11% in 2008," the newspaper reported.

Major banks are encouraged to make SBA loans to small businesses for up to \$5 million, with the federal agency agreeing to cover as much as 85 percent of any loss.

Financial institutions share responsibility for the drop in loans to African Americans.

According to the Wall Street Journal, Bank of America made 1,400 SBA loans in fiscal 2007. For the latest fiscal year, however, that figure fell to just 247 borrowers. But the total loan amounts remain relatively unchanged, reaching \$40.2 million in 2007 to \$40.7 million for the last fiscal year.

That's part of a larger trend by banks coming out of a recession to favor larger deals over smaller ones. According to the SBA, their average loan is \$426,796, more than double the average of \$192,919 in 2005. That's problematic for African Americans because 80 percent of the loans to fund Black business are for \$150,000 or less.

The housing market decline has also had an adverse impact on African Americans.

Of course, everyone acknowledges that the Great Recession was a drag on business, both big and small. Other ethnic groups had a hard time

obtaining business loans in a depressed economy, but they are recovering at a faster rate than Blacks.

"This is the fallout from the recession and housing bust," J. Patrick Kelley, a deputy associate administrator of the SBA, told the Wall Street Journal. "The borrowers hardest hit...are the last to see a recovery come to them."

According to the SBA Office of Advocacy, Black business owners made up 49.9 percent of all minority owners in 2012. Asians made up 29.6 percent and Hispanics 10.3 percent. Overall, Blacks own 14.6 percent of U.S. businesses and women own 36 percent.

When it comes to Black businesses, there is good news and bad news. A Census Bureau press release, dated Feb. 8, 2011 stated:

"From 2002 to 2007, the number of black-owned businesses increased by 60.5 percent to 1.9 million, more than triple the national rate of 18.0 percent, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's Survey of Business Owners. Over the same period, receipts generated by black-owned businesses increased 55.1 percent to \$137.5 billion.

"Black-owned businesses continued to be one of the fastest growing segments of our economy, showing rapid growth in both the number of businesses and total sales during this time period," said Census Bureau Deputy Director Thomas Mesenbourg.

Now the bad news: Of the 1.9 mil-

lion Black-owned businesses, 1.8 million had no paid employees in 2007.

Because 82 percent of business startups, both large and small, require capital beyond the owners' personal assets, access to capital remains a major concern.

"Minority small business owners are disproportionately denied credit when they apply for it even after controlling for other variables such as business credit scores, personal wealth, and revenues. These findings hold true particularly for black and Hispanic business owners," according to an issue brief by the SBA.

The variation of home ownership can also be a factor.

"Home ownership may provide an important catalyst to small business growth, but it may also serve as a barrier to entry for prospective entrepreneurs," the SBA said. "For instance, business growth can bridge the wealth gap between minorities and non-minorities across gender. Among existing businesses, home ownership significantly decreases the probability of loan denials and can be critical to such growth."

According to Census data, 78.2 percent of business owners owned homes in 2012. Research shows that 72.6 percent of Whites own homes, 58.7 percent of Asians, 47.2 percent of Hispanics and 43.8 percent of Blacks.

Clearly, a number of factors contribute to whether Blacks own their own businesses. The SBA must play a stronger role in opening the doors for Blacks, not just "minorities."

When I interviewed Marie Johns, then the outgoing deputy secretary of the Small Business Administration, a year ago, she said the SBA does not separate figures by race, though it hopes to do so at some point.

Technically, she was correct in saying the SBA does not separate agency-wide figures by race. But the SBA's 8 (a) program figures can be broken down by race and that's where she was being disingenuous. I specifically asked her twice about the status of Black businesses under Obama and twice she was less than forthcoming.

Now, I know why: The Obama administration's record of guaranteeing loans to Black businesses is worse than it was under George W. Bush.

Yes, that was documented recently by the Wall Street Journal in its analysis of data for the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30.

"Black borrowers received 1.7% of the \$23.09 billion in total SBA loans.

Cesar Chavez Day Calls on Us to Unite

"We cannot seek achievement for ourselves and forget about progress and prosperity for our community...Our ambitions must be broad enough to include the aspirations and needs of others, for their sakes and for our own." Cesar Chavez

While it is commonly thought that the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s was by, of, and exclusively for the benefit of African Americans, the life and legacy of Cesar Chavez remind us of how much it touched the lives of our Hispanic brothers and sisters and oppressed people everywhere.

A Mexican-American who was born March 31, 1927 on a farm near Yuma, Arizona, Chavez and his family moved to California in 1938 to eke out a living like thousands of other overworked and underpaid migrant

farm workers in his community. But rather than tolerate the daily injustices heaped upon them, which also included forced child labor, sexual harassment of women workers and the use of pesticides harmful to both workers and consumers, Chavez devoted his life to organizing and improving the lives of migrant workers.

In 1962, he and Delores Huerta co-founded the United Farm Workers Union. Inspired by the non-violent examples of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Chavez embraced the philosophy of non-violent protest and employed such tactics as marches, boycotts and hunger strikes to garner mainstream support for the rights of migrant workers. In 1968, he fasted for 25 days for better wages and working conditions in the fields of California's San Joaquin Valley. Upon ending that strike by breaking bread with Senator Robert Kennedy, Chavez addressed his supporters, saying, "We are gathered here today, not so much to observe the end of the Fast, but because we are a family bound together in a common struggle for justice. We are a Union family celebrating our unity

and the non-violent nature of our movement."

Chavez's work and sacrifice inspired millions of people around the world, including Dr. King and National Urban League President Whitney M. Young, Jr. In 1969, towards the end of a 5-year strike and boycott for the rights of Mexican and Filipino grape workers, Young met with Chavez and his supporters in Delano, California. Young was moved to write a To Be Equal column in which he said, "I was inspired by their spirit and their faith in the face of the odds against them." He added, "Labor, by organizing the poor and the friendless, can help end poverty by protecting low-wage workers, and it can give the lie to those who happily proclaim the selfishness and prejudice of some unions."

Cesar Chavez died on April 23, 1993. Following Whitney Young's example, subsequent National Urban League leaders, me included, have continued to work in solidarity with the goals of the United Farm Workers and numerous other Latino civil rights organizations. I spoke at the National Council of La Raza confer-

ence last summer and attended part of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) conference last month. We are all united in many of our struggles, especially the fight to end income inequality and poverty. As an iconic labor leader and anti-poverty activist, Cesar Chavez would have likely also been an enthusiastic supporter of the National Urban League's current petition to raise the minimum wage and all of our work for jobs with living wages and fair benefits.

President Obama has proclaimed Chavez's birthday, March 31, as Cesar Chavez Day "to remember a man who made justice his life calling." We believe that the best way to honor Chavez's legacy is through service and a renewed commitment to end income inequality and poverty. Congress can do its part by raising the minimum wage now.

fact that God has indeed blessed His people with abundant blessings. In reading this psalm, I feel the urge to join the psalmist in Psalm 106:1-2, 48 as he exclaims: "Praise ye the Lord. David begins this psalm with praise as he proclaims "1Praise waiteth for thee, O God, in Sion: and unto thee shall the vow be performed. O thou that hearest

prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come" (vv. 1-2). David extols the Lord, for the Lord heard his prayer and forgave people's transgressions (vv. 3-4). Not only does David praise God for His redemption, but in verses 5-8, he praises God for His mighty acts in creation: "Which by His strength setteth fast the mountains; being girded with power: Which stilleth the noise of the seas, the noise of their waves, and the tumult of the people" vv. 6-7).

Because of the Lord's abundant blessings on the land, nature shouts for joy (vv. 9-13). David sites this evidence of the Lord's provision, "The pastures are

clothed with flocks; the valleys also are covered over with corn; they shout for joy, they also sing" (v. 13). Yes, we need to praise God everyday of our existence for His bountiful blessings, as the psalmist in Psalm 34:1-4 affirms: "I will bless the Lord at all times: His praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul shall make here boast in the Lord: the humble shall hear thereof, and be glad. O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together. I sought the Lord, and He heard me, and delivered me from all my fears."



IRS Has \$760 Million for People Who Have Not Filed a 2010 Income Tax Return

Refunds totaling almost \$760 million may be waiting for an estimated 918,600 taxpayers who did not file a federal income tax return for 2010, the Internal Revenue Service announced today. However, to collect the money, a return for 2010 must be filed with the IRS no later than Tuesday, April 15, 2014.

The IRS estimates that half the potential refunds for 2010 are more than \$571.

"Some people may not have filed because they had too little income to require filing a tax return even though they had taxes withheld from their wages or made quarterly estimated payments," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas. "In cases where a return was not filed, the law provides most taxpayers with a three-year window of opportunity for claiming a refund."

For 2010 returns, the window closes on April 15, 2014. The law requires that the return be properly addressed, mailed and postmarked by

that date. There is no penalty for filing a late return qualifying for a refund.

The IRS reminds taxpayers seeking a 2010 refund that their checks may be held if they have not filed tax returns for 2011 and 2012. In addition, the refund will be applied to any amounts still owed to the IRS or their state tax agency, and may be used to offset unpaid child support or past due federal debts such as student loans.

By failing to file a return, people stand to lose more than just their refund of taxes withheld or paid during 2010. In addition, many low-and-moderate income workers may not have claimed the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). For 2010, the credit is worth as much as \$5,666. The EITC helps individuals and families whose incomes are below certain thresholds. The thresholds for 2010 were:

- \$43,352 (\$48,362 if married filing jointly) for those with three or more qualifying children,
- \$40,363 (\$45,373 if married filing jointly) for people with two qualifying children,
- \$35,535 (\$40,545 if married filing jointly) for those with one qualifying child, and
- \$13,460 (\$18,470 if married filing jointly) for people without qualifying children.

Current and prior year tax forms and instructions are available on the Forms and Publications page of IRS.gov or by calling toll-free 800-TAX-FORM (800-829-3676).

Taxpayers who are missing Forms W-2, 1098, 1099 or 5498 for 2010, 2011 or 2012 should request copies from their employer, bank or other payer.

If these efforts are unsuccessful, taxpayers can get a free transcript showing information from these year-end documents by going to IRS.gov. Taxpayers can also file Form 4506-T to request a transcript of their tax return.

My Day: A Jewel in Hamilton Park

Earlier this year, the Dallas County Commissioners recognized and commended the Hamilton Park Community for preserving their historic "living" legacy. Thomas Jefferson, President of the Hamilton Park Civic League, and a resident for 57 years, accepted the resolution in open court with other outstanding residents attending. Hamilton Park is the first African American development in the City of Dallas. It is still viable today due solely to community leadership, raw pride, the first homeowners and their will to preserve their ownership heritage. A resolution was adopted, presented and signed by the county judge and commissioners.

I think a little bit of Hamilton Park resides in all African Americans. The resolution captures and says it best. The resolution appropriately

addresses the name; "The Hamilton Park Community is named for Dr. Richard T. Hamilton, a physician and African American civic leader. The community was dedicated in October 1953 and formally opened in May, 1954. By 1961, Hamilton Park was completed with 742 single-family dwellings, shopping center, churches, a park with a playground, swimming pool, tennis court and baseball diamond".

The initial purchase was a 233 acre site for an African American middle class community. At this time in our history African Americans could not purchase land in certain parts of American cities. That was the case in North Dallas. The Dallas County Resolution highlights their courage and vision by stating: "These determined African American men and women, some of whom were returning to Dallas having bravely served their country during World War II, ventured to North Dallas to purchase land and nurture a family-oriented community of two-parent households, with shared values, morals and traditions (a marriage certificate was required to purchase a home in Hamilton Park)". Most amazing, which is not in the resolution is a reflection, filled with pride,

from a devoted community member, who grew up in the community that there were on defaults on mortgages in this entire community.

Paragraph Five of the resolution says "Hamilton Park has been a jewel in North Dallas for nearly 60 years. Hamilton Park is known as a quiet, stable and responsible area with dedicated professionals, educators, clergyman, business owners, entertainers, scholars and blue collars workers. It has enriched this historic community through partnerships and collaborations with several non-profits, private corporations, and with the support of the Dallas Police Department to provide a safe community".

And finally the resolution concludes with the future; "In these changing times, the new generations guided by the teachings of their parents and mentors, continue to serve in a variety of community and civic roles throughout Dallas County and the world".
