

A Pope of the People

The selection of former Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio of Argentina as the new leader of the world's one billion Catholics is a welcomed event to those of us who believe that a central part of faith is work that uplifts people who are economically burdened and bruised.

By all accounts from those who are familiar with him and his work, the new pope is a profound intellectual who has avoided the regal trappings of office. Instead, he lived in a simple apartment and trav-

eled on public transportation while a senior church official in Argentina.

Once selected he quickly took the name of Saint Francis of Assisi, who was known for his work with people who had little wealth, but great faith. Legend has it that once while praying he heard a voice that said "go Francis and repair my house."

Born in 1182, Saint Francis founded the Franciscan order whose members were devoted to the service of others, particularly those who found themselves in need. His life was one that many priests throughout the history of the church have attempted to emulate for its depth of belief and its vast charity.

A fan of soccer in his native country, Pope Francis refused to be driven in a chauffeured limousine and prepared his own meals. He is the first Jesuit Pope and is also the first non-European Pope in 1200 years.

I believe that Pope Francis will be inclusive, that he will seek more diversity in the

leadership of the church and that he will place greater emphasis on the development of the faith in South America and Africa, two continents where the church's population continues to grow.

According to the Pew Research Center, the five countries with the highest numbers of Catholics are Brazil (126 m), Mexico (96 m), the Philippines (75.5 m), the United States (75.3 m) and Italy (49 m). There are 31 million Catholics in Argentina, the Pope's land of birth. Thirty-nine percent of the world's Catholics live in Latin America and the Caribbean. No other part of the world has a larger percentage.

While serving as a Cardinal in Argentina, Pope Francis spontaneously washed and kissed the feet of twelve patients ravaged with HIV/AIDS during a hospital visit. He said to those with him that he was not one to forget the "sick and the poor." Certainly, he will prove himself to be a pope of the people.


The Volunteer of the Decade Award was presented to Eileen Lavine to honor her continuing work on the Dallas Marathon Health & Fitness Expo.

ST. JOHN 20:1-10 - CHRIST'S TRIUMPHANT VICTORY OVER DEATH

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the prominent theme in this section of the Apostle John's presentation, for without the resurrection of Christ, the grand.

The gospel message would indeed be incomplete (I Corinthians 15:1-4). In chapter 20 of John's presentation, he records the various appearances of the Saviour after He was raised from the dead; thus, these appearances confirmed that Christ indeed had emerged from the grave in triumphant glory!

This same theme of Christ's triumphant victory over sin, death, and the grave dominated the powerful preaching of the Apostles in the book of Acts (Acts 2:24-36; 3:15; 4:10; 5:30; 10:40; 13:34). As I contemplated while reading this chapter, one serious prevailing thought brought gratitude to my heart: "I am grateful that all members of the blessed Trinity were engaged in the resurrection of Christ" (Romans 6:4; St. John 10:17-18; Romans 8:11). It is awfully instructive that chapter 20:1 begins with the reference to "the first day of the week".

Christ's resurrection on the "first day of the week" marks a new beginning, for Christ had finished His work of redemption, in relation to the Old Testament, as the Sabbath stood as a reminder of God's consummate work in the old creation (Genesis 2:3).

In verse 1, the supreme devotion of Mary Magdalene is brought to bear, for she never forgot the fact that Christ had

delivered her from the oppression of being in bondage to Satan. She was not only seen at the cross, but the first at His grave. Her deep and abiding love is displayed, for she never forgot that Christ expelled seven demons from her (St. Luke 8:2). There is an amazing phenomenon that takes place in verse 1: "the stone had been taken from the sepulcher." According to Matthew 28:2, the stone had been removed by an angel; thus, this action proved that God had intervened.

Having perceived that the stone had been removed, Mary Magdalene tells Peter and John (v. 2). In her excitement, she tells others about her discovery! Now, anxious and excited, both disciples went to the sepulcher, with John outrunning Peter (vs. 3-4). In verse 5, we see the anxious expectation of the Apostle John; however, as he inspects, he doesn't immediately go into the sepulcher. On the other hand, as the curious Peter arrives, he goes into the

sepulcher (v. 6). In verses 6 and 7, the Apostle John supplies us with ample and sufficient evidence that Christ was victorious over the grave, having left His grave clothes in the sepulcher! With all of the ample evidence at hand, John could only conclude that Christ had risen from the dead (v. 8).

Having heard Christ speak of His resurrection for three years, these disciples did not comprehend the message (v. 9). Having received an eyewitness account of the resurrection, the disciples went to their homes. These disciples went to their physical or earthly homes after receiving the grand message of Christ's resurrection. But, before we go to our heavenly home, we need to spread the message that "Christ lives today." And should someone ask us how we know He lives, we can confidently say - "He lives within my heart." Yes, He lives, oh yes, He lives!

To Be Equal: The Empowerment of Women

"So please ask yourself: What would I do if I weren't afraid? And then go do it." Sheryl Sandberg

In a stroke of marketing genius befitting the Chief Operating Officer of the social media phenomenon, Facebook, Sheryl Sandberg chose Women's History Month to launch her new book, Lean In, and begin a national dialogue about "Women, Work and the Will to Lead." Ruth Standish Baldwin was a co-founder of the National Urban League more than a century ago and the inclusion and empower-

ment of women has been one of our most important priorities. Today, Former Labor Secretary Alexis Herman serves as Senior Vice Chair on our Board, and almost half of our 95 local Affiliate CEOs are women. For that reason, we applaud Sandberg for her new book and are proud to join in the conversation.

We all know that historic barriers of gender discrimination, as well as the responsibilities of bearing and caring for children have made it more difficult for women to balance work and family. But Sandberg contends that women too often "hold ourselves back in ways big and small, by lacking self-confidence, by not raising our hands, and by pulling back when we should be leaning in."

Lean In appears to be written by and for women for whom the path to executive leadership has always been a realistic, if somewhat difficult, journey. But, the book has sparked another conversation in Black America about how women of color have always had to "lean in" to overcome the dual hur-

dles of racial and gender bias. Consider how Harriet Tubman leaned into the face of death to lead a thousand slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad. Or how Sojourner Truth stood up and boldly asked "Ain't I a woman?" at the 1851 Ohio Women's Rights Convention. Consider how Fannie Lou Hamer who was "sick and tired of being sick and tired," fought for African American voting rights as an organizer of the 1964 Mississippi Freedom Summer and Vice Chair of the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party. Or how a quiet seamstress named Rosa Parks, leaned in, sat down on a bus and lit the fuse of the civil rights movement.

Decrying the lack of women at the top of corporate America, Sandberg does admit that, "The gap is even worse for women of color, who hold just 4 percent of top corporate jobs, 3 percent of board seats and 5 percent of congressional seats."

But, with rising numbers of Black women in college, preparing themselves for suc-

cessful careers, clearly a lack of drive or ambition is not the problem.

Lean In urges women to "Sit at the Table," "Seek and Speak Your Truth," "Don't Leave Before You Leave," and "Make Your Partner a Real Partner." These recommendations present a road map of success that has obviously worked for Sheryl Sandberg. But, it is largely the lack of support, the pressures of single parenthood, and systemic racial and gender discrimination that continue to keep women of color from getting a foot in the corporate door. The empowerment of all women depends on closing the wage gap, protecting women's reproductive rights, providing greater workplace flexibility, having more women in non-traditional professions like science and engineering, and supporting common sense measures such as the Violence Against Women Act which was recently reauthorized and signed into law by President Obama.

If men and women lean in together, we can foster gender equity and a better America.

Black Voters are Back in Style

The push for the Black vote is on. Black folks are back in style. Black is beautiful – again. Since the last election, the mantra has become, "Get more 'minorities' to vote Republican" and Black voters are at the top of that list. Yes, they want to increase their Hispanic support, but the African American vote is ripe and ready to be harvested by just the right message given by just the right messengers. Wow, that sounds familiar. Don't Democrats have that same strategy? They trot out a couple of spokespersons to soothe us with convincing platitudes that have kept us in their corner for decades.

Now the Republican sleeping giant has finally awoken, and it is ready to do whatever it takes to regain Black voters' confidence and support. They have launched a new Black political role model into the limelight; he is an icon among Black people, a hero, Horatio Alger personified, and his name is Dr. Ben Carson. He was the darling of the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) con-

vention and is the new love of Sean Hannity's life. Fresh off his in-your-face, Mr. President, speech at the national prayer breakfast, Carson has decided to quit medicine and pursue "other" interests. The Republicans are already drafting him for the 2016 presidential race.

To rub salt into the wound, some Black commentators and columnists are suggesting that Black voters should seriously consider moving from the Democrat plantation to the Republican plantation, and the chairman of the Republican Party, Reince Priebus, has a plan to make that happen. So does Rand Paul. Both of them have said Republicans must get more Black people to remember what their party has done for us, and bring us back into their "big tent." Yes, we are definitely in vogue these days.

The question is: What are we going to do with our newfound popularity? When political parties compete for your votes, you win. I wonder what the Democrat response will be to this Republican incursion. After 75 years or so of unbroken Black voter loyalty, the battle lines have been drawn by Priebus, who has set out to do what Michael Steele could not do with "fried chicken and potato salad;" get more Black folks to vote Republican.

Why is it always an either/or choice between Black folks being a Republican or a Democrat? It seems to me that Black people, especially,

should always be independent and willing to support either party if, of course, both parties address the interests and needs of Black people.

Notwithstanding the opposing arguments regarding what Presidents Lincoln, Eisenhower, and Nixon did for Black people versus what Presidents Roosevelt, Kennedy, and Johnson did, we should base our voting on interests rather than parties. Our unique position and genesis in this country demand political independence rather than political allegiance to anyone or any party. It's all about reciprocity, and the last time I checked, Black people have yet to receive even a reasonable return on our investment in the U.S.

Our American experience is unique. No other group has committed so much to, worked so hard for, fought and died in wars for America, and received so little in return. Other groups did not go through what we went through, and our right to play in the political game was bought and paid for hundreds of years ago. However, this is still, above all, a capitalistic society, and economics rules the day. If we take care of business in the economics arena, the political arena will be easy pickings.

Heed the words of T. Thomas Fortune, a journalist and co-founder of the National Negro Business League: "No people ever became great and prosperous by devoting their infant energies to politics. We were

literally born into political responsibility before we had mastered the economic conditions which underlie these duties."

His message is clear. We are not even in the political game because we do not use our political leverage to get what we say we need. All we get back from our "precious" votes is a good feeling, which could be characterized as having sex rather than making love. Black people are in love with our political party; and our party is just having sex with us.

We had better wake up from our infatuation with political parties, and understand that they only want us for one thing: our votes. Of course, they would also like our campaign donations, but we certainly aren't trying to hear that. Black people must be more politically independent, and stop letting the talking heads and so-called leaders, both Black and White, steer us toward one party over the other. We will be more politically effective if we leverage our votes with those who espouse and support our interests. If we can't do that then we should at least be present at both tables in large enough numbers to have a positive impact on each party's agenda. Right now, the reference to Black people being made by either major party is related to our votes, not our progress.

Remember: In politics there are no permanent friends and no permanent enemies, just permanent interests.

Tiger Woods, who has spent 623 weeks at No. 1 in the world, will return to the top spot for the first time in 29 months after his victory Monday in the Arnold Palmer Invitational at Bay Hill.

"I think it's been years since I've hit the ball this consistently day in and day out," Woods said.

Woods held off Rickie Fowler and Justin Rose

in the continuation of the final round, which was halted Sunday when wind, rain and lightning forced a suspension of play. Woods and Fowler had played two holes Sunday, and Woods led by three shots when they teed off at No. 3 on Monday.

Fowler applied some pressure on the back nine, until he knocked two balls in the water on the par-5 16th on his way to a triple bogey.

Woods, not as sharp

as he had been in the first three rounds, finished with a final-round 2-under 70, 13 under par and two shots better than Rose.

"By-product of hard work, patience, and getting back to winning golf tournaments," Woods said about his return to the top of the rankings.

Woods' girlfriend, world-champion skier Lindsey Vonn, tweeted congratulations moments after the victory.

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My Day: No Negro

made us stronger, were already in existence. The Negro Baptist Church was organized in 1773. Talk about history. The National Negro Business League had thousands of members before integration as did the National Negro Baseball League. So, my simple question is because we became 'black' and 'African Americans', we should allow the 'Negro' to evaporate? What is the new term for 'n-town'?

The change will take effect next year when the Census Bureau distributes to more than 3.5 million households the annual American Community Survey. I must inform you that the Census Bureau has a bureau chief of racial statistics. This branch of the Census has conducted months of public feedback and research determining the view of the term. If you participated, I would appreciate a call, which I will leave at the end of this article. The conclusion of the surveys was that the term was outdated and offensive. You see 'Negro' itself took the

place of 'colored'. And then, I repeat, 'black' to African Americans. Which means, at this point, the 'n' word should be fired.

Nicholas Jones, Bureau Chief of Racial Statistics, and Matthew Snipp, professor at Stanford University, continues with "this is a reflection of changing times, changing vocabularies and changing understandings of what race means in this country". Personally, I find this unacceptable. I am certain there was a more capable source at the National Urban League headquarters, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) or a qualified professor of African Studies at several ivy league universities and historically black colleges in America.

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DALLAS MAYOR'S INTERN FELLOWS PROGRAM

Driven by the belief that students from Dallas' public high schools "must make the connection between a good education and a great career," Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings kicked off the Dallas Mayor's Intern Fellows Program asking Dallas businesses of every size to step up and provide summer internships for Dallas public high school students. Joined by dozens of business and nonprofit leaders, Mayor Rawlings announced the challenge at a news conference held recently at Dallas City Hall.

"The Mayor's Intern Fellows Program is much more than a summer job; it's an eye-opening and often life-changing opportunity for Dallas public high school students," said Mayor Rawlings. "This summer program is truly important because this investment in our youth strengthens our education system, our city and its economy, and the workforce of tomorrow."

Founded in 2008, the Mayor's Intern Fellows Program is an eight-week paid summer internship program that introduces high school students to careers and employment opportunities in industries and companies where they have expressed interest. The students — rising juniors and seniors from Dallas ISD and public charter high schools — get exposure to a variety of fields, including technology, healthcare, law, accounting, business, education, the nonprofit sector, advertising/marketing/public relations, engineering, banking, manufacturing and hospitality.

Modeled after the prestigious White House Fellows Program, the Intern Fellows Program prepares motivated teens to become the leaders of tomorrow. Since its inception six years ago, 513 Dallas ISD and public charter high school students have participated in the internships made possible by hundreds of businesses and nonprofits.

Darling International is underwriting the "Business 101 Training Program" that all students will undergo in preparation for their job interviews, which will include resume building, interviewing, proper dress, career choices, corporate climate, and financial literacy. Highland Capital Management is sponsor of the Job Fair set for May 3, where students will be interviewed by human resource professionals and receive formal job offers. As the Community Service Sponsor, Tenet Healthcare will underwrite the events where interns will volunteer at either the North Texas Food Bank or Community Partners of Dallas.

Program sponsors are Atmos Energy, Dallas Citizens Council and Kroger. Additionally, Kroger is pro-

viding breakfast, lunch and snacks for all three "Business 101" trainings, the Downtown Business News is helping spread the word to its readers, and Central Market is providing food for Computer Training Day. Donors to the program are Linda and Mitch Hart; Al G. Hill, Jr.; Erle Nye; Margot and Ross Perot; Vin and Caren Prothro Foundation; Sewell Automotive Companies; and Harold Simmons.

The Mayor's Intern Fellow's Program is facilitated by Dallas nonprofit Education is Freedom (EIF), a comprehensive college-planning program offering a dedicated team of school-based experts who offer college-access programming in numerous Dallas ISD high schools.

Employers are asked to provide at least one eight-week summer internship for a student fellow for 20 to 40 hours weekly, pay the interns the recommended minimum rate of \$9 per hour, and pay a program fee per intern, which covers the intern's participation in "Business 101" training, Job Fair, Microsoft Office computer training, leadership development training and Community Service Day. The eight-week internships will begin June 17 and concludes with the Mayor's Intern Fellows Program celebratory luncheon on Friday, August 9.

Businesses also are asked to provide students an opportunity for job shadowing of executives and to observe a company's operations. Probably one of the most important aspects is to set up one-on-one conversations with managers and executives regarding college and career prospects and to share information about the company's industry and variety of career options.

If a company cannot provide an intern at their business, they may underwrite an intern to work at a local nonprofit agency or be a program sponsor.

Komen - Dallas County Affiliate; Tenet Healthcare;

Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children; URS Corporation; USI Southwest; Weil, Gotshal & Manges LLP; Winstead PC; Yellow Cab; and Zix Corporation.
