“Bloody Sunday” Commemorated by Vice President Biden and Black Leaders

(AP) - The vice president and black leaders commemorating a famous civil rights march on Sunday said efforts to diminish the impact of African-Americans' votes haven't stopped in the years since the 1965 Voting Rights Act added millions to Southern voter rolls.

More than 5,000 people followed Vice President Joe Biden and U.S. Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga., across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma's annual Bridge Crossing Jubilee. The event commemorates the "Bloody Sunday" beating of voting rights marchers - including a young Lewis - by state troopers as they began a march to Montgomery in March 1965.

The 50-mile march prompted Congress to pass the Voting Rights Act that struck down impediments to voting by African-Americans and ended all-white rule in the South.

Biden, the first sitting vice president to participate in the annual re-enactment, said nothing shaped his consciousness more than watching TV footage of the beatings. "We saw in stark relief the rank hatred, discrimination and violence that still existed in large parts of the nation," he said.

Biden said marchers "broke the back of the forces of evil," but that challenges to voting rights continue today with restrictions on early voting and voter registration drives and enactment of voter ID laws where no voter fraud has been shown.

"We will never give up or give in," Lewis told marchers.

While the TLBC awarded more than 60 scholarships during its African American Legislative Summit, Jones was one of six scholarship awarded on an at-large basis from only member districts. She was also the only student selected from the Lancaster Independent School District and one of three students from her senatorial district.

Additional criteria included that she must have a GPA above 3.0, be a Spring 2013

graduating senior from a Texas Education Agency (TEA) accredited high school and enroll full time in the Fall of 2013 in an accredited college, university or community college.

Jones attended the scholarship banquet with her mom to formally accept the award, meet senators and representatives, and tour the capitol building with other students. Her success is another example the fulfillment of Lancaster ISD's More Than a Diploma Initiative.

Protect the right to vote!

Last week the U.S. Supreme Court heard oral arguments in a case that is as significant to our nation as was Brown vs. Board of Education in 1954, the landmark civil rights case that made separate but equal educational facilities unconstitutional.

The Justices are considering Shelby County vs. Holder, a case that challenges Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The case is of extreme importance. And although I did not address the court, I felt it critically necessary to attend the session to represent each of you and your position on an individual's right to vote.

Section 5 mandates that certain states and jurisdictions, including Texas, receive preclearance or approval from the U.S. Justice Department or the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.

before making changes to established voting practices and procedures. Under the provision a proposed redistricting map has to clearly demonstrate neither a discriminatory effect nor purpose.

In the last three years, Republican controlled legislatures in more than twelve states have passed laws that have made voting more difficult for minorities. In the past twelve months, federal authorities, utilizing their discretion under Section 5, have prevented legislatures from implementing such practices.

Countless numbers of men and women in this country gave their lives so that all Americans could participate in our democracy as voters. It is a right that is fundamental to our way of life, and has to be protected if we are to remain a fair and decent country.

In recent years lower courts have disallowed proposed changes in voting practices using Section 5 as a guide. A U.S. Court of Appeals Judge wrote that without Section 5 minority voters would suffer.

Eight Southern States, beginning in 2010, have passed laws designed to make voting more cumbersome for minority vot-

ers. Various civil rights organizations such as the Congressional Black Caucus and the Congressional Hispanic Caucus have consistently opposed such legislation. Section 5 has been relied upon as a barrier to prevent those with malicious intentions from setting the country back fifty years.

Gary Bledsoe, an Austin based lawyer who chairs the Texas NAACP, said that anyone who opposed section 5 was living in a fantasy world. "Section 5 is absolutely necessary," he said. "The spirit of segregationists like Bull Connor resides in those who want to do away with the provision."

Patterns and practices of voter intimidation are present in this country, Bledsoe added. "It is obscene to suggest that equality, without intervention from the Justice Department and the Courts, exists in America."

I believe that all fair minded people acknowledge and do not dispute the progress that the Voting Rights Act has created. Section 5 is crucial and must be preserved. We cannot afford to allow a few to drag the majority of us back into the stone ages.

What Killed President Kennedy and Trayvon Martin? Just Maybe the Easy Access to Guns!

Tuesday, February 26 marked one year since 17-year-old Trayvon Martin was killed by a gun wielded by self-appointed neighborhood watchman George Zimmerman after he saw Trayvon walking home from a 7-Eleven with a bag of Skittles and bottle of Arizona iced tea.

Black children, youths, and families know first-hand that the killing of Black children by gun violence is not new but a relentlessly unreported and under-reported plague that has been disproportionately snuffing out Black child lives for a very long time. Fifteen percent of children and teens are Black but 45 percent of all children and youths killed by guns in 2010 were Black. Black boys 15 to 19 years old were 28 times more likely than White boys the same age to be killed in a gun homicide.

Shortly after President John F. Kennedy's assassination,

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. wrote that it was time for our nation to do some soul-searching, and while the question "Who killed President Kennedy?" was important, answering the question "What killed President Kennedy?" was even more critical. Dr. King believed the answer was that "our late President was assassinated by a morally inclement climate".

"It is a climate filled with heavy torrents of false accusation, jostling winds of hatred, and raging storms of violence. It is a climate where men cannot disagree without being disagreeable, and where they express dissent through violence and murder. It is the same climate that murdered Medgar Evers in Mississippi and six innocent Negro children in Birmingham, Alabama."

Dr. King further noted that the undercurrents of hatred and violence that made up this morally inclement climate were fueled by our cultural embrace of guns: "By our readiness to allow arms to be purchased at will and fired at whim, by allowing our movie and television screens to teach our children that the hero is one who masters the art of shooting and the technique of killing, by allowing all these developments, we

have created an atmosphere in which violence and hatred have become popular pastimes."

The same winds of hatred, storms of violence, and easy access to and glorification of guns that Dr. King believed killed President Kennedy would soon also kill Dr. King. Fifty years after Dr. King described our morally inclement climate, the outward signs of racial intolerance and hatred have undoubtedly diminished but there are still far too many reminders of the dangers lurking everywhere that devastate us all-like Trayvon's senseless death for walking home while Black. Between 1963, when President John F. Kennedy was assassinated, and 2010, nearly 60,000 Black children and teens were killed by guns, more than 1,200 every year for 48 years. This is 17 times the number of reported lynchings of Black Americans of all ages since 1882 but we have not had an equivalent Black community anti-lynching movement to save our children from gun violence.

While there are troubling undertones of racial suspicion and fear in Trayvon Martin's killing which must be addressed as justice is sought, the fact is that most Black young people mur-

dered by guns are killed by Black shooters -just as most White children and teens murdered by guns are killed by White shooters. Sadly, the tragedies of Tucson, Aurora, Newtown and elsewhere made clear that none of us are safe anywhere or immune to the pervasive threat of gun violence.

We are all in the same boat and must act together to stop the plague of violence. Gun safety laws that only apply in one city or state can't fully stop our national epidemic of gun proliferation and violence any better than we can stop a flu epidemic by vaccinating one family. We must struggle together to stop gun violence and to change the morally inclement climate that Dr. King warned about if we are going to protect all of our nation's children everywhere.





Baylor Tops Women's Basketball Poll Again

(AP) - Baylor remained No. 1 in The Associated Press women's basketball poll for a ninth straight week while Toledo entered the Top 25 for the first time since 2001.

The Lady Bears cruised to wins over Oklahoma and West Virginia and will try for their 40th straight Big 12 regular-season victory Monday night against Kansas State. Baylor, which received all 40 first place votes for the

second straight week, will play in the Big 12 tournament this weekend before hosting the first two rounds of the NCAA tournament.

No. 2 Notre Dame and No. 3 Connecticut also play Monday night for the Big East regular-season crown. The Irish already have clinched a share of the title by beating the Huskies by a point in January.

Stanford and California are fourth and fifth. Duke fell one

spot to sixth. Kentucky, Penn State, Tennessee and Maryland round out the first 10.

Toledo has won 14 straight and is No. 25. The Rockets were last ranked Nov. 19, 2001 for a week before falling out. LSU also jumped in at No. 22 after beating Kentucky, Alabama and Texas A&M over the past eight days.



"I hope that my mother will be proud, too," Prince Harry said at the gala. "Maybe, just maybe, they are together somewhere up there, with blueprints and sketches already mapped out. I can only hope we put the swings in the right place."

During his time in Lesotho, Harry met with young people at separate clinics for both deaf and blind children. At the Kananelo Centre for the Deaf, he practiced sign language, wrote on blackboards, and took part in a dance. He even joined Prince Seeiso for a cooking class, donning a Paddington Bear apron, as the two jokingly teased each other. Later, at St. Bernadette's Resource Centre for the Blind, he joined kids for a game of football.

The trip marked Harry's second trip to Lesotho, the country landlocked by South Africa, following a trip with his brother, William, in June 2010. Half of Lesotho's population of 1.8 million are under 18, and of those 40% are classified as vulnerable or orphans. The country has the third-highest rate of HIV/AIDS in the world. Most of the population is only reachable by foot or on horseback.

"Talking about HIV and understanding it isn't dangerous," Harry said at the Johannesburg dinner. "Denying it, or not knowing about it, definitely is. Our aim and hope is that we can influence a decline in the transmission of HIV and increase life expectancy, in a unique way for Lesotho: by addressing the psychological and social needs of the next generation, which is so important."

Walking through the cosmetics department in WalMart and other retail chains, most African-American women will notice that quality products designed for them are few and far between. Outside of MAC, Queen Collection, and Fashion Fair, there are a select number of cosmetics lines created for black women that we are aware of and indulge in purchasing. It might be due to lack of promotion, proper marketing, or funding, but cosmetic lines that have dedicated themselves to servicing black women are difficult to uncover; but, they do exist. Some are retailed nationally while others are strictly available online. Nonetheless, these six cosmetic lines for African-American women are continuing to build their niche in the billion-dollar industry.

1. Supermodel Iman has evolved into a cosmetics mogul with her line, IMAN Cosmetics, Skincare, and Fragrance. Regarded as the first cosmetics line designed for all women with skin color, IMAN was created in 1994 after the model grew tired of having to mix foundations together to create the perfect shade. After a landmark alliance with Proctor & Gamble in 2004, IMAN is now on the shelves of mass retailers including WalMart,

Target, Walgreens, and Duane Reade. Her line is considered one of the best available for African-American women.

2. Kim Roxie, the creator and visionary of LAMIK cosmetics, defines the brand as, "a reconstitution of beauty." That is an understatement. Considered the first eco-chic makeup brand, LAMIK prides itself on looking at beauty under a different microscope while giving makeup a new purpose. LAMIK is proving that beauty is revealed, not applied.

3. You might have seen Black Opal on the cosmetic shelves in Target, but surprisingly, this brand is relatively unpopular or unknown among many African-American women. Created in 1994 by dermatologist Cheryl Burgess, Ph.D. to specifically address the skincare needs of black women, Black Opal has developed formulas and an amazing rainbow collection of shades that complement the varied skin complexions of African-American women. Black Opal can be found in select WalMarts and Targets, but their magic is far-reaching.

4. Jada Pinkett-Smith, Mary J. Blige, and Chaka Khan are three of the more famous African-American women who discovered the powerful beauty that Carol's Daughter products unleash, but these ladies aren't the only ones. Created, owned, and operated by Carol's

Rate Of Advanced Breast Cancer Among Young Women Increases

Although there was only a minimal increase, it is still alarming because tumors that appear in the breast of young women tend to be more aggressive than they are in older women. In addition to tumor aggression, young women are also less likely to be screened on a consistent basis. Medical director of the teen and young adult cancer program at Seattle Children's Hospital, Dr. Rebecca Johnson believes that the increase is not the result of a single factor, but multiple causes.

According to Johnson, the increase translates from about 250 cases of advanced breast cancer in women under 40 in the 1970's, compared to more than 800 cases in

2009. Nationwide, between 1970 and 2009, the number of cases increased from 22 million to 30 million.

Other breast cancer research experts suggest that women choosing to get pregnant later on in life could also be a contributing factor, partially due to the tendency of later pregnancies to cause already growing tumors to grow and spread more rapidly, in response to pregnancy hormones. Other possible risk factors include having one to two drinks daily and obesity.

In general, breast cancer rates have fallen during recent years. As commonly stated, early detection is key.
