I congratulate Meshonda Cole for being this year's Teacher of the Year."

"Cole is exemplary in her support of students, staff, and parents," said Kennedy-Curry Principal Regina Rice. "As a master teacher, Cole demonstrates excellence in preparing students to be young mathematicians and to love math. She helps students at all levels achieve academic growth as evidenced by her high passing Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) rate."

Cole achieved a Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies from the University of Texas at Arlington in 2001, with a specialization in early childhood education. In August 2002, she became a third grade teacher in Dallas ISD's Martin Weiss Elementary School. Six

years later, she began to work at Maynard Jackson Middle School, and last fall-August 2011-she joined the team at the new Kennedy-Curry Middle School.

Cole, who has been a district master teacher for six years, was inspired to pursue a career in education by her early grade school teachers. "As early as grade school, I could see that my educational accomplishments were due in large part to my teachers' abilities to make learning enjoyable and challenging at the same time," said Cole. "This positive experience early in my development fueled a lifelong passion to teach and contributed greatly to my decision to make education my career choice."

"A growing issue in pub-

lic education I would like to address is student underperformance in mathematics," said Cole. "I set high expectations for my students and hold them accountable to achieve. My students are not allowed to use the excuse 'I've always been bad in math' in my class. My students have competed and placed in UIL and at the district level in Math Olympiad. To change the outcome of student performance first we have to make students do the thinking, discovering, and problem solving. It is the educator's responsibility to challenge students to rise up to the curriculum.

Teaching must change to meet the needs of our new generation. Today's digital; therefore, pen and paper alone is not going to get the job done. Intense technology training should be made available if not required for all teachers."

During her 10 years as an educator, Cole has taken additional roles such as being part of the school's Instructional Leadership Team, Saturday School coordinator, student mentor, coordinator for the school's Mother/Daughter & Father/Son clubs, cheerleader coordinator, and girls' basketball coach.

"I encourage educators to make student growth and success a priority in their schools," said Cole. "I challenge those who don't have a strong parental support system

to create their own system, and build a relationship with their students to motivate and challenge them to reach their full individual potential. Students should know that failure is not an option regardless of their background."

As the event's sponsor, Central Market H-E-B, also presented the Teacher of the Year finalists with a \$1,000 cash award. Those finalists are:

BLACK COLLEGES MUST DEVELOP NEXT BUSINESS LEADERS

I had the pleasure of serving on a panel at the recent White House HBCU Entrepreneurship Conference. A blue-ribbon panel of luminaries from academia and industry was on hand at the invitation of avid U.S. Black Chamber supporter Marie Johns, Deputy Administrator of the Small Business Administration.

Enlightening. Encouraging. Affirming. Each of these could describe the outcomes of the all-day session. It really had my Florida A&M "Rattlers" and Clark Atlanta University "Panthers" blood pumping.

The consensus of everyone in attendance? America's Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) must commit themselves to: develop the next generation of Black business leaders; be centers of excellence and thought leaders

on entrepreneurship; jumpstart innovation in the communities they serve; and encourage and foster entrepreneurial activity among students before graduation.

As you might imagine, the discussions were wide-ranging, touching on globalization, technology, re-engineering education models, access to capital, and the lingering impacts of discrimination on all of the above. There were reports of real-world successes from Bennett College President Julianne Malveaux, and Ron Stodghill, director of Johnson C. Smith University's Innova Laboratory, a business incubator. Though not HBCUs, Silicon Valley's Mission College, represented by President Laurel Jones, and d.t. Ogilvie, founder of the Center for Urban Entrepreneurship & Economic Development at Rutgers Business School, provided real-world examples of the kind of innovation that HBCUs can emulate and monetize.

The USBC is going to pitch in and do what we can to help. We'll start by making sure several student business leaders are able to attend our upcoming School of Chamber Management this July 24-28 in Washington, D.C. Maybe they'll learn something; maybe we'll learn a thing or two from them.

We'll also commit to encouraging closer cooperation between our member chambers and the business departments of HBCUs located near them. I'm certain only good things can come from increased

interaction between current and future business leaders.

There is no question that the rebirth of Black Entrepreneurship will take root and grow on the campuses of America's Black colleges and universities. Thousands of bright, talented young men and women focused on using their brains to change the economies of their communities and the world. What's not to like about that?

And finally, I must acknowledge the Obama administration. I have mentioned SBA Deputy Administrator Marie Johns, Donald Cravins from the Senate Committee on Small Business and others. More importantly, the president gets it. Virtually every agency has embraced his insistence on inclusion. Maybe I'm just feeling good because I'm the product of two HBCUs, but to have the White House in the fight with us, that's really a good thing.

CONGRESS IS DROWNING AFRICAN JOBS

Imagine standing on the side of a river, watching a man drown. He's not very far from shore, and he's pleading with you to help. There's a rope lying on the ground next to you. What do you do?

The answer is simple – you throw the man a line.

Unfortunately for the African apparel industry, the answer to this question has been elusive within the halls of the U.S. Congress. More than 200,000 jobs are sinking into oblivion, all because of inactivity on a very simple, non-controversial piece of trade legislation.

The so-called "Third Country Fabric Provision" of the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA) created a thriving apparel sector across Sub-Saharan Africa. In a nutshell, it allows African countries to import raw fabric from other regions in the world, assemble them into garments with African workers, and export

them into the U.S. duty-free. It sounds simple, but this single provision has done arguably more for job growth in Sub-Saharan Africa than any foreign aid program in history. And it has done so at minuscule cost to the U.S. taxpayer.

The broader AGOA legislation dates back to 2000 and has consistently enjoyed strong bipartisan Congressional and public support for the same reasons – because it is cost-effective and makes good policy sense. It is trade, not aid, that Africa needs the most, and they've proven that they can do it well. Consequently, the U.S. apparel buyer enjoys cheaper goods while building goodwill towards the U.S. throughout across sub-Saharan Africa.

Unfortunately, the Third Country Fabric Provision's window closes on September 30. If it is allowed to expire, hundreds of thousands of African workers (on average, 70-80 percent women) will be left to fend for themselves. Even now, factories across Africa are shedding jobs left and right, because U.S. retailers place their orders

months in advance and there is grave concern over Congress' ability renew the provision. If the situation continues, virtually all apparel trade with Africa will grind to a halt even before the September cutoff and the U.S. will lose significant credibility as a reliable partner in the eyes of Africa's leaders. If we cease being a reliable partner, I have no doubt they will find one elsewhere.

All of this begs the question: Why isn't renewing the Third Country Fabric Provision a higher priority for Congress? Not a single constituent group from the U.S. private sector or civil society opposes this provision. To the contrary, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and numerous industry groups have already written countless letters to Congress urging an extension of this legislation. Nor is it a matter of international competitive pressure – compared to the national exports of Vietnam, Bangladesh, or Cambodia, the sum of all sub-Saharan Africa's exports is a mere drop in the bucket.

Even though the Third

Country Fabric Provision's renewal has broad, bipartisan support in both the House and Senate, it is simply getting lost in the cracks amid Election Year squabbles over who makes the first move, and whether the measure will become a "pile on" for other, completely unrelated measures.

Two hundred thousand African jobs, it seems, are being held hostage by procedural dysfunction.

The man in the river is drowning, and our lawmakers are checking their Blackberries to see if someone else will throw the rope first.



NAACP Launches Historic "This is My Vote" Voter Registration and Education Campaign

The 2008 U.S. Presidential election brought us not only a historic election but also record participation of minority voters. More than two million more African American voters and an additional two million Latino voters cast ballots than had done so in the previous presidential election cycle in 2004. For the very first time, African-American women had the highest turnout rate of any racial, ethnic or gender group, and voting among younger African American voters jumped by more than 17 percent.

Such high levels of civic participation in the melting pot of America are, no doubt, cause for celebration. But 2008's record turnout also triggered a backlash, which will severely hinder access to the ballot in several states this year. In 2011, at least 34 states introduced legislation or policies that will cause suppression in voter turnout. Thus far, 14 states have passed such laws and presently nearly 10 other states have similar laws pending, according to non-partisan Brennan Center for Justice at New York University's School of Law.

Proponents of the laws cite no recent illegal voting epidemic but claim the laws are in response to voter fraud, which is virtually non-existent in the U.S. And, of course, there are criminal penalties to deal with anyone who would violate the laws on the books.

The new restrictions attack ballot access by

requiring photo IDs to vote, curtailing early voting windows, stripping the formerly incarcerated men and women who have served their debt to society-- of the right to vote and purging voters rolls, often with thousands of errors. Approximately 21 million Americans don't have a government-issued photo ID, including 25 percent of voting-aged African-Americans. This is not the first time politicians have curtailed minority voting access. Similar restrictive laws were passed as a response to the passage of the 15th Amendment granting ex-slaves the right to vote. On both occasions, these types of laws had the same result: limiting the ability of people of color to cast their ballots.

This attack on voting rights is coordinated. It is insidious. And it is the worst we've seen since the Jim Crow era. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. called voting the "foundation stone for political action." The laws restricting access are like jackhammers persistently chipping away at that stone.

The NAACP recognizes this threat and its potential effects. We are taking action this election year to maintain the successful turnout levels of 2008 by registering new voters to ensure that every eligible voter has the opportunity to cast a legitimate vote in the 2012 election.

This Wednesday, the NAACP and our partners in the Faith, Labor and civic organizing communities launched our most ambitious voter registration and education drive in recent history. This is My Vote will register, edu-

cate and turn out hundreds of thousands of voters this year, with a special focus on African-Americans and other minorities, younger and elderly voters.

This is My Vote will enlist volunteers to go door-to-door in neighborhoods throughout the country, registering new voters and educating existing voters on the new laws and restrictions in each state. Our national voter registration hotline 1-866-MyVote1 allows citizens in every state to receive voter registration documents by mail, and our new website, www.thisismyvote.org will provide online tools for people to download registration documents and learn about voting requirements state-by-state. In addition, we have entered into historic partnerships with the National Baptist Convention and other denominations to ensure the reach of the campaign is as broad as possible.

Today, more than 46 years after passage of the Voting Rights Act, most of us would like to believe the fight for voting rights and access had been won long ago. Last year revealed that the battle still rages on, and so does the NAACP. We are more determined than ever to succeed in our fight for equality.

New Study Demonstrates Dosing Non-Compliance Increases RSV-Related Hospitalizations Among High-Risk Babies In Medicaid Population

MedImmune, the global biologics arm of AstraZeneca, announced results from a new retrospective database cohort study of 8,443 high-risk infants receiving palivizumab in Medicaid programs across 12 states. Approximately 67% of infants were non-compliant with palivizumab. Non-compliance with the FDA-approved dosing of Synagis® (palivizumab), defined as not receiving at least 5 doses or having dosing gaps, significantly increased likelihood of hospitalization from respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) among high-risk infants in a Medicaid population. The percentage of RSV-related hospitalization (RSV-H) was significantly higher among non-compliant vs. compliant infants (12.0% vs. 7.4%, P<0.001) respectively.(1-6) These data were presented today at the 2012 Pediatric Academic Societies (PAS) Annual Meeting in Boston.

"These results suggest that inconsistent dosing or dosing less than approved in the FDA label for Synagis is correlated to the risk of RSV hospitalization for high-risk infants," said Parthiv Mahadevia, MD, MPH, senior health economist and outcomes researcher at MedImmune.

The FDA-approved labeling for Synagis, Section 2.1 – Dosing Information, states, "The efficacy of Synagis at doses less than 15 mg/kg, or of dosing less frequently than monthly throughout the RSV season, has not been established." In these analyses, the population under study was infants born with prematurity (34 weeks gestational age or less), congenital heart disease (CHD) or chronic lung disease of prematurity.

"These infants are recommended to receive palivizumab as per the product's label and our findings demonstrate the need for full protection against RSV throughout the season," said Mahadevia.

Also presented at PAS, were two additional sub-analyses of the data:

- Non-Compliance with Palivizumab Among Racial Minorities in A Medicaid Population, Tuesday May 1, 10:00 AM (Abstract 184)
- Factors Associated with Non-Compliance with Palivizumab Among Medicaid Infants, Saturday

April 28, 1:00 PM (Abstract 287)

RSV is the most common respiratory infection in infancy; approximately one-half of all infants are infected with RSV during the first year of life, and nearly all children have been infected at least once by the time they reach their second birthday.(7,8)

In most children, RSV presents mild symptoms similar to the common cold and doesn't require medical attention. However, certain infants—particularly premature infants and babies with congenital heart disease (CHD) and chronic lung disease (CLD) of prematurity—are at increased risk of developing a serious infection from RSV, often requiring hospitalization.(9,10) Serious RSV infection is the leading cause of infant hospitalization in the U.S.,(11,12) and is the cause of one of every 13 pediatrician visits and one of every 38 emergency room trips.(13)

About the Studies

Compliance with Synagis dosing was evaluated across six RSV seasons (2003-2009), with RSV season typically running from November through March.

Babies were required to have been discharged between May 1 and September 30 and to have received one or more doses of Synagis during their first RSV season (October through April) with no gaps of > 35 days between any dose. Inclusion criteria were defined as infants born with prematurity (34 weeks gestational age or less), congenital heart disease (CHD) or chronic lung disease of prematurity (CLDP).

Important Safety Information

What is Synagis® (palivizumab)? Synagis is a prescription medication that is used to help prevent a serious lung disease caused by respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) in children at high risk for severe lung disease from RSV.

Who should not receive Synagis? Children should not receive Synagis if they have ever had a severe allergic reaction to it. Signs and symptoms of a severe allergic reaction could include: itchy rash; swelling of the face; difficulty swallowing; difficulty breathing; bluish

color of the skin; muscle weakness or floppiness; a drop in blood pressure and/or unresponsiveness. If your child has any of these signs or symptoms of a severe allergic reaction after getting Synagis, be sure to tell your child's healthcare provider or get medical help right away.

How is Synagis given?

Synagis is given as a shot, usually in the thigh muscle, each month during the RSV season. Your child should receive their first Synagis shot before the RSV season starts to help protect them before RSV becomes active. When RSV is most active, your child will need to receive Synagis shots every 28-30 days to help protect your child from severe RSV disease for about a month. Your child should continue to receive monthly shots of Synagis until the end of RSV season. Your child may still get severe RSV disease after receiving Synagis. If your child has an RSV infection, they should continue to get their monthly shots throughout the season. The efficacy of Synagis shots given less than monthly throughout the RSV season has not been established.

What are the side effects of Synagis?

Possible, serious side effects include severe allergic reaction which may occur after any dose of Synagis. Such reactions may be life-threatening or cause death. Unusual bruising and/or groups of tiny red spots on the skin have also been reported. Common side effects of Synagis include fever and rash. Other possible side effects include skin reactions around the area where the shot was given (like redness, swelling, warmth or discomfort). EBie Awards

Urban Green Council today announced the finalists for the upcoming EBie Awards™, a new nationwide juried competition that celebrates sustainability improvements in Existing Buildings (hence the EBies), and the people who made them happen. The winners will be announced at an Oscars-style awards show to be held June 28 at the Hard Rock Café in Times Square.

With buildings accounting for more than 1/3 of the nation's greenhouse gas emissions, and 85% of the buildings expected to be in use in 2030 already standing, there is a tremendous need to retrofit existing buildings for improved efficiency and sustainability.

The EBies, sponsored by Carrier, a part of UTC Climate, Controls & Security, recognizes "unsung heroes" who have made great strides in improving environmental performance but whose accomplishments may otherwise go unheralded - not just building owners, but building managers and operators, auditors, commissioning agents, lighting designers, plumbing engineers and others. Unlike other awards, the EBies are based on measurable

improvements in performance.

"Retrofitting a new building may not be as sexy as building a new one, but making our existing buildings more sustainable is the only way we're going to make a real dent in our carbon footprint," said Russell Unger, executive director of Urban Green Council. "The building manager at your office or the super in your apartment building could very well be doing great work that saves resources and money. These are the people and projects we will be honoring at the EBies."

Bloomberg. "With the opportunity to host the EBie Awards - and celebrate the nomination of New York City's own green buildings - we recognize the significant impact efficiency measures will have on our future, including lower greenhouse gas emissions, energy costs and building waste."
