

MR. LEVI DAVIS NAMED FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN BOARD CHAIRMAN FOR METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEM

Methodist Health System recently announced Levi Davis has been elected chairman of the health system's corporate board, effective April 1. Davis, a longtime board member and prominent business community and civic leader, also holds the distinction of being the first African American to serve as board chairman of Methodist Health System, and the first from a public-sector background.

Davis, who joined the Methodist corporate board in 2002, was named this year as treasurer of the board of Texas Healthcare Trustees, a statewide organization for those serving on the governing boards of hospitals and other health-related organizations in Texas. He is a past chairman of the Methodist health System Board Planning Committee and vice chairman of the corporation. In June 2011, he and his wife received a Heritage Award from the African American Museum in Dallas as part of an annual event benefitting the museum and its public education programs, exhibits, and operations.

For more than 30 years, Davis has been active in Dallas community affairs as a municipal and business leader, educator, and an involved humanitarian.



Nueva Encuesta: Los adolescentes hispanos están claramente conscientes de los peligros de enviar mensajes de texto al conducir, pero incluso así, un 54% incurre en esta riesgosa conducta

Las conclusiones de una nueva encuesta administrada por AT&T como parte de la campaña "Puede esperar" indican que los adolescentes hispanos son altamente vulnerables en lo que respecta al envío de mensajes de texto mientras conducen. Un impactante 54% de los adolescentes hispanos admite que envía mensajes de texto al conducir, en comparación a un 41% de los adolescentes blancos y un 42% de los afroamericanos.

Aunque la mayoría de los adolescentes entrevistados en la encuesta comprende los peligros de enviar mensajes de texto al conducir, el 43% admite que lo hace, y el 75% dice que esa práctica es común entre sus amigos. Pero aún más preocupa es el hecho de que estos adolescentes sienten la presión de sus compañeros para responder a los mensajes de texto rápidamente, en cinco minutos o menos.

La penetración de los equipos smartphone es muy común entre los adolescentes, especialmente los adolescentes hispanos que pro lo general son los primeros en adoptar nuevas tecnologías y más rápidamente. Según esta encuesta, el 78% de los adolescentes entrevistados en esta encuesta declaró que es propietario de un equipo smartphone en comparación a solo un 68% de los adolescentes blancos. Además, en los hogares hispanos es más probable que sólo haya teléfonos móviles, lo que significa que éstos son su principal medio de comunicación, según la Encuesta Nacional de Entrevistas sobre la Salud (NHIS, por su sigla en inglés) del centro Pew Research Center.

"La prevalencia del envío de

mensajes de texto al conducir es mayor entre los adolescentes hispanos, por lo que creemos que es nuestra responsabilidad generar conciencia sobre el peligro de esta riesgosa conducta", dijo Brent Wilkes, de la organización League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC). "Gracias al esfuerzo realizado por AT&T en difundir en toda la comunidad hispana su mensaje de no enviar mensajes de texto al conducir, LULAC puede hacer lo mismo para salvar vidas".

A medida que nos acercamos a una temporada de celebraciones con los bailes y ceremonias de graduación, también entramos en los "Cien días más letales" para los adolescentes que conducen en la carretera, período que se extiende desde el Día de Conmemoración de los Caídos hasta el Día del Trabajo.(1) El envío de mensajes de texto es además la vía de comunicación número uno entre los adolescentes.(2) Los adolescentes envían en promedio cinco veces más mensajes de texto al día que el adulto medio.(3) Cuando este hábito llega a las carreteras, los conductores que envían mensajes tienen 23 veces más probabilidades de participar de un accidente o situación similar.(4)

New Poll: Hispanic Teens Are Aware Of The Dangers Of Texting While Driving, Yet 54 Percent Are Guilty Of This Risky Behavior

Findings from a new survey commissioned by AT&T* as part of the "It Can Wait" campaign indicate Hispanic teens are highly vulnerable when it comes to texting while driving. A shocking 54 percent of Hispanic teens admit to texting while driving, compared to 41 percent of Caucasian and 42 percent of African-American teenagers.

Even though most teens polled in this survey understand the dangers of texting while driving, more than 43 percent of teens admit to sending a text while driving and 75 percent say it is common among their friends. But even more troubling is the fact that these teens feel pressure to respond to texts quickly – within five minutes or less.

Smartphone penetration is very high among teenagers, especially among Hispanic teens who over-index on smartphone and technology adoption. According to this survey, 78 percent of the Hispanic teens interviewed in this survey report owning a smartphone, compared to only 68 percent of Caucasian teenagers. Additionally, Hispanics are more likely to be a cell phone-only household, meaning they use their cell phones as their primary way of communication, according to the National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) by the Pew Research Center.

"The prevalence of texting while driving is higher among Hispanic teens, which is why we feel it is our responsibility to help spread the word about the dangers of this risky behavior," said Brent Wilkes, League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC). "Thanks to AT&T's efforts to spread their no-texting-while-driving message throughout the Hispanic community, LULAC can do the same, saving lives in the process."

With prom, graduation and summer nearing, we head into the "100 deadliest days" for teen drivers on the road – the days between Memorial Day and Labor Day.(1) Texting also ranks as the No. 1 mode of communication among teens.(2) On average, teens text five times more a day than a typical adult.(3) When this habit hits the road, drivers who text are 23 times more likely to be in an accident or near-accident.(4)

Representative Yvonne Davis Announces \$500,000 2012-2013 Urban Scholarship Fund

State Representative Yvonne Davis (D-Dallas) announced that over \$500,000 in scholarships are available for high school graduates from Dallas and twenty eight other urban areas throughout Texas. Administrated by the Texas Association of Developing Colleges (TADC), the Urban Scholarship Program was created during the 74th Legislative session as part of House Bill 2128 with the cooperation of the three largest local telephone companies in the state of Texas at that time. This year's Scholarship Fund contributors are AT&T and Verizon Wireless.

Since the establishment of the Urban Scholarship Fund, nearly 10,000 students throughout the state of Texas have been able to begin or continue their college education due to over \$5,500,000 awarded to them through the Urban Scholarship Fund.

"This fund was created to provide access to higher education opportunities for Texans who, without this assistance, might not be able to strive for a college education," said Rep. Davis. "Basically all the problems facing our communities, including economic parity, high crime, building cohesive families, and other quality of life issues are related to the lack of education. By providing increased avenues of educational opportunity, we multiply our chances of improving the conditions of our State. The goal of this fund is to boost chances of reaching this target!" Rep. Davis continued.

The 2012-2013 Urban Scholarship Fund is for Texas residents who are also U. S. citizens and full-time undergraduates in good academic standing at any accredited public or private non-profit college, university or technical college. Additionally, applicants must demonstrate financial need and have graduated from a high school in the following metropolitan cities: Abilene, Amarillo, Arlington, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Carrollton, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Fort Worth, Frisco, Garland, Grand Prairie, Houston, Irving, Killeen, Laredo, Lubbock, McAllen, McKinney, Mesquite, Midland, Pasadena, Plano, San Antonio, Waco and Wichita Falls. Students interested in applying for scholarships should contact their high school guidance counselor; college financial aid officer, or call the Texas Association of Developing Colleges at (214) 630-2511. Applicants may also complete the scholarship application online at www.tadc.org then print, sign and mail it with the required documents. The deadline for applying for the 2012-2013 Urban Scholarship Fund is Monday, July 16, 2012 (postmarked).

Students attending technical, junior or community colleges will receive \$700, public four-year college and university students will receive \$1000, and private four-year college and university students will receive \$2000. The number of awards is uncertain because of the varying funding levels to different types of institutions.

The Urban Scholarship fund was created in 1995 when Rep. Davis attached an amendment to the omnibus telecom bill creating a pool of funds derived from unclaimed telephone service deposits. Previously unclaimed funds went into the unclaimed funds pool in the State Treasury. Although these funds will be shifted into the scholarship account, local telephone companies will still reimburse consumers for any funds properly claimed in the future.

"We ask our students to study hard, make the grade and prepare themselves for the next level necessary to reach their goal. However, the continued rising cost of a college education presents an obstacle to some students. The Urban Scholarship Fund provides these students additional funding to help pay for their college education and ultimately realizing their goal," stated Rep. Davis.

Students from non-metropolitan areas of the State may be covered by the Rural Scholarship fund, which was also created by House Bill 2128.

Rep. Davis is currently serving her tenth term, representing District 111 in the Texas House of Representatives.

DEAR EDITOR:

What another awesome psalm we have before us. Many serious bible students are in agreement that Psalm 4 is related to Psalm 3 because Psalm 3 grows out of the crisis experience David encounters in the rebellious activity of his beloved son, Absalom. You will recall in Psalm 3 that David faces serious danger and he may have written Psalm 4 during the night of his extreme crisis experience (Psalm 3:5-6). It should be noted that this Psalm has a musical notation that reads - "To the chief

Musician on Neginoth, A Psalm of David." Some scholars believe that a neginoth is a stringed instrument. As such, this Psalm is a song accompanied by a stringed instrument.

In verses 1-3, this psalm begins with a cry or prayer to God. Davis is pleading with God to have mercy upon him in the time of great distress. The word distress means trouble or pressure. Like the psalmist, in a time of great difficulty in our lives, we certainly need the Lord's mercy.

As the pressures of life continue to mount in our lives, we certainly need to know that God's presence is with us and that He truly answers prayer.

The bible is filled with


many examples of God's deliverance in behalf of His people: Psalm 145:18, Psalm 50:15, Isaiah 65:24, Psalm 18:6, Psalm 55:16, Psalm 86:7, Psalm 91:15. Should the Lord not directly deliver us from trouble, His presence is certainly with us, for Hebrews 13:5-6 says - "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me."

Having cried to God in verses 1-3, the psalmist cautions his enemies in verses 4-5 not to sin against God by trying to wrong or hurt him, for God will certainly aid him through His protection. In essence, David exhorts his enemies to refrain from their

evil plan to oppose him and become a worshipper of the Lord. Also David expresses that those who truly trust in the Lord will offer sacrifices in the right way (Jonah 2:9).

A psalm that begins with a serious cry, ends with David expressing his confidence in God's safety (vs. 6-8). In a time of crisis, David finds out that you can trust God and He will sustain you in the midst of any difficult situation. BLACK RESTAURANT CEO HAS A LOT ON HIS PLATE

A petition is circulating asking that the country's largest restaurant company treat and pay its African American employees "equally." The petition is a result of the suit Restaurant Opportunities Center United (ROC) has filed against Darden Restaurants claiming the company systemically favors White workers over minorities.

The suit alleges that minority workers at The Capital Grille job sites in New York, Chicago and Washington, D.C., "are shunted away from front-of-house jobs like waiters and hosts towards lower-paying kitchen jobs" and that Darden discriminates against Blacks "by not offering a clear path" from their low fare restaurants (Red Lobster and Olive Garden) to their high-brow The Capital Grille.

A Darden representative described the allegations as "baseless." The irony of the situation is that the chief cook and bottle washer at Darden is an African American, Clarence Otis

Jr., the Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer. The Darden family of restaurants features recognizable and successful full-service brands such as: Red Lobster, Olive Garden, LongHorn Steakhouse, The Capital Grille, Bahama Breeze, Seasons 52 and Eddie V's. Darden owns and/or operates more than 1,900 restaurants that employ 180,000 people and serve more than 400 million meals a year.

The ROC union campaign is asking the public to "join us in calling on Darden to ... institute a promotions policy that that allows Black workers to compete for jobs as servers, bartenders and chefs at the company's fine-dining facilities." The nationwide campaign asks that "Black workers be able to advance to livable wages" at Darden's Capital Grille sites and not be relegated to the lowest-wage work.

The critics say, "Black workers in the restaurant industry are routinely relegated to fast food outlets" while White more readily climbs the ranks to earn upwards of \$50,000 a year. They say that The Capital Grille is "the only place within the company where workers can earn a living

wage." They want Darden to provide clear pipelines ... to higher-paid work at Capital Grille restaurants.

Darden acquired The Capital Grille chain from Rare Hospitality in 2007. The Capital Grille operates upscale steakhouse locations in 20 states and the District of Columbia and is considered "the big leagues" across Darden properties and in the industry. The union wants Blacks to be put on the path that would lead more of them to Capital Grille locations, strategic moves that would make their career paths and pay equitable with Whites.

"Darden Restaurants is very proud of the work environment it creates for employees," said spokesperson Rich Jeffers. The company is an industry leader. Fortune magazine ranks Darden among its "Top 100 Places to Work." Darden has a well-established history of promoting minority workers to managerial positions, getting high marks for a diverse workforce.

Clarence Otis Jr. is a Black trailblazer. How he handles this situation may make him an icon. He has been with Darden for 17 years. In his capacity as CEO, in

the last seven years he's guided the company to a \$400 million annual net income. Otis came to Darden during its spin-off from General Mills. His only previous restaurant experience had been in college when he waited tables during summer breaks. Now, the 56-year-old executive and his wife have one of the largest collections of African art in the U.S.

The group's allegation that "Black workers are routinely discriminated against throughout the restaurant industry" merits the public's attention and concern. Beyond Darden, restaurants account for one of every 12 private sector jobs and are the nation's second-largest private sector employer. The industry has a workforce of nearly 13 million and is one of the country's strongest job creators. National Restaurant Association President Dawn Sweeny says "The industry provides millions with rewarding career and employment opportunities...and whether in the kitchen or the corporate office, restaurants offer a variety of career paths." The Darden discrimination case bears further watching.







EIGHTH-GRADER WILL ATTEND SMU TALENTED AND GIFTED SUMMER PROGRAM



Banking on Good Practices

Back in the day, the music of James Brown prompted many listeners to tap a toe or two. One particular JB song, "There was a time," is as relevant today as it was before – particularly when it comes to how America's banks changed over the years. There indeed was a time when bank profitability was derived from its investments in communities and neighborhoods. There was also a time when many people believed that banks would treat them fairly.

Just as James Brown passed on, so did many of the banking practices of yesteryear. Today's bank customers often harbor a deep and broad resentment as to how these institutions operate. Perhaps a new research report on credit cards from the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL) will enlighten and encourage those now leading our financial institutions to change their ways again. Predatory Credit Card Lending, the latest research from CRL, finds that bank practices that benefited consumers also enhanced financial stability. Conversely, financial institutions focused on maximizing short-term gains through deceptive terms and penalty

fees wound up being more financially at-risk.

The report states in part, "Predatory products seemed profitable in the short term and seemed to help fuel economic growth; but led to a disproportionate escalation in losses when housing markets slowed and the economy soured. Our new research shows this has also been true in the credit card arena."

CRL examined prevalent marketing and pricing practices before the Credit Card Accountability, Responsibility and Disclosure Act (CARD Act) took effect. The analysis of the connection between credit card practices and actual company performance during the recent economic downturn was based on data from the top 100 credit card issuers. After tracking credit losses from 2006 through 2010, CRL found:

- Credit card issuers that engaged in a deceptive or abusive tactic tended to have multiple offenses;

- The larger the financial institution was that was engaged in these misleading practices, the worse their practices tended to be.

- In general, regional or smaller banks and credit unions tended to have clearer and fairer pricing; and

- Common sense curbs on abusive lending benefit everyone – customers, investors, shareholder and ultimately taxpayers.

These findings also suggest that despite current efforts to weaken or dismantle the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, the public and private sectors would be well-served by more and better policing of credit cards and other forms of predatory lending such as overdraft and payday loans.

High-cost penalty fees and rising interest rates became the risk, instead of mitigating it, according to CRL. The report concludes, "This study shows that measures to stop deceptive and unfair lending practices promote market transparency and enhance the health of lenders –and the economy – in the long term."

There was a time when bankers understood that taking care of its customers was just good business. Maybe, in the words of James Brown, they will get back on the good foot.

**Rev. Joseph Lowery Visits Dallas, Endorses
Domingo Garcia, and Speaks about
President Obama and the Black Church**

Reverend Joseph Lowery, Past President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) and called the "Dean of the Civil Rights Movement" came to Dallas to endorse Domingo Garcia for the newly created United States Congress, District 33. Rev. Lowery, 91, stated Mr. Garcia is "the best man running." When asked about supporting Attorney Garcia over an African-American candidate, Rev. Lowery said "I will not as a Black man, who has suffered discrimination for so long...afford to be against anyone because of race, color, or ethnicity. We have to vote for people who are intelligent, have integrity, and have transparency. I think he (Garcia) has all the things we need to be a good Congressman."

On President Obama's statement in support of same-sex marriage, Rev. Lowery said "it was the only position he could take. How can you be a leader of all people, how can you be the President of all people, deny some of the people, same rights that you enjoy? It is for what stands and to say you believe in equal rights for some and not others, I think that is what they call an oxymoron."

When asked about the President's re-election, Rev. Lowery stated, I think he will have a tough time. People are unable to adjust to change. He represents change, he represents progress. He is going to have a tough time, but I think he is going to make it, because I think he is on God's side, and on the right side. His statement about equality in marriage is evident about the kind of character he has: honest, straightforward, and generous.

Rev. Lowery also spoke about the Black church dealing with President Obama's position on same-sex marriage. He stated "the Black church, like everyone else has a difference in opinion. I just hope they, we, think it through. My position is that I believe in equal rights...I think God wants us to love one another as we are."

Rev. Lowery goes on to say, "if we coalesce with people of like minds, and like spirits, we can serve the common good. I think what America is all about is that we are one in mind, one in spirit, one creation and we are not going to let people divide us on the

Jimmy Johnson goes from head Hurricane to Hall of Famer

(AP) - Jimmy Johnson was asked if he ever considered getting back into college coaching and responded by taking out his phone and scrolling through his pictures.

"There's where I live on the ocean," he said. "What I spend my time doing is..."

And Johnson showed the small crowd gathered around him a photo of himself and a 250-pound blue marlin he caught one morning, fishing by himself off the coast of Florida.

"They realize now I'm not coming back," said Johnson, who went 52-9 and won the 1987 national championship in five years at the University of Miami before leaving to become coach of the Dallas Cowboys.

That's OK, Jimmy. You've done enough to be a College Football Hall of Famer.

Johnson was part of a class of 17 former players and coaches selected for the hall by the National Football Foundation and announced Tuesday at the Nasdaq stock exchange in Times Square.

"While winning back-to-back Super Bowls with the Dallas Cowboys was rewarding, the most fun I had in football was in college," Johnson said.

The other coaches to be inducted in December are Phillip Fulmer, who won the first BCS title in 1998 with Tennessee, and R.C. Slocum, the winningest coach in Texas A&M history.

Ty Detmer, the record-breaking 1990 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback for BYU, led a group of 14 players heading to the Hall of Fame.

Steve Bartkowski, who played quarterback at California from 1970-72,

joined Johnson at the news conference in Manhattan. He said the call he received from NFF President and CEO Steve Hatchell to let him know that he had been selected to the Hall of Fame caught him totally off guard.

The rest of the class includes receiver Art Monk of Syracuse; tight end Dave Casper of Notre Dame; tackle Jonathan Ogden of UCLA; running backs Charles Alexander of LSU and Otis Armstrong of Purdue; quarterback Tommy Kramer of Rice; defensive backs Scott Thomas of Air Force and Greg Myers of Colorado State; split end Hal Bedsole of Southern California; defensive end Gabe Rivera of Texas Tech; linebacker Mark Simoneau of Kansas State; and guard John Wooten of Colorado.


