

DEAR EDITOR:

What a remarkable morning prayer we have from David. It is indeed a morning prayer with David lifting his voice unto God with full expectation of hearing from God (verses 1-3). This is an awesome example for us. We should begin each morning directing our prayers to God Almighty. Not only should we begin each morning with prayer, but our lives should reflect habitual practice of sincere prayer. Psalm 55:17 says - "Evening, and morning, and at noon, will I pray, and cry aloud; and He shall hear my voice."

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF PSALMS" "A REMARKABLE MORNING PRAYER" PSALM 5:1-12

Our blessed Saviour serves as One whose earthly ministry was bathed in prayer. The following are some examples in which our Lord engaged in prayer: Matthew 14:23, Mark 6:46, Luke 6:12; 9:28; 11:1; 22:41, 45; 23:43. David, having expressed his heartfelt morning prayer in verses 1-3, declares his total hatred of evil in verses 4-7, for God, who is Holy, hates iniquity. Wickedness is totally against God's character and it does not please God. Evil cannot dwell with Him for "God is Light, and in Him is no darkness at all" (1 John 1:5). Again, wickedness is contrary to the character of God, for Habakkuk 1:13 says - "Thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and

cannot look on iniquity." Although wickedness may abound for a time, ultimately the time will surely come which will bring destruction and total shame on those who practice lies (leasing) and iniquity (v. 6). Thus, David was confident that he would worship God in the tabernacle (v. 7).

In verses 8-12, David petitions God to guide him in righteousness. Because of the fact that God is righteous (vs. 4-6) and the enemies about him are wicked, David's sole desire is to follow God in the way of righteousness (v. 8). In verses 9-10, David is calling on God to judge his foes, whose flattering speech brought about death. David describes their inner

wickedness by saying that their mouth is not trustworthy; they are full of depravity, and their throat is an open sepulcher. Verse 9 is quoted by Paul in Romans 3:13. In verse 10, David prays an imprecatory prayer, calling on God to judge the wicked.

This remarkable psalm closes in verses 11-12 with David's exhortation for the righteous to praise God. If you truly love the name of God, you will praise His Holy and Righteous name. The Lord's name refers to His awesome character and His wonderful attributes revealed to us from scripture. In closing, I also join the psalmist in extolling His name.

Working Hard to Get Back on Track by Marian Wright Edelman

(NPPA)- Since childhood, 21-year-old Ashante Dickens has had a clear goal: "I want to be an elementary school teacher. That's my passion." She got good grades in school, and did well enough in high school to be allowed to take a few early enrollment classes at a nearby college in early childhood education. She was on the road to realizing her dream when a family problem changed her course. Now Ashante is a parent to 1-year-old Tristan and lives in a Detroit homeless shelter where Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter Julia Cass met Ashante and Tristan while on assignment for the Children's Defense Fund. Ashante is still desperately hoping to return to college and her teaching dream, but for now, the shelter offers women and children a home for up to two years while they "get situated," as she says.

Ashante calls herself a "back and forth child." Her mother disappeared from her life when she was six. She grew up in Georgia with her father and spent sum-

mers in Detroit with her grandmother. Ashante's father was an assistant principal and they lived in Cobb County in suburban Atlanta. "I had a good life in Atlanta," Ashante said. But when she was 16 her father had two strokes that affected him mentally as well as physically.

"He became abusive," Ashante said. "He wasn't really right in the head." By then she had reconnected with her mother and told her "about the situation I was going through where he would hit me." Her mother called the police who removed Ashante from the home. She was 17 then and the authorities allowed her to go live with her grandmother in Detroit.

Ashante graduated from high school there and began attending Wayne State University. "I didn't do well," she said. "A lot was going on in my grandma's house . . . My auntie and my brother stayed there, too. It was hard to study and deal with the different personalities." She quit school and started to work at

McDonald's thinking that she would save enough to be able to move into her own place and then pick up her education again. She stopped work when she became pregnant with Tristan and left her grandmother's house for a homeless shelter. After Tristan was born, they moved to a transitional living shelter for mothers and children.

Ashante began receiving cash assistance and food stamps. As soon as Tristan was a few months old she went back to work. "I don't think anybody wants to be on assistance. My motivation is to work harder so I don't need it."

For seven months, Ashante took a three-hour bus trip each way to work a \$7.85 an hour job at a Target in the suburbs. This was her schedule: Take Tristan to day care by 8 a.m., take the three buses to work; work eight hours; take the three buses back to Detroit, pick Tristan up at 11 p.m. One of the buses ran just hourly and if she missed that bus, she would be an hour late. This hap-

pened enough times that her hours were cut back to just 10 a week.

Eventually she left that job and started seeking another. "I've done retail. I've done office work. I've worked in day care so my experience is broad," she said. Her goal is to return to college but she thinks she should work to get a place to live and a car first. In October, she got a job at a McDonald's which is an hour to an hour-and-a-half walk and bus ride each way. The pay was \$7.40 an hour. Temporary Assistance to Needy Families gave her a voucher for day care; otherwise she would have ended up making very little.

"If my dad hadn't had a stroke, I would be somewhere totally different right now," she said. "I'd still be in Georgia. I would probably be in my second or third year at Kennesaw State in elementary education. But I'm just going to work to the best of my ability to get back on track. I think I'm young enough to turn it around."

FLEX YOUR (POLITICAL) MUSCLES

November is only six short months away, so the 2012 campaign for the White House is moving full-speed ahead. Because we live in the miracle of this fantastically dizzying digital age with news and information at our fingertips and coming at us from infinite sources; and because more than 274 million Americans are connected to the Internet, you probably won't be surprised that we have converged upon the Internet for any and all tidbits surrounding the presidential candidates since the beginning of the year. Even though Mitt Romney is the presumed Republican nominee, I think it's fascinating to see which candidates attracted the most visitors to their sites. Don't you? Aw, come on, aren't you a little curious?

Nielsen recently profiled the voter-age audience (18+) to see who was checking out which of the (once upon a time not so long ago) five presidential candidates. The sample was extensive, covering 15 different sites during January 2012, including: ABC-NEWS Digital Network, CBS News Network, CNN Digital Network, Daily Kos, drudgereport.com, Fox News Digital Network, Google

News, Huffington Post, MSNBC Digital Network, NPR, NYTimes.com, Politico, USATODAY.com, Wall Street Journal Digital and Yahoo! News Websites. Any of those among your favorites?

In January, President Obama's site received more unique American adult visitors than the four Republican candidates' sites combined. ("Unique" is defined by web analytics as unduplicated or counting only once to a website over a specified time period, as opposed to "new" or "returning.")

Hispanics comprised 17% of MittRomney.com, 37% more Hispanics than were active online during the entire month of January 2012 (12%).

RickSantorum.com attracted the lion's share of women visitors (60%), which was the largest male/female split among the candidates.

Interestingly, 76-year-old Ron Paul, the oldest of the Republican hopefuls, drew the youngest visitors. More than a third of his hits were from members of the 18-34 group. Though it was almost neck-and-neck with Newt Gingrich with male visitors, 56% and 51%, respectively,

RonPaul2012.com won by 4.3 percentage points.

Newt Gingrich's website guests were the most affluent and educated. Twenty-seven percent reported earnings of more than \$100K and half had either a Bachelor's or Post-Graduate degree.

The analysis of why American voters visit which sites is up to the political pundits. Part of the research Nielsen conducted also focused on the News & Information sites that feature political content. Are you surprised to learn that Google News wins the race for the highest concentration of young visitors, those 18-24? Survey results showed that 23% more 18-34 year olds visited Google News in January 2012 than were active online. (It is heartening to me to know that our young people are interested, engaged and involved in our political process. My son is only a few years away from legally casting his first vote. Sigh.) More results:

The next age demographic, Americans 25-49, are most likely to visit Politico and Drudge Report (31%).

Of all the sites studied, NPR enjoyed the largest growth in vis-

itors (up 21% since October 2011).

28% of visitors to Wall Street Journal Digital have a household income of \$100K or more.

Surfers who land on the Drudge Report page were most likely to have a Bachelor's degree, which is more than double the percentage of all active college grad Internet users (36% vs. 17%).

College graduates were more likely to visit a specific candidate's site than visit a News & Information site.

I'm always telling you that knowledge is power, and stressing how you wield power as consumers and how important it is that we pick and choose to use that power wisely. Well, I hope you don't tire of hearing me stress this point. This election is important - no matter which side of the political aisle you may stand on. Read. Watch. Listen. Learn - so you can make the most informed decision possible. The choice and power are in your hands.

Jack shared with me a view of his interview with Dr. Robert Epstein, former editor-in-chief of Psychology Today and editor of over 15 books. Our subject questions finally evolved around to 'why are arranged marriages working and mainstream marriages failing'? Just to give you a sense of the percentages between the two groups-let's look at marriage between a male and female in America. Mainstream marriages have a fail rate of over fifty(50%)percent of first marriages. Two thirds of second marriages fail and about ¾ of third marriages fail. Staggering, don't you

think? That, as plain as day, is the ultimate breakdown of values.

In 1982, we watched in awe as Dr. Moon, married and blessed over 2,075 couples at Madison Square Garden in New York City. The anniversary of this event is approaching its 30th year and a world wide gala is being planned in New York City, to be satellited, streamed and screamed around the world in celebration of family. Interesting enough, the "Moon Marriages" have been adopted and practiced by many more cultures and religion, including some very close to your religion. A recent survey estimates that 83 percent of those couples that were blessed in marriage 30 years ago are still intact. In India, where divorce is legal, and a high, high percentage of marriages are arranged, they have the lowest divorce rate in the world. Arranged marriages fail rate is harboring around 70% in the top industrialized countries.

There is clearly a gap there. Maybe our Hollywood and 'real wiles' examples are not working.

WHO NOT TO VOTE FOR

'For Where I Sit' by Sandra Crenshaw

The dismal turnout of a full week of voting in the Dallas County primaries may indicate a low turnout election on next Tuesday.

Perhaps voters need more time because for the first time in a long time, voters have fresh faces on the ballots challenging political icons like Dallas County Commissioner John Wiley Price and Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson, three trying to take Barbara Mallory Carraway state representative seat and a unusually large field of attorneys vying to become Judges.

"It's time, we need new fresh people in office -younger ideas," they resound in their radio advertisements. Most of this freshman group are targeting the social media savvy with internet websites and slic literature handouts. The question that the late Al Lipscomb would ask "But where is the dirt under their fingernails? What have they done for the community? All of their resumes are impressive from Harvard law degrees, to serving on non profit boards, to just being active responsible citizens.

We asked for 'em. We complain that no one steps up to the plate to challenge career politicians. Don't get me wrong, opposition is healthy for democracy, brings new ideas, forces debate and serves to hold the incumbents accountable. But from where I sit, my fear is that few of these up and coming potential leaders have convinced me that they even know the duties of the county, state, and government offices they seek and more importantly, how do they know what the citizens they seek to represent feel on the issues. If a candidate does not seek to know what the voter wants from an elected officials, how can I be assured that the candidate will represent our views. If the candidate has never spoke out on an issue, tried to change laws, stood up for what is right, what do I have to gauge one's electability? Instead of hosting a forum that revealed how little these new candidates are prepared to take on incumbents, I engaged in conversation with most of the political arena newcomers that I thought had potential. Didn't want them to wake up after being slaughtered on Election Day and give up. We need their support on boards and commissions, in PTA's and Homeowner Associations.

I tell those on their maiden voyage, that Price, Johnson, and other long time elected officials did not get to where they are to being "no fool." There are a lot of things that they have done that voters do not like, but they have never been accused of not knowing their stuff. So instead of concentrating on what they do wrong, learn from what they do right. Here's what I got.

Candidates Daniel Clayton and

Theresa Daniels avoided the hot spots by always answering, "I don't know enough about the issue?????" New political consultant Randall Bryant misinformed his candidate that he could buy the Coalition of Black Democrats endorsement. Dr. Alameel contributed \$15,000.00 to the IMA and then the president of IMA to cut a radio spot Buying votes is one thing that turns the electorate off.

I told Cedric Davis, who is the sharpest in his field of opponents, that the electorate do not get out of their cars to read yard signs. His response was that some election clerks thought that they were cute. I tried to tell Micah to appeal to the seniors who do not like John's activists protest ways. The late NAACP regional director Richard Dockery always told me to not argue with a fool in public because the onlookers will only see two fools arguing. Every chance Micah gets he's tried to provoke John in public. I asked him why do you think voters want to jump out of the skillet into a frying pan. Taj Clayton office staff rejected my input without even giving me an opportunity to express it and I know I have at least 300 voters I influence in District 30 with my pen alone. He said that he had some consultants from Houston that he has hired for GOTV but that he wanted me to lobby the precinct chairs for his support I replied that I didn't know what to tell them? Knight did double performance duty, also singing "The Way We Were." Kelly Clarkson also performed on the show.





Wilson began her career in education as a fifth-grade teacher at the Yuma School District #1 in 1997, and came to Dallas ISD in 1999 as a math teacher at Skyline High School. She has been the associate principal at Hill for the past two years where she is credited with improving morale among staff and students as well as improving student performance.

"As a campus administrator, I have seen many things in regards to people. I have seen our children at their very best, those who have the healthiest of households and the most caring parents versus those who seem to be raising themselves," said Wilson. WHO WILL BE THE NFL'S NEXT BEST BLACK QUARTERBACK?

Last year was simply the year when the Black quarterback took over the football world. From Cam Newton's record-breaking rookie season to Robert Griffin III's winning the Heisman, never have two African-American signal callers shared the limelight as America's darlings. With Griffin set to enter the professional ranks as the NFL recovers from Newton's breakthrough, both men appear to be trendsetters at the position. However, more importantly, both players appear to have scrubbed away the stigma normally associated with the Black quarterback. But who has the clearest path to becoming the next best Black signal caller, Newton or Griffin III? Perry Green and Stephen D. Riley, two Afro sports writers, debate the issue.

Riley: Standing at just a hair under 6-foot-6, Newton's build, enthusiasm and smile bring a Magic Johnson-type of athlete to the position. After storming through defenses in 2010 on the way to a 50-touchdown Heisman campaign, Newton didn't take a step back like most rookie signal callers do upon entering the National Football League - he jumped forward. His first two games were 400-yard passing efforts in a season of 14 rushing

touchdowns. Simply put, Newton redefined the profile of Black quarterbacks in just one season. There was a reason Carolina Panthers owner Jerry Richardson warned Newton to stay away from any tattoos or piercings and it wasn't racial. But why do anything to harm your appearance when you're scheduled to be the best Black quarterback who has ever played the position?

Green: When was the last time you've seen an NFL franchise nearly sell the farm to acquire a Black passer? The answer, in short, starts with never. Griffin's Heisman campaign at Baylor bolted him into the headlines but his moxie, humbleness and gridiron skills kept him there. After dazzling the NFL combine with a sub-4.4 in the 40-yard dash, no Black quarterback has made more waves prior to the draft than Griffin. He's already being tagged as Washington, D.C.'s savior and he's not even an official Redskin yet. People don't buy hype like that unless it's legit and Griffin is definitely that. He doesn't have the basketball height of Newton or the tight end-like build of his predecessor. But you can argue he's already a better passer and he's definitely more mobile, two things that should equate to a Warren Moon-style career as America's next best thing as a Black signal caller.

Riley: Newton's one-man army rookie routine won't be touched, ever. And he's already in position for an even better

sophomore campaign. The Panthers passer totaled 35 touchdowns last year while still throwing for over 4,000 yards. He finished with an 84.5 quarterback rating and gave defenses fits all year. It isn't so much his skills as a passer that makes him a nightmare matchup but just the overall package. You're not going to tackle him one-on-one in the open field and even when you get two, three or four hands on him, he's still not going down. His size gives him the direct advantage over Griffin in terms of durability but the clean-cut image and billion-dollar smile also gives him the advantage in terms of endorsements. This is what a cash cow looks like.

Green: Griffin's been transcending opinions about him for years and his low-key attitude should help appeal him to the media. As much as I like Newton, will America ever get over a semi-scandal his father helped create at Auburn? And will he ever be able to shake stories about stolen laptops at Florida? Griffin has kept things square about football. And while both men are talented beyond their years, if we're talking about overall total package then Griffin's squeaky clean image makes him the frontrunner. His touch on the deep ball will keep the high-lights churning and as long as he continues to exhibit that same rarified persona while making plays at the same time, he's set to easily become the face of the Black quarterback.

Barber Shop Gossip: NBA Playoffs - How Dwyane Wade Found Redemption

AT PRESS TIME

(AP) - Near the end of the first half of the Miami Heat's crucial 101-93 victory over the Indiana Pacers in Game 4 of their second round series on Sunday afternoon, Dwyane Wade dribbled the ball around the three-point line, with nowhere to go. He couldn't shake Pacers forward Paul George, and the sequence symbolized Wade's performance up to that point: he looked lethargic, inefficient, lost.

Coming off a Game 3 outing in which he scored five points on 2 for 13 shooting in a Miami loss - Wade reportedly had fluid drained out of his left knee prior to that game - Wade's nightmare continued in the first half on Sunday. He was 1-8 from the field. The Heat had trailed by double-digits.

Even since Wade led the Heat to the 2006 NBA championship, Wade could do no wrong in Miami. Among NBA fans, he had a good-guy reputation; you didn't hate the Heat because of Wade. He wasn't the one making the Decision.

But lately, Wade's has been the subject of a bit of backlash. "Dwyane Wade is more of a jerk than LeBron James," writes one blogger. "Gotta say, I never thought I'd write those words." Wade has been committing hard fouls; in Game 2 against the Pacers, for example, a frustrated Wade shoved Indiana point guard Darren Collison on a fast break, after Wade missed a shot - and didn't receive a foul call - on the other end.

Remember when Wade clobbered Kobe Bryant in the All-Star game, breaking his nose? Wade didn't even walk over to Bryant to check if he was OK.

Last month, Wade spouted off about the Olympics, saying that NBA players should be compensated for their service. He backtracked, but those comments endeared him to no one. And in Game 3 of the Pacers series on Thursday, Wade got into a shouting match with coach Eric Spoelstra on the sidelines.

What's gotten into this guy? That thought was on the mind of millions as Wade dribbled the ball against George. Seemingly

out of options, Wade finally stepped back behind the three-point line, and fired a shot. Ack, there he goes again, forcing another one.

But this shot fell. And Wade became unleashed.

Before Wade hit this three-pointer, he may have been at the lowest moment of his NBA career. After he made it, he may have saved himself, and the Miami Heat's season. Wade went on to finish with 30 points in Miami's Game 4 road victory, which evened the series at 2-2. If Miami lost that game, the Heat might have been toast. With Wade playing like a scrub, and Chris Bosh out with an abdominal strain, Miami had little hope.

Wade had plenty of help from his buddy LeBron James: James scored 40 points, grabbed 18 rebounds and dished out 9 assists against Indiana. Soon after Wade hit that three, James hit Wade with a beautiful backdoor pass; Wade finished it with a baseline dunk, which also helped charge him up. James connected with Wade on a pretty lob pass early in the second half too. When James and Wade play off each other like they did on Sunday, they raise basketball to a level we rarely see.

The anti-Wade sentiment felt forced, anyway. It's almost as if America must display a certain amount of Heat hatred, and if we can't direct it at LeBron, who's been playing great, and if Bosh is out, we have to target Wade. Sure, the fouls are crude. But on another team, would Wade just be labeled a hard-nosed, physical player? He did not try to break Bryant's nose, and in the glorified pickup atmosphere of the All-Star game, it was refreshing to see some competitive flair.

And the Spoelstra episode was blown way out of proportion. Coaches and players bite at each other all the time. Since when is Spoelstra sacrosanct, and can't be questioned?

On Sunday, Wade responded to his critics, in full. Now, don't be surprised if Miami just marches to the Finals.


