DALLAS ISD BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVES MIKE MILES AS SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Dallas Independent School District Board of Trustees voted to name Mike Miles as the district's new Superintendent of Schools. The board approved hiring Miles with an 8-1 vote during a recent board meeting.

Miles' contract, approved by trustees, will provide him a salary of \$300,000 a year for 3 years. This move puts Miles at the helm of the nation's 14th largest school district.

"This obviously is an exciting time for me," said Miles. "I'm looking forward to working with the dedicated people here in Dallas ISD, the staff, parents and the community. I know great things are ahead for us as we move forward for the good of our students."

Miles' first official day on the job will be July 1, 2012. However, the board voted to enter into an additional Administrative Services Agreement with Miles that would allow him to get to work immediately. That agreement would be for a period of no more than 15 days between now and his official start date. Under that agreement, Miles will receive a day rate of \$1,000.

"And Then Life Happens" by Auma Obama

(AP)-In her new memoir, "And Then Life Happens," Auma Obama writes about how she recognized in her long-lost half-brother Barack a kindred spirit, someone who often felt misunderstood and craved a connection. Brother and sister would eventually weave together their tales of familiar love and loss, and of father who often fell short of expectations.

Through this ritual of sharing tales, each hungrily devouring details of the other's life, the siblings would forge a lifelong bond despite their separation in childhood. In her book, Auma writes that she realized that in many ways, she and her brother were living parallel lives. He worked as a community organizer in a poverty-stricken Chicago neighborhood, while she grew up in a poor Kenyan village and later fought discrimination against Africans in Germany. Still, when she first met the future president on a 10-day trip to Chicago, she told Curry, "I initially was afraid that I might not like him as a person because I didn't even know him. I knew about him all my life, but I didn't know him."



Presently, the richest 1% of the American population own 37.1% of the country's total wealth. Collectively their adjusted gross income was \$1.3 trillion in 2010. And while \$343,927 was the minimum income level to be included, on average, top 1-percenters made \$960,000. The next 19% own 50.6% of the country's total wealth. Or, 80% of Americans only own 12.3% of the country's total wealth. Consequently, there exists major wealth inequality in the United States.

The 1% has climbed the ladder of success and then has kicked the ladder out of place so others cannot climb up. But, it is a known fact that the way the bottom group can advance is through education.

Over the last 11 years, the school's curriculum has evolved where it now prepares students for entrance into the computer and medical technology fields. PCCenter received its accreditation from the Accrediting Commission of Career Schools and Colleges in 2006, and it is now approved and/or licensed by the Texas Workforce Commission Career Schools and Colleges, the Veterans Administration, the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services, and Title IV of the U.S. Department of Education.



The African American Education Archives and History Program (AAEAHP) of Dallas celebrated its 10th Anniversary this year at the Annual Hall of Fame Luncheon held at Oak Cliff Bible Fellowship Church Activity Center on April 14. Ten years ago, Dr. Harry Robinson, Jr., Dr. Jesse Jai McNeil, Jr. and Dr. Alfred L. Roberts, Sr. envisioned the establishment of an organization that would document and preserve the history and voices of those who changed the face of education for African American students in Dallas County. Beginning in 2003, the inaugural event recognized and honored senior educators who were 80+ years of age at a public reception. Since its inception, the AAEAHP has a collection of artifacts, documents and visual images as well as recorded interviews of people involved in the education experience of African American students. The efforts of the AAEAHP volunteers have resulted in eighty five individuals inducted into the AAEAHP Hall of Fame. A permanent pictorial exhibition of inductees (2004-2012) is located in the Helen Giddings Solarium in the African American Museum in historic Fair Park. Major financial contributions were received from Dr. Gwendolyn Clark, retired DISD Principal, and community partner, Friendship West Baptist Church. Hall of Fame inductees, their families and friends, as well as AAEAHP Board of Directors and Advisory Committee have enthusiastically supported the programs and events.





Walker Becomes First Recipient of the Gates Millennium Scholar from BTWHSVA

On April 19, Ursula Walker received the long awaited news that she became one of the "One Thousand Scholars" chosen by The Gates Millennium Scholarship Committee this year. Making her also, the first recipient of the scholarship from Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing & Visual Arts and beating out over 24,000 GMS applicants. The "One Thousand" recipients of this prestigious scholarship will be financially assisted throughout their higher academic journey from the first day of college as a freshman to a Bachelors, Masters and even a Doctorate Degree.

"It was a very long and challenging application process," said Ursula, "but I was determined to complete the application because I did not want to graduate college in major debt or put that kind of financial burden on my mother. Unfortunately, my family learned the hard way about college debt through my big brother's college experience. When he graduated from Townview in 1999, he and my mother did not know they could apply for outside grants or scholarships other than what FASFA offered, which included several types of government and student loans. But after the dust settled, my brother was almost \$80,000 in debt with a large monthly payment that my mother had to help re-pay. This time however, we all thought "out of the box."

"Now, as a Gates Millennium Scholarship recipient, I feel more confident and optimistic that as long as I stay in school and keep my grades up, there are no limits as to what I can achieve without it devastating me financially. I just want to thank the GMS Committee for seeing "my potential" and "my dream" out of 24,000 other hopefuls. I want to thank every single one of my Teachers, Counselors, and Principals at all three Arts Magnets for their encouragement, guidance, and support over the years. Especially to those currently, for writing the recommendation letters, providing me with the documents that were required in a timely manner, and for helping me to stay focused on my academic and artistic goals."

"Thanks also to the non-profit organizations like Angel Faces and Ordered Steps who

have been so instrumental in my life. I thank them and all of the other organizations that allowed me to serve with them as they served the community. I especially want to thank my mother and my brother for everything they have done for me. For they have spent many hours long into the night on so many occasions helping me with whatever I needed help with, including the GMS application. Nine essay type questions, some with two to five parts, was no joke. But we did it and I feel extremely blessed, grateful, and honored to be one of the "Gates Millennium Scholars Class of 2012". I give all the praise and glory to God," she added "for He has rewarded me for everyone's diligence and made all of this possible."

Ursula Walker began her artistic journey modeling for the Campbell Agency at the age of eight months old. She began working as a paid actor in her first speaking roles at the age of five in the Gospel Musical Stage Play He's Always Right On Time written by M.P. Stone and The Black Nativity a Willie Minor Production presented at The South Dallas Cultural Center. She then attended Sidney Lanier Elementary School for the Exploratory Arts and Greiner Middle School for the Performing Arts where her focus was theatre and dance of all disciplines.

For many years Ursula was a repeat student of The Dallas Children's Musical Theatre Program, KD Studio's Film & Theatre Program, TBAAL's Summer Youth Theatre Series, AFPAC Theatre Program, The Debbie Allen Summer Dance Intensive, and Ordered Steps Productions Praise Dance Ministry.

As an accomplished dancer by the age of eleven, she was chosen to dance with both "The Trakk Team" and "The Untouchables" professional dance troupes. Ursula was also choreographing dances for AFX and GTOP Praise Dancers and after three years was promoted from student to Jr. Assistant Dance Director with Ordered Steps.

Ursula is currently a top academic ranking senior at BTWHSVA with a major focus in Theatre. She is a member of The Advanced Acting & Directing Class and was recently inducted into the International Thespian Society. 

'Jumpstarting' Black Businesses

ness owners haven't been bitten by the "crowd-funding" bug that tech-savvy entrepreneurs have begun to use to attract growth capital to their enterprises.

So, taken as a whole and viewed on the surface, the elements of the JOBS Act hold little promise of alleviating the pressure most Black business owners feel when seeking capital for growth and expansion of their businesses.

But the JOBS Act is a good thing, right? Well, sort of. The new legislation absolutely provides the impetus for Black businesses to develop the new tools needed to make the "jump-start" bill work for us. We have to begin to think of our businesses in entirely new ways, particularly in matters of scale. Most Black-owned businesses fit the description of "micro-enterprises." The small businesses

addressed in the JOBS Act can pool up to \$2 million in investment capital, issue up to \$50 million in stock, or grow to \$1 billion in revenue before attracting Securities & Exchange Commission (SEC) attention, in most cases. Most of us only wish we were that "small."


Sounds like an apples and oranges comparison, right? Whatever the distinction between micro vs. small enterprise, we'll be working to figure out how to make this work for us. It's pretty clear we'll have to develop some new expertise. That means more joint ventures, more mergers, more working together, more creativity in the ways we position our businesses for growth.

The U.S. Black Chamber (USBC) will begin to work to engage our friends and supporters from the world of investment banking to develop strategies on how

best to make the JOBS Act work for Black businesses across the country. With a little elbow grease, some new tools - and a huge helping of luck - we'll have a first draft ready for presentation at the USBC School of Chamber Management this summer.

There is one provision included in the JOBS Act that holds a bit more short-term promise. The Capital Expansion Act (HR 4088) increases the number of shareholders able to invest in community banks from 500 to 2,000. This one component alone should dramatically spur the development of Black-owned banks across the country, which in turn would open access to more conventional business financing tools.



Poverty and unemployment have risen sharply in our community, and most strikingly, so has hunger. People may not always have an accurate picture of who goes hungry in this country. By and large, the face of hunger is that of thousands and thousands of women and children. What is perhaps most shocking is that children represent almost half of the beneficiaries of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), commonly known as food stamps.

Without SNAP, these children would go to bed hungry each night, seriously jeopardizing their ability to develop and thrive. I want to bring this critical issue to the attention of my constituents and those in the surrounding areas, and I want them to know that combating hunger is the utmost priority for me. The state of hunger that exists in the Dallas area is far too critical to ignore.

In a recent Gallup poll, 19% of metropolitan

households said that there were times when they did not have enough money to buy all the food they needed. In my own district, that number was an overwhelming 29%. Many of these families received help from neighbors, local churches and charities like the North Texas Food Bank. Hunger is too great a problem for charity alone, which is why the federal government invests in SNAP.

In April, 383,483 Dallas County residents received SNAP benefits, the majority of them children and seniors. Benefits averaged just \$4.24 per day, or \$1.41 per meal. Although these payments may seem small, they helped many families from having to choose between necessities like utility payments, medication, and food.

SNAP is a program that works and is fiscally sustainable. Error rates and fraud are at historically low levels, and this program provides economic stimulus to communities throughout our country. Economists estimate that every \$1 spent on SNAP benefits created a \$1.79 ripple effect in our local economy during the recession. A recent report found that SNAP actually lifted 8% of families out of poverty during the worst of the economic downturn.

So why is Congress debating whether to sever this lifeline needed

by so many in this country? The recently-passed House budget proposal would slash SNAP funding by \$133.5 billion, or 17% over ten years, as well as remove the program's ability to respond to unforeseen need. This proposal is contrary to very values we hold as Americans, and how we treat those most in need.

Our foundation as a country was based on the premise of promoting the general welfare for our citizens. Our government has made a commitment to fostering the equality of opportunity, so that every citizen has the chance to compete on a level playing field. Hunger undercuts that commitment by depressing student achievement, lowering worker productivity, and increasing health care costs for too many Americans.

Unfortunately, many in Washington refuse to acknowledge the importance of this life-saving, stop-gap program, and how it is essential to providing the means necessary for our future generation to succeed.

Now is the time to invest in proven programs like SNAP, not increase hunger by balancing our books on the most vulnerable. Any cuts to SNAP in the budget process will burden hungry Dallas families at a time of record need.


