AWOL Muslim Soldier, Naser Abdo Guilty in Fort Hood Bomb Plot

(AP) - A federal jury Thursday convicted Abdo, a Muslim soldier, on six charges in connection with his failed plot to blow up a Texas restaurant full of Fort Hood troops, his religious mission to get "justice" for the people of Iraq and Afghanistan.

Pfc. Naser Jason Abdo had already traveled hundreds of miles since going AWOL from Fort Campbell, Ky., three weeks earlier. He bought a gun from an online seller in Nashville and paid cash for thousands of dollars of bomb-making components at a major Dallas-area retail store. Trying to avoid being caught, he wore a baseball cap and sunglasses most of the time, never used credit cards while staying in motels and traveling by bus or cab, and he had his roommate's driver's license.

But his luck ran out in Killeen, a city about 150 miles southwest of Dallas and near one of the nation's largest Army posts — Fort Hood.

Eleven Dallas ISD Schools To Close

(Dallas ISD) -The Dallas ISD Board of Trustees has approved a plan to close 11 schools, including nine elementary schools and two middle schools, with other Dallas ISD campuses beginning next school year as a cost-saving measure.

The overall cost savings is estimated at approximately \$11.5 million.

Dallas ISD is projecting a preliminary budget deficit for next year of \$25 million as a result of unprecedented cuts to public education by the Texas Legislature during the 2011 legislative session.

The schools to be consolidated with other campuses include: City Park Elementary School; Julia C. Frazier Elementary School; Phyllis Wheatley Elementary School; N.W. Harllee Elementary School; Arlington Park Elementary School; James W. Fannin Elementary School; James B. Bonham Elementary School; Oran M. Roberts Elementary School; D.A. Hulcy Middle School; H.S. Thompson Elementary School; and, during the 2013-14 school year, Pearl C. Anderson Middle School.


In accordance with district policy, the schools that will be consolidated with others are predominantly campuses that are significantly underutilized, have low enrollment, or are in close proximity to other campuses with available student capacity.

This past spring, a citizens budget review commission appointed by the Board of Trustees recommended that the district examine the possibility of consolidating some campuses with others to save money.

The majority of the schools that will be consolidated with others have fewer than 300 students. Seven of the 11 campuses recommended for consolidation with others are currently operating at less than 60 percent capacity.

Romney clinches 2012 Republican Nomination with Texas Victory

(AP) - Mitt Romney clinched the Republican presidential nomination on Tuesday with a resounding victory in Texas and now faces a five-month sprint to convince voters to trust him over Democratic President Barack Obama in the November 6 election.

Although the race has been essentially over for weeks, Romney finally cleared the necessary benchmark of 1,144 delegates for becoming the Republicans' presidential candidate after a long, bitter primary battle with a host of conservative rivals.

He will be formally nominated at the Republicans' convention in Florida in late August.

In a statement, Romney said he was humbled to win enough of Texas' 155 delegates to secure the nomination.

"Our party has come together with the goal of putting the failures of the last three and a half years behind us. I have no illusions about the difficulties of the task before us. But whatever challenges lie ahead, we will settle for nothing less than getting America back on the path to full employment and prosperity," he said.

Texan Republicans on Tuesday also chose their candidate for a U.S. Senate race in November. Lieutenant Governor David Dewhurst faces former state Solicitor General Ted Cruz in the primary. It will end up in a July runoff if neither man can reach 50 percent support.

The U.S. housing market is headed on a solid path to recovery. According to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, mortgage delinquencies have declined for the fourth consecutive month in April, while sales of existing homes in the first quarter of 2012 were 5.3 percent higher than the same period last year.

In Dallas County and North Texas, median home sales prices have increased, property values are up, and the total number of homes for sale has consistently declined.

DEAR EDITOR:

The Huston-Tillotson University 2011-2012 academic year culminated with the conferring of degrees during May's Commencement Convocation for the largest graduating class under President Larry L. Earvin's administration.

More than 2,500 family members and friends attended the early morning, outdoor ceremony full of pomp and circumstance for the 130 members of the Class of 2012 that also included two honorary degree recipients. Terry S. Smith and James R. Wilson both received the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree. Philip Berber offered words of encouragement

to the graduates as the keynote speaker.

Berber founded a series of start-ups during a 20-year entrepreneurial journey that led to the establishment of his current venture. He sold his Internet brokerage company CyBerCorp to Charles Schwab in 2000 to form, along with his wife Donna, A Glimmer of Hope. The social vendor and non-governmental organization (NGO) helps lift women and children out of extreme poverty in Ethiopia. To date, A Glimmer of Hope has helped to impact more than 2.5 million lives in rural Ethiopia by constructing more than 4,000 water projects, 335 school build-

ings, 170 health facilities, and distributed more than 17,000 microfinance loans.

He recounted his failures and blessings that moved him into his current position that provided the background of his "Future Favors the Bold" message with three key points of encouragement: "Life is full of challenges and set backs...but it's how you respond to them that will make all of the difference; do what you love and love what you do; and be in service to others, and so you will be in service to yourself." He compared his challenges and lessons learned to those of several of the graduates. "Keep believing in yourself. Never

give up on yourself, and never, never, ever give up on your dreams," he stated.

Berber also recalled the words of the late Steve Jobs, co-founder of now Apple Inc., who encouraged graduates to love what they do. "Being engaged in a purposeful, meaningful way will fill your heart and sometimes, more than you know, will touch, or inspire, or help someone along their path," Berber concluded.

What an earnest heartfelt psalm we have before us. Psalm 6 is addressed to "The Chief Musician on Neginoth upon Sheminith. The term Sheminith probably means "upon the octave" and like all of the psalms, this psalm was accompanied by a neginoth which is a stringed instrument. Whereas Psalm 5 is an imprecatory psalm, Psalm 6 is a penitential psalm. An imprecatory psalm is one where the psalmist calls a curse upon his enemies or invokes God to impose evil on his enemies. To the contrary, the penitential psalm is one

where the psalmist expresses sorrow to God for having done wrong; in essence he is being repentant.

Psalm 6 begins in verses 1-4 revealing David's urgent cry of repentance and his sincere plea for God's mercy. David, a child of God, is crying out in mercy for spiritual relief because he felt so low spiritually and was drowning in the very depths of despair. Have you ever felt that way? about 300 times! The Lord surely wants us to believe this awesome affirmation!


Paul wrote that the return of Christ will be "the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ..." (Tit.2:13)

Some of the best advice I ever received was to make sure I never comingle my personal and business finances. When you're just getting started, it's typical to use your personal accounts for business expenses. However, establishing accounts in the name of your business creates a clearer financial picture, allowing you to more easily track and manage business expenses. It also helps lenders and investors when making decisions regarding financing and investments.

Last but certainly not least, make it official. African Americans are infamous for "side hustles," and finding ways to earn extra income beyond your regular nine-to-five is generally encouraged. If you find yourself with a profitable business venture that is marketable and has the potential for

long-term success, go ahead and file the appropriate paperwork to legally establish your business. This could create opportunities to grow your business and increase revenue by providing access to bank and government financing options, as well as other resources.

Long story short, over several years my business grew to serve over 100 clients and I was able to sell it and move on to other career aspirations. I know that this success came from careful planning and management and a willingness to seek advice. I also gained quite a few gems of wisdom as a small business owner that continue to benefit me today:

- Good service breaks down barriers.
- Follow through on what you promise.
- Deliver your best.

• Network and seek guidance - no matter how much you think you know, there is always something new to learn.

• Regardless of whether you work for a company or are self-employed, leverage the skills you have to capitalize on opportunities.





Congressional District 30 and John Wiley Price for County Commissioner, Precinct 3, in this year's Democratic Primary. They will have no Republican challengers in the fall election, thus will maintain their elected positions.


Toni Rose, local activist and Paul Quinn graduate, won the majority of votes for State Representative, District 110. She easily beat Cedric Davis and Larry Taylor for the seat held by Barbara Mallory-Caraway. Also, Theresa Daniels won the majority of votes for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, a new district remapped as a result of population changes shown in the 2010 census.

There will be a runoff election for U. S. Congressional District 33. Domingo Garcia received 43.9% of the vote and Marc Veasey, 17.02%. District 33 is a new Congressional District created as a result of population increase in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex.

On the Republican side, Mitt Romney received 72.82% of the votes in Dallas County and now has enough delegates to officially become the Republican nomination for President of the United States. David Dewhurst and Ted Cruz will be in a runoff election for U. S. Senate Republican candidate.
