## DALLAS ISD EIGHTH-GRADERS MAKE SIGNIFICANT GAINS IN READING ON STAAR

Texas raised its standards for mathematics and reading this year, and Dallas Independent School District eighth-grade students rose to the occasion with an improved passing rate in reading on the first administration of the 2016 STAAR exam.

Overall, Dallas ISD eighth-graders taking the English version of the test improved their passing rate in reading by 3.4 percentage points from the previous year. A particular highlight is the 5.8 percentage point increase in reading for African-American students and an 8.4 percentage point increase for English Language Learners. Economically disadvantaged students also performed well, with a 3.1 percent increase in their passing rate.

Passing rates in reading for fifth-grade students held mostly steady, with a .2 percent increase from the year before. With all results, the passage data reflects student performance even as state standards have increased.

"The improvement by our eighth-grade students in reading is encouraging, and the fifth-grade reading results identify where we need to focus our efforts" said Superintendent Michael Hinojosa. "We believe the hard work of our students, teachers and staff will create more stepping stones as we raise achievement for all students."

Dr. Wright Lassiter Jr., chancellor emeritus of the Dallas County Community College District, received the 2016 national Leadership Award from the American Association of Community Colleges during the organization's annual conference in Chicago this month.

AACC's Leadership Award, which began as an annual tradition in 1982, is presented to individuals whose accomplishments and professional contributions to the community college field have been outstanding. An awards committee comprising the AACC board of directors reviews all nominations and makes the final selections.

Lassiter is one of three recipients who were honored for their service and leadership to community colleges. Dr. Walter Bumphus, president and CEO of AACC, said, "With nearly 150 years of higher education among them, Wright Lassiter, George Boggs and Brice Harris have helped usher community colleges into the modern age and to prepare them for the future."

Boggs served as the ninth president and CEO of AACC, and Brice retired this month as chancellor of the California Community Colleges system.

Dr. Joe May, DCCCD's current chancellor, said, "Throughout his distinguished career, Dr. Lassiter has provided leadership and vision not only for the Dallas County Community College District but also for the mission of community colleges across the entire country. He's an esteemed colleague and friend, and we congratulate him on this well-deserved national honor."

Prior to joining the Tribune in 1983, Curry worked for 11 years as a reporter for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and for two years as a reporter for Sports Illustrated.

### The Browns selected former Baylor WR Corey Coleman with the No. 15 pick in the 2016 NFL Draft

BEREA, Ohio (AP) - The Browns came into the NFL draft craving speed, a downfield target and someone to score touchdowns. Corey Coleman fills all three criteria.

"I can do a little bit of everything," he said.

After ignoring a vital position for much of the past few seasons, the Browns nabbed the first wide receiver in the draft, selecting the quick Coleman from Baylor with the No. 15 overall pick.

The Browns traded out of the No. 2 overall spot and a chance to pick a potential franchise quarterback last week and then made another deal to move down before selecting Coleman, who scored 20 touchdowns last season.

Coleman won the Fred Biletnikoff Award last season, given to the nation's top receiver. Coleman's speed - he's been clocked at 4.38 seconds in the 40 - made him attractive to the Browns, Browns vice president of football operations

Sashi Brown said Coleman was the team's top-rated wide receiver and the team was thrilled he was still available at 15. "He's a tremendously productive, dynamic playmaker," Brown said. "It's something we

haven't had here in recent years. With Corey's speed, tenacity and ability to turn small plays into long plays, we're really excited to bring him here."

Lassiter said, "I am deeply honored and humbled to have been deemed a worthy recipient of the AACC Leadership Award and to share the award program with two leadership icons in the community college field. A special word of thanks and gratitude to my long-time friend and colleague, Walter Bumphus, for presenting my name to the board of directors for consideration."

He added, "I have long held the view that awards should also be shared with the various individuals and teams that I have been privileged to work with for nearly four decades. Our work together has been shaped by two lasting themes: 'The largest room in any house is the room for improvement'; and 'Service is the rent that you pay for the space that you occupy here on earth.'"

Lassiter was appointed DCCCD's sixth chancellor in

2006. He also was the district's first African-American chancellor. During his tenure as CEO, he provided leadership for the system's seven colleges and multiple locations. He oversaw a successful \$450 million bond election and program implementation which resulted in the construction of 29 buildings throughout the district - including five new community education campuses in either underserved or fast-growing areas of Dallas County. The new facilities met the needs of unprecedented enrollment growth as DCCCD enrolled more than 80,000 credit and 25,000 continuing education students.

Grants from the Texas Workforce Commission allowed DCCCD to work more closely with companies and also to prepare more workers in the county for high-demand jobs.

Lassiter served as president of DCCCD's El Centro College for 20 years before

he was appointed chancellor. He played an instrumental role in founding the El Centro College Middle College in 1988, which now is named the Wright L. Lassiter Jr. Early College High School. Students earn dual credit at Lassiter ECHS and can graduate with both an associate degree and a high school diploma.

DCCCD's former chancellor retired in 2014. He continues to serve as a graduate school faculty member at Dallas Baptist University and is the author of 13 books. Earlier in his career, Lassiter was president of Bishop College in Dallas. In 1979, he became the first black college president in the State University of New York System when he led Schenectady Community College.

## Dallas ISD Eighth-Graders Make Significant Gains In Reading On STAAR

Fifth-grade students showed a solid increase in their mathematics exam passing rate from the year before, growing 2.8 percentage points. While nearly every group of students posted a gain of 2.3 percentage points or greater, African American students set the pace at 4.7 percent. This is particularly notable as Texas is increasing adjusted

mathematics standards this school year.

A lower percentage of eighth-graders passed the mathematics exams on the first administration, with a 4.5 percentage point decrease from the prior year.

Dallas ISD leaders expressed optimism that the STAAR results reflected more gains than decreases, and said that work will continue to improve across all subject areas.

"The first administration STAAR results have many positives while also underscoring the work ahead," Hinojosa said. "The STAAR results are an important indicator of performance, but they should also be seen in the context of other important signs of progress at the student, campus and district level. I am encouraged by the multiple signs of progress that show we are on the right track."

## DERAY'S CAMPAIGN FOR MAYOR OF BALTIMORE IS A WIN FOR THE BLACK LIVES MATTER MOVEMENT

imperfectly. We all might have liked an Affordable Care Act, for example, that looked more like universal health care, but the legislative process of compromise left folks out. The legislative process is, by necessity, a compromising process where people rarely get everything they want.

On the other hand, from the outside, people can yell, scream, march, write, and influence. From the outside, the practicalities of legislation aren't especially relevant. Outside protesters are trying to get attention. They count on legislators to respond to their protest song by paying attention to their issues and legislating them. That's why I was just a bit chagrined when President Obama told the Black Lives Matter folks to stop yelling. Yelling is their job. His job is to translate their yelling to change, if he so chooses.

The Black Lives Matter folks have been instrumental in this Presidential campaign in forcing Democrats Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders to deal with race in ways they might not have. Neither of them has gone far enough, although both have conceded some attention to reparations issues, and talked more explicitly about racial economic justice.

Mckesson says he "challenged the status quo of Baltimore's politics," and in many ways he did. He and his team took the pain of the Freddie Gray murder and

turned it into the power of a galvanizing campaign. His scant 3077 votes (with 99 percent of the votes counted) underestimate the impact of his race in that his race is empowering for other young people. Especially young people who are considering electoral politics, and his race establishes him as a meaningful voice in Baltimore politics. Presumptive Mayor Catherine Pugh should figure out a way to use his talents (perhaps on the Police Commission) as Baltimore continues to heal.

"While we did not win tonight, what we did was very important, and I want you to be as proud of our work together as I am," Mckesson wrote to his supporters. "We did something very special, and it sets the table for what else is possible." Almost anything is possible for Mckesson and the Black Lives Matter activists. It is my hope that these activists connect the immediate reality of anti-black violence in law enforcement with the more systemic reality of structural anti-black violence that manifests itself through economic oppression, political subjugation, and social inequality. In the United States, this violence demonstrates through income, wealth and unemployment gaps, through voter suppression and biased laws, and through microaggression. The extent of the violence is clouded by the myth of post-racialism. Even with an African

American president activists needed to assert that #BlackLivesMatter because the Obama presidency offered no protection for Tamir Rice, Eric Garner, Michael Brown and so many others. The myth of post-racialism is insufficient to quell structural and persistent anti-black violence.

Hopefully Mckesson will not be the last Black Lives Matter activist to involve himself in electoral politics. This 2016 Presidential season has been great in illustrating some of the shortcomings of our electoral system, but also some of its strengths. That Bernie Sanders could enter a race with just a 3 percent approval rating and amass a war chest \$27 at a time is amazing. That he could seriously rival the presumptive front-runner and push her agenda to the left is commendable. That DeRay Mckesson could go from outside agitator to inside candidate is a measure of what is possible. Imagine what would happen if there were more voter participation and if more people understood how we could accomplish so much more by working inside and outside of the political system.

## BLACKONOMICS: ARE BLACK PEOPLE BECOMING OBSOLETE?

Coalition-building is the best way for Black people to make the kind of progress we need to make in this country, especially when it comes to economic empowerment. Some have posited that Black people are swiftly becoming obsolete. From the agricultural economy to the industrial and mass production economy Black folks, in some cases, had it going on. Many individual Blacks did quite well with jobs and businesses in those areas. As we moved through the technology/information economy and now into the knowledge-based economy, the rules for survival have changed.

Are Black people as a group becoming obsolete? Someone said, "All the shoes have been shined and all the cotton has been picked," which suggests that Black people are no longer needed by White folks, therefore, if we do not change our ways when it comes to business and job development we will indeed become obsolete. Frederick Douglass, Booker T. Washington and Marcus Garvey spoke of a time when we would have to consider the question of Black obsolescence if we did not awaken from our deep sleep and refuse to be dependent upon the largess of others for our sustenance.

The strength we gain from coalescence will bring about this much-needed change, and one major step is to reach out

and connect with other like-minded people of African descent. This should be done on a national and an international level, the closest area being just south of our country-the Caribbean.

One of the greatest Africans in modern history was born in Jamaica. Of course, that would be Marcus Mosiah Garvey, who founded the Universal Negro Improvement Association (UNIA). Look across the Caribbean and you will find other Blacks who knew and followed through on solutions; they took action rather than merely talk about their problems. They stood up against aggression, ignorance, and oppression. They understood and followed through on the value of educating their people, and they subscribed to the lessons their elders left behind.

Haitian history shows us strength and refusal to submit to enslavement; it also shows us resolve and a willingness to help others, as in the case of Haitian soldiers going to Savannah, Georgia to fight against the British in the Siege of Savannah on Oct. 9, 1779, during the U.S. Revolutionary War. We also remember the irrepressible Toussaint L'Ouverture, Jean-Jacques Dessalines, and Henri Christophe, Haitians who led the only successful slave revolt in the western hemisphere.

Many Black people came to the United States from the Caribbean and brought with

them the same spirit, the same dedication and drive, and the same resolute character that causes men and women to seek for themselves, as Richard Allen taught back in 1767. Our Caribbean brothers and sisters have come with the determination to do for self, to rely on self, to cooperate with one another, and build an economic system within their own ranks. This article is written in an effort to celebrate our people and establish relationships that will engender cooperation among our people.

Marcus Garvey instructed us to do one thing prior to taking on economic empowerment initiatives. He told us to "Organize!" He shared with us the truth about economic empowerment over political empowerment and how we should seek economics first. He said, "The most important area for the exercise of independent effort is economic. After a people have established successfully a firm industrial foundation they naturally turn to politics and society, but not first to society and politics, because the two latter cannot exist without the former."

Lessons from Garvey and others have led a precious few of us to implement strategies that, in fact, will lead to economic empowerment; we need many more. One such effort is the One Million Conscious Black Voters and Contributors (OMCBV&C), which was established on Garvey's words, "The

greatest weapon used against the Black man is disorganization." The OMCBV&C movement is underway, actively recruiting that critical mass of Black people who will take action rather than merely talk about problems. The One Million will leverage dollars and votes to obtain reciprocity in the marketplace as well as in the public policy arena.

In the tradition of Marcus Garvey, the One Million is organized, cooperative, and supportive of one another. It is entrepreneurial in its philosophy regarding ownership and control of income producing assets. The One Million is molded in the very practical notion of using our own resources to help ourselves and our children. We are committed, dedicated, sacrificial in our giving, and unapologetically Black as we pursue our ultimate goals of economic and political strength in that order.

Black people, no matter where we were born or where we live, must appreciate the fact that we started out in the same place and our differences emanate from our experiences in the nations where our ships docked in the western hemisphere.

## "A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS" ROMANS 4:1-8 AN ILLUSTRATION OF GOD'S PROVIDED RIGHTEOUSNESS

Having shown in this grand book of Romans, mankind's utter need for God's righteousness (Romans 1:18-

3:20), Paul will discuss how God's provided righteousness was imputed in the lives of two prominent Old Testament individuals by faith. Moreover, these two Old Testament figures were declared righteous on the principle of faith, and not on the basis of works. God's grace continues to save any man on the basis of his or her faith and not by works (Galatians 3:22, 26). These two Old Testament figures, Abraham and David served to validate Paul's argument that mankind is saved by trusting Christ to attain salvation, and not by achieving salvation through good deeds. Believers today work because

we are saved, not to be saved! Good works are the fruit of our salvation; it is not the basis of our salvation!

In verse 1, Paul begins his argument in proving that a man is saved based on the faith principle rather than on the basis of works by referring to one who was highly esteemed among the Jews; in addition, he was regarded as the founder of the Hebrew race, for his name was Abraham (Genesis 12:1). Using Abraham as a prime example, Paul will prove that even before the law, Abraham was justified before God by his faith (Genesis 15:6). In reference to verse 2, Abraham, the founder of the

Hebrew race, could never be justified before God on the grounds of works, even though Abraham exhibited many good works. Abraham had many good works to boast in, but he could never boast before God because God does not accept the works of the flesh!

To establish his position that a man is justified completely by his faith, Paul affirms his authoritative position in verse 3 by referring to Genesis 15:6, which says - "And he believed in the Lord; and he counted it to him for righteousness." Thus, Abraham received God's imputed righteousness on the

basis of his faith even before the law! To continue to buttress his argument, Paul declares in verse 4 and 5 that Abraham's imputed righteousness was based on God's grace (unmerited favor) and was not merited on the basis of Abraham's works.

Faith in God's provided righteousness through Jesus Christ is the only condition for receiving salvation! Because of Abraham's faith, God imputed righteousness to Abraham's account! In verse 6, Paul uses another Old Testament figure by the name of David to establish again his position that God's provided righteousness is gained by a man's faith. Whereas

Abraham was justified by God before the law (Genesis 15:6); David received God's righteousness while he was under the law; yet David was never saved by the law! Although David sinned greatly before God (v. 7), he acknowledged the blessedness of being forgiven by God (Psalm 32:1,2). As believers we are part of the "blessed crowd" wherein the Lord has not placed our sins to our account (v. 8). Although we were guilty before God, our guilt was placed upon Christ on an old rugged tree on Calvary. Joyful is the man whose sin the Lord will not reckon to his account.

## George E. Curry, Editor-in-Chief and Publisher of EmergeNewsOnline.com to speak at Commencement at Jarvis Christian College

After Emerge, Curry served for nine years as editor-in-chief of the National Newspaper Publishers Association News Service (NNPA), a federation of approximately 200 African American newspapers, and its companion website, BlackPressUSA.com. The National Association of Black Journalists named Curry its 2003 "Journalist of the Year" for his work in improving the Black Press.

In January 2016, Curry was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the Multicultural Media, Telecom and Internet Council (MMTIC), the nation's leading advocate for minority advancement in communications. A videotaped interview with Curry was conducted by The

HistoryMakers and is stored as part of the African American oral history project at the Library of Congress.

He is the author of Jake Gaither: America's Most Famous Black Coach (Dodd, Mead & Co., 1977), editor of The Affirmative Action Debate (Perseus Books, 1996) and The Best of Emerge Magazine, (Ballantine Books, 2003). He has written a syndicated weekly newspaper column for more than 15 years.

Curry was part of the week-long Nightline special, "America in Black and White." He has also appeared on the CBS Evening News, ABC's World News Tonight, The Today Show, 20/20, Good Morning America, CNN, C-SPAN, BET, TV One, Fox Network News, MSNBC, ESPN and the BBC.

While working as a Washington correspondent for the Chicago

Tribune, he wrote and served as chief correspondent for the widely-praised television documentary, "Assault on Affirmative Action," which was aired as part of the "Frontline" series on PBS. He was featured in a segment of "One Plus One," a national PBS documentary on mentoring.

Curry is past chairman of the Board of Trustees at Knoxville College, his alma mater. As a student at Knoxville College, he was quarterback and co-captain of the football team, editor of the school newspaper and attended Harvard and Yale on summer scholarships.

After delivering the 1999 commencement address at Kentucky State University, he was awarded a Doctor of Humane Letters degree. In May 2000, Lane College in Jackson,

Tenn. also presented Curry with an honorary doctorate after his commencement speech.

He is chairman of the Board of Directors of Young D.C., an independent, metropolitan area newspaper written by and about Washington, D.C.-area teens.

Curry's work in journalism has taken him to more than 20 countries, including Egypt, England, France, Italy, Germany, China, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Malaysia, Morocco, Algeria, Thailand, Cuba, Haiti, Brazil, Ghana, Senegal, Nigeria, Côte d'Ivoire (the Ivory Coast), Mexico, Canada, Austria and the Netherlands.

In 2012, he was part of the official U.S. delegation and a presenter at the U.S.-Brazil seminar on educational equity in Brasilia, Brazil.

### Brief Sports News

**SOCCER LONDON (AP)**- Leicester secured a first Premier League title without playing after second-place Tottenham drew 2-2 at Chelsea in one of the biggest triumphs by an underdog in sports.

Leicester was playing in the second tier only two years ago, came close to being relegated again last year and started this season facing 5,000-1 odds for the title. Now for the first time in their 132-year history Leicester is champion of England after establishing an insurmountable seven-point lead over Tottenham with two games remaining.

The Foxes missed a chance to seal the title on Sunday when they were held by Manchester United. Tottenham had to win at Chelsea to keep its bid for a first title since 1961 alive.

Leicester will collect the trophy on Saturday when it hosts Everton at the King Power Stadium. English soccer has not had a maiden champion of the top flight since Nottingham Forest in 1978. And for the last 20 years the Premier League trophy has never left London or Manchester, with Arsenal, Chelsea, United and City sharing the trophy between them.

**BASEBALL BOSTON (AP)** - Boston Red Sox third baseman Pablo Sandoval, a \$95 million free agent who lost his starting job before going on the disabled list, will have exploratory surgery on his left shoulder to determine the source of the injury.

The team announced the procedure will be performed in Florida by Dr. James Andrews, a specialist in repairing ligaments. The Red Sox said they had no timetable for Sandoval's return, but ESPN reported that the two-time All-Star is expected to miss the rest of the season.

**BALTIMORE (AP)** - Baltimore Orioles shortstop J.J. Hardy will be sidelined for at least a month with a hairline fracture in his left foot.

The injury occurred Sunday, when Hardy fouled a ball off his foot in the fourth inning against the Chicago White Sox. Baltimore was off Monday. Manager Buck Showalter said he expected Hardy to be out 4-6 weeks.

**NEW YORK (AP)** - Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Josh Ravin was suspended for 80 games following a positive test under Major League Baseball's drug program.

Ravin is the eighth player suspended this year under the big league program and the fourth in three weeks. He tested positive for Growth Hormone Releasing Peptide 2 (GHRP-2), the commissioner's office said. Ravin blamed the positive test on a supplement he took during spring training after a bout with intestinal flu and strep throat caused him to lose 20 pounds in about a week.

**PRO FOOTBALL SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP)** - Former San Francisco 49er Dana Stubblefield was charged with the rape of a "developmentally delayed" woman, prosecutors announced.

The Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office said Stubblefield, a former defensive lineman for the San Francisco 49ers and Oakland Raiders, allegedly assaulted the woman on April 9, 2015, at his Morgan Hill home after interviewing her for a baby-sitting job. He is charged with five felony counts and faces a "substantial prison sentence" if convicted. A day before the assault, Stubblefield contacted the then 31-year-old woman on a baby-sitting website and arranged an interview, prosecutors said.

**NEW YORK (AP)** - The New York Jets exercised their fifth-year option on defensive lineman Sheldon Richardson, keeping him under contract with the team through the 2017 season.

The team also announced that it declined the option, as expected, on off-injured cornerback Dee Milliner, meaning the 2013 first-round draft pick can become a free agent after this season.

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** - Looks like there's still a little fuel left James Harrison's tank after all.

The five-time Pro Bowl linebacker announced on his verified Instagram that he plans on returning to the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2016. Harrison posted a picture of his familiar No. 92 jersey emerging from a smoke-filled tunnel with a caption that read: "I'm back."

"I'll be 38 on Wednesday and I'm feeling just like a fine wine.

Getting better with age," Harrison wrote.

Harrison finished with five sacks in 2015, but said after Pittsburgh's loss to Denver in the playoffs that he needed time to figure out if he wanted to come back for a 14th season.

**KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)** - The Kansas City Chiefs have exercised their fifth-year option on left tackle Eric Fisher, which means the former No. 1 overall draft pick is scheduled to make \$11.9 million during the 2017 season.

Fisher had a disappointing first two seasons in the NFL, and some were quick to label the Central Michigan product a bust. But the 6-foot-7, 305-pound lineman appeared to break through last season, even shutting down Texans star pass rusher J.J. Watt during their playoff game.

**ASHBURN, Va. (AP)** - Chris Culliver's time with the Washington Redskins lasted all of six games.

Redskins general manager Scot McCloughan told the injured cornerback that he was being released after the team signed Josh Norman as a free agent and took Kendall Fuller in the third round of the NFL draft. Culliver signed a four-year deal as a free agent a year ago, but he tore the ACL and MCL ligaments in his right knee during practice on Thanksgiving Day.

**PENN STATE ABUSE BELLEFONTE, Pa. (AP)** - Jerry Sandusky's effort to get his child molestation convictions thrown out ran into tough questioning from a judge who voiced doubt about defense lawyers are entitled to question witnesses - including some of the former Penn State assistant football coach's victims.

Judge John Cleland pressed Sandusky attorney Al Lindsay about whether there is sufficient basis for him to allow an evidentiary hearing now, nearly four years after a jury found Sandusky guilty of 45 sex-abuse counts.

Sandusky, wearing an orange prison jumpsuit, took no active role in the hearing that lasted about an hour. On his way into the courthouse, he told reporters to "read what has been written." The 72-year-old ex-coach is serving 30 to 60 years in state prison. He has maintained his innocence.

New coach, Hue Jackson needs to improve a receiving corps that accounted for a league-low eight TDs last season. The Browns scored just 28 TDs and offensive weapons to put defenses on edge. Jackson believes Coleman, who may be undersized at 5-foot-11 and 190 pounds, can change that.

"He scores touchdowns," said Jackson, who spent the past two seasons as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator. "He can light it up from anywhere on the field."

Coleman caught 74 passes for 1,363 yards last season and led the NCAA with 20 catches of 30-plus yards and 11 over

40 yards. Paul DePodesta, the team's new chief strategy officer who earned his reputation building major league baseball contenders, said the group was confident Coleman would still be available if the Browns moved down During Coleman's visit, Jackson showed him video of Bengals Pro Bowl wide receiver A.J. Green. While it remains to be seen if Coleman can develop into a player like Green, Jackson said the 21-year-old has other intangibles. "He has a lot of charisma," Jackson said. "He's very confident, many receivers are very confident - at least the ones I've coached. They want the ball and he's going to be one of those guys who want the ball, and you want a guy who wants the ball."

Bauman is a graduate of The University of Texas at Dallas, where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Political Science and Urban Studies, and a Master of Public Administration degree from Southern Methodist University.

She replaces Robert Strauss of Dallas who was appointed to the DART Board in 2006.
