AFFORDABLE CARE ACT COSTS AND SAVINGS

The new insurance exchanges within the Affordable Care Act have provided millions of consumers with an online database where consumers will be able to purchase coverage plans and compare health insurance plans instantly.

The four levels of plans within the system will provide basic essential coverage for emergency hospitalization, check-ups and prescriptions. The cost of each Medicare supplement plan varies depending on the level, and different companies and providers will offer a variation of premiums, such as higher or lower co-payments and deductibles.

The Bronze plans have the lowest premium, projected to cover 60 percent of expenses. They will require consumers to pay out-of-pocket costs.

The Silver plans are considered the standard available plan's and are projected to cover 70 percent of expenses. The Gold plans will cover 80 percent of expenses. The Platinum plans, with the highest premiums, will cover 90 percent of medical expenses. Catastrophic plans are available to consumers who are under 30 years old and consumers with very low household incomes or large families. This plan provides up to three yearly doctor visits. During this time span, a \$6,400 out-of-pocket deductible will take place before insurance payments start for illness or injury. The lower your income, the more you save.

Two daughters of longtime Dallas educator Dr. Billy Earl Dade joined district officials, parents, students and elected officials Friday, Nov. 8, at the dedication of the new school named in his honor.

Constructed at a cost of \$36.3 million, the 213,616-square-foot school at 2727 Grand Ave. is the second district school dedicated this fall, and serves students from the former Billy Earl Dade and Pearl C. Anderson learning centers.

Superintendent of Schools Mike Miles lauded the modern learning facility and acknowledged Dade's daughters—Dr. Barbara Dade Martin and Ms. Billie Sanford—saying their father, "believed in the power of education to uplift people and communities."

Principal Dr. Alecia Cobb presided at the event, which featured the school's choir, band and Leadership Cadet Corps.

District 100 Texas House member Eric Johnson and Dallas ISD

District 9 Trustee Bernadette Nutall shared their hopes for a bright future for the students served by the new school and encouraged the community to support it as volunteers and involved citizens.

District 7 Dallas City Council Member Carolyn Davis voiced similar sentiments and presented a proclamation in praise of the late Dr. Dade, who served as a teacher, college professor and mentor for more than a half-century. In Dallas ISD, he served as principal at Frederick Douglass, Paul Laurence Dunbar, John Henry Brown, and C.F. Carr elementary schools and Pearl C. Anderson Junior High School. While teaching mathematics at Julia C. Frazier Elementary School and Booker T. Washington High School, he also taught post-secondary classes at El Centro, Bishop and Paul Quinn colleges and Prairie View A&M University.

PRESIDENT BARACK OBAMA PAYS TRIBUTE TO 107-YEAR-OLD WWII VETERAN



President Obama affirmed the country's 'sacred obligation' to care for veterans, long after the end of military conflict. Mark Wilson/Getty Images

President Barack Obama on Monday paid tribute to those who have served in the nation's military, including one of the nation's oldest veterans, 107-year-old Richard Overton.

This is the life of one American veteran, living proud and strong in the land he helped keep free," Obama said during a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery.

Overton rose slowly and stood to loud applause when Obama mentioned his name, then stood a second time at the president's request and drew more applause.

He was among hundreds attending the outdoor ceremony on a crisp, sunny Veteran's Day. Earlier Monday, Overton and other veterans attended a breakfast at the White House.

Obama used his remarks to remind the nation that thousands of service members are still at war in Afghanistan. The war is expected to formally conclude at the end of next year, though the U.S. may keep a small

footprint in the country.

Soon, "the longest war in America's history will end," Obama declared.

As the 12-year-old war draws down, Obama said the nation has a responsibility to ensure that the returning troops are the "best cared-for and best respected veterans in the world." The country's obligations to those who served "endure long after the battle ends," he said.

As president, Obama said he wanted to see the "best cared-for and best respected veterans in the world."

Obama also noted that it has now been 60 years since the end of the fighting in Korea.

"We join as one people to honor a debt we cannot fully repay," he said.

This psalm may be classified as a Maschil or instructional psalm. In fact, the superscription of this magnificent psalm reads: "To the chief Musician, Maschil. A Psalm of David, when Doeg the Edomite came and told Saul, and said unto him, David is come to the house of Ahimelech." The treacherous man of this psalm is Doeg, an Edomite, who betrayed David. There are

those who pretend to be your friend, yet they are really against you.

David, a great leader, was often exposed to danger; especially, being betrayed by one he trusted in like Ahithophel in Psalm 55:13-14. Doeg's treachery is portrayed in II Samuel chapters 21-22. David begins the psalm by describing the fact that the treacherous man brags about his evil. Although the treacherous man boasts about his mischievous behavior, the Lord's goodness endures continually (v. 1). In addition to the treacherous man boasting of his mischievous conduct (vv. 2-4), he also uses words bent to destroy others as verses 2 and 3 state, "Thy tongue deviseth mischiefs; like a sharp razor, working deceitfully. Thou lovest evil more than good, and lying rather than to speak righteousness."

This man has a wicked lifestyle aimed at causing destruction to others. The destructive behavior of the treacherous man will be put in check because the Lord will uproot him from the earth as verse 5 warns, "God shall likewise destroy thee for ever, he shall take thee away, and pluck thee out of thy dwelling place, and root thee out of the land of the living." In other words, the Lord will bring about his death quickly forever. And because the Lord will put an end to their existence, there will be a cause for joy by the righteous (vv. 6-7).

As believers, we know that the Lord is going to "mow" down the wicked, and we need not fret, for Psalm 37:1-2 states, "Fret not thyself because of evildoers, neither be thou envious against the workers of iniquity. For they

shall soon be cut down like the grass, and wither as the green herb."

In comparison to Doeg, the treacherous man, David likens himself to a "green olive tree." This description is a picture of prosperity and longevity. David indeed had a blessed state because of the Lord's loyal love. Although David had been betrayed, he was going to praise the Lord and wait on Him (vv. 8-9). In the midst of all of our calamities in life, let us continue to trust in the Lord, for Psalm 57:1 states, "Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me: for my soul trusteth in thee: yea, in the shadow of thy wings will I make my refuge, until these calamities be overpast."

People who are uninsured still affect our nation's health care system. Currently, when people are uninsured, private doctors do not take them. Instead, people flee to any available clinic or emergency room to be examined. A common issue is that hospitals are over-crowded with emergencies and have exceedingly long wait times for patients to be screened. Because the uninsured are often unable to pay for their medical expenses, the expenses are passed on to those with premiums, causing inflation in their medical plan coverage

Emergency room visits are more expensive than a trip to the doctor's office. As of August of 2013, the U.S. health care inflation rate was 2.34 percent, compared to 1.94 percent last month and 4.05 percent as of last year.

Let's say your annual household income is \$51,017, your family consists of four people—two children and two adults—and you are not receiving employer health coverage. The amount you would have to pay for the premium would cost you \$3,511 per year, which equals 6.88 percent of your household income and covers 41 percent of the overall premium. You could receive a government tax credit subsidy of up to \$5,121, which covers 59 per-

cent of the overall premium. With this in mind, the cost to enroll in the Bronze plan would be \$2,033 per year, which is 3.99 percent of your household income after the subsidies. Your out-of-pocket costs for the Silver plan (not including the premium) can be no more than \$10,400—that figure being the maximum level depending on the amount of health care services you use throughout the year. A recent report shows that during the first week, more than 51,000 Americans have already completed Obamacare applications. Coverage will begin on January 1, 2014. Open enrollment will conclude on March 31, 2014.

COWBOYS TAKE HUMBLING LOSS TO SAINTS INTO BYE WEEK

Cowboys simply couldn't stop the run with Bruce Carter and Ernie Sims trying to fill the void in the middle. Star pass rusher DeMarcus Ware aggravated a right thigh injury in his return after missing three games - the first time he was sidelined in his nine-year career.

At one point against Brees, the Cowboys had three undrafted rookies in the secondary.

Safety Jeff Heath was one of them, and he played every snap even though he missed several tackles and tripped over himself on a 52-yard scoring pass to Kenny Stills. He has started three games in place of rookie third-round pick J.J. Wilcox, who is expected to return next week from a knee injury.

Cornerback Morris Claiborne, yet another player battling a hamstring problem, is expected to return against the Giants.

"We have to find a way to get healthy," Lee said. "And I need to find a way to get out there on that football field. And we, as a team, have to find a way to play a whole lot better."

That goes for the offense, too. The Cowboys had gained at least 200 yards in every game when Tony Romo was taking every snap - until Sunday night, when they had just 193. Romo targeted Dez Bryant only twice and completed less than 50 percent of his passes for the second time in three weeks after he hadn't done it at all since 2009.

As they get ready for the Giants, the Cowboys are faced with the fact that their offense has been held to less than 300 yards three times in five games since getting a season-high 522 in a 51-48 loss to Denver.

"We have a chance to sit back and assess what we are doing on offense, defense, and the kicking game, and who we are doing it with, and how we are doing it, and how we can do it better," coach Jason Garrett said.

year, but is likely to miss at least one game.

The Cowboys looked hopeless without Lee, surrendering an NFL-record 40 first downs and 625 yards - 2 more than the franchise record set two weeks earlier in Detroit. Those are the first two 600-yard games allowed by Dallas in its 53-year history.

The only reason Dallas didn't allow a fifth 400-yard passer this season - the Cowboys already have the record by surrendering four - is because the Saints quit throwing after Drew Brees got to 392 early in the fourth quarter.

"I just didn't expect this," Jones said. "I never saw this coming. What I did think is that we could come in here and get some points on the board. I felt that certainly we are compromised relative to our defense where we are right now with our personnel, but that's not an excuse. Because we still didn't play as well as they played."

The Cowboys have their bye week to think about a lot of things before their next game Nov. 24 at the New York Giants.

Lee's backup, Justin Durant, also left the game against the Saints with a hamstring injury. The

(AP) - Maybe Rob Ryan wasn't the problem for the Dallas defense.

Even Cowboys owner Jerry Jones seems willing to acknowledge as much after New Orleans torched his team for a franchise record in yards allowed - the second time that's happened in the past three weeks under Monte Kiffin, who replaced Ryan when Jones fired him 10 months ago.

Ryan was in charge of the Saints defense that held Dallas to its lowest offensive output in five years in a 49-17 loss on Sunday night.

"We thought that it was best for us to go in the direction that we are, and that doesn't look good right now," Jones said. "Candidly, we're having some of the same things that Rob had last year. He had a lot of people, frankly, to be fair to Rob, he lost a lot of guys on defense."

The biggest loss for Ryan last year was linebacker Sean Lee, who was gone for the season after injuring a toe in the sixth game. Lee got hurt again in New Orleans, pulling a hamstring in the first quarter. He should be back this



When it comes to keeping students safe and healthy, the Dallas ISD proactively seeks ways to secure the well-being of our students. District departments employ a wealth of programs, services and strategies to address students' physical, mental and emotional health and security. While education is our primary mission, it's clear that education cannot occur in environments where students' basic needs are not met, and safety is among the most essential of basic needs.

Gang, drug, child abuse and truancy prevention programs, building security enhancements, safety drills, health and nutrition education, counseling, and drop-in centers to serve homeless students are among the many efforts we devote to student safety.

The recent expenditure of \$4.5 million in bond funds upgraded security at all district schools. Peepholes in all campus portables, additional security cameras at secondary campuses, electronic door-strike buzzers, eight-camera digital recorder systems, and card-reader systems are among the improvements.

School counselors help students and families address conduct, learning differences or family challenges that affect students' performance. Counselors serve as student advocates and can refer parents to a variety of community social services for ongoing support.

The Police and Security Services Department assigns its 135 sworn officers to all secondary campuses and can dispatch officers to immediately respond to emergencies at elementary schools. Working closely with school administrators, Dallas Police Department and the district attorney, officers constantly monitor schools for drug and gang activity. Our Emergency Operations team guides principals in the development of campus emergency operations plans that detail how schools will respond to emergency situations. Schools are required to conduct regular practice drills to ensure that students and staff are ready to take appropriate action in the event of bad weather, fire or threats of violence.

The Child Abuse and Domestic Violence Prevention department trains school staff to identify and report child abuse and partners with mental health agencies to educate teens to recognize the signs of teen dating violence. The department presents training for staff and students from PreK to 12 to protect students from abuse.

The Homeless Education Program has created Drop-In Centers at North Dallas High School and John Leslie Patton Academic Center where students and parents can obtain uniforms, hygiene and school supplies. Like all of those previously listed, this program aims to help students stay safe and well so they can remain in school and move forward academically.
