President Barack Obama Announcing An Executive Order On Immigration



(AP) - President Barack Obama on Thursday will announce steps he will take to shield up to 5 million immigrants illegally in the United States from deportation, defying Republican lawmakers who say such a step would poison relations with the new GOP led legislature.

Obama, in a video released on Facebook, said he would make his announcement from the White House at 8 p.m. EST on Thursday, then would travel to Las Vegas to promote the plan Friday.

He said while everyone agrees the immigration system is broken, Washington has allowed the problem "to fester for too long."

"What I'm going to be laying out is the things that I can do with my lawful authority as president to make the system better, even as I continue to work with Congress and encourage them to get a bipartisan, comprehensive bill that can solve the entire problem," Obama said.

As many as 5 million people in the country illegally would be spared from deportation and made eligible for work permits. But the eligible immigrants would not be entitled to federal benefits - including health care tax credits - under the plan, officials said Wednesday.

Obama was to speak at Las Vegas' Del Sol High School, a school with a large population of non-English speaking students where Obama unveiled his blueprint for comprehensive immigration legislation in 2013.

DCHHS Offers Free Flu Vaccine



Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) is offering the seasonal flu vaccine for children and adults at no cost. The flu vaccine is free for all uninsured and low income Dallas County residents.

"In comparison to last year, we're seeing similar percentages of individuals positive for flu, but more people are being tested this year," said Zachary Thompson, DCHHS director. "This same time last year more than 330 tests were performed and we are currently at around 800 tests, with 113 positive for either type A or B flu."

There were 3 pediatric and 55 adult flu-related deaths in Dallas County during the 2013-14 flu season. This year, there have not been any flu-related deaths. DCHHS Medical Director/Health Authority Dr. Christopher Perkins encourages everyone to get the flu vaccine once a year.

"It is ideal to get a flu shot before the virus begins circulating in the community," Dr. Perkins said. "However, if you haven't received it, you still have time to get protected."

Individuals should also practice proper hand washing and other flu prevention methods, Dr. Perkins added. Flu materials are posted on the DCHHS website.

The flu vaccine DCHHS provides is an all-in-one shot that protects against multiple flu strains including the H1N1 virus.

The adult vaccine is given in the adult immunization clinic on the first floor at the DCHHS building located at 2377 N. Stemmons Frwy. in Dallas. The children's vaccine is available at all DCHHS immunization clinics. Clinic hours are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Appointments aren't necessary. Black and Proud

Blacks in our democracy are proud. The years of slavery, self-pity, self-neglect, low self-esteem and the thought of unreachable goals are gone. Blacks believe in themselves and as a result they are high achievers in all areas of economic and educational endeavors. We have also climbed the ladder to social prosperity.

As Black children progress through school, they should be taught about the barriers that have set blacks apart from other Americans and with fortitude we must stress the true meaning of democracy and freedom. Our government is based on the belief 'that every person (regardless of race, creed or sex) should have the same basic rights and freedoms, and that all individuals should be free to govern themselves.'

African American History must always be presented to our children to instill in them the many great contributions our ancestors made to our society. Public schools should teach African American History along with White History each and every day, not just during Black History Month. Helping Black children to build self-esteem would be so easy if somewhere along the "education journey" blacks were presented with their culture, on a daily basis, in the form of television programs, movies, videos, seminars and music. If the schools don't do it, then the parents must do it at home.

Throughout life we will be confronted with these barriers. Some of the barriers I speak of have already been knocked down, but some of them are still alive in our society. In my lifetime, Blacks have been confronted with these barriers: 1) being taught that it is a disgrace to have dark-colored skin; 2) discrimination; 3) prejudice; 4) the blacks' place in the social order (we weren't allowed to vote, we were barred from any jobs that white men found desirable, we were not permitted to attend schools with whites and black schools were badly neglected by the white schools officials); 5) we had to work for cheap wages.

There has been a slow, but steady change in racial attitudes in the United States since the Supreme Court ruled in the case of Plessy vs. Ferguson in 1896. At that time, it was ruled that separate facilities for blacks on railroads must be equal to those of the whites. Freedom came for Blacks because we took pride in ourselves and we fought for our inalienable rights, our dignity, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

There are many black businesses in our neighbors that we are proud of and show it by purchasing our goods or services from them. Owners and operators of Black businesses realize that in order to keep their customers returning they must be courteous to them, fair with their prices, beautify their stores and shops as well as keep them clean and neat.

We can never deny that we are black. We should never want to deny that fact. But, being proud entails many things, as we have discussed above. If you are Black and can't identify with the contents in this article, it's time for you to achieve a new goal, "Be Black And Proud."

The Tom Joyner Foundation® announced the 'Full Ride' scholarship program that will cover all the expenses of one student planning to attend a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) in the fall of 2015.

"The cost of a college education isn't getting any cheaper," said Tom Joyner, chairman of his Foundation and host of the top-ranked nationally syndicated radio show. "So, I want to help a graduating high school senior with a chance to attend a black college to pursue their dreams."

Past Full Ride Scholars have impressive backgrounds, including last year's winner the first winner, Titus Zeigler, who was a top student at Atlanta's Henry W. Grady High School. The future trauma surgeon was a member of the Junior ROTC program, tutored kids at a local middle school and volunteered for the Atlanta Food Bank. Britney Wilson, a native of Brooklyn, N.Y., who graduated from Howard University, and she is now in her second year of law school at the University of Pennsylvania. Cheyenne Boyce of Detroit is now a senior at Spelman College, where she is an international relations major who is fluent in Japanese.

Students will receive full tuition and stipends for up to 10 semesters to cover on-campus room and board and books. Students must meet the required academic standards each semester to renew the funds each year. Graduating high school seniors can apply for the scholarship by going to the Tom Joyner Foundation website at www.tomjoynerfoundation.org to complete the application. Students must have their schools mail their transcripts and recommendations to the Foundation at P.O. Box 630495, Irving, TX 75063-0495.

To be eligible, students must meet the following criteria:
1) A United States Citizen
2) Current high school seniors attending school in the United States (applicant must be anticipating completion of high school degree in the spring of 2015).

3) Minimum high school grade point average of 3.50 (on a 4.00 grade scale, excluding home school studies) and Minimum SAT score of (combined math essay and verbal score) or ACT score of 30.

4) Applicants must apply and be accepted to an HBCU by July 1, 2015.
5) Applicants must have demonstrated leadership abilities through participation in community service, extracurricular, or other activities.

The applications must be postmarked no later than January 16th, 2015. Interviews will occur in April 2015.

 Republicans are vehemently opposed to the president's likely actions, with some conservative members threatening to pursue a government shutdown if Obama follows through on his promises to act before the end of the year.

A wide-ranging immigration bill passed the Senate last year, but stalled in the Republican-led House. Obama vowed this summer to instead pursue changes to the immigration system using his own authority but delayed the measures until after the midterm elections, in part because of concerns from some Democrats facing tough races.

Democrats still lost control of the Senate in the midterm balloting.

One official familiar with the administration's planning said the beneficiaries of Obama's new executive action would be treated in the same manner as those immigrants who were shielded from deportation and who became eligible

for work permits under an Obama directive in 2012. The 2012 executive action deferred deportations for immigrants who came to the United States illegally as children. The official discussed the limits of Obama's action on the condition of anonymity, lacking authority to speak on the record at this point.

Those immigrants covered by the 2012 action, called Dreamers by their advocates, can obtain work permits but are not eligible for food stamps, federal welfare benefits or disability benefits under the Supplemental Security Income program. They also are ineligible for tax credits under Obama's health care law, though they can buy health coverage at full price on the exchanges created by the law. They may be eligible for public benefits provided by some states, however.

Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson said Wednesday that Obama's executive actions will be comprehensive and include border

security measures. He said he believes that immigration changes that Obama will announce are not only legal but needed in light of inaction by Congress on immigration.

Astrid Silva, an organizer for the group Progressive Leadership Alliance of Nevada, said the president "has a duty to keep his promise and use his full legal authority to take action where Congress has failed." The group said the White House has been in touch with Nevada activists about the trip.

Republicans on Capitol Hill are deeply divided and have spent much of the week intensely debating how to respond. By timing his announcement for the Friday before Thanksgiving, with Congress on recess all of next week, Obama gives the public some time to react to his announcement before Congress has a chance to respond.

to be prepared.

Q. I am a little confused, the characters seem to be leaders in the church, but yet they seem to be following the influence of satan. Can you explain.

A. The word of God teaches us that in the latter times man will depart from the faith. It teaches that, If we do not repent, the pastors and leaders in the church are the first ones to take God's word lightly, to doubt its strictness because of what they want to do. As God holds them responsible to their calling, they will fail by the numbers. Life according to God's word becomes too difficult and they take a short cut.

Q. You have said that the book is fiction; does that mean that the things in the book will not happen.

A. No, it means that much of what is in the book has not happened.

When you look at Revelation chapter 6 through chapter 9 you will find

the times more difficult than in the book, matter of fact they are so difficult that it is hard to believe. But it will happen and we will be unprepared if we are not careful. The word says that God himself will shorten those days, if he had not, no flesh would be saved.

Q. What about this book you want people to know?

A. That this is a real account of what the church will experience in the first three and a half years of Jacobs troubles. It is a real life soul

breathing account of the suffering and torment of a church family and the community web that has trapped it between heaven, the earth and hell. Here lie the consequences of disobedience, disrepect, complacency, ungodliness, compromise and doubt. A living experience that will wake every soul to pay attention. I want the people to know that the time of true repentance is coming to an end. And that the survival of those days would cause man's heart to fail because of things coming upon the earth.

Q. In the book you mentioned the tribulation period; how does it affect the church?

A. We live a life that we will always have an opportunity to get our lives right. We even believe that the church will not go through the tribulation period. If the church must go through this period, she is unprepared to withstand the things coming up in their lives. If we believe that the church will not be raptured until after the first three and a half years, we will live better lives.

Q. What about people who do not believe in the tribulation period.

A. Whether we believe in this period or not, it will come, it will happen. But we will not be prepared and we will not teach others

Q. It seems to me that when I am reading the book I can feel frustration, anger, disappointment, or is this just me.

A. All three of those attributes are felt by the writer and the reader, as to what level of disruption you will experience depends upon your belief. It depends upon your relationship with your pastor and what he teaches. Whatever you believe, you must believe that because your life may depend upon your faith.

Q. Mr. King when I read this book will I get a good feeling about the church?

A. There is a possibility that you will not. You will feel frustration, anger, and disappointment. And if you are not careful, you may feel as if God has failed you. You will feel that the faith that we presently have may not be enough to sustain us in our survival in the last days.

This past Saturday, November 15th, marked the start of the Affordable Care Act's (ACA) 2014 open enrollment period. From November 15th to February 15th, millions of Americans will have the opportunity to shop for and enroll in customized health insurance plans most suited to their personal needs.

In spite of the initial difficulties with the website during the 2014 rollout, the ACA has evolved into a thriving and

effective healthcare coverage system serving millions of people across the United States. Statistics provided from the first open enrollment period show that this historic law is performing well. By ensuring that millions of students, workers, and families across the U.S. are able to reap the benefits of newfound health security, in addition to the personal and economic freedoms provided as a result.

In 2011, the ACA made healthcare more accessible and affordable for millions of Americans by saving consumers \$9 billion. In fact, during the first open enrollment period in October of 2013, nearly 7 out of 10 people who selected a plan through the Health Insurance Marketplace found coverage for less than \$100 a month with tax credits. Since

then, 10.3 million uninsured adults have received health coverage and the number of uninsured adults has been reduced by 26% according to statistics released by the Obama Administration and the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS).

On the first day of the 2014 open enrollment period, over 100,000 people submitted their coverage applications - many receiving their eligibility results that same day. For those unable to complete the process online, the ACA call center took more than 200,000 calls this weekend, with over 20,000 of these calls held in Spanish. I believe this was a great start to the second open enrollment period and exactly the type of momentum I would like to see continue through February 15th.

CMS reported that in 2015, insurers will be offering 25% more plans, with some of the nation's largest insurers offering coverage for the first time in more than a dozen states. In Texas alone, there are more than 2.6 million people who lack health insurance. With such great opportunities currently available, numbers like these are simply unacceptable.

As a representative of the 30th congressional district, I will continue to work hard to ensure a reduction in the number of uninsured Texans. Through the ACA, affordable coverage is available between now and February 15th with coverage beginning as early as January 1st if enrolled by December 15th. I encourage my constituents to make their elections early and get covered.

provided me with fresh insight on how much Tuscaloosa has - and hasn't - changed since I graduated from Druid High School in 1965.

The first notable sign of change was that the Tuscaloosa News published a story on my upcoming speech at the church. Growing up, the only way to get coverage in the Tuscaloosa News was to play sports, be an entertainer or, heaven forbid, commit a crime. When I began my career as a journalist, I could get a job as a reporter for Sports Illustrated, but not with my hometown paper because it did not hire African Americans. But that has changed for the better.

Another change for the better was supposedly the desegregation of Tuscaloosa public schools. But it was not always for the better. My education at all-Black Druid High school was on par with, if not better, than that provided by Tuscaloosa High, our all-White crosstown counterpart. That notwithstanding, both high schools were demolished in the name of desegregation. Druid was replaced with a new building that became a middle school and Tuscaloosa High was replaced by Central High, another new structure. The plan was that Whites and Blacks would attend middle school and high school together. The reality is that didn't last for long.

That became clear when I entered Central High on Friday,

the first time I set foot in the building. If you had placed a blindfold on me and lifted it once I was inside, I would have thought I was back at Druid. The "integrated" school was virtually all-Black. Whites have done what most Whites who can afford it do: they pulled their students out of desegregated public schools and enrolled them in majority White private or parochial schools.

But Tuscaloosa is no different than the rest of the South. As the Civil Rights Project at UCLA reported, "The reality is that segregation has been increasing since 1990, for almost a quarter century, and that today black students are substantially more segregated than they were in 1970. The direction of change, however, suggests that things will continue to worsen."

Like Ole Miss and the University of Georgia, the University of Alabama was desegregated under pressure from the federal government. I had just completed the 10th grade at Druid when Gov. George C. Wallace made his famous "Stand in the Schoolhouse Door" on June 11, 1963 to prevent the enrollment of two Black students, Vivian Malone and James Hood. That day will be forever etched in my memory.

After objecting to what he called "the unwelcomed, unwanted, unwarranted and force-induced intrusion upon the campus of the University of


Alabama," Wallace was forced to step aside and allow the students to enroll.

When I spoke to a class on race and gender at the university, Black and White students interacted openly and comfortably. One White student spoke fondly of her close friendship with her Black roommate and others described how the university had made it easier for them to meet new friends who did not look like them. I smiled contentedly as they relayed their stories, happy that real progress had been made in my hometown.

Over lunch, however, I was brought back to reality. A university professor relayed that Black students told him of being called the N-word every day on campus. Every day. On one hand, 'Bama represented what seemed like unimaginable racial progress. On closer inspection, nothing has fundamentally changed - except the cosmetics - from the bad old days.

At my evening speech at the Community Christian Church, except for two Whites, the audience was all Black. That was two Whites more than I expected. Tuscaloosa, like the rest of America, remains mostly segregated.

Whether it was interacting with high school pupils, talking with students at the University of Alabama or the community, not that much has really changed in Sweet Home Alabama once you look beyond the surface.

It's been almost 50 years since I lived in Tuscaloosa, Ala. I go back from time to time, but not much after Mama moved to Cleveland about 35 years ago and later to Augusta, Ga. Except for a couple of cousins, all of my relatives have either died or moved away. My youngest sister, Susan Gandy, lives in Tuskegee, Ala. My other sisters, Charlotte Purvis and Chris Polk, live in Durham, N.C., and Oakland, Calif. area, respectively.

Many close family friends such as Mrs. Dorothy Smith and Mrs. Emma Henderson, two longtime neighbors from my McKenzie Court housing project days, are deceased. A growing number of my Druid High classmates - James Calvin Brown, Reginald Henderson, Peter Boyd and most recently, Ronald Thompson and Estella Robertson Carter - are no longer with us.

I returned home to give three speeches last Friday - at Central High School, the University of Alabama and Christian Community Church. Though exhausting, my whirlwind tour of my hometown


the civil rights protections and criminal justice reforms that have been so fiercely advocated by Holder.

ecutor, aggressively fighting terrorism, financial fraud, cyber-crime, all while vigorously defending civil rights."

A native of Greensboro, N.C., the daughter of a Baptist minister and the granddaughter of a pastor/sharecropper, Lynch's dedication to protecting civil rights and ensuring equal justice is part of her DNA. Her background and experiences also inform her commitment to common sense criminal justice reforms designed to make our system smarter and fairer. She remembers as a child riding on her father's shoulders to student anti-segregation boycott meetings at his church. She also recalls her sharecropper grandfather lamenting, "In rural North Carolina in the 1930s, if you were poor and

Black and got in trouble with the law, you had very little recourse."

As a lawyer and U.S. attorney, Lynch's career has been undergirded by an unshakeable belief that, as she states, "Justice is only served when people feel protected by their government rather than targeted."

Those are the values we look for most in the People's Lawyer. We urge the Senate to confirm Loretta Lynch as the next United States Attorney General without delay.

Medicare Open Enrollment

Medicare's "Extra Help" program helps people with limited income pay for their prescription medications

Making ends meet should not mean going without your medications. If you have limited income and resources, you may qualify for Extra Help to pay for some health care and prescription drug costs. Drug costs in 2015 for most people who qualify for Extra Help will be no more than \$2.65 for each generic drug and \$6.60 for each brand-name drug. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services estimates that more than 2 million people with Medicare may be eligible for Extra Help, but aren't currently enrolled to take advantage of these savings. A recent law changed how your income and assets are counted:

- Life insurance policies don't count as resources
- Any help you get from relatives, friends, and others to pay for household expenses—like food, mortgage, rent, heating fuel or gas, electricity, water, and property taxes—doesn't count as income

Many People Qualify and Don't Know It

Even if you were previously turned down for Extra Help due to income or resource levels, you should reapply. If you qualify, you'll get help paying for Medicare prescription drug coverage premiums, copayments, and deductibles. To qualify, you must make less than \$17,505 a year (or \$23,595 for married couples). Even if your annual income is higher, you still may be able to get some extra help. Your resources must also be limited to \$13,440 (or \$26,860 for married couples). Resources include bank accounts, stocks, and bonds, but not your house or car.

There's No Cost or Obligation to Apply

It's easy and free to apply for "Extra Help." You or a family member, trusted counselor, or caregiver can apply online at socialsecurity.gov/i1020 or call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213. TTY users should call 1-800-325-0778. All the information you give is confidential. You can also get help in your community from your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), Area Agencies on Aging (AAA), the Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC), and many tribal organizations. For information about how to contact these organizations, visit Eldercare.gov.


