# TRUMP WINS WHITE HOUSE

In a stunning political upset, reality television show host and real estate mogul, Donald J. Trump, became the 45th president of the United States early Wednesday morning by defeating former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, winning in many states thought to be securely in the former first lady's corner.

Trump's victory sent millions of Americans into shock and resulted in global financial markets taking a nose dive. The effort to make a woman America's first commander-in-chief was rebuffed by voters in usually reliable democratic states such as Pennsylvania, Florida, Ohio, Wisconsin and Michigan where pre-election polls showed Clinton tied or in the lead.

Despite the backing of national political leaders such as President Obama, First Lady Obama, Vice President Joe Biden and Senator Bernie Sanders, Clinton only received 216 of the 270 electoral votes that she needed to win the presidency. Trump

received 276 electoral votes even though the vote totals Wednesday morning showed him losing the popular vote by less than 100,000 to Clinton.

Clinton received 88 percent of the African American vote, while Trump received only ten percent. Four years earlier, President Obama received 93 percent of the African American vote. Voters younger than 30 gave Clinton 54 percent of their votes, six percentage points less than what the president received during the last election. If she had performed better with African Americans and younger voters, she would have won, some political observers said.

Clinton phoned Trump after the electoral count was posted, but did not appear before a large gathering in New York where she had intended to give a victory speech. Instead, her campaign manager appeared and told her supporters that they should go home.

Trump's victory was similar to the election of Harry S. Truman in 1948 when most polls showed New York governor, Thomas E. Dewey, defeating the incumbent president Harry S. Truman who won on Election Day.

Trump carried the south, including Texas and Arkansas, the state where Clinton served as first lady while her husband, former President Bill Clinton, served as governor.

Nationally, minority voters turned out in strong numbers for Clinton, but it was not enough to curtail the stampede of non-minority voters, some of them evangelical Christians, who stormed the voting booths to vote for Trump. Many of them said that they disapproved of Trump's personal conduct and personality but despised Clinton even more than they disliked Trump.

During his victory speech Trump was unusually kind to Clinton, saying that the nation owed her a major debt of gratitude for her service to the country.

"It is now time for us to come together as one united people," Trump said during his remarks. "I pledge to every citizen of our land that I will be president for all Americans. I am reaching out for guidance and help so that we can work together."

## Parkland clinic hosts diabetes awareness event Nov. 14

Free screenings, demonstrations at Bluit-Flowers Health Center

The statistics can be startling: about one in 11 Americans has diabetes, someone is diagnosed with the disease every 23 seconds and 89 million are at risk. And, according to the American Diabetes Association, diabetes remains the 7th leading cause of death in the United States.

In conjunction with November's observance of National Diabetes Awareness Month, Parkland Health & Hospital System will host a Diabetes Awareness Day event from 8 a.m. - noon on Monday, Nov. 14 at the Bluit-Flowers Health Center, 303 E. Overton Road, Dallas, 75216. Bluit-Flowers is one of Parkland's 12 Community Oriented Primary Care health

centers located throughout Dallas County.

The event is open to the public at no cost and will feature Parkland diabetes team members and a representative from the American Diabetes Association presenting information on a variety of topics including diabetic medication, insulin and monitoring, foot care, eye care, as well as meal planning, cooking demonstrations and games. Glucose screenings will also be available.

"Diabetes is at epidemic proportions in America and in Texas, and is taxing the health of our population and our economy. The time for action is now," said Luigi Meneghini, MD, Executive Director of

Parkland's Global Diabetes Program and Professor of Internal Medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

"The goal of the event is to provide useful, practical information to the community in a relaxed and casual environment so participants can learn about the disease and make better lifestyle choices that help them manage diabetes or even prevent it," said Sharon Cox, a registered dietitian at Parkland who is coordinating the event.

Kellie Rodriguez, CDE, Director of Education & Community Engagement for the diabetes program, emphasized that "screening is important, since 25 percent of patients with diabetes do not

know they have the condition. Just as worrisome is the estimate that about 89 million Americans have prediabetes, a condition in which sugar levels are not high enough to be classified as diabetes, but are elevated above normal levels. Persons with prediabetes have a 50 percent chance of developing type 2 diabetes if they don't make significant lifestyle changes, such as diet and physical activity."

## PRESS ROOM: #HOWDOUFEEL? MOVEMENT GIVES A VOICE TO MILLENNIALS ABOUT THE ELECTIONS

Millennials outnumber the Baby Boomer generation and yet their voices appear to be muted in one of the most important elections in our Nation's history. Millennials are an untapped power in this election. To unleash that power, the #HowDoUFeel Movement, a non-partisan social media campaign, was created by millennials for millennials to provide a platform for their voices to be heard and to start a dialogue about issues that matter to them.

"We don't see ourselves represented in the mainstream media and it results in feeling disengaged and left out of the system," said Kelly Shogren, 25, Ambassador for the #HowDoUFeel Movement. You can find millennial voters,

#HowDoUFeel evolved from a discussion in a college classroom in Chicago. Groundswell Educational Films, a non-profit media arts organization with a mission to give ordinary people a voice in society, operationalized it. "We recognized an opportunity to turn young people into voters by engaging them on issues that matter most to them," said Jennifer Amdur Spitz, a Chicago strategic communications consultant and co-founder of Groundswell. "Together with 9 diverse millennial ambassadors and several campus and community-based organizations we engaged young voters in conversation and registered them to vote. Now we're focusing on getting them to the polls." Understanding that the next

president will appoint several Supreme Court Justices, this vote is not a 4-year vote, but has potential to change the course of the country for decades. The #HowDoUFeel campaign helps millennials realize the importance of this election and the power of their vote. "It is about recognizing our stake in this election and empowering the youth through politics," said Caleb Porter, 22, a Chicago community organizer.

Daily questions and topics are posed on the website and social media platforms to drive awareness, conversation and higher millennial voter turnout. "We want our country to progress and develop," said Brandon, 19, from Texas. In a short period of time, the #HowDoUFeel hash tag has gained momentum with thousands of comments and posts. 





## FORMER PRO BASEBALL PLAYER OMAR WASHINGTON TRAINING BLACK YOUTH FOR THE BIG LEAGUES

Omar Washington, a former professional baseball player with the Philadelphia Phillies and the Boston Red Sox is on a mission to increase minority participation in Major League Baseball.

It wasn't long ago that comedian and actor Chris Rock referred to African-American baseball fans as an endangered species, in part, because he said the game was a sport for the rich.

Earlier this year, USA Today released an updated report on the demographics of Major League Baseball, which revealed that 69 of the 862 players on 2016 opening day rosters and disabled lists were African-American. Just eight percent MLB players are African-American.

Rock's comments and the raw numbers only serve to underscore some of the challenges faced by former professional baseball star Omar Washington, who heads what he calls the most successful minority youth baseball academy in the nation, Citius USA.

"We have a rich history of moving young ball players to the next level to play college and, or, professional baseball," said Washington, who was drafted in 1990 by the Philadelphia Phillies and played for the Boston Red Sox during his career. Washington's son, Ty, plays for the Cincinnati Reds.

"There are trials and tribulation," said Washington. "The challenges of making things happen are always tied in with the economics of it and the biggest problem in dealing with the youth in our inner-cities is finances, because parents are forced to choose whether to pay their rent, their car note or for their child to participate in baseball."

Still, Washington and his staff have maintained a willingness to stick to it.

With the rising cost of all-important tournaments that aspiring baseball stars must participate in, Washington estimates that he's spent over \$27,000 of his own money to ensure that his young players were able to compete and showcase their skills.

Citius USA began in Texas, but has now expanded to New

York, Florida, California and Chicago with a total of 63 teams that contain as many as 16 kids per squad.

"The tournament prices have risen to \$6,400 for a bunch of kids who can't afford it," Washington said. "We've been doing this for the last few years and you take a bunch of kids and their parents are worried about keeping their lights on, paying for their car that they need to go to work and then you tell the kid's parent that they need \$1,000 to play in a tournament."

Former Los Angeles Angels general manager Tony Reagins, who was appointed as Major League Baseball's senior vice president for youth programs, told the baseball news website, the Big Lead, that research has revealed that "the financial barrier is an important barrier participating" in the decline of the participation of African-Americans.

"For soccer or basketball at the early ages, the financial outlay may include just the cost of a ball and shoes (and a relatively inexpensive pair of shin guards for soccer)," the article said. "For baseball or softball, those costs can include a bat, a fielding glove, multiple pairs of pants, batting gloves, shoes, and a batting helmet, and a bag to manage and transport all of it."

The Big Lead article continued: "Once in the sport, the financial barriers for continuing in competition can escalate even more. This is particularly true as kids get to the 12 and 13-year-old age groups, when baseball begins to see the participation decline. Local community-based leagues may have a relatively affordable entry fee, but once tournament baseball becomes a bigger part of the equation, fees escalate."

Tournament fees don't include hotel accommodations, gas and food money, as well as costs for any family member who desires to travel with the player.

Washington has resisted the temptation of calling on past or present superstars like Derek Jeter, Andrew McCutchen, Lorenzo Cain and others.

"I'm trying hard to help and, right now, we're the number

one ranked minority-based organization in the whole country and with that you'd think those guys who have made it would look at this situation because of the economics and do something," Washington said. "I can't make them do anything. I would love to tell them to stop being naïve and that these kids are you. They are who you were once and they are striving to get the same opportunities that you got."

Even the various urban youth academies run by Major League Baseball itself have failed to flourish – or at least they've been unsuccessful in establishing a rapport with young African-Americans.

"The programs really are nonexistent for us in the areas that we are in," Washington said. "They don't consider the hardships that the kids go through and they don't address that at all. Those academies are not nearly enough to make a difference."

So, Washington continues to push on – seeking to hit homeruns where he can, but taking it one base at a time, which he notes is the only reasonable alternative.

The goal of Citius USA is to improve the talent level of the minority youth and, in doing so, providing a platform to college or pro baseball for athletes at the high school level.

Mostly, Washington said he continues to promote sportsmanship, hard work, competitiveness, and knowledge and respect for the game of baseball.

"The competition we surround our players with is unmatched and it really gives our kids an edge," Washington said. "I bet you that 90 percent of Black kids in Texas, who have played professional baseball came through my organization."

Washington continued: "We are trying to do something here and we definitely want to make sure that we're reaching out to help these kids. Our track record is really good; we have 75 kids who have been drafted out of the program and over 400 who are now in college. It's a strong program and we're doing it with very little because we're old school and these kids deserve this opportunity."
