DALLAS ISD LINCOLN AND CARTER STUDENTS AMONG FIRST TO EARLY VOTE IN PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Early voting began on Oct. 24 and, already, some Dallas ISD students haven't taken to the polls as a first-time voter.

Students from Lincoln High School and Communications/Humanities Magnet received a standing ovation from poll workers as they cast their ballots at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center.

In September and October, a number of women groups from the Lincoln community registered students who would be eligible to vote in time for the November election.

Sheila Walker, community liaison at Lincoln,

carried out an idea she has long hoped for.

"I not only wanted to make sure they were registered, but I have always had a vision to take students to poll on the school bus," said Walker.

In all, nearly 30 students were bussed to the community center that sits in the heart of Dallas' Fair Park. Dallas ISD Trustee Bernadette Nutall and Principal Johnna Weaver were among the few who accompanied Lincoln's first-time voters, and cast their ballots too.

At Carter High School, nearly 20 students in a social studies class closed out their school week

by heading to an early polling site. This time, students walked to their polling place at Friendship West Baptist Church.

Fred Davis, principal at Carter knew other factors play into voting and did not want that to be a deterrent for his eligible students to vote.

"We knew transportation would be an issue and that some students would not be able to go to a polling site, so we're glad this is available to us this year where we can just walk across the street," Davis said. "It cuts out some of those issues of transportation, that gives people a reason not to vote."

Issues in the Election!

With just a few days remaining before Americans voters decide who will become the leader of the world's most powerful nation,

the issues of race, immigration, terminating pregnancy and health-care are driving the choices of the electorate, according to a recent national poll.

The electorate is divided on the issue of race.

The poll, conducted by the Pew Research Center in Washington, found that forty-one percent of the respondents believed that too little attention is being paid to race issues in the country, while thirty-

nine percent believed that race received too much attention.

The survey found that sixty-five percent of those voters who support Donald Trump believed that race received too much

attention while sixty percent of those who support Hillary Clinton said that racial issues did not receive the attention that they should receive.

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS"

ROMANS 13:1-14

The Believers' Responsibility to be Good Citizens

Although the grand Apostle Paul had urged the Roman believers that they are not to be conformed to the world (Romans 12:2), this verse does not exempt believers from being in subjection to the authorities of civil government, nor the rulers of the state (Romans 13:1-2). Christians should always be good citizens of the countries in which they live. God's command of obedience to civil authority is for "every soul." This command is issued to the saved and unsaved. They are commanded to be subordinate (be subject) to the authorities placed in government.

We are to be subject to civil authorities because God has appointed them by His good providence (see Daniel 2:21; 4:17). These governmental authorities have a grave responsibility to God to make sure that the authority God has granted be administered properly. Because God has granted them with authority, rebellion against governmental authority

is rebellion against God (v. 2). Those who rebel will receive punishment or damnation. The government can inflict penal punishment upon violators of the laws of the state. We must obey all governmental leaders as long as their commands do not conflict with the commands of God (Acts 5:28-29). In verses 3-4, rulers are not a terror to those who conduct themselves properly, but to those who break the law. Governmental leaders are ministers who serve God, even though they may not even believe in God's existence (v. 4). They have been appointed by God to execute His good purposes. Those who do evil deeds bring the ruler's wrath upon themselves.

Paul cites two reasons why we are obligated to the government under which we live (v. 5). The first reason is the "fear of the wrath of the government." There will be a fear of the power to inflict punishment on those who disobey the law of the land.

A second reason is that Christians should fear out of "conscience sake." Having an enlightened conscience, a Christian has a sense of obligation to God (1 Timothy 1:5; 1 Peter 2:13). In verses 6-7, we are obligated as citizens to pay taxes to God's appointed rulers. Rulers collect taxes in order to fund the government. We pay taxes because it is God's command to do so! Believers are to give whatever is due to the proper people (v. 7). Personal and property taxes should be paid to whom the tax is due. Again, the tax (custom) is used in support of the civil government. Not only should we pay taxes, but we should respect (fear) our leaders due to their positions, and honor them because of their task (v. 7).

Not only should believers be in submission to civil authorities of the state, but believers have an obligation to love their fellowmen. When believers love one another, they will be fulfilling the last part of the Ten Commandments dealing with a

believer's relation to his fellowman (vs. 9-10). Thus, when believers love one another, they are fulfilling the law. Selfless love always seeks the highest good of others.

Having discussed that believers have an obligation to obey civil authorities and love one another, Paul now impresses upon us that the culmination of our salvation is near (Romans 13:11). Knowing that Christ will be appearing soon, believers should have an attitude of watchfulness. Knowing this, believers should be casting off the deeds of darkness and putting on the armor of light (v. 12). Also, believers should not conduct themselves after the unsaved, but to clothe themselves with Christ (vs. 13-14). In summary, as believers, we are obligated to obey civil authorities, to love one another, and to deport ourselves properly in view of the Lord's return.

Days Before the Election, Clinton Talks about Criminal Justice, Jobs and Education with the Black Press

[RALEIGH] In an exclusive interview with North Carolina's African-American press, Hillary Clinton said the even though she is running to benefit all Americans, the first woman expected to be elected president of the United States on Nov. 8th does have a special focus on working with the African-American community and its leaders — both local and national — to improve employment, business, education, and other important quality of life issues.

"I want to pay particular attention to Americans who feel left out and left behind by the economy, or the situation in their communities," the former First Lady, senator and United States Secretary of State said Oct. 23rd at St. Augustine's University in Raleigh, a historically Black college, during perhaps one of her last sit-down interviews of the campaign.

"I've laid out a really extensive agenda for African-Americans, starting with improving the economy so that it's producing more jobs for more people; raising the national minimum wage — [we've] got mostly women earning minimum wage, often times being the sole support of their children, and they deserve a better economic opportunity," she said. Clinton also cited more affordable housing as a need.

She maintained that getting equal pay for women as a "particularly big issue for African-American women," adding that black female small business owners are "the fastest growing segment of the small business world in our country."

"[But] they're running into credit... [and] regulatory problems. We've got to look at those, not just from a 30,000-foot view, but right down on the ground. What is it that stands in the way of men or women getting their businesses going?"

Improving higher education not only through the proposal she and Sen. Bernie Sanders have developed to make public universities "tuition-free" for students from families making \$125,000 or less, but also creating a "dedicated \$25 billion fund" to help private historically black colleges and universities like St. Augustine's and Shaw universities to continue to grow.

After reading that one in five North Carolina homes have no access to the Internet, noting that they are disproportionately African-American or Latino, Clinton said emphatically, "I

want to fix that," continuing that those families are left out of so many economic and educational opportunities as a result.

"Taking on systemic racism," something she has "talked very openly and specifically about," is something Clinton added to her pronounced agenda for African-Americans. She points towards reforming the criminal justice system "from end to end" to help stem the tide of questionable fatal police shootings of black people, improving police training, and building greater respect between law enforcement and the African-American community.

"I particularly want to provide more diversion from the criminal justice system and more second chance programs for people who have paid their debt to society so that we begin to reverse what has been an over incarceration that has really disrupted communities."

"But I also have to do more to heal the divides that we face in our country, and I'm taking all of this on because I want to build on the progress that Pres. Obama has made. I don't want to see it reversed or ripped away." And yet, a "President" Hillary Clinton's approach would be from "a different perspective that will hopefully get even more people listening," she says.

Clinton certainly disagrees with Donald Trump's assessment that African-Americans "live in hell," instantly exclaiming, "Oh that's so wrong," and then adding "One of many insulting, divisive comments that Trump made was his characterization of African-American communities. It just shows he's never been in any, he doesn't know any people, he has no idea of the dynamism of small business or the importance of historically black colleges and universities, or the role that black churches play, or black professionals, and every walk of life."

"He has characterized in such a negative way what I see as a part of America that has a lot going for it, but [also] has some challenges that we must honestly address."

Clinton expressed support for South Carolina Congressman James Clyburn's "10-20-30" plan — ten percent of federal funds should go to the twenty percent of communities that have been living with generational poverty and lack of development for thirty years. Clinton says she's developed a plan that not only implements 10-20-30 into the federal budget, but also the empowerment and enterprise zones that helped build black businesses

under President Bill Clinton's "New Markets" tax credits to be able to further invest, and hire people within their communities.

Mrs. Clinton said she'd like to see "a much bigger effort" when it comes to upgrading skills training so that more people can actually qualify for the 1.2 million available jobs in the marketplace.

She says she wants to accomplish this challenge literally on a "neighborhood by neighborhood" basis, working with local officials, businesses and faith leaders who know the most about their own communities, and bring different perspectives to the table.

Clinton lauds President Obama's leadership in getting the country out of the greatest financial crisis since the great Depression — an economic collapse she says was caused by a combination of huge tax breaks for the wealthy, and Republicans taking the regulatory eyes off of Wall Street and the financial markets.

Clinton says that Obama "doesn't get the credit that he deserves for pulling us out of that big ditch."

She credits the president's "steadiness" in guiding the economy with a substantial stimulus and recovery package and the reinstatement of a higher tax rate on the wealthy, all resulting in over 75 consecutive quarters of economic growth.

Last year until now, Clinton adds, more people are finding work, incomes went up and more people are entering the jobs market.

"I want to build on that foundation," Mrs. Clinton says of Pres. Obama's achievements, "and I don't want to see it ripped up and thrown away by a false ideology that the way you create economic wealth and equality in America is top down. I think its middle out, and bottom up. I will build on what the president has done."

When asked if "President" Hillary Clinton's United States Justice Department would continue to pursue the strengthening of voting rights, keeping in

mind the US Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling that the Republican-led NC General Assembly deliberately suppressed African-American voters with "surgical precision," Clinton immediately said, "Yes, a hundred percent."

She furthered that she was "proud" of the efforts of both US Atty. Gen. Loretta Lynch and her predecessor, Eric Holder, to beat back unconstitutional voter ID laws in North Carolina and across the nation. However Clinton also blasted the US Supreme Court for striking down Section 4(b) of the 1965, effectively taking away the Justice Dept's most effective tools in policing how various states are upholding the 1965 Voting Rights Act [VRA].

Clinton lamented that the High Court crippled the VRA, especially since Democrats and Republicans in the US Senate when she served voted 98-0 to renew the VRA, and then-Pres. George W. Bush signed it.

"I want to appoint people to the [US] Supreme Court who understand, based on what you read in the Fourth Circuit [and other court findings against Republicans trying to suppress the vote]. I also want to go back to Congress and try to get legislation to fix the heart of the Voting Rights Act..." noting that Congressman John Lewis (D-GA) is leading a bi-partisan effort now "...to reinstate the full reach and power of the VRA."

Clinton, her husband former President Bill Clinton, and other campaign surrogates have been flooding North Carolina in recent weeks trying to edge Republican Donald Trump in one of the nation's tightest battleground state races. Last Thursday, Clinton appeared with First Lady Michelle Obama in Winston-Salem, N.C.



(AP) — The World Boxing Association has finally sanctioned a fight between Anthony Joshua and Wladimir Klitschko for its "super" heavyweight title.

The fight will take place in the spring of 2017, but only if Joshua beats Eric Molina on Dec. 10 in the British boxer's second defense of his IBF title.

The WBA super belt is vacant after Tyson Fury relinquished it last month, citing "clinical depression." Fury beat Klitschko in

November last year to take the WBA, IBF and minor WBO titles off the Ukrainian boxer.

"We will now move forward with Bernd Boente (Klitschko's manager) and Team Klitschko in planning the date and venue," Joshua's promoter, Eddie Hearn, said on Wednesday, "knowing that victory against Eric Molina in Manchester on Dec. 10 is more important than ever."

According to the poll, African Americans and Hispanics polled, overwhelming said that too little attention was paid to racial issues in American society. Sixty-six percent of African American respondents, and fifty-two percent of Hispanics said that more attention needed to be focused race related topics and issues.

On the issue of immigration, the poll found that ninety-five percent of the respondents who support-

ed Clinton believed that undocumented workers should have a path of citizenship, while sixty percent of those who called themselves Trump supporters agreed.

Nearly forty percent of those who identified themselves as supporters of Trump said that undocumented workers should be deported from the country. At the same time, only one percent of the respondents who identified themselves as supporters of Clinton said that undocumented workers should be barred

from living in America.

The Pew poll found that more than sixty percent of all Americans believed that terminating pregnancy should be legal in the majority of situations.

Eighty-two percent of those who said that they supported Clinton said that a woman should have the right to terminate a pregnancy while sixty percent of those who supported Trump said that the procedure should be illegal. Thirty-six of those who supported Trump agreed with the majority of

Clinton supports on the issue.
