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DALLAS KWANZAAFEST 2013 HAS BEEN CANCELED



(AP) KwanzaaFest has been canceled, according to the Dallas County Commissioner John Wiley Price who has sponsored the annual event since 1991.

The December event at Dallas Fair Park is a cultural celebration and health fair that provides medical screenings and social services.

But staging an event of its size also became very costly, with security, emergency medical, utility, insurance and rent expenses. This year's event was running about \$30,000 short of what was needed, and a last-minute donation offer that came in Monday arrived too late, Price said.

"I'm not going to push my volunteers in six weeks for something that normally takes us six months to put together, a production," he said. "It's not about just the money; it's about the volunteers. It's about the logistics, and I'm just not going to do it, try to do it in six weeks."

Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins said the county would find other ways to provide the health services that are offered at KwanzaaFest.

"I'm disappointed that we're not going to have it this year, but we're committed to finding ways to get those services out to the community," he said.

Price said KwanzaaFest could return next year.

EARLY VOTING NOW AND RUNS THROUGH FRIDAY, NOV. 1

Early voting for the Nov. 5, 2013, Constitutional Amendment election began Monday, Oct. 21, and runs through Friday, Nov. 1.

Those voting during Early Voting can cast a ballot at a time and location more convenient to their schedule than waiting for Election Day.

Information on the location of Early Voting polling places and times in Dallas County can be found at www.dallascountvotes.org and in other counties by contacting your local elections office.

Please remember that the November 5th Election will be the first statewide election requiring a photo ID for in-person voting.

Many Texans already have an approved form of photo ID. The seven forms of approved ID are:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days before being presented at the polling place. Information about obtaining an election identification certificate is available at the DPS website.

The Nov. 5 statewide ballot consists of nine proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Voters may also see a number of local initiatives and races on the ballot.

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NAACP SELECTS LORRAINE MILLER, FORMER HOUSE CLERK, AS INTERIM PRESIDENT

The NAACP has named former House of Representatives clerk Lorraine Miller as interim president and CEO of the 104-year-old, Baltimore-based civil rights organization. Miller, an NAACP board member, steps in to preliminarily replace Benjamin Todd Jealous, the organization's youngest president and CEO, who announced in September that he would step down effective the end of the year to spend more time with his wife and two children.

Miller steps into the role Nov. 1.

Miller is a native of Fort Worth, Texas, and has an executive master's degree from the Georgetown University School of Business. According to the NAACP website, Miller is the first black American and third woman to serve as an officer of the U.S. House, where she has served as clerk. She also has worked as senior adviser and director of intergovernmental relations to then-House speaker (now House minority leader) Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., and also has worked for former House speakers Jim Wright, D-Texas, the late Tom Foley, D-Wash., and for Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga.

She also served on the legislative affairs team for the Clinton White House. In 2004, she was elected president of the Washington, D.C., branch of the NAACP.

Miller, who lives in Washington, said she was honored to assume the role.

US Chamber boss: Ted Cruz needs to 'work on' keeping quiet - The head of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce on Monday likened Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Texas) to a tennis player, questioning whether the GOP firebrand has the necessary political agility to keep charging the net. Cruz has come under fire from fellow congressional Republicans for his refusal to drop efforts to delay or dial back the president's landmark healthcare law as part of a budget deal. The president of Washington's largest business lobby appeared to sympathize with the frustration. "I sort of think about him as a tennis player," Tom Donohue told reporters Monday. "You know, if you're going to rush the net all the time, you better have a lot of motion to the left and the right, and he hasn't proved that to me yet," Donohue said, stressing that he wanted to work with the freshman senator. Asked whether the business community wouldn't rather Cruz keep his mouth shut, Donohue said, "that might be one thing we could work on."

'Dallas' Too Busy Growing To Hate



Bethune-Cookman Gets a New President – and his Wife by James Harper

Florence Jackson has no problem with being known as the woman who stands by her man.

The new first lady of Bethune-Cookman University even admits that her husband, Edison Jackson, who was scheduled to be installed as the school's sixth president on Oct. 16, is the head of their family.

"He earned that. I didn't just give it to him. We grew together. He was not dictatorial," she said in an interview with her husband during which it became obvious that she is a long way from being a traditional wife. Mrs. Jackson adds that she will not be a traditional first lady of the historical Black university as well. And that suits her husband just fine.

President and Mrs. Jackson will be celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary on Oct. 19, three days after he officially takes over the reins of a college founded 109 years ago by Mary McLeod Bethune.

Mrs. Jackson first met her husband in their hometown of Heathsville, Va. They were in the first grade together and her mother was their teacher.

They would eventually become childhood sweethearts, attending the same church, singing in the choir together and playing in the high school band. Both would go on to different colleges and they ended up getting married two years before they graduated.

Mrs. Jackson was a business major and her first job would be as a high school teacher in New Jersey where they eventually settled. Soon, President Jackson would get a job in Compton, Calif., and as most wives did in those days, she would pack their things and on they went with their two children.

From Compton to New York In 1985, Jackson would become president of Compton Community College. By 1989, they would be packing their bags once again, headed back East where he had been offered the position of president of Medgar Evers College in New York City. He would hold that position until he decided to retire in 2009.

While Jackson served as president at both these colleges, Mrs. Jackson continued to have her own life. In addition to raising their children, she also maintained a full-time job in academia for 34 years until she retired. Their daughter Eulayne Jackson Brooks is a superintendent of schools while son Terrence Jackson is a computer engineer.

After retiring from Medgar Evers, the Jacksons moved back to their Virginia hometown.

Though she was enjoying their retirement, Mrs. Jackson noticed that her husband was not adjusting as well and wasn't surprised

when he told her he had been offered an interim position as president of B-CU.

"I learned early the need to be flexible. We had to move several times," she said, adding she was fine with the move as long as it was an "interim" position.

"I was involved with Deltas (Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.). I was very busy. He was getting restless. I was not shocked," she continued.

Jackson officially became interim president of B-CU on May 13, 2012.

"Obviously, that didn't work out," Mrs. Jackson remarked.

Permanent offer

Once again she was approached by her husband and told that he had been offered a permanent position.

"I was hesitant. People I have met here (in Daytona Beach) have been cordial," Mrs. Jackson said noting she gave in to her husband especially after he told her he would only hold the position for four years.

"I see myself in a supportive role. I'm one of his strongest supporters. He knows I'm always there for him. He can always come home no matter what," Mrs. Jackson continued.

As far as her role at B-CU, Mrs. Jackson said, "I'm flexible. When things open up, I'll address them at that time."

Along with Delta Sigma Theta, Mrs. Jackson has been active in the Links service organization.

She currently volunteers at B-CU's library two days a week and told the librarians to put her to work wherever they needed her.

Like his wife, President Jackson was at ease as he shared his plans for the university for the remaining three years of his contract.

Jackson said a major issue that needs to be addressed in the community is helping young men go back to school, especially young fathers.

"There is a pocket of young men aged out of the school system. We need to help them get back in the mainstream society – say to these young brothers there is hope," he said.

Adopted elementary school in Daytona

Jackson also said he plans to

address issues facing Black women as well in the community.

One project Jackson is proud of is the university's adoption of Turie T. Small Elementary, a predominately Black school in Daytona Beach.

With a new K-16 initiative, Jackson said students from B-CU will serve as tutors at the school to help improve the success of the students.

Jackson said there are plans to have a new student union building constructed in the place of the former Cookman Hall.

"Most institutions have one-stop shopping. Students should not have to walk all across campus," he said. The new Student Union will include specialty shops.

"I couldn't live with myself if I ignored conditions of student living," he said sharing that he had two student dorms – Curtis Hall and the Bronson Annex – gutted and renovated, plus added new furniture.

New Construction Planned Jackson said two more residence halls will be constructed on the current football practice field before his presidency is concluded.

Construction soon will begin on a new practice field for football players behind the Larry Handfield Training Center.

Though many alumni and students want a new gym, Jackson said the funds for such an endeavor are not available.

So in the meantime the old gym will be enhanced and expanded to include new seating and locker rooms.

B-CU surpassed projections enrolling a record 3,787 students for fall 2013. The projected enrollment for fall 2013 was 3,471. Jackson added that B-CU received nearly 10,000 applicants.

"Students from across the world see the value in a Bethune-Cookman education. We are focusing on academic excellence and that is drawing students who want a quality education," he continued.

"I don't want the university perceived as a last resort," President Jackson said. "We can pick and choose."

Explanatory Statements for the November 5th, 2013 Constitutional Amendment Election Links

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of

which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled vet-

eran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organization.

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property in addition to the current legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB)



"THE PSALMIST'S OBSERVATION OF THE PROSPERITY OF THE WICKED" PSALM 49:1-20

The superscription for Psalm 49 reads "To the chief Musician, A Psalm for the Sons of Korah." The psalmist begins this psalm in verses 1-4 by calling on God's creation to listen to his instruction that requires understanding to gain the proper perception. The psalmist summons both the rich and the poor to listen to his saying, "My mouth shall speak of wisdom; and the meditation of my heart shall be of understanding" (v. 3). When a summons has been issued of great import, one should listen with the intent to heed.

The psalmist declared in verse 5 that the wicked

have a false sense of security. The glory of the wicked is only transitory and fleeting. In verses 6-9, the psalmist unveiled the fact that the wealth of the wicked cannot buy salvation, nor can his wealth bring about an extension of his life on earth forever as he states, "They that trust in their wealth, and boast themselves in the multitude of their riches; None of them can by any means redeem his brother, nor give to God a ransom for him" (vv. 6-7).

Because life is so fragile and brief, it is important that man should place great value on the question of "where will he spend eternity?" Jesus raised a most profound question on the value of one's soul in Matthew 16:26 in saying: "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" The eternal question should be considered by man, for Jesus Christ is the only One who can

redeem man's soul from eternal destruction. Jesus left the glory of heaven to rescue mankind; in that Romans 6:23 says, "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Would you desire to receive eternal life? Then, trust God's Son, for I John 5:12 states, "He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life." Yes, eternal life resides in Jesus Christ, and Christ states clearly, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me."

Although the wicked rich may prosper in this life, they will eventually depart from the earth and they will leave their "holdings" with others (vv. 10-12). They may even have properties named in their honor, they will leave it and be forgotten, "For he seeth that wise men die, likewise the fool and the brutish person perish, and leave their wealth to others" (v. 10). In verses 13-14, the

psalmist advances the fact that the folly of the proud will be ended in death. In other words, the glory of the proud will be consigned to the grave! Their glory will be put to rest. However, the righteous has hope beyond the grave, "But God will redeem my soul from the power of the grave: for he shall receive me" (v. 15). The psalmist concludes this psalm in verses 16-20 by acknowledging that affluent wicked people might enjoy the pleasures of this life, they will not take anything with them, "For when he dieth he shall carry nothing away: his glory shall not descend after him" (v. 17). It would be foolish to be envious of them. The ultimate destination of the wicked rich is eternal doom and separation from God, "Man that is in honour, and understandeth not, is like the beasts that perish" (v. 20).





Proper disposal of unused medications prevents accidental poisonings

Medicines in the home are a leading cause of accidental poisoning and flushed or trashed medicines can end up polluting our waters. To reduce the number of unintentional poisonings, the staff of the North Texas Poison Center, housed at Parkland Memorial Hospital, is urging residents to take part in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day.

The event takes place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 26, and aims to provide a safe and convenient means for people to dispose of their unused or expired medications.

"Communities across the United States will be taking part in this event and raising awareness on the potential for abuse of prescription medications,"

said Charise Thomason, public health educator with the North Texas Poison Center.

Thomason said there are several reasons why people should dispose of unused, expired and unwanted medications:

- Unwanted medications can be tempting to children and pets, and can result in unintentional poisonings.

- Expired medications are often ineffective because they have been kept past their expiration date or improperly stored.

- Unused medications

can make your home a target of theft by drug abusers.

- Dispose of medications properly. Do not keep prescription medications around "just in case."

- Inventory your medicine cabinet and other places you store your medicines.

- Safely store the medicines you use by keeping them out of reach. Store medicines in a locked cabinet or medicine lock box.

- Always use the child-resistant medicine cap – and remember child-resistant caps are not childproof.

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
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












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"Groundbreaking For The New Client Choice Food Pantry in South Dallas - A Model of Collaboration"



A historical groundbreaking for the expansion of the St. Philip's food pantry to a "client choice" food pantry was held on Thursday, October 17th at 1:00 p.m. The pantry is located at 1502 Pennsylvania Avenue adjacent to the St. Philip's School and Community Center. St. Philip's and North Texas Food Bank have collaborated for nearly three decades in bringing hunger relief services to South Dallas.

The new "client choice" food pantry is the result of an unprecedented collaboration between the City of Dallas, corporations and the non-profit community. The partners include North Texas Food Bank, Kroger, In The City for Good, Debra Peek-Haynes of Quorum Commercial, the Real Estate Council and

St. Philip's School and Community Center. Each entity will partner to provide a vital contribution to expand St. Philip's current food pantry into a "client choice" food pantry.

City Councilmember Carolyn R. Davis of District 7, who helped spearhead the coalition said, "I am very excited about this state-of-the-art food pantry that will be a benefit to the South Dallas community. This is another step in our on-going efforts to revitalize South Dallas."

The City of Dallas played a crucial role in the effort by donating the condemned property located directly adjacent to St. Philip's. In the City for Good, Quorum Commercial and Trammell Crow took the roles of negotiating for the property along with the design of the renovation. Fundraising for the "client choice" food pantry has been led by In The City For Good and St. Philip's. The Real Estate Council has made a major financial commitment to the project. Kroger will provide additional design and engineering support along with helping to procure fixtures and refrigeration equipment.

"This project is special for us because we are working with some of our long-term partners as well as new partners to make this project a reality" says Gary Huddleston, Director of Consumer Affairs. Kroger has worked closely, over many years, with the North Texas Food Bank on projects throughout the metroplex.

The North Texas Food Bank will operate the new "client choice" food pantry in partnership with St. Philip's School and Community Center. The North Texas Food Bank will use this expanded client choice food pantry to test distribution models and to create a "best in class" pantry operation. In turn, North Texas

Food Bank will use this food pantry to teach best practice pantry operation across the service area.

Dr. Terry J. Flowers, Executive Director / Headmaster of St. Philip's said "The expansion of services with the development of this food pantry will provide relief amidst the surrounding food desert in our neighborhood. The collaboration with North Texas Food Bank will bring South Dallas/Fair Park the highest level of support for hunger relief along with pathways to self-reliance."

Community collaboration is not a new idea for St. Philip's School and Community Center. Located in the heart of South Dallas, St. Philip's actively works with other organizations to provide numerous services for the citizens of South Dallas including a free legal clinic, MyChildren's pediatric clinic through Children's Medical Center of Dallas, senior citizen programming in collaboration with AARP, the Kid's Café, another collaboration with the North Texas Food Bank, and working with VNA, St. Philip's has been a Meals-on-Wheels depot for more than 25 years.

The groundbreaking was open to the public.



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
