Women Favor President Obama Because of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Restoration Act

(AP) - The first piece of legislation President Obama signed into law was the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Restoration Act, which empowers women to recover wages lost to discrimination by extending the time period in which an employee can file a claim. The President continues to advocate for passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act, common sense legislation that would give women additional tools to fight pay discrimination. And President Obama convened a National Equal Pay Task Force to ensure that existing equal pay laws are fully enforced. The Task Force has helped women recover millions in lost wages, built collaborative training programs that educate employees about their rights and inform employers of their obligations, and facilitated an unprecedented level of inter-agency coordination to improve enforcement of equal pay laws.

On November 6, 2012, voters will cast their vote for the \$642 million bond program. The Proposition 3 will raise \$55 million for economic development investments, mostly in southern Dallas.

The bond package is an important component of Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings' ambitious GrowSouth initiative to increase the tax base and improve quality of life in southern Dallas. The \$55 million Proposition 3 would build on successes and major investments under way in north Oak Cliff and West Dallas and around the University of North Texas at Dallas and Pinnacle Park.

This media has called for unity and togetherness for the last decade, hoping to reach the goal of a better society.


At this time in history, it is imperative that **HISPANICS**, **BLACKS**, **WHITES** and all races work together to accomplish a sense of unity.

CHIEF OF STAFF ALAN KING RESIGNS FROM DALLAS ISD

Dallas Independent School District Superintendent Mike Miles announced Thursday, Oct. 18 that Chief of Staff Alan King has submitted his resignation effective tomorrow.

King served as Interim Superintendent for a year after being named Chief Financial Officer in January 2011.

"Alan King has served the district ably and with integrity in every

capacity and I wish him well," said Miles. "During our discussion today, Alan told me that when he accepted the position of Chief of Staff, he felt it would be temporary until our new administrative team was in place. Now that the first 100 days has been completed and a new administrative team is solidly in place, he felt as if he had accomplished his goal of shepherding the

transition." Superintendent Miles noted that King leaves the district in a stronger financial position than when he started. The district's fund balance is projected to be approximately \$189 million at the end of the 2011-12 school year. Miles said that a strong team remains in place that will be able to keep the district's financial operations on solid footing.

me" (2 Corinthians 12:9). In Second Corinthians, Paul speaks of his thorn. He wanted the Lord to remove the thorn from him, but the Lord allowed the thorn to stay. The Lord wanted Paul to lean on Him and not on Paul's own strength.


Many of us cry out to God wanting Him to remove something from our lives. It is during our difficult times that we can become closer to Christ. Why? It is during this time that we have to learn to depend on Christ for our

strength. Paul went one step further to explain that he would boast about his weaknesses so that Christ's power can rest on him. This means that Paul learned to accept his thorn. Once Paul was able to accept his situation, he found joy in Christ.

No incident in the life of King David is presented as the basis for the occasion of Psalm 26. This psalm may be classified as an instructional psalm; mainly, teaching one that a life of separation from evil demands that a walk of integrity is very much needed. The term "integrity" means sincerity, honesty, and uprightness. David begins this instructional psalm by calling on God to examine his walk of integrity. Although David had sinned greatly in the past (Psalms 32, 51), we find that David is calling on God to examine his walk of

integrity - "Judge me, O LORD; for I have walked in mine integrity: I have trusted also in the LORD; therefore I shall not slide. Examine me, O LORD, and prove me; try my reins and my heart" (vs. 1-2).

David's walk in verse 3 - "For thy lovingkindness is before mine eyes: and I have walked in thy truth," serves as a great walk of godliness. When one is walking the walk of godliness, one will not be engaged in any form of evil, such as the blessed man in Psalm 1 that "walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly" and meditates in the law of the Lord day and night. It is very interesting to me that the psalmist could declare that he walked in integrity and in truth because He trusted in

the Lord. When you are trusting in God and His word you will have a godly walk.

In verses 4-8, David manifested his walk of integrity through his separation from sinners - "I have not sat with vain persons, neither will I go in with dissemblers" (vs. 4), nor sit with the wicked as stated in verse 5. David vows his association with worshippers of God and the house of God in verses 6-8 - "LORD, I have loved the habitation of thy house, and the place where thine honour dwelleth" (v. 8).

As believers in this age of grace, we need to know that in order to maintain a godly walk, we must trust in God and His word and separate from that which is evil, for II Corinthians 6:17

says - "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you." The one whose walk is upright will worship God in sincerity. In essence, He will have an adoration to worship the Lord (vs. 7-8).

In verses 9-12, David calls on God to spare him from the judgment of the wicked as he states in verse 9 "Gather not my soul with sinners". In anticipation of the Lord's deliverance, David was determined to praise the Lord in the congregation in verses 11-12 - "My foot standeth in an even place: in the congregations will I bless the LORD" (vs. 12).

On October 19, 2012, the last weekend of the 2012 State Fair of Texas, Big Tex was destroyed by fire.

Kerens, Texas is known as the "Birthplace of Big Tex". The statue was an idea of Mr. Howell Brister, to encourage holiday sales in the town. Modeled after Kerens residents Ottis Franklin Spurlock and Hardy Mayo, the figure was built by members of the community. After two seasons Kerns offered it up for sale. In 1951, State Fair president R. L. Thornton purchased it for \$750 and had artist Jack Bridges transform them into a cowboy, giving birth to big "Tex".

Big Tex made his debut at the 1952 fair, dressed in denim jeans and a plaid shirt donated by the H. D. Lee Company of Shawnee Mission, Kansas. Mr. Artist Bridges used a photograph of his own face, a photograph of rancher Doc Simmons and a photograph of Will Rogers to create the new look. After the fair, his appearance was slightly altered to straighten his nose and correct an odd wink. It was in 1953 that Big Tex also began speaking. In 1955 Big Tex received his first new change of clothes, again fabricated by the H. D. Lee Company. After that year's fair, he traveled to West Texas to participate in Abilene Christian College's 50th annual homecoming celebration.

Big Tex celebrated his 50th birthday in 2002, receiving a giant birthday cake and an AARP card. Shades of gray were added to the hair and wrinkles were added the figure's hands and face as Big Tex continued to "age." In 2012 the State Fair of Texas celebrated Big Tex's 60th birthday.






missed by all whose lives he has touched.


Mrs. Juanita Nixon
