## FIRST LADY MICHELLE OBAMA PRAISES AMAZING STUDENTS

Students in Akron have a lot to look forward thanks in part to city's own NBA legend LeBron James, who recently announced plans to help students pay for their college education.

On Wednesday October 21, 2015 at the University of Akron's James A. Rhodes (JAR) Arena, LeBron James and the First Lady of the United States Michelle Obama addressed this announcement to over one thousand students at a special event focused on education.

In 2011, in partnership with Akron Public Schools, the LeBron James Family Foundation began working on the high school dropout crisis, through the foundation's "Wheels for Education" (WFE) program, that targets third graders and following them through graduation.

Now the foundation will guarantee a 4-year, renewable University of Akron scholarship to all qualifying students that are part of the Akron I PROMISE Network (AIPN).

In order to qualify, each student must graduate from a high school within the Akron Public School district, achieve standard testing, maintain good attendance and perform community service.

## Dallas ISD Honors Teachers Of The Year



This year, one teacher from the elementary and secondary categories and an elementary and secondary teacher from the magnet/special schools category were selected to receive the top award at a special event honoring them on Thursday, Oct. 22.

Tara Broadus at Joseph J. Rhoads Learning Center received the award in the elementary category and Rachel Harrah, from Thomas Jefferson High School won for secondary.

Michael Ruiz at William B. Travis Vanguard/Academy for the Academically Talented and Gifted

received the elementary magnet/special schools nod, while Dana Clark from Irma Rangel Young Women's Leadership Academy won in the secondary category.

All 12 finalists for 2015 Dallas ISD Teacher of the Year were distinguished teachers as measured by the Teacher Excellence Initiative. There were four finalists in the elementary school category, four in the secondary category and four in the category for magnet and special schools.

About the winners

Tara Broadus has taught prekindergarten at Joseph J. Rhoads Learning Center for

11 years. A doctoral candidate and self-described life-long learner, she sees ongoing learning as a powerful instructional tool.

"Lifelong learning is a staple in how I work to improve classroom effectiveness," Broadus said. "I have remained in school since 1999 and continue to obtain professional development hours during the summer related to my grade level. I believe that there is always something to learn, some takeaway, that I have not tried that can be the difference maker in how I instruct my students."

The Board of Trustees on August 21 approved sending the \$1.6 billion bond package to the district's registered voters. The proposal is based on recommendations compiled by the Future Facilities Task Force (FFT) with input from numerous sources including FFT members, Dallas ISD staff, school administrators, community members and facility assessment reports commissioned by the district.

The proceeds from the bond package are anticipated to create nine new schools, 326 new classrooms, a variety of new educational programs, and facility improvements. 

## "A PSALM DESCRIBING PRAISE TO THE KING" PSALM 101:1-8

We are not told how long after the events of Pentecost that the incident of the text took place. Whatever the amount of time, the believers continued to be active in their faith in spreading the good news. As a part of their religious customs, we find in our text Peter and John engaged in worship in the temple. Our text says that Peter and John entered the temple courts at the ninth hour which is 3:00

p.m. (v.1).

As Peter and John entered the temple, a lame man was placed there, who daily asked contributions from the crowd of worshippers. This lame man simply wanted a contribution to supply his needs (vv. 2-3). He sat daily at the gate called beautiful to ask alms of worshippers. The gate called beautiful was a gate that led from the court of the Gentiles into the temple area limited to Jews. As people poured through the gate, no doubt this lame man became a noticeable object as he sat begging for alms.

What a pitiful picture we have of an individual who is both helpless and hopeless. The lame man serves as a portrayal of a lost sinner – one who is helpless and hopeless. As believers, we need to extend a helping hand, directing the lost to

Jesus Christ, the Saviour of mankind (St. John 1:29; 6:35). The lame man of our text, who had a handicap, was instructed by Peter to gaze at both Peter and John (v. 4). Having obeyed Peter's instructions, the lame man was expecting only a contribution (v. 5). This man who had been crippled for over forty years (Acts 4:22), never imagined that the power of God could bring relief to his crippled condition.

To remedy his lame situation, Peter and John did not offer the lame man material substance, but invoked the powerful name of Jesus for verse 6 says, "Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." At the powerful name of Jesus, this once lame man received a cure (v. 7). This man's condition was

indeed helpless and hopeless but he received strength to walk because of the power of Jesus! Having been healed, the beggar expresses jubilation by walking, leaping and praising God (v. 8).

The man, who once lay at the gate, is now expressing unusual joy in the temple as he praises God. After one has been healed by Jesus, he or she should have a desire to worship Him where other worshippers go. This miracle of the healing of the lame man was a noteworthy one and it caused amazement among many people, because they knew of the helpless condition of the lame man (v. 9-10). When God truly heals one, it is truly amazing!






