Rangers Win AL West Title



Rangers Celebrate AL West Title (AP)

(AP) - Cole Hamels and the Texas Rangers finally clinched the AL West title on the last day of the regular season.

Hamels pitched a three-hitter, Adrian Beltre hit a go-ahead homer and the Rangers beat the Angels 9-2 Sunday, eliminating Los Angeles from playoff contention.

A year after their 95 loss-

es were the most in the American League, two months after they were still eight games out of first place and three days after ensuring themselves a postseason spot, the Rangers wrapped up their sixth division title.

Texas plays its first AL division series game since 2011 on Thursday at Toronto or Kansas City.

Moments after the final out, AL West championship banners already were flying at the ballpark. The Rangers will go there under first-year manager Jeff Banister, whose team lost ace Yu Darvish to Tommy John surgery before the season started.

#TAKEBACKTXSU

The Black Lives Matter Movement isn't the only movement that has created a hashtag that has caught on like a wildfire amongst young, Black people - at least not Black youth in Houston.

Texas Southern University (TSU) students have started a movement called #TakeBackTxSU, calling the university to task for what they consider to be a lack of concern for student issues, and more importantly, for what they believe is an attempt by the current administration to abandon the roots of TSU as a Historically Black College and University (HBCU).

The Movement and hashtag, #TakeBackTxSU, were created by Christina Letsinger, a junior, studying communications at TSU.

She believes TSU has become extremely divided, and that the university should not be, especially with it being an HBCU.

"The hashtag, #TakeBackTxSU, was not to bash or disrespect TSU or its administration," said Letsinger. "It was created because we love TSU and we want to see it prosper. We have to come together and stick together because WE ARE ONE TSU."

Letsinger states the three reasons she created the hashtag were to: (1) bring back the culture and tradition to the TSU campus that has been stripped from TSU by the current



administration; (2) shed light on issues like financial aid, housing, lack of technology, building maintenance; and (3) unite TSU back to one school.

Donald Trump Dropping Out Of the Polls



AP- Donald Trump says there is one way he could get out of the race: if his poll numbers decline. In an interview Sunday on NBC's Meet the Press, the current Republican presidential front-run-

ner said he would bow if his poll standing declines to a level at which he thought he could no longer win the GOP nomination.

"I'm not a masochist. If I was dropping in the polls where I saw that I wasn't going to win, why would I continue?" Trump told NBC's Chuck Todd.

"I believe in polls. How many elections do you see where the polls were wrong? Not that many. OK. You see them, but not that many. If I were doing poorly, if I saw myself going down, if you would stop calling me cause you no longer have any interest in Trump because he has no chance, I'd go back to my business. I have no problem with that."

Trump currently leads the field among Republican primary voters. But some polls are starting to show his support waning somewhat in key early-nominating states, as other candidates, like former Hewlett-Packard CEO

Carly Fiorina and retired neurosurgeon Ben Carson, have gained steam.

Throughout the race, Trump has been incredibly vocal about his strong poll numbers, frequently brandishing them as a rhetorical weapon during interviews, debates, and campaign rallies to demonstrate the depth of his support.

He has also been dismissive of polls that have shown his support dropping. When asked by Business Insider about negative media coverage showing his support sagging after last month's Republican presidential debate, Trump lashed out.

"It's dishonest reporting and - let me change it - it's knowingly dishonest," Trump said. "Because the polls speak for themselves. I'm up. Check out Zogby. Check out Reuters - the Reuters - what do they call that? The Reuters average. Even the Huffington Post. Check all of them."

South Carolina Flooding: How to Help

(AP) -- Officials say it is now safe for some people to return to their homes after they evacuated early Wednesday because of a dam that was expected to collapse. Authorities had ordered residents in about 1,000 homes downstream from the dam to evacuate and seek higher ground. Lott says, "There is no danger of any dam break whatsoever." The sheriff said the decision to evacuate was based on the recommendations of engineers at the dam. Trucks carrying about 400 tons of rocks were brought in to stabilize the dam.

Nielsen Reports Untold Success Stories in the Black Community

(NNPA) - Acquanetta Pierce Glass, president and CEO of Avance Communications in Detroit, Mich., used last year's Nielsen report on Black consumers to convince one of her clients to run a 15-second trailer in movie theaters during the holiday season.

The Nielsen Company's credibility in the data and research space helped to convince her client to launch the campaign, which was a phenomenal success, Glass said.

The Nielsen Company partnered with the National Newspaper Publishers' Association (NNPA), a trade group that represents more than 200 Black newspapers in the United States, to help distribute the annual study on Black consumers.

According to the 2015 report, Black consumer spending on watching movies and playing video games entertainment topped the total population.

"The mean number of annual African-American movie ticket purchases is about 19% higher at 3.7 versus 3.1 for non-Hispanic Whites. Video/PC game store purchases are 71% higher and amusement park purchases are 25% higher than non-Hispanic Whites as well," the 2015 report said. "As the number of higher-income Black consumers continue to grow, pur-

chasing rates will follow suit."

Glass hopes to be able to pull those same nuggets of information from the 2015 report to gain an edge on her competitors and to keep her clients informed on the latest data.

"We're living in a cluttered society and with all of the communication that we have and if this report gives [your business] an advantage to break through that clutter," you have to take it, said Glass.

This year's report focuses on the untold success stories in the Black community that are often missed by mainstream media.

The report said that Black households experienced the largest increase in the number of households earning more than \$200,000, almost doubling the increase experienced by the total population over that same time period.

In the years from 2005-2013, the income bracket with the largest increase for Black households occurred in the number of households earning over \$200,000, with an increase of 74% for the total population, the report said.

Rev. Jacques DeGraff, a social justice activist, founder of the Eagle Academy for Young Men in Bronx, N.Y. and co-chair of Nielsen's African American Consumer Advisory Council, called the report required reading for anyone who calls themselves a leader or a voice in the Black community.

nity.

"We're not all teenagers throwing rocks at CVS," said DeGraff. "Some of us have careers and businesses mortgages and organizations that are built on success. We're part of the American landscape."

Denise Rolark Barnes, chairperson of the NNPA, said that the report shows the value of the Black dollar.

"This report definitely sets the record straight and we've got to use this like a drum and pound on this thing in every jurisdiction across the country in every city to make sure that people understand our value," said Barnes.

Cheryl Pearson-McNeil, senior vice president of U.S. Strategic Alliances and Community Engagement at Nielsen, said that the report tells a different story than the stereotypes regurgitated about the Black community in mainstream media, including hard luck, rising crime rates, mass incarceration and high unemployment.

"At every income level above \$60,000 per household, Black income growth outpaced that of non-Hispanic Whites," the report said. "In the years from 2005-2013, the income bracket with the largest increase for Black households occurred in the number of households earning over \$200,000, with an increase of 138%, compared to an increase of 74% for the total population."

Not only did the report high-

light the income growth rate of Black households earning \$50,000, \$75,000 and \$200,000, Nielsen also noted that more than 70 percent of Black high school graduates enrolled in college last year, a higher rate than Whites and Hispanics. The Black high school graduation rate also rose faster than the national average.

Blacks also experienced higher rates of homeownership in the South (47.4 percent), where most African Americans live, compared to other regions.

"We call this report the untold story for a reason," said Pearson-McNeil.

Black households at the \$100,000 income level spend more per trip than Whites at department stores, convenience stores, toy stores, bookstores and automotive stores, according to the report.

DeGraff said that it's up to the Black community to decide what to do with the "stereotype-shattering" data compiled in the Nielsen report.

"What this report says is that our position in America has changed. We're not just supplicants asking for justice and participation," said DeGraff. "We are participants at the table as equals and as contributors."

DeGraff continued: "There are companies whose fortunes rise and fall on how we spend our money. The question should be: What are we getting in return for giving you our business?"

A Little Bit of Faith: Dwell in God

Have you ever needed a place to rest your weary head? Have you ever felt left alone? Many of us have at times. This life can be difficult; when life is difficult, we look for someone whom we can consult with or confide in. Yet, there is a person whom we can trust and tell all our problems and concerns to. As you recall, a great multitude had gathered because they were so astonished by the phenomenon of tongues speaking among the Galilean. This phenomenon impressed them so much until they asked the question, "What meaneth this?" The unbelieving Jews at Pentecost could not believe the movement of the Holy Spirit and mocked what took place, for verse Acts 2:13 says, "Others mocking said, These men are full of new wine." These unbelieving Jews witnessed the event that took place at Pentecost, yet they did not believe! Their reaction prompted Peter to stand boldly with the eleven and declare that Jesus of Nazareth is the Messiah as recorded in verses

14 through 40. Peter informed the crowd that, although they rejected Christ, the program of God included the death and resurrection of Christ because it was foretold in scripture.

"THE POWERFUL PREACHING OF PETER ON THE DAY OF PENTECOST" ACTS 2:36-47

The basic theme of Peter's message is seen in verse 36 that says, "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made the same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ." Peter wanted this crowd to know that Jesus of Nazareth is the Messiah (Christ). He wanted the whole nation to know that the same Jesus that was crucified, God had appointed Him "both Lord and Christ." The message that Peter presented to this crowd brought deep conviction to some, for verse 37 states, "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do?" The crowd that heard Peter's message was under deep conviction because they were guilty of rejecting the Messiah, whom God had sent.

Having acknowledged their guilt in verse 36, Peter responded to their question with this answer, "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Peter directs this audience to do two things: "repent and be baptized." When an unsaved person repents he or she is changing one's mind or one's purpose. The audience that Peter was preaching to needed to change their minds with respect to Jesus, the Messiah, the Appointed One that God sent! This audience needed to view Jesus Christ as God viewed Him. The needed to not only feel sorrow for their sin of rejecting the Messiah, but they needed to change their hearts and identify Him as the Messiah as God viewed Him.

Not only was the audience directed by Peter to repent, they were also exhorted to be water baptized as a visible sign of an invisible change that would take place in their hearts. Through water baptism, those who accepted Christ were making a public acknowledgement that they

were identified with Christ. Because their sins had been remitted, they were publicly baptized as a means of acknowledging that fact.

As a result of genuine repentance, the gift of the Holy Ghost is promised (vv. 38b-40). Because the Jewish people had been callous to the truth, Peter warned this audience to save themselves from having a rebellious attitude (v. 40). The overwhelming response is seen in verse 41 which states, "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls."

The early church was characterized in four ways: "they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine; they fellowshiped; they broke bread; and they prayed" (v. 42). As a result of their new found existence, four marvelous results took place among them: fear came upon them (v. 43); an unusual fellowship existed among them (vv. 44-46); the church was spiritually enriched by the Lord (v. 47).





Rangers win AL West title

The Angels needed to win their finale and have Houston lose in Arizona to force a tiebreaker game for the AL's second wild card. The Astros, who were playing in Arizona, clinched that wild card when the Angels lost.

The Rangers clinched no worse than a wild card with their 5-3 win in the opener of the four-game series Thursday night before the Angels, the 2014 division champs, won the next two games with ninth-inning rallies.

Los Angeles won 2-1 on Friday and rallied for an 11-10 victory Saturday to stay in the race. Houston won both of those nights.

Texas has won its last 10 games started by Hamels, the ace left-hander they acquired from Philadelphia at the end of July when he was coming off a no-hitter. Hamels won seven of

those games - the 2008 World Series MVP is 7-1 with Texas and 13-8 overall this season.

The Rangers were eight games out of first place after an 11-inning loss to San Francisco on Aug. 1, when Hamels left with a three-run lead in the eighth inning of his Rangers debut.

At that time, many viewed the acquisition of Hamels, who is signed through 2018 with a club option for 2019, as a move for future seasons. Instead, the Rangers had him on the mound in the 162nd game of the season with a division title, and the seventh playoff berth in team history, in reach.

After Albert Pujols hit his 40th homer in the first to give the Angels a 2-0 lead, following Mike Trout's double, Hamels allowed only one more hit. That was a one-out double in the second by Shane


Victorino.

Texas went ahead to stay in the fifth on Beltré's 18th homer, which landed just beyond the wall in right field for a 3-2 lead against Garrett Richards (15-12). That came after Shin-Soo Choo, who has reached base in 53 of the last 55 games, had an infield single.

Beltré added an infield RBI single as the Rangers added six runs in the seventh, a 37-minute half-inning when Los Angeles used five pitchers.

Beltré has 33 RBIs in his last 23 games, and an MLB-high 53 RBIs in 48 games since Aug. 15. He has 83 RBIs overall.

Richards, starting on three days' rest for the first time in his career, walked the first two batters he faced before Fielder went the opposite way, pushing a grounder through the left side of the infield for an RBI single.

"Being that we are an HBCU, it does not make me feel good that our culture and traditions are being taken away and covered up," said Letsinger. "We're proud to be an HBCU and these issues must be addressed and no longer ignored or pushed under the rug by this administration."

Many of the students at TSU have taken to social media to show solidarity and their support for the movement by sharing the hashtag, along with other memes and messages for all to see.

The local NAACP chapter tweeted its support for the Movement, saying: "NAACP supports the #TakeBackTxSU movement. We are in full support of bringing back the heritage and culture of our HBCU."

Other students and alumni have shared their grievances and concerns about the current administration's handling of TSU and its legacy. One of the biggest concerns was a recruitment video that was produced and released by TSU administrators that featured several TSU students - none of the students on the recruitment video for this HBCU were African American, however.

One concerned person, ladyoliviavmd, wrote on social media:

"Currently, Texas Southern University's administration is systematically eliminating the history and the culture that a Historically Black College and

University encompasses, particularly the essence of TSU and community presence that the school has in Third Ward, Houston, Texas, and masking it with the claims of increasing the school's diversity. I am very disappointed that the students are wanting and fighting to preserve the legacy of TSU more than the administration. The most recent recruitment video TSU released did not have one person of color in the video, President Rudley has on numerous occasions taken away what makes TSU, like the removal of the organization trees on the yard as well as painting over murals of the great painter John T. Biggers as well as his students. We cannot allow this Poisonous Administration to destroy Texas Southern University. I challenge Alumni, Faculty and Staff, and students to speak up against the wrongs of the current administration."

In response to the Movement, TSU officials released a statement:

"Students are a top priority in every aspect of our operations at Texas Southern University. The university administration is taken aback by the flurry of social media surrounding issues that have occurred at the beginning of this semester. TSU Administrators are aware that members of the Student Government Association have a campus peer meeting scheduled for Monday, September 21. We will trust this process and will be pre-

pared to meet with student leaders at the conclusion of that assembly. The TSU Administration welcomes and values student opinions. We will listen to concerns posed by the student body and, in turn, work toward a resolution. We remain...OneTSU."

The TSU Student Government Association (SGA) released a statement:

"Student Government Association leaders at Texas Southern University are meeting to discuss student matters. TSU students are asking that members of the media respect their privacy as they work out a path toward resolution with university administrators, and do not want the tone and tenor of their meeting distracted by cameras and microphones. The majority of TSU students do not support actions taken by a few last week to point fingers at the administration for some issues that may have been the fault of the students in question. SGA leaders will listen to all concerns from the student body and then meet with university administration to resolve critical problems."

Texas Southern University SGA President Crystal Owens chimed in with her thoughts.

"We love our university and we know that our administrators will do whatever it takes for students to receive the best possible education and support," said Owens. "We are One TSU and will emerge in a better place after this dialogue."

How the Program Works
There are many factors to consider before deciding whether a HECM is right for you. To aid in this process, you must meet with a HECM counselor to discuss program eligibility requirements, financial implications and alternatives to obtaining a HECM and repaying the loan. Counselors will also discuss provisions for the mortgage becoming due and payable. Upon the completion of HECM counseling, you should be able to make an independent, informed decision of whether this product will meet your specific needs. You can search online for a HECM counselor or call (800) 569-4287 toll-free. There are borrower and property eligibility requirements that must be met. You can use the listing below to see if you qualify. If you meet the eligibility criteria, you can complete a reverse mortgage application by contacting a FHA-approved lender. You can search online for a FHA-approved lender or you can ask the HECM counselor to provide you with a listing. The lender will discuss other requirements of the HECM program, such as first year payment limitations, available payment options, the loan approval process, and repayment terms.

Borrower Requirements
• You must: Be 62 years of age or older
• Own the property outright or paid-down a considerable amount
• Occupy the property as your principal residence

•Not be delinquent on any federal debt
•Have financial resources to continue to make timely payment of ongoing property taxes, insurance and Homeowner Association fees, etc. Participate in a consumer information session given by a HUD-approved HECM counselor

Property Requirements
The following eligible property types must meet all FHA property standards and flood requirements:
•Single family home or 2-4 unit home with one unit occupied by the borrower
•HUD-approved condominium project
•Manufactured home that meets FHA requirements
