

NAACP warns African-Americans against travel on American Airlines

Dallas Native Supports the Navy's "Silent Service" Half a World Away



SANTA RITA, Guam - A 2006 Newman Smith High School graduate and Dallas native is aiding the U.S. Navy's silent service in the submarine community as part of a hybrid crew of Sailors and civilian mariners working aboard the expeditionary submarine tender, USS Emory S. Land.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Anthony Robinski is a sonar technician serving aboard the Guam-based submarine tender, one of two submarine tenders in the U.S. Navy, conducting coordinated tended moorings and afloat maintenance in the Pacific Ocean as well as the Persian Gulf, Red Sea, Arabian Sea, and parts of the Indian Ocean.

A Navy sonar technician is responsible for the safety of the ship and navigating the ocean with sound.

"My history teacher told me that whatever you do you have to take responsibilities for your actions and do your job to the best of your abilities," said Robinski. "I am exceptional in my job and that lesson has taught me to work well with others."

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The NAACP is warning African-Americans that if they fly on American Airlines they could be subject to discrimination or even unsafe conditions.

American said Wednesday that it was disappointed by the announcement and will invite the civil rights group to meet and talk about the airline.

The NAACP said that for several months it has watched a pattern of disturbing incidents reported by African-American passengers. Among them was activist Tamika Mallory's claim last week that she was a victim of racial bias when a pilot ordered her off a flight after a dispute with another airline employee over her seat.

The NAACP said that and other recent incidents involving African-Americans "suggest a corporate culture of racial insensitivity and possible racial bias on the part of American Airlines."

American Airlines, based in Fort Worth, Texas, said it has a diverse workforce and serves customers of all backgrounds.

Analysis: Can the GOP survive the Trump presidency?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Can the traditional Republican Party survive the presidency of Donald Trump?

That existential question, which has nagged at Republicans since Trump's stunning election one year ago, flared up anew Tuesday with Arizona Sen. Jeff Flake's announcement that he is retiring from Congress. One of the GOP's most consistent critics of the president, Flake was facing a tough primary challenge in next year's election from at least one candidate with the backing of some Trump allies.

"There may not be a place for a Republican like me in the current Republican climate or the current Republican Party," said Flake, a conservative who has worked with Democrats on issues like immigration and the Obama administration's detente with Cuba.

I am a 64 year-old divorced woman who lives with my father. Some years ago, when my marriage fell apart, and Mom was diagnosed with dementia, I moved back home to help my dad with her. I was also working part-time, so I couldn't afford my own apartment. Two years ago, Dad and I could no longer care for Mom at home, so we put her in a care facility, and I retired. During this time, I have made new friends, three of them live in the state of New Mexico. A few months ago, I went to visit these friends, and fell in love with

New Mexico. The cost of living isn't as high as it is here, and the laid-back, small city life seems to mesh well with my personality. I feel this is the place I am meant to live the rest of my life. My problem is that Dad is 87, and I'm leery of moving hundreds of miles away, knowing there are some thugs in the neighborhood, who may try to break into the house once they learn Dad is there alone. Although I have a sister, she has never been there for our parents the way I have been. In fact, our parents haven't seen her in seven years. Some friends and relatives say I should go for it, since I'm divorced and childless, and also reminding me I'm no longer a young woman. 

With a crew of 42 officers and 600 enlisted, submarine tenders are 649 feet long and weigh approximately 23,493 tons. Their mission is to provide maintenance, repairs, hotel services, weapons reload and logistics support to deployed guided-missile and fast-attack submarines. Both of the U.S. Navy's submarine tenders are homeported in Apra Harbor, Guam, and rotate between deployment to support the forward-operating in the 5th and 7th Fleet areas of responsibility and in port in Guam to support in-port and visiting units.

Submarine tenders are additionally capable of providing

repair and logistic services to deployed surface ships.

"I am impressed every day by the caliber of the Sailors who serve aboard our ship," said Capt. Douglas Bradley, commanding officer of USS Emory S. Land. "Our hardworking crew completes an immense amount of work daily aboard this ship. The multitude of different skills and responsibilities is remarkable: submarine and surface ship repair, weapons handling, supply, medical, dental, and more. I am extremely honored to lead and serve this immensely talented and dedicated crew."

The integrated crew of Sailors and civilian mariners builds a strong fellowship while

working alongside each other, Robinski explained. The crews are highly motivated, and quickly adapt to changing conditions. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches and drills.

"The Navy has presented me a lot of opportunities to excel as an individual and to better myself," said Robinski. "My favorite part about being in the Navy is the ability to interact with different people from different backgrounds and the bonds I have made in the Navy.

Guam is home to the U.S. Navy's only submarine tenders, USS Emory S. Land and USS Frank Cable, as well as four Los Angeles-class attack submarines. The submarine ten-

ders provide maintenance, hotel services and logistical support to submarines and surface ships in the U.S. 5th and 7th Fleet areas of operation. The submarines and tenders are maintained as part of the U.S. Navy's forward-deployed submarine force and are readily capable of meeting global operational requirements.

Some advice that Robinski would give to others back home is to always continue moving forward.

"Should you fall or stumble, rise up again and continue moving forward, one day you will find yourself," added Robinski.

The senator's dour assessment of his future in the Republican Party gave voice to worries that have gripped the GOP heading into the midterm elections. Trump has shown little loyalty to some sitting senators, and has openly squabbled with Flake and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell. Some of the president's ardent supporters — led by former White House senior adviser Steve Bannon — are actively courting GOP primary challengers who are more willing to buck the Republican establishment in Washington than line up behind its leaders.

Andy Surabian, a senior adviser for the pro-Trump group Great America Alliance, said Flake's retirement is part of a trend and "should serve as another warning shot to the failed Republican establishment that backed Flake and others like them that their time is up."

To be sure, intra-party divisions are hardly new for the GOP, which has struggled for years to reconcile its more moderate, pro-business wing with the growing crop of populists and nationalists that ultimately fueled Trump's political rise. Trump's election may have

left Republicans with control of both the White House and Congress but it did nothing to heal the divisions. If anything, Trump — a former Democrat with no ideological mooring to conservative principles or deep ties to GOP leaders — has exacerbated the gulf between millions of GOP voters and the congressional leaders sent to Washington to represent them.

Peter Wehner, a Trump critic who served in President George W. Bush's White House, said there's a "struggle going on for the soul of conservatism and the Republican Party." He urged more traditional Republicans to stay and fight for their principles instead of fleeing — though he left open the prospect that it's a fight they ultimately may not win.

"If this party is defined by Donald Trump and Steve Bannon, then a lot of these people aren't going to want to be a part of that party anyway," Wehner said.

The anti-establishment forces already had one victory under their belt after firebrand jurist Roy Moore defeated incumbent Sen. Luther Strange in the Alabama GOP primary last month. Moore is considered an outlier among Republicans and hardly a guaranteed vote for McConnell if he

lands in the Senate next year.

Flake's comments Tuesday from the Senate floor came hours after Sen. Bob Corker, a Tennessee Republican who has also decided not to seek reelection, declared Trump was "debasing" the United States with untruths and name-calling. Last week, Sen. John McCain lamented a climate of "half-baked, spurious nationalism" and Bush bemoaned "bullying and prejudice in our public life" — comments that appeared to be veiled criticism of Trump, though neither man mentioned the president by name.

Privately, many more Republican officials have raised deep concerns about the direction Trump is pulling the party, both on policy and tone. He's pulled the GOP to the right on immigration only to raise the prospect of making a deal with Democrats to allow young people brought to the U.S. illegally as children to stay in the country. He's withdrawn the U.S. from a major Pacific Rim trade pact and threatened to pull out of a long-standing deal with Canada and Mexico. The president has also drawn open support from some white nationalists, a reality that was magnified after he equivocated in his response to clashes between

white supremacists and counter-protesters in Charlottesville, Virginia, this summer.

But aside from occasional criticism of Trump's tweets or most callous comments, most Republican office holders have stayed silent, in part out of fear of alienating the president's supporters. A handful of House Republicans have taken the same path as Flake and Corker, announcing plans to retire rather than run for re-election in competitive districts.

Trent Lott, the former Republican Senate majority leader from Mississippi, blamed much of the GOP discontent on the fact that even with a Republican in the White House, the party has been unable to make good on its promises to voters. Efforts to repeal "Obamacare" have failed in embarrassing fashion.

Many see the current debate over a tax overhaul package as their last best chance for a legislative breakthrough before the midterms and predict sweeping losses for the GOP if a bill doesn't pass.

But Lott, too, said the solution for conservatives is to stay in Trump's Republican Party, not walk away.

"You don't complain that there's not room for you in your party, you make room," he said.

Minority Blood Donors Needed for 3 Lives Blood Drive at Remington College Fort Worth Campus

Remington College created the 3 Lives campaign to recruit new minority blood donors and raise awareness of blood disorders. Minority donors - particularly African American donors - are in high demand because they provide blood with unique antigens that are vital for patients with sickle cell disease and other blood disorders.

According to the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America, more than 2.5 million people carry the sickle cell trait in the U.S. - mostly African Americans. 80,000 people in the U.S. have sickle cell disease, and 1,000 babies are born with sickle cell each year.

Nationally, Remington College has collected more than 13,900

pints of blood through its 3 Lives Blood Drives. And since 1 pint of blood can save 3 lives, that's enough blood to save more than 41,000 lives.

While the focus of 3 Lives is to increase the number of minority blood donors, everyone is encouraged to give blood at the event. Donors must be 17 years of age or older and weigh a minimum of 110 pounds. All the blood collected will go to local hospitals and medical centers to help people in the Metroplex.

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

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

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

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What you need to know about the Health Insurance Marketplace

What is the Marketplace?

The Health Insurance Marketplace – called the “Marketplace” – was created by the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and will help you find health insurance coverage that meets your needs and fits your budget. You will be able to look at all of the health insurance plans in your area and compare your options. If you currently have insurance, you can find out if you qualify for plans with a lower monthly payment and learn about plans with lower-out-of-pocket costs for health care visits.

The Marketplace will also tell you if you or your family members qualify for coverage through Medicaid or Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

The fifth open enrollment period into the Health Insurance Marketplace runs Nov. 1 – Dec. 15, 2017.

Who should apply?

You may be able to buy health insurance through the Marketplace if you:

- Live in the United States

- Are a U.S. citizen or national (or you are legally present)
- Are not currently in jail

document numbers for legal immigrants) for you and your family

•Employer and income information (pay stubs or W-2 forms) for every member of your household who needs coverage

•Information about any current coverage you have

•Information about health plans that you and your family are offered from the company where you work, even if you are not covered by that plan

•Number of people living in your house that may need health insurance

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



LeBron plays point, scores 34 as Cavs beat Bulls 119-112

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cavaliers' lineups are changing daily. Their defense is a mess, their slow starts are puzzling and the starting point guard is hurt.

Cleveland's got some problems. LeBron James minimizes them all. Making a rare start at point guard, James scored 34 points as the Cavs, using another early season lineup, awakened after a sluggish first half and beat the Chicago Bulls 119-112 on Tuesday night.

Although he often handles the ball and runs Cleveland's offense, James had not officially been listed as a guard since 2012 with Miami. The superstar added 13 assists, including a no-look, behind-the-back dish to Jae Crowder for a 3-pointer during Cleveland's 15-3 spurt in the third quarter.

The Bulls did all they could. James just did more.

"You're playing against the best player on the planet," Chicago coach Fred Hoiberg said.

Kevin Love had 20 points and 12 rebounds, and Dwyane Wade, who asked Cavs coach Tyronn Lue to take him out of the starting lineup, came off the bench and added 11 points.

Justin Holiday scored 25 and rookie Lauri Markkanen 19 for Chicago, which made a season-high 17 3-pointers. The 7-foot Markkanen became the first player in NBA history to make 10 3-pointers in his first three career games.

Cleveland trailed 92-91 entering the fourth before Love dropped a 3 and Kyle Korver made a pair of 3s in 33 seconds. Chicago closed within six in the final two minutes, but the Cavs came up with two offensive rebounds to reset the shot clock before James drove past Markkanen for a left-handed layup to make it 118-110.

It was vintage James, perhaps the only player in the game who can play

either guard spot, both forward positions and center.

It's how he was raised.

"Ever since I was a kid I've always learned every position on the floor," he said. "The point guard, shooting guard, small forward, power forward and center. And know all the plays, what they're doing and reads. Coach slides me to the 1, I know every set. If he slides me to the 5, I know the 5. I know the 4. I know the 3. I know the 2."

"I know every single play in every single position, so it makes the job a lot easier for me because I know where I should be and what my teammates should do."

The Cavs were coming off an embarrassing loss to Orlando and their defense was atrocious in the first half, when the Bulls made 12 3-pointers and scored 65 points — 12 less than in their previous game.

Lue has been experimenting with lineups and combinations because of new players and injuries. He trotted out another new starting five — his third in three games — against the Bulls, moving James to the point, and starting Tristan Thompson at center so Love wouldn't have to guard 7-foot-1 Robin Lopez the entire game.

But Cleveland's starters let Chicago control things early. Dropping uncontested 3-pointers, the Bulls opened a 14-point lead before the second group — led by Wade and Jeff Green — got the Cavs back in it. Green finished with 16 points.

"Thank God for our bench," said Lue, who angrily got after his team at halftime about defense. "But we've got to be better — 17 3s again where guys are just looking at us, staring us down and raising for shots. We talked about making the guys put the ball on the floor and we didn't learn our lesson."

TIP-INS

Bulls: Chicago came within one 3-pointer of matching the club record set on March 12, 2011. ... Lopez banked in his second career 3-pointer as the shot clock expired in the first quarter. Lopez made his first career 3 on Saturday against San Antonio. ... Former Cavs point guard Kay Felder, picked up on waivers from Atlanta before the season, scored 13 points in 15 minutes.

Cavaliers: Snapped a five-game losing streak to Chicago. ... Starting PG Derrick Rose missed his second straight game with a sprained left ankle. ... James played in his 771st regular-season game, matching center Zydrunas Ilgauskas for the most in franchise history.

ROOKIE RAVE

James is impressed with Markkanen, the No. 7 overall pick from Arizona.

"Very confident," James said. "I watched him a lot. He wore my shoes a couple times. He wore my retro 'Brons a couple times and I liked that. Can shoot the heck out of the ball and he's going to continue to get better. And the best thing about it is he'll get an opportunity."

Markkanen didn't show any nerves, but was in awe being on the floor with James.

"That's a dream come true for me," he said. "Your favorite player when you're growing up and then you get to go against him. He's a pretty tough guy to guard."

A BRIGHT LIGHT OF THE BLACK PRESS DIMS: BERNAL SMITH II DIES AT 45

The National Newspaper Publishers Association lost one of its own this week.

Bernal E. Smith II, the president and publisher of the Tri-State Defender and a well-known civic leader in Memphis, Tenn., died Sunday.

Smith was 45.

The Tri-State Defender, among the longest running African-American newspapers in the country and a member publication of the National Newspaper Publishers Association, noted on its website that Smith was with his family when he was found Sunday, October 22.

"The New Tri-State Defender and its management board was devastated when we learned that Mr. Smith had passed," associate publisher Karanja Ajanaku said in a statement along with Calvin Anderson, the president of Best Media Properties, the Defender's parent company.

Smith's death caught many of his colleagues off-guard; all of them expressed shock and sympathy for his family.

"I am personally saddened by the death of our comrade and publisher Bernal Smith," said Dorothy Leavell, the publisher of the Crusader newspapers in Chicago and the chairman of the NNPA. "He was just elected vice chairman in June and we were looking forward to working closely with him to find solutions for the future of our beloved Black Press."

Smith was a serious and dedicated member of the fourth estate, Leavell added.

"We shall miss him so much," said Leavell.

Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, the presi-

dent and CEO of the NNPA, said that the entire NNPA family of African American publishers across the nation deeply mourns Smith's death.

"As publisher of the New Tri-State Defender in Memphis, Smith represented the journalistic genius of a freedom-fighting publisher, who was dedicated to the empowerment of Black America," Chavis said. "Long live the spirit of Bernal Smith."

Joy Bramble, publisher of The Baltimore Times, said she was simply shocked by the news of Smith's death.

"I was just working with him on some things, I just can't believe it," Bramble said.

Rosetta Perry, the publisher of the Tennessee Tribune, called Smith a true friend and a bright light.

"When I met him, we just clicked and I was comfortable with him, like I had known him my whole life, and I didn't have to pretend to be anyone or anything," Perry said. "That voice that we loved to hear at our meetings and training sessions is now still. Bernal's place at the board of directors' meetings will now be vacant, but he will live forever in our hearts."

Karen Carter Richards, publisher of the Houston Forward Times and 1st vice chair of the NNPA, said that she asked Smith to run for 2nd vice chair of the NNPA, this year, because of his vision and talents.

Richards said that she wasn't surprised when he won the election for the post, because of his infectious personality and great abilities.

"I am devastated. Bernal was my friend and he was a visionary, who was smart, energetic, kind and definitely the future of NNPA," Richards said.

Richards continued: "His innovative ideas made us click. At the

request of Bernal, I flew to Memphis last year to attend his Best in Black Awards show. He wanted me to recreate the show in Houston and we were going to partner and bring his great awards show to the city of Houston."

Broadcast executive and Wave newspaper publisher Pluria Marshall said Smith was one of NNPA's up and coming publishers.

"He was about business," said Marshall. "He added value when he spoke on issues related to NNPA and his recent election to the executive team was a clear sign of his rising star."

Marshall added: "He will be sorely missed."

Hiram Jackson of Real Times Media, who sold Smith the New Tri-State Defender, called Smith's passing a sad day for the future of the Black Press.

Bernal Smith represented the future of our industry and he was one of the most innovative publishers I knew and I recognized his gifts immediately," Jackson said. "I will miss his friendship and his contagious enthusiasm about Black people."

A graduate of Rhodes College, who also earned a master's of business administration from Union University, Smith led a local group that purchased the Tri-State Defender from Real Times Media in 2013.

Smith mentored inner-city youth and once served as president of the 100 Black Men of Memphis.

In a joint statement, Denise Rolark Barnes and D. Kevin McNeir, the publisher and the editor of The Washington Informer, respectively, said that Smith was an integral force in the city of Memphis as the publisher of the Tri-State Defender, where he made issues of economic parity, social justice and the support and encouragement of the Black community his primary concerns.

The statement continued: "Even more, as one of the younger publishers of the NNPA, his enthusiasm and dedication were essential to our overall growth and continued existence. His death leaves a void that will be difficult, if not impossible to fill. But his spirit will live on as will our memories of him—a proud, talented Black man who loved his people and his community and who diligently gave his all each and every day on behalf of the Black Press."


