PARKLAND NAMED A 'GREENEST HOSPITAL IN AMERICA'

Parkland Memorial Hospital has been named one of the 50th Greenest Hospitals in America by Becker's Hospital Review. Hospitals recognized have a variety of programs and initiatives in place to reduce their waste output, energy consumption, water use and general environmental footprint.

Becker's Hospital Review previously published a version of this list in 2013 and 2015.

The Becker's editorial team selected hospitals for inclusion based on nominations and editorial research, looking for hospitals that have received awards or designations from organizations like Practice Greenhealth, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the American Society for Healthcare Engineering and the U.S. Green Building Council.

Since its sustainability program was established in 2013, Parkland has recycled or diverted more than 3,800 tons of waste through 30 different programs. In addition, the laundry water reclamation system saves approximately 12 million gal-

lons of water per year.

"Parkland is fortunate to have a sustainability team and numerous 'green' champions throughout the hospital and health centers," said Miranda Skaaning, Parkland's Sustainability Coordinator. "Our efforts go beyond the hospital walls to help address issues related to the health effects of energy consumption, waste disposal and air pollution. We strive to improve our environmental footprint for the benefit of our community and beyond."

Parkland isn't alone in its sustainability efforts. Each year the system partners with neighboring hospitals and universities to host an electronic waste take-back event for Dallas County. And twice yearly, Parkland partners with the Dallas County Hospital District Police Department to host a prescription take-back event where members of the public can turn in unwanted, used or expired medications including prescriptions, over-the-counter medicine and pet medicine for safe disposal.

In addition to Becker's 'green' recognition, Parkland has received three LEED® Gold

Certifications. In 2015, Parkland's Women's & Infants Specialty Health (WISH) Clinic and acute care hospital were awarded the LEED® Gold Certification from the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program, which sets voluntary standards for buildings. In 2013, Parkland earned LEED Gold for its Tower Garage located at the corner of Harry Hines Boulevard and Medical District Drive.

The LEED rating system offers four certification levels for new construction — Certified, Silver, Gold and Platinum — that correspond to the number of credits accrued in five sustainable design categories. The U.S. Green Building Council says LEED certification provides independent, third-party verification that a building, home or community was built to "achieve high performance" in sustainable site development, water savings, energy efficiency, materials selection and indoor environmental quality.

Mark Cuban Supports Hillary!

Among those in North Texas who are urging voters to support Hillary Clinton's presidential bid over Republican nominee Donald Trump is Dallas Mavericks owner Mark Cuban. A billionaire businessman, Cuban says that Trump has not been an earnest businessman, and that his policies would be detrimental for the country.

Large numbers of Texas agree with Cuban. Hillary Clinton is within three points of winning Texas in the November election and within striking distance of turning Texas blue, according to a recent

national poll. If she wins Texas it would be a stunning blow for the Republican Party, and will more than likely place Texas in the Democratic column for years to come, according to season political observers.

No Democratic candidate has won a state-wide race in Texas in the last two decades, and many Texas Republicans say that they are staying away from the polls because they find their party's nominee personally immoral and incoherent on the policy issues that are important to them.

In the poll, which was conducted by CBS News, Clinton is beating Trump

among very important demographics such as Hispanics, African Americans, Asians and college-educated voters. The Republican nominee is not doing well among women in Texas who were polled. More than 50 percent of the women respondents said that they believed that Trump has little or no respect for them.

Democratic leaders in Dallas and Tarrant counties are urging voters to turn out in large numbers at the polls. They are requesting that Clinton supporters vote for a "straight ticket" and punish down ballot Republicans who have supported efforts to cur-

tail minority voting.

"We have done the work to put Texas in play for Democrats," said Deborah Peoples, the Democratic Party Chairwoman for Tarrant County. "Now get out there and vote," she added.

The CBS poll found that Texas voters believed that Clinton exceeded Trump in temperament and judgment, saying that they were more comfortable with her becoming commander-in-chief in an unsettled world. Voters worried that Trump was too rash and belligerent. For instance, only 36 percent of those polled believed that Trump's promise to build a wall

along the nation's southern border would become a reality.

Early voting began on Monday, and political leaders and clergy are urging voters to go to the polls prior to Election Day on November 8th. They have emphasized to people that Trump is a threat to American Democracy and that there few groups that he has not insulted, including racial minorities, Muslims, Hispanics, people with disabilities and women.

The Republican nominee has an ill-defined message, is not supported by the overwhelming majority of his party's leadership and is being untruthful about

TV ONE'S "NEWSONE NOW" TO AIR PART-TWO OF THE TOWN HALL ON FRIDAY, OCTOBER 28 AT 7AM ET

NNPA - TV One's NewsOne Now – the first morning news program in history to focus on news and analysis of politics, from an explicitly African American perspective – aired a special town hall entitled "Roland Martin Presents: Is School Choice the Black Choice?" on Friday, Oct. 21 at 7 a.m. ET. The town hall which took place at Howard University on Oct. 5, 2016 explored the importance of school choice for African-American children. Part two of this town hall will air next Friday, October 28 at 7 a.m. ET.

The two-hour panel, which Martin moderated, featured a variety of educators, advocates and opponents of educational reform to discuss the controversial issue of charters, vouchers and the school choice movement within the Black community. Among those on the panel: Dr. Steve Perry, Principal of Capital Preparatory Magnet School; George Parker, former President of the Washington Teachers Union; President of Democrats for Education Reform, Shavar Jeffries; former director of DC Association of Charter Schools Dr. Ramona Edelin; President of the Washington Teachers Union, Elizabeth Davis; Director of the NAACP's Washington Bureau and Senior Vice President for Advocacy and Policy, Hilary O. Shelton; President of Medgar Evers College, Rudy Crew; Dr. Dawn Williams, Interim Dean of the School of Education at Howard University and Troy LaRaviere, former Principal at the number one rated neighborhood school in Chicago.

School Choice Is The Black Choice is a national initiative designed to rally Black parents to take control of their children's future. Roland, along with his wife, the Rev. Dr. Jacquie Hood Martin, have launched School Choice Is The Black Choice, through her non-profit, J. Hood and Associates.

As an ambassador of the school choice movement, Roland Martin says it's imperative that Black parents fully embrace all aspects of education, and advocate for what works best for their children. He says that the school choice/ed reform movement desperately need Black voices leading it,

especially when it comes to mobilizing and organizing African Americans to make their voices heard about the education of their children.

"If you are standing in the way of kids getting a quality education, even if you wear the liberal/progressive label, you are the enemy," said Roland Martin. "I'm sick and tired of seeing Black kids travel through traditional schools with little or no road to success. I'm a product of traditional public and magnet schools. For me, I care about what works. Traditional public, charter, private, magnet, home school, online schools, vouchers, I really don't care. If it works for the parent and the child, I'm down with it."

Martin has long been an advocate on education issues, speaking at numerous education conferences across the country, including opening the National Charter School Convention in Nashville this June; hosting a number of discussions on his radio, TV and social media platforms; and rallying Blacks to get behind school choice in Tulsa, Chicago, Atlanta, Memphis and Nashville.

Roland Martin is also a board member of 50Can, a nonprofit education organization that works at the local level to advocate for a high-quality education for all kids, regardless of their address. He previously served on the board of StudentsFirst, an education advocacy non-profit launched by noted education, Dr. Michelle Rhee (it merged with 50Can this year).

Martin also is the only national journalist to press Democratic presidential candidate Hillary Clinton, and her former rival, Sen.

Bernie Sanders, on the issue of charter schools, and their value to the education of Black children.

In 2015, Roland S. Martin premiered the documentary The New Orleans Charter School Revolution: Ten Years After Katrina. The one-hour special, which aired on TV One and can be seen at RolandSMartin.com, explored the rebuilding and reorganizing of New Orleans' once failing school system. As part of this special, Martin commissioned a poll of Black parents, which showed that more than 70% of them support not only charter schools but school vouchers.

With the School Choice Is The Black Choice initiative, Martin will work with other education advocates to illuminate the issues of America's K-12 education system and how successful charters can be a boon for the Black community. In addition, the project will celebrate families that have been transformed by the ability to access high-quality schools and a more equitable education system.

"As a former College Associate Dean of Instruction; Dean of Career Programs; and Vice President of Academic Affairs, there is a misunderstanding of the term School Choice and the work of various kinds of schools. The creation of Freedom Schools is the first act of school choice for educating our children, then follows the development of home-school based on the biblical principal of education begins at home and onward to the outreach by Christian schools by denominations such as Baptist, Methodist, Jesuit etc." said Jacquie Hood Martin. "As an educator and education advocate

our dialogue must be open and have the ability to work for us, rather than fighting against those who don't believe in our children's ability to succeed no matter where they go to school."

Over the next year, the School Choice Is The Black Choice initiative will conduct polling in several cities to gauge the perspective of Black parents on school choice; host a series of town halls in several cities; conduct forums with faith & clergy leaders designed to increase discussion around the launch of successful charter schools; and work with Black fraternities and sororities to create their own charter schools, especially his own fraternity, Alpha Phi Alpha, which he hopes to persuade to open 50 Alpha Academy charter schools nationwide over the next five years.

Some of the cities Roland Martin plans on taking the School Choice Is The Black Choice initiative to include: Memphis, Indianapolis, Little Rock, Ft. Lauderdale, Dallas, Houston, Charlotte and Birmingham.

TEXANS-BRONCOS

Denver gives Osweiler rude welcome in 27-9 win over Houston

(AP) - The Denver Broncos must have enjoyed the company of Brock Osweiler (AHS'-wy-lur) while he was with the team last season, because they were in close contact with him throughout much of Monday's 27-9 win over Houston.

Osweiler was constantly harassed while completing 22 of his 41 passes for just 131 yards and no touchdowns. It was his first meeting with the Broncos since leaving the team for a free-agent package from the Texans last offseason. He often made risky throws to DeAndre Hopkins in double coverage and fumbled in the fourth quarter to set up a game-clinching field goal.

C.J. Anderson and Devontae Booker gave the Broncos a productive ground game, while Trevor Siemian threw for 157 yards and a TD. Anderson rushed for 107 yards and a touchdown, and Booker had 83 yards and a TD on 17 carries.

Denver is 5-2 and tied for first with Oakland in the AFC West after ending a two-game losing streak.

The Texans are 4-3 and one game ahead of Indianapolis and Tennessee in the AFC South.

BRONCOS-FAN FALLS

Fan falls leaving Broncos game, condition unknown

(AP) - A fan fell from 30 to 50 feet leaving Sports Authority Field at Mile High after the Denver Broncos game on Monday night.

The fan was transported to the hospital and his or her condition was unknown, according to Denver Fire. The Denver Post said it happened at about 9:44 p.m. local time and emergency personnel responded to a 911 call for help.

The incident occurred near the north end of the stadium following the Broncos' 27-9 win over the Houston Texans.

BIG 12-HOT SEATS

Big 12 hot seats topped by Charlie Strong at Texas

(AP) - Texas football coach Charlie Strong began his weekly news conference Monday by spending a couple of minutes discussing the multitude of self-inflicted wounds that cost Texas in its loss to Kansas State on Saturday.

Turnovers. Penalties. Blown assignments. It could eventually serve as the epitaph for his tenure leading the Longhorns.

Strong dropped to 14-18 in his third season with the 24-21 defeat in Manhattan. And with eighth-ranked Baylor rolling into town, the chances of turning things around this week appear bleak.

Strong isn't the only coach whose grasp of their job is tenuous.

Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury could be headed for another losing season after a shootout loss to Oklahoma on Saturday. He is just 22-23 in his fourth season, and 11-20 in the Big 12, which makes the tenures of Spike Dykes, Mike Leach and Tommy Tuberville before him appear even more impressive. All those coaches had winning records in Lubbock.

Then there is Kansas coach David Beaty, who still has just one win in his second season. There is little doubt he took over the worst program in major college football, and there is plenty of evidence to suggest he's making progress. But the Jayhawks suffered another blowout loss last weekend, this time to Oklahoma State.

DOLPHINS-FOSTER RETIRES

4-time Pro Bowl RB Arian Foster announces his retirement

(AP) - Four-time Pro Bowl running back Arian Foster has announced his retirement midway through an injury-plagued season with the Miami Dolphins.

Foster, 30, tried to come back from a torn Achilles tendon, but was slowed this season by groin and hamstring injuries. He disclosed his decision Monday on the website Uninterrupted, and the Dolphins confirmed it.

The retirement is effective immediately.

Foster signed a \$1.5 million, one-year contract with the Dolphins in July after seven years with the Houston Texans. He holds the Texans' franchise record with 6,472 yards rushing.

This season he rushed for 55 yards in 22 carries. His playing time was curtailed with the emergence of Jay Ajayi, who tied an NFL record by surpassing 200 yards rushing each of the past two weeks.

NBA-SAGER

Tributes planned for TNT's Sager

(AP) - The Golden State Warriors and TNT will begin the season with a tribute to Craig Sager as the sideline reporter continues to battle leukemia.

TNT will unveil a T-shirt during its Tuesday night studio show that was inspired by the suit Sager wore while receiving the Jimmy Valvano Award at this year's ESPY Awards. The Warriors will then give their fans at their season opener against San Antonio a Sager Strong T-shirt. The team also will play a message in the arena supporting his fight.

Sager won't be able to work the game as he continues treatment for the disease.

FINDING COMMON GROUND

In the NBA, foreign players try to understand social issues

(AP) - Andrew Bogut grew up in a richly diverse area of Melbourne, Australia, and has estimated that he went to school with people from nearly 100 different nationalities.

He has fondly referred to his home as a tolerant and inclusive community, one largely devoid of racial tension that many of his NBA teammates faced growing up in the United States. But Bogut and other international players have been on the periphery, if not part of, discussions in locker rooms as their teammates address social issues like police brutality and racial profiling.

The NBA tips off its latest season on Tuesday night and there could be some protests. The NBA has long embraced a reputation for being the most socially con-

scious league in the United States, but there is a rule in the collective bargaining agreement that requires players to stand respectfully for the anthem.

Many of the roughly 22 percent of the league's players who come from outside the U.S. are white Europeans or Australians and do not have the same perspectives that their African-American teammates had growing up here even though racial inequality is a problem that exists throughout the world.

Coaches pick Cincinnati to win American Athletic Conference

(AP) - American Athletic Conference coaches have picked Cincinnati to win the league title this season.

The Bearcats edged UConn in the poll, which was released Monday at the conference's annual media day.

Cincinnati received 95 points and six first-place votes, while UConn claimed the other five and finished with 94 points. SMU was picked to finish third, followed by Houston.

Cincinnati guard Troy Caupain and Memphis' Dedric Lawson were chosen as the league's preseason co-players of the year.

Caupain is joined on the preseason conference first team by teammate Gary Clark, Lawson, SMU forward Ben Moore and Houston guard Damyean Dotson.

UConn guard Alterique Gilbert was projected as the league's top rookie, the fourth straight season a Huskies player has been chosen for that honor.

Coaches again pick UConn to win American Athletic Conference

(AP) - American Athletic Conference coaches have again picked UConn as the favorite to win the league title.

The four-time defending national champions received 10 of 11 first-place votes in the preseason poll, which was announced Monday at the conference's annual media day.

UConn lost three All-Americans from last year's team, including national player of the year Breanna Stewart.

But the Huskies return seven players from that team, which finished 38-0.

Temple is picked to finish second and South Florida is projected third in the conference. SMU was the coaches' pick to finish fifth while Houston is projected to dwell in the conference cellar.

UConn junior Kia Nurse, who was a member of the Canadian Olympic team, is the preseason choice for American player of the year.

The preseason conference first team also includes her teammate Katie Lou Samuelson, USF's Kitija Laska, Tulane's Kolby Morgan and Temple's Alliya Butts and Feyonda Fitzgerald.

The AAC has two new coaches with Katie Abrahamson-Henderson taking over at UCF. She led Albany to five consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances out of America East. SMU is now led by former NBA player Travis Mays, who was an assistant at Texas.

Then there is Kansas coach David Beaty, who still has just one win in his second season. There is little doubt he took over the worst program in major college football, and there is plenty of evidence to suggest he's making progress. But another blowout loss on Saturday, this time to Oklahoma State, also showcased the gap that still exists between Kansas and the rest of the league.

"We've got great kids. They're tough dudes and they understand the task at hand, understand

what we're trying to get done," Beaty said. "There's no quit in those guys. There's no spirit problem. They hate losing, just like we all do. But we don't feel sorry for ourselves."

Kingsbury and Beaty at least have a few things going for them.

In Kingsbury's case, he still has plenty of goodwill among fans from his own playing days with the Red Raiders. And his score-a-minute offense is fun to watch, even if the defense is a disaster.

In Beaty's case, he took over a program so deep in the dumps that even the most optimistic of fans would admit that it would take Nick Saban or Urban Meyer at least a few years to turn it around.

"They're much improved," Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops said of the Jayhawks. "Defensively they play really solid, offensively they spread it around and throw it more consistently. Coach Beaty and his group have done a really good job."
