Freedom Sunday Local Pastors Unite In Effort To Get Out The Vote

Freedom Sunday invited all Texans and the community to join Pastors as they took their congregations, directly after their worship services, straight from the pews to the polls.

Freedom Sunday is a non-partisan statewide voter turnout initiative with one purpose, and that purpose is to increase voter turnout in our faith communities. It is important that our black communities are heard.

"Every time we make any moves forward, we change things," Reverend Rickie Rush explained about the importance of this year's term.

In the 2013 ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court, struck down the need for historically discriminatory states to get approval prior to making changes to voting laws. Here, in Texas, many feel voters are now experiencing suppression through the Voter ID Law.

Freedom Sunday is an effort to recall the spirit of Freedom Summer. In 1964, Mississippi had the lowest percentage of eligible black voters who were actually registered to vote.

"What we saw back in the 60s was a result of the oppression that was placed on black people and I think the church became a command center. We have not seen that kind of graphic oppression since then, but I do not doubt that should it arise and as it arises the church will galvanize again," according to Bishop Jakes.

Sunday, October 26, We invited all communities to join us in holding voter registration drives, candidate forums, and supporting Freedom Sunday by engaging in the Calendar of Activities and committing to showing up at the polls on Sunday between 1:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.!

With only one week remaining to decide, the two leading candidates Wendy Davis and Greg Abbott are stomping the campaign trail to garner as much support as possible. We at the North Dallas Gazette are here to join in that support with our endorsement of Davis who we feel is not only the right choice for our state but the only candidate who if elected will use the full weight of the governor's office to fight for all Texans and roll back the assaults on our educational system, women's rights and voter's rights that we have endured the past 14 years under Gov. Rick Perry.

ON EDUCATION
In 2011 the 82nd Legislative Session under the leadership of the Republican Party cut funding for public education by \$5.4 billion, something that had not been done in over 60 years and something that will not be done under the leadership of Davis. Not only was Davis the only senator to oppose those massive cuts but she has also continued to be one of the very few lone voices fighting for the restoration of those cuts, unlike her opponent Abbott. She knows that it's not just good parenting, "family values" or strong communities that contribute to a child's success. Funding and policy has to be in place to back those efforts.

Davis knows that a one size fits all approach to our public education system is not effective. It hinders teachers' ability to teach, as do standardized tests. 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DeSoto ISD Receives \$7.8M GEAR UP Grant



Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson was on hand to congratulate and present a check to DeSoto ISD on behalf of the U.S. Department of Education representing the \$7.8M the district will be receiving through the GEAR UP grant.

DeSoto ISD was only one of two Texas institutions and the ONLY K-12 Texas district to receive the prestigious GEAR UP grant from the U.S. Department of Education. GEAR UP - Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs - awarded 41 new grants valued at \$82M per year. Grants are awarded in two types - partnerships and state grants.

DeSoto ISD will receive \$7.8M over the next seven years to serve a cohort of 6th and 7th graders through their first year of college. The program is aimed at at-risk, underserved, low-income students of color to prepare for college and achieve success in postsecondary education.

DeSoto ISD Board Members, DeSoto Mayor Carl Sherman, SBOE Member Mavis Knight, representatives from Rep. Giddings and Sen. West offices, plus city council members and additional guests, along with cohort students from all three middle schools, attended the special event.





While speaking to reporters regarding his resignation from the Justice Department, Attorney General Eric Holder, who became the nation's 82nd attorney general in February of 2009, said that he would continue to participate in the national debate on social and political issues, and that he would continue his service to our country. I am hopeful that he does exactly as he has stated.

Mr. Holder served as more than the nation's chief legal officer. At times he was the nation's judicial conscience. He spoke frankly about the role that racial prejudice has played historically in American society. During a speech in 2009, he called Americans "cowards" for failing

The November 4 election is only a moment away. Believe it or not, as of about two weeks ago, two thirds of the people in the U.S.A. did not know that there is to be an election on November 4, 2014. As far as some segments of our society are concerned, that is just fine. They would rather that we remain asleep.

The political Right is mobilizing forcefully. They are trying to make this election about Obama. With Obama hovering around 40% in the polls, the right-wing expects to use this

to deal honesty with our country's history of racial discrimination.

Not since the early 1960s when Attorney General Robert Kennedy headed the Justice Department, has an attorney general spoken so forcefully to America about social ills. In fact, Mr. Holder called Attorney General Kennedy his role model, often quoting Mr. Kennedy who once remarked that the Justice Department had a responsibility to be a "force for that which is right."

When a conservative majority on the United States Supreme Court voted to remove the heart of the Voting Rights Act, Attorney General Holder, a former jurist, searched for others ways that the legislation could be used to prevent states from implementing policies and practices that discriminated against minority voters.

Always one to stand up for principle and the rule of law, Attorney General Holder has not been without his detractors

inside and outside of politics. A Republican led House of Representatives voted to hold him in contempt of Congress in the summer of 2012 after he refused to turn over documents that they wanted to use to pursue a partisan political agenda.

A large number of House Democrats, including all of the members of the Congressional Black Caucus, walked off the floor of the House in protest of the action, and refused to participate in the vote. Attorney General Holder and the administration rightly characterized the House action as "political theater."

When a 19-year-old unarmed black youth was killed last summer by a white police officer in Ferguson, Missouri, Attorney General Holder traveled to that Midwestern town, telling residents there that the Justice Department would conduct a fair and thorough investigation into the circumstances surrounding the shooting.

In Ferguson he shared his

personal experiences as an African American male being stopped on the streets of Washington, D.C. by police officers for no legitimate reasons. He said that the practice was unacceptable and needed to end.

His presence in Ferguson and his candidness gave residents hope that the investigation into the shooting would be handled fairly. Attorney General Holder has also made the case for reform in sentencing, and has spoken out against the over-incarceration of Americans, most of them minorities and poor.

The American people owe Attorney General Holder a tremendous debt for his service. When he does exit the Justice Department he will leave the institution with a legacy of decency and fairness. I am certain that his role model, Attorney General Robert Kennedy, would be more than proud of his service to our nation.

JESUS' DEFINITION OF GENUINE GREATNESS MATTHEW 18:1

Whichever festive day in view, the psalm is filled with excitement over God's great deliverance. In fact, in verses 1-2, the psalmist summons the congregation to sing triumphantly to the Lord, their strength and to accompany their praise with musical instruments - "Sing aloud unto God our strength: make a joyful noise unto the God of Jacob. Take a psalm, and bring hither the timbrel, the pleasant harp with the psaltery."

As a nation (vv. 3-5), they were summoned to keep the statue of appearing at the festival. The very law of God required that every male had to keep the following festivals three times a year: Feast of Passover, Feast of Unleavened Bread, and the Feast of Tabernacles (Deuteronomy

16:16). As stated in verse 5, "For this was a statute for Israel, and a law of the God of Jacob." In verses 6-7, the psalmist reminded Israel of God's dealings with them during their bondage experience in Egypt and their wilderness experience after they left Egypt. He continued to rehearse God's dealing with the people during the giving of the law.

God had promised to bless the people if they were obedient; therefore, they should not serve another god. God's decree was specific - "Hear, O my people, and I will testify unto thee: O Israel, if thou wilt hearken unto me; There shall no strange god be in thee; neither shalt thou worship any strange god. I am the LORD thy God, which brought thee out of

the land of Egypt: open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it" (vv.8-10).

The psalmist concludes this psalm by recalling that if the nation disobeys, they will be punished (vv. 11-12); as the people did not hearken to the voice of God so verse 12 states, "So I gave them up unto their own hearts' lust: and they walked in their own counsels." On the other hand in verses 13-16, if they obey God, He will bless the nation by destroying their enemies and continually provide for them - "He should have fed them also with the finest of the wheat: and with honey out of the rock should I have satisfied thee" (v.13).

to their advantage, both discouraging Democrats and mobilizing conservatives. The right-wing may be in for a surprise, but it is too tough to call.

This election is not about Obama. It really comes down to two things. First, YOUR right to vote, and, second, what sort of future you really want. For the right-wing the election is clearly about holding back the future and focusing on fear and anger. Unless you are interested in trying to turn the clock back to about 1950, you will need to be at the polls on November 4th.

Beginning after the 2008 elections, sections of the Republican Party went about moving legislation in various states to address allegations of voter fraud. The potential for voter fraud is less than the potential of being hit by lightning. Nevertheless, playing to

racist fears on the parts of many whites (of African Americans and immigrants), the right-wing was able to invent a problem where none existed. They convinced many people that there needed to be more stringent requirements to vote, steps that tend to disenfranchise people of color, youth and senior citizens. In the 2012 elections African Americans and Latinos revolted against this effort and turned out in force. But showing up in one election is not enough. The aim of the political Right is to beat us down.

The future is also at stake. The political Right fears the demographic changes in this country. But they also fear real discussions about economic inequality, the environmental crisis, the rights of women, and, actually, the role of government. Their most articulate

spokespeople openly talk about shrinking government which will mean that many things that you and I take for granted will disappear, such as social security, food safety inspections, fair tax systems, and a reasonable discussion about what to do about climate change. The right-wing ends up reminding me of the child bully who seeks to intimidate others and will only stop when we stand up to them. At that moment we come to realize that they are nothing more than pathetic cowards.

So, there you have it. We can sit home and pretend that the November 4th elections don't mean anything, or we can get to the polls and make it clear that we have no interest in giving up on the future or giving up on our right to make a statement. The choice really is ours.

Texas Publishers Association's Statewide Elections Endorsements

It is an irrefutable fact those who seek to disenfranchise and abrogate our liberties and attainments, our political victories and strides are well-organized and steadfast. Bearing this in mind, it is our duty to be not only just as coordinated in our efforts but to also be proactive. When candidates come campaigning for our votes we must be collectively ready to present them with a platform that best benefits our community. In the words of Frederick Douglass, power concedes nothing without demand. The Texas Publishers Association has made it clear we will not be endorsing any candidate in the upcoming statewide elections that did not attend our candidate screening.

For the office of lieutenant governor, TPA endorses Leticia Van de Putte. Unlike her tea party opponent Dan Patrick, Van de Putte is committed to

ensuring all children regardless of their economic status or ZIP code in the state of Texas receive a quality education and the funding and resources are available to realize this. As lieutenant governor she pledges to:

- Restore funding for full-day learning for pre-K students as opposed to 3 hours a day.
- Limit the class size for children grades K-4.
- Invest the necessary funding in Texas' public schools, restoring the 2011 Legislature cuts.
- Remove the standardized testing pay based on performance system allowing teachers to utilize their creativity and skills to teach.
- Allow for more involvement of parents and community members in control of their neighborhood schools.

Sen. Patrick's record has already proven he is not concerned with educating children in our public education school system. In 2011 he was among

those who voted to cut \$5.4 billion in public education funds and even opposed the use of the state's Rainy Day Fund to offset cuts. In 2013 when he had the opportunity to restore the cuts not only did he vote against it but composed legislation to limit state appropriations and require any future state surplus funds to go toward property tax relief instead of education. In addition he proposed exempting certain residences from property taxes, reducing public education revenue and filed "mandate relief" legislation making it easier to lay off employees, reduce teachers' salaries and higher fewer teachers by increasing class sizes.

For the state comptroller's office TPA endorses Mike Collier who if elected will be the first CPA in history to hold the state's top account position. At the top of his agenda is to make property taxes fair for all homeowners. Since 1997 the property tax appraisal law

has unfairly allowed for large companies to drive down the market value of their properties causing homeowners to foot the bill. In 2013 SB 1342 was presented to correct this flaw, however Collier's opponent Sen. Glen Hegar along with his powerful campaign contributing group of lawyers and tax consultants stalled the legislation killing it upon arrival to the Senate.

TPA endorses Steve Brown for Texas railroad commissioner who is the only African American running for statewide office. Until now the railroad commissioner has always come from the ranks of the oil and gas industry, including Brown's opponent Ryan Sitton who boasts of his fifteen years of experience in the oil and gas and petrochemical industry. But what to him seems like selling point is in fact to us concern for pause. As someone so intricately involved with the oil and gas industry it is foreseeable the Railroad

Commission will be nothing more than an extension of the oil and gas lobby. As an outsider of the industry Brown represents a breath of fresh air, someone who can bring forth a new and unbiased commission that will put the needs of the citizens before the industry. He has already pledged to protect the interests of all Texans as well as the environment.

For attorney general TPA endorses Sam Houston, a Houston-based attorney who has been practicing civil law at the state and federal level for 26 years. When elected to attorney general he has vowed to immediately overturn the AG ruling that currently prevents Texans from learning if hazardous chemicals are stored near them. But Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott ruled that to release such information jeopardized homeland-security



My Day: One Hundred Forty Years Old

Whereas, the Senate of the State of Texas is pleased to recognize Pastor Joe S. Patterson and the Greater New Zion Baptist Church on their 140th Church Anniversary Celebration; and

Whereas, GREATER NEW ZION BAPTIST CHURCH grew from a mission station located in Dallas.

The church was born in the hearts and minds of the women from the "Frog Town" Community, now Downtown Dallas. So many of these women were cooks and maids during this period, required to work on Sunday mornings which made the evening services a high point for their Sunday worship; and

Whereas, in 1874, the mission station in "Frog Town" became a new church called New Zion. The funds for the land and construction of the

first permanent facility, were donated by a generous benefactor, who was concerned for her maid's happiness; and

Whereas, in 1921, under the leadership of dedicated deacons and willing workers, eighteen pastors and forty-seven years later, additional property was purchased at Alamo and Wichita Streets.

In 1915, the growth pattern of Dallas was moving North forcing the membership to make the decision to move and build another building;

Whereas, in 1919, New Zion purchased property on the corner of Boll and Guillot Streets. Deacons demolished the old building, saved the materials and built the basement which was used as the tabernacle for worship for a few years. In 1923, the seemingly long wait for the congregation to move upstairs into the new brick building finally came; and

Whereas, in 1949, New Zion Baptist Church was again without a pastor. A young Rev. Arthur Vance Voice from Louisiana was invited to speak one Sunday morning with a sermon entitled "Christians Like Fig Trees". In April of the same year, Rev. Voice was called to pastor this congregation. The church immediately purchased a parsonage for

new pastor and his wife; and

Whereas, in 1953, the parsonage and church on Boll and Guillot Streets was sold and the funds applied to the new location at 2210 Pine Street, a predominately all white progressive area in South Dallas. With the new location, a new focus and beginning, the church was renamed GREATER NEW ZION BAPTIST CHURCH;

and

Whereas, in 1990, after forty(40+)years, Pastor Voice started looking toward the new century with new leadership. In 1991, Pastor Joe S. Patterson preached his first sermon as Pastor on Sunday, October 27, with Pastor Emeritus A. V. Voice in attendance. Pastor Patterson remains our trusted and esteemed leader in his second decade.

RESOLVED, that the Senate of the State of Texas, hereby commend Pastor Joe S. Patterson and the GREATER NEW ZION Family for outstanding leadership, fortitude and the many contributions to the Dallas community and beyond; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared for Pastor Joe S. Patterson as an expression of esteem from the Texas Senate.


