DALLAS 9/11 ANNUAL MEMORIAL STAIR CLIMB WILL BE HELD AT RENAISSANCE TOWER



The public is invited to join firefighters, law enforcement and EMS personnel from the north Texas region and beyond for the annual 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb, Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon at Renaissance Tower, 1201 Elm St.

More than 400 City of Dallas public safety officers are expected to participate in a day of extreme physical challenge and intense reflection, honoring New York's bravest and finest, recognizing local heroes, and providing support for the families who survive them.

The event will begin at 8 a.m. with a memorial service for fallen public safety officers and a keynote speaker with a direct connection to September 11 will give a tribute. The climb will begin at 8:46 a.m. after a moment of silence. Participants will carry the name and picture of their counterparts killed at Ground Zero. City climbers will include 422 active-duty public safety officers, including 353 firefighters, 70 law enforcement officers and nine EMS workers.

Other activities will include informational areas, a kids' area, display of present day and antique public safety apparatus, and a showcase of regional response capabilities such as Dallas US&R Task Force 2 and Desoto MCI Bus. Local public safety agency recruiters will also be at the event, as well as local community colleges, police, fire and EMS academies.

Food and beverages will be available for purchase. Elm Street between Field and Griffin, and the southbound turn lane of Field to Westbound Elm will be closed from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. on the day of the event. For more information visit: <http://www.dallasstairclimb.com/>.

SAFER DALLAS ANNOUNCES FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN TO BRING REALITY BASED TRAINING TO DPD OFFICERS

Safer Dallas Better Dallas has announced a major fundraising campaign to fund a state of the art, reality-based training center for the Dallas Police Department (DPD). The \$2 million plus campaign will provide a reality-based facility pioneered in part by the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Hogan's Alley center in Quantico, Virginia. The facility will give DPD officers a realistic learning laboratory to practice de-escalation and appropriate scenarios critical to the safety of residents and officers. The Safer Dallas Better Dallas mission is to keep people from becoming crime victims, engage them in a partnership with Dallas Police and make Dallas America's safest big city. The importance and timing of the facility is not lost in the current national environment. "The Department of Justice has said that reality based training is the best training that law enforcement officers can be provided with," said DPD Executive Assistant Chief, David Pughes. "Chief Brown has already tripled the reality based training for staff and is committed to providing Dallas Police officers with the best training in the country in order to make Dallas America's safest big city."

Notice of 2015 Proposed Property Tax Rate for City of Dallas- A tax rate of \$0.797000 per \$100 valuation has been proposed for adoption by the governing body of City of Dallas. This rate exceeds the lower of the effective or rollback tax rate, and state law requires that two public hearings be held by the governing body before adopting the proposed tax rate.

PROPOSED TAX RATE	\$0.797000 per \$100
PRECEDING YEAR'S TAX RATE	\$0.797000 per \$100
EFFECTIVE TAX RATE	\$0.759885 per \$100
ROLLBACK TAX RATE	\$0.804145 per \$100

The effective tax rate is the total tax rate needed to raise the same amount of property tax revenue for the City of Dallas from the same properties in the 2014 tax year and the 2015 tax year.

The rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate that City of Dallas may adopt before voters are entitled to petition for an election to limit the rate that may be approved to the rollback rate.

YOUR TAXES OWED UNDER ANY OF THE ABOVE RATES CAN BE CALCULATED AS FOLLOWS:

Property tax amount = (rate) x (table value of your property) / 100



Black Youth Get Summer Jobs Boost

WASHINGTON (NNPA) - Black youth experienced bigger employment gains over the summer than White and Hispanic youth, according to analyses by Valerie Wilson of the Economic Policy Institute, a nonpartisan think tank focused on low- and middle-income workers.

Wilson, the director of the Program on Race, Ethnicity, and the Economy at EPI, studied the seasonally unadjusted jobs numbers from June, July and August and discovered that Black youth (16-19 years-old) showed the largest gains among young people in employment-to-population ratio (EPOP), the share of the population that is employed, and the labor force participation rate, the measure of workers that either have jobs or that are still looking for one, compared to last summer.

In a blog post on summer youth employment for EPI's website, Wilson wrote that, "Summer employment was up 2.5 percentage points for Black teens, compared to a 1.5 percentage point increase for

Hispanic youth and a 1.2 percentage point increase for White teens."

Wilson said that the summer youth employment numbers are higher in general because the economy is doing better, but Black and Latino youth might have been more motivated to look for jobs by tough financial conditions at home.

"African American and Latino families were the hardest hit during the recession and had less wealth to fall back on," said Wilson. "African American and Latino youth may have more of an incentive to get into the labor market and to find jobs so that they can contribute to their families."

The summer labor force participation rates for Black and Latino youth bottomed out around 2010, Wilson said and have been increasing throughout the recovery. The summer labor force participation rate for White youth, however, flattened over the same period of time. In 2010, the summer participation rate for White youth was 43.8 percent. By 2015 that rate had fallen to 42 percent. For Black youth, the summer labor force participation rate was 29 percent in 2010 and increased to 33 percent in 2015.

Even though the Black unemployment rate increased from 9.1 percent in July to 9.5 percent in August, the labor force participation rate also edged up from 61.5 percent in July to 61.7 percent in August signaling that more Blacks were optimistic about finding work last month.

In recent weeks, growth on the U.S. and Chinese stock markets has sputtered as some investors speculate that the Federal Reserve may begin to raise interest rates later this month in attempt to guard against inflation.

Wilson said that the Federal Reserve has a dual mandate.

"On one hand they are charged with keeping unemployment low and on the other hand the [Federal Reserve] is tasked with keeping inflation low," said Wilson, adding that the interest rate on borrowing money is used to balance those two economic indicators.

The national unemployment rate fell from 5.3 percent in July to 5.1 percent in August and the economy added 173,000. Wilson said that broader measures like the EPOP, labor force participation rate, and prime age employment show that the economy still hasn't fully recovered.

"Even though the unemployment rate is looking better, there is still a lot of slack in the labor market," said Wilson.

Many economists, like Wilson, believe that the economy is still too weak to cause serious concerns about inflation. Sluggish wage growth continues to keep workers from getting ahead.

Wilson said that specific policies like raising the minimum wage and revising the overtime rules for certain workers can help to spur wage growth.

According to EPI, from 1979 to 2013 worker productivity increased by 64.9 percent, but hourly wages for the median worker only increased 6.1 percent over the same time period.

In a statement on the August jobs report, Representative Bobby Scott (D-Va.) said that the economy continues to recover from the worst financial crisis in a generation, but there is still more work to do.

"For example, we must enact the Raise the Wage Act, which will increase the minimum wage and put more money in the pockets of hardworking Americans," said Scott. "That legislation will help us continue down the road of economic recovery."

The Value of Labor

economic achievements for all American workers - regardless of job sector.

As we celebrate labor and America's slow but steady climb to newfound economic prosperity during its most sustained period of job creation this century, we discover a dark cloud inside the silver lining of our recovery: the prosperity of the American economy is not being shared equally. Too many people are working harder, but are falling further behind. Too many people remain at the distant margins of the job market - particularly in our communities of color, where unemployment remains at crisis level, even as our economy continues to rebound.

The unemployment rate in our country currently sits at 5.3 percent, its lowest rate since May 2008. But take a deeper dive into those numbers and the tale of two recoveries is clear and unmistakable. While the unemployment rate for Whites is at 4.6 percent, the Hispanic unemployment rate is at 6.8 percent and the Black unemployment rate is 9.1 percent - double that of White job seekers. The unemployment rates for Blacks and Hispanics are nothing if not discouraging and telling. These communities, especially hard hit during the last recession, are not benefiting from our economy's rebound.

The ability to secure work that provides a fair, living wage - regardless of gender - is an

asset to the worker, the worker's family, neighborhood, community, and ultimately, our nation. We are an immensely stronger America when access to work is not excluded to some, but rather, extended to all.

That is why the National Urban League has proposed a 12-point Blueprint for Quality Job Creation. Our plan offers a dozen dynamic and imaginative measures to benefit those most profoundly affected by recession but left out of the ensuing recovery, while also remedying many of the underlying causes behind the recession's inordinate and amplified impact on the communities we serve:

- Restore the Summer Youth Jobs Program as a stand-alone program;
- Create 100 Urban Jobs Academies to implement an expansion of the Urban Youth Empowerment Program;
- Develop a dynamic, national public-private jobs initiative to create jobs, train urban residents and stimulate economic growth in the areas of technology and broadband, health care, manufacturing, transportation, public infrastructure and clean energy;
- Boost minority participation in information and communication technology industries;
- Reform, revise and reauthorize the Workforce Investment Act to prepare and retrain workers for 21st century jobs;

- Create Green Empowerment Zones;
- Expand small business lending;
- Initiate tax reform that reduces rates across the board and eliminates tax loopholes;
- Establish and promote multilateral international trade policies that expand the market for American goods and services;
- Enact the Urban Jobs Act (H.R. 5708);
- Expand the hiring of housing counselors nationwide; and
- Fund direct job creation in cities and states.

We continue to urge Congress and the White House to adopt these measures without delay. The standard of living many of us take for granted today was won for us through the determination and organized protests of the American worker. The solidarity of the workers of the past must be reborn in our political discourse today as we collectively strive to open blocked pathways to work, success and the American dream of economic mobility. We must all work together - individuals, politicians and corporations - to ensure the possibility of work for fair wages for all who seek it.

Notice quickly that Peter is the main speaker on the day of Pentecost, but he is supported by the other eleven apostles. Dr. Luke mentions the fact that there were eleven apostles who stood with Peter; thus, Dr. Luke considers that fact that Matthias was the replacement for the vacant apostolic position of Judas Iscariot, not the apostle Paul (Acts 6:2; Matthew 19:28). As a further answer for these unbelieving critics at Pentecost, he even quotes from their scripture that says, "But this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel" (v. 16). Peter is not stating that Joel's prophecy was being fulfilled on the day of Pentecost. However, based on Joel's prophecy that will be fulfilled during the Millennium Kingdom, these critics should not think that the phenomenal operation of

the Spirit was something strange. Peter goes on to quote to these critics in verses 17-21 that there was a great outpouring of God's Spirit and that fact should not be strange to them based on Joel's prophecy.

According to verses 22-35, Peter continues his preaching to this audience explaining that Jesus of Nazareth was indeed the Christ who they crucified (vv. 22-24). Peter related to these Jewish leaders that they were responsible for the crucifixion of Jesus. These leaders were to be blamed for delivering Jesus over to the Roman government to be crucified on a cross of shame. Although the religious leaders plotted the death of Christ, it was a part of God's program that He would be slain and rise again for verses 23-24 say, "Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands

have crucified and slain: Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that He should be holden of it."

Peter even related that Christ would be raised from the dead, quoting from Psalm 16:8-11 to prove it (vv. 25-31). Again, Psalm 16 is a prediction of the resurrection of Christ, for David, the one speaking in that psalm was still in the grave.

In verses 32-35, Peter supports his argument for Christ's resurrection by citing proofs of it and he also related that Jesus is exalted, for He is seated at the right hand of God. In conclusion, Peter boldly preached the resurrection of Christ with power and conviction; and we too must declare that same message with power, conviction and love as we serve this present age.

My position On The Iran Agreement

After careful consideration I am in full support of the historical nuclear weapons agreement between the United States, China, France, Russia, the United Kingdom, Germany and Iran. The agreement is in the best interests of our country, our major allies in the Middle East, and the global community.

The agreement, which will face Congressional scrutiny, has won support from more than one hundred former American diplomats. These experienced Republicans and Democrats describe the deal, negotiated by Secretary of State John Kerry and Secretary of Energy Dr. Ernest J. Moniz, as a "landmark agreement." It would

be irresponsible to reject this diplomatic movement towards stability and peace. "Once properly implemented, this comprehensive and rigorously negotiated agreement can be an effective instrument in arresting Iran's nuclear program and prevent the spread of nuclear weapons in the volatile and vitally important region of the Middle East," the former diplomats wrote in a letter to the White House. Twenty-nine top American scientists have also endorsed the deal, noting that it will "advance the cause of peace and security in the Middle East and can serve as a guidepost for future nonproliferation agreements." The group of scientists includes six Noble Laureates. In a letter to President Barack Obama, these experts pointed out that Iran was only "a few weeks away" from having fuel for nuclear weapons. The agreement would stop Iran's nuclear program, the scientists wrote. Under the agreement, Iran agrees that it will not develop or acquire a nuclear weapon. The deal also includes a permanent ban on Iran's development of key nuclear weapon components

and is based on four clear objectives, blocking the highly enriched uranium route, allowing no path to plutonium, intensive monitoring, and incentives for compliance. Without the agreement there will be no restraints on Iran's nuclear program. There would more than likely be an arms race to acquire and develop nuclear weapons by various nations in the Middle East. Such a climate would not be in the best interest of our country, and certainly not in the best interests of the global community. Currently eighty members of the House of Representatives and thirty-four members of the Senate have voiced their support for the deal. Lawmakers have nearly 60 days to review the agreement. If Congress votes to kill the deal, President Obama will use his veto power. A two-thirds majority vote in the Senate is required to override a Presidential veto. It is my firm belief that if this deal is not implemented the world risks devastating military conflict. I urge my Congressional colleagues to support the agreement.

Open Enrollment in Texas Tuition Promise Fund® Began September 1

Open enrollment in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund, the state's prepaid college tuition program, began, Sept. 1, and runs through Feb. 29, 2016. Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds families that the Texas Tuition Promise Fund offers parents and loved ones the chance to prepay a child's education at Texas public colleges and universities at today's prices. "Hard-working Texas families want the best for their kids, and securing their future educations is a big part of that - unfortunately, setting a family budget for that can be challenging," Hegar said. "The Texas Tuition Promise Fund lets participants lock in today's prices for their children's educations at Texas public colleges and universities, and it has flexible options that families can use to fit their budgets." Participants in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund purchase prepaid "tuition units"

that can later be used toward undergraduate tuition and school-wide required fees at schools ranging from Texas public community colleges to four-year, in-state universities. Prices are based on 2015-16 academic year costs for the state's public colleges. Type I units, priced for tuition and school-wide required fees for the most expensive public four-year school in Texas, cost \$132.54 per unit. Type II units, based on the weighted average cost of tuition and school-wide required fees across all Texas public four-year schools, cost \$91.43 per unit. Type III units, priced at the weighted average cost of tuition and school-wide required fees across all Texas public two-year schools, cost \$23.35 per unit. Under the plan, 100 units equal roughly one academic year consisting of 30 semester hours of tuition and school-wide required fees at

the Texas public school that most closely matches the pricing base. Participants can purchase up to 600 Type I units, approximately six years, or the dollar equivalent of Type II and III units. The plan's payment options include lump sum payments, installment payments that include 8 percent interest or a pay-as-you-go plan that allows participants to gradually add more units when the family budget allows. Payments can be as low as \$15 after an account is established by paying a one-time fee of \$25 and purchasing at least one unit. The Texas Tuition Promise Fund is entering its eighth year. continued her bid for a Grand Slam. Following her sibling's win, a proud Venus gave Serena a sweet hug and said, "So happy for you."

Speaking about her victory later, Serena told reporters (via the Associated Press): "Obviously we are very, very tough competitors on the court, but once the match is over, the second it's done, you know, we're sisters, we're roommates, and we're all that."

With two more wins, Serena will be the first tennis pro in a quarter-century to win all four Grand Slam titles in one season, a feat that was last accomplished in 1988 by Steffi Graf. "That would be huge, not just for me, but for my family, just for what it represents and how hard we have worked and where we come from. So it would be a moment for our family," Venus, 35, told the AP on Tuesday. "But at the same time, if it doesn't happen it's not going to make or break you. We don't have anything to prove. She has nothing to prove. She's really the best ever."

Sisterly slam! Serena Williams inched closer to a Grand Slam title on Tuesday, Sept. 8, after beating her sister Venus Williams in the quarterfinals of the US Open at Arthur Ashe Stadium in NYC. Serena, 33, the top-ranked female tennis player in the world, defeated her big sis after three sets, 6 to 2, 1 to 6, 6 to 3, and






