

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

TRUSTEES NAME DR. MICHAEL HINOJOSA AS LONE FINALIST FOR SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Dallas Independent School District Board of Trustees has named Dr. Michael Hinojosa as the lone finalist to serve as superintendent of schools.

The appointment followed a called meeting of the Trustees today at the Dallas ISD administration building. The Trustees will now wait 21 days as required by law before making the appointment final. Hinojosa will continue serving as interim superintendent of Dallas ISD during that time.

"Our board is pleased to have Dr. Hinojosa back in a permanent capacity. In just a brief time since his return, he has proven to be the steady and experienced hand needed to guide Dallas ISD," said Board President Eric Cowan. "Dr. Hinojosa is committed to working with the Trustees as we work to graduate students that are college and career ready. We have much work to do, and we are all ready to get started."

Rangers Overtake Astros for 1st In AL West with 6-5 win

Adrian Beltre and Prince Fielder teamed up again in a tense Texas showdown, and this time the Rangers overtook the Houston Astros for first place in the AL West.

Beltre's fourth hit Tuesday put the Rangers in position to win in the bottom of the ninth inning a night after

Fielder pulled them within a half-game of the Astros with a tiebreaking two-run home run with Beltre aboard in the eighth.

Mitch Moreland's sacrifice fly finished the 6-5 victory Tuesday night.

Eight games back and in third place in the division

after losing on Aug. 1, the Rangers have gone 27-14 since. They've won five straight over the Astros, who had been in first place since July 28. Texas won the first two of this four-game series.

MISS AMERICA CHAIR APOLOGIZES TO VANESSA WILLIAMS

Sam Haskell, executive chairman of the Miss America pageant, apologized to the entertainer for the way the pageant's predecessors handled a controversy involving photos of Williams. The photographs were published several months after she became the first African-American Miss America. Williams resigned the title in 1984.

Haskell, who was not involved with the pageant at the time, said, "I want to apologize for anything that was said or done" during the photo scandal. "Vanessa: Welcome back!"

Williams won both the swimsuit and talent competition, to become the first African American to win Miss America and making an unforgettable mark in pageant history. Despite her resignation, she performed her duties as Miss America in an exemplary fashion.

"I want to thank everyone who has come up to me over the past 32 years and said, 'You'll always be MY Miss America,'" Williams said. "I got a chance to be on the stage and represent what I represented back in 1984. Thank you so much for being so welcoming to me."

Since her 1988 debut album, "The Right Stuff," Williams has sold more than 7 million records worldwide and has scored No. 1 and Top 10 hits on various Billboard album and singles charts, including pop, dance, R&B, adult contemporary, holiday, Latin, gospel and jazz. Her work has been honored by four Emmy nominations; 17 Grammy nominations (of which 11 were for her individually); a Tony nomination, three Screen Actors Guild award nominations; seven NAACP Image Awards; and a Golden Globe, Grammy and an Oscar for Best Original Song for her platinum single "Colors of the Wind," from the Disney film "Pocahontas."

She also starred on the TV shows "Ugly Betty" and "Desperate Housewives."

Williams co-starred with Cicely Tyson and Cuba Gooding Jr. in Broadway's "The Trip To Bountiful" in 2013. She returned to the Great White Way the next year in the musical "After Midnight."

Presidential Candidate Donald Trump Visits Dallas



final warm-ups for the second Republican debate Wednesday night. Trump will be positioned at center stage once again, a reflection of polls that show him holding a clear lead over the rest of the field.

Hundreds of critics of Donald Trump's statements on Mexican immigrants and immigration went on the march to protest a Trump presidential campaign rally in Dallas.

More than 1,000 people participated in the Monday march and demonstration organized by the North Texas chapter of the League of United Latin American Citizens. They marched from the Dallas Roman Catholic cathedral to the American Airlines Center, where Trump was to appear at a packed house. Some marchers carried signs criticizing Trump and at least one carried a Trump piñata.

There were no disturbances and no reports of arrests at what was promoted as a "Dump Trump" rally.

Trump enthusiasts started lining up at noon outside the arena, some driving considerable distances. Some said they were not at all sure they would vote for him but sure didn't want to miss a chance to see him in person.

"We are a dumping ground for the rest of the world," said Trump, who emphasized his commitment to deporting all undocumented immigrants and building a wall on the southern border of the United States.

"We don't want them either!" yelled a woman as he spoke.

The subject of illegal immigration, which has made Trump a sharply polarizing figure in the 2016 White House race, brought the Republican his most enthusiastic cheers of the evening.

ROMO FINDS WITTEN TO GIVE COWBOYS 27-26 COMEBACK WIN OVER GIANTS



"We'll try to reassess that and figure out where to put guys," Romo said after his 11-yard scoring toss to Witten with 7 seconds left gave the Cowboys a 27-26 win over the Giants. "No one can replace Dez Bryant, but it's my job to help that whole situation."

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

Black Votes Matter

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Credo of The Black Press
The Black Press believes that America can best lead the world away from racial and national antagonisms when it accords to every person, regardless of race, color or creed, full human and legal rights. Hating no person, fearing no person, the Black Press strives to help every person in the firm belief that all are hurt as long as anyone is held back.

As we enter the 2016 political campaign season with numerous candidates for president of the United States in the Republican and Democratic parties, it appears once again that the political and economic interests of Black America are not being adequately addressed by either of the major political parties. It is as if the Black American vote is being taken for granted.

The Black vote is important first to the Black community and secondly to American democracy. The right to vote and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 did not come about without a struggle. Many brothers and sisters went to jail and paid

a heavy painful price to acquire the right to vote. Some even died in the struggle to advance Black political and civic participation.

In the Civil Rights Movement, voting rights were deemed precious and a sacred moral responsibility to everyone of voting age. Today, there is need for the Black community to reassert the value and strategic leverage of the Black vote. It is one thing for the status quo to ignore the political interests of the Black community, but it is another when so many of us are missing in action on Election Day.

According to the United States Elections Project, Black voter turnout has been significantly increasing steadily from 48.1 percent in 1996 to 52.9 percent in 2000 to 61.4 percent in 2004 and peaking at 69 percent in 2008 when Senator Barack H. Obama was elected president. In 2016, we should have no less than a 90 percent Black turnout. If that happens, the Black vote, more than any other single voting group in the U.S., will determine the outcome of the elections.

We should recall that in the 2012 elections, for the first time in history, Black voter turnout was higher than White voter turnout - 66.6 percent to 64.1 percent. Why do all these voting statistics matter? The short answer is because if we can continue to increase our voter turnout we will be better positioned to advance the interests of the Black community.

A few weeks ago, the Pew Research Center reported that for the first time in history, there are at least 364 counties, independent cities and other county-level equivalents in the U.S. that did not have a White majority population - "the most in modern history, and more than twice the level in 1980." Ninety-two of the 364 counties are predominantly Black. This is leading to the election of more Blacks as county sheriffs, county chief executives, and other high public offices at the county and regional levels.

Some would say it is poetic justice, but it is a rapidly changing racial demographics reality in terms of population density increases and Black elected officials are on the rise particularly in the 11 states that once made up the old Confederacy:

Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. That's not surprising when you consider that 55 percent of all African Americans reside in the South, up from 53.6 percent in 2000.

It's not surprising that some of the most intense efforts to suppress the Black vote is taking place in the South.

Yes, Black Lives Matter! We must do whatever is necessary to improve the quality of life for our families and communities. Do not fall into the cynical attempts to persuade us that our votes do not count. Our votes do count and do make a big difference for the betterment of Black America. Yes, Black Votes Matter!

Trump's Attack on Immigrants of Color

I want to address this column quite explicitly to African Americans. If you are not African American, please feel free to read this, however. When you hear Donald Trump wail against immigrants, I hope that you understand that he is also talking about you.

I realize that many African Americans - too many, as far as I am concerned - believe that immigrants from Asia and Latin America are the source of our economic problems. They are not, but I will get to that in a moment. What is more urgent,

however, is that we appreciate that what Trump and others are doing is not really crusading against immigrants but crusading against people of color.

Let's think about this for a moment. Trump attacks Mexicans, quite explicitly, suggesting that they are bringing crime to the U.S. Well, the facts prove otherwise. Immigrants, legal or undocumented, are less likely to be criminals. But let's stick with this for a moment. If, for the sake of argument, Trump wanted to make a case against immigrants, why does he not once mention Russians? The Russian mafia is known to be among the most dangerous criminal outfits in the U.S.A. So, if we are talking about immigrants bringing in crime, why not the Russians?

There is a very simple reason. The issue with immigrants, for people such as Trump, is not that they are immigrants but that they are immigrants of color. There is a fear among a section of the White population that the U.S. will soon

cease to be a predominantly White country and that all hell will break loose. For completely opportunistic reasons they want to enlist you - African Americans - in this battle against immigrants of color.

It does not stop with immigrants of color. Trump is the person who would not let go of his "birther" allegations that President Obama was, allegedly, not born here. This was aimed at suggesting that an African American could not be a legitimate president. Trump continued this, in a pattern with which we are now familiar, irrespective of the facts. These "birther" arguments go hand-in-hand with his anti-immigrant of color stand, i.e., if you are not White, you are - at best - a guest in the U.S.

There is no question but that immigrants have an impact on the job market but what has been going on for centuries is that businesses use new and vulnerable workforces as a way of trying to divide up the larger workforce. One hundred years ago, underpaid African

American workers from the South were used accordingly by businesses in the North and Midwest in an attempt to undermine White-dominated unions. Many of these White workers, instead of organizing with Black workers against the antics of the employers, turned on the Black workers as if they were the problem. Trump, et.al., are trying to do the same thing today.

Jobs are not being moved to other countries (or to rural parts of the U.S.) by undocumented workers. They are being moved by businesses that care more about the bottom line than they do the fact that you will be on the unemployment line. Donald Trump is part of that select group that has made this situation possible and thrives while the rest of us fight like crabs in a barrel.

PSALM 98:1-9

What an awesome psalm of praise we have for our study. This psalm gives us a grand invitation to praise the name of our God. May I ask this thought-provoking question - "Is He worthy of our praise?" As I look back over my life, I want to "bless His name" for blessing my life with the gift of salvation; and for that reason, I am going to join in with the psalmist in

blessing the name of the Lord, when he said - "Bless the LORD, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless His holy name. Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies; Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's" (Psalm 103:1-5). 



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MAYWEATHER DOMINATES A DEFENSIVE BATTLE TO REMAIN UNBEATEN IN 49 FIGHTS

(AP) - His career winding down to its final seconds, Floyd Mayweather Jr. took a victory lap around the ring, his fist raised in triumph.

After 19 years of perfection in the ring, he deserved one final bow.

Mayweather capped a remarkable career with a typical Mayweather fight Saturday night, using his defensive wizardry to frustrate Andre Berto on his way to a decision so lopsided one judge gave him every round.

The \$32 million he earned was pocket change compared to what he got for Manny Pacquiao in his last fight. But the more important number was win No. 49 in the final fight of his unblemished career, tying the mark of the late heavyweight champion, Rocky Marciano.

"You gotta know when to go. I've had a great career," Mayweather said. "I'm leaving with all my faculties. I feel like I'm smart and sharp."

Mayweather wasn't about to change what he does best in his last fight.

Both dominant and defensive, he used all the tricks learned in a pro career that began in 1996 to take a unanimous decision over Berto and retain his welterweight titles in what he insists was his final fight.

Mayweather won yet again in a fight where he was chased but never really tested. He piled up points with a sharp

jab and quick counter punches, leaving Berto swinging at air most of the night.

"What can I say, I was the better man tonight," Mayweather said.

By the late rounds, Mayweather was both talking to Berto (30-4) and taunting him, secure in the knowledge he was winning big against the 18-1 underdog. In the final seconds of the fight he took a victory lap, as the crowd of 13,395 stood and cheered at the MGM Grand arena.

The ringside scorecards reflected Mayweather's dominance, with one judge scoring a 120-108 shutout. The other scores were 118-110 and 117-111, while The Associated Press had Mayweather winning 119-109.

Mayweather added to his pay-per-view riches once again, and once again he didn't seem to have to work too hard to make it. Berto, who had lost three of his last six fights, tried to make it a fight but his punches were wide and mostly missed their marks.

"I pushed him to the limit," Berto said. "But he was just better."

Mayweather did what he's done best in his long career, fighting defensively and picking his shots against Berto. He was especially effective when Berto rushed at him, using his counter punching skills to keep Berto away.

It was a winning combination once again, just as it had been in his 48 previous fights.

Mayweather had vowed to give fans an action fight in his last bout, after being criticized for fighting defensively in his win over Manny Pacquiao. He did trade punches with Berto on several occasions, but never stayed in the pocket long enough for Berto to find his mark.

Mayweather complained to his father in the corner during the fight that he hurt his hand, but said since he is retiring it didn't matter.

Ringside punch stats showed Mayweather's defensive wizardry. Mayweather had landed 232 of 410 punches, while Berto landed only 83 of 495.

"I was in great shape but it was difficult to fight him," Berto said. "He was really, really slippery."

Mayweather weighed in at 146 pounds, a pound more than Berto.

Mayweather, in his 26th title fight, controlled the action all night, now allowing Berto to land more than one punch at a time. He was never able to hurt Berto, though, and passed up chances to engage him in exchanges.

Berto was surprisingly passive early, doing little in the opening rounds but throw punches that hit nothing but air. He picked up the pace beginning in the fourth round, but Mayweather had little trouble ducking and moving away from his wild punches.

By the 10th round were talking so much trash that referee Kenny Bayless called a halt to the action and told both fighters they needed to shut up.

If Mayweather retires it will end a career that saw him become a pay-per-view star and earn more money than any boxer before him. Though most in boxing believe he will some day fight again, the 38-year-old said he had plenty of money and his health is more important than chasing records.

"I've accomplished everything," Mayweather said. "I've done everything in my sport."

MAYOR CARL SHERMAN

Carl O. Sherman, Sr. is the 20th mayor (re-elected for a second term) - and the first African-American mayor - of DeSoto, Texas. DeSoto is a diverse city in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex with over 50,000 residents, a budget of over \$72 million and more than 350 city employees. Sherman was elected mayor in May 2010 and re-elected in May of 2013 on a platform of bringing new jobs and businesses to DeSoto and revitalizing the downtown area. Under his leadership, the city has launched an aggressive new focus on generating economic development centered on attracting quality jobs to DeSoto; such as the new Kohl's ecommerce distribution center that will employ over 2,000 people. The City's economic development standing with Governor Perry's Texas One economic development corporation has been upgraded from a Tier 5 to the second highest status Tier 2, in which only two other North Texas cities maintain. In line with this vision, the city has recently had its bond rating upgraded to AA with Fitch.

Sherman has been a community advocate for many years, both as an elected official and a private citizen. First elected to the DeSoto City Council in 2006, his fellow council members elected him as mayor pro-tem in 2008 and 2009. Prior to serving on the City Council, Sherman served as the SPAC chairman of the city's \$32 million general obligation bond in 2003, which voters overwhelmingly approved. Sherman also serves as an executive member of the Dallas Regional Mobility Coalition Board and the TEX-21 Subsidiary of River of Trade, Agile Port and Trans-Texas Corridor.

Sherman has served the community in many other capacities, again as the first African-American in the position. Some of these positions include president of the DeSoto Rotary Club, board chairman of the DeSoto Chamber of Commerce (2006) chairman of the business and government affairs committee (2002), and board chairman of the Best Southwest Chamber of Commerce (2007). The Best Southwest Chamber is comprised of the mayors of the four partner cities - DeSoto, Cedar Hill, Duncanville and Lancaster - and the associate cities of Ferris, Glen Heights, Hutchins, Midlothian, Ovilla, Red Oak and Wilmer.

Sherman also has more than two decades of experience as an entrepreneur and businessman. In 2003, as a visionary 35-year old chairman and CEO, he navigated eTelcharge.com, Inc. onto Wall Street, where it traded on both the U.S. NASDAQ and the Frankfurt exchange in Europe.

Sherman has received several honors for his leadership and commitment to innovation, including AT&T Corporation's Alex Award for his patent application and recognition as one of the Dallas Urban League's "Most Promising Leaders of the 21st Century".

In 2007, Sherman accepted the call of the ministry to serve in God's Kingdom and became an ordained minister, after serving as bishop for two years. Today, he pastors two congregations as the senior minister of the Church of Christ in both Hutchins and Wilmer.

Mayor Sherman and his wife, Michelle have five children and two grandchildren and reside in DeSoto, Texas.



MRS. CHERYL B. WATTLEY

Professor of Law and Director of Experiential Education - Professor Cheryl B. Wattley joins the inaugural faculty of the UNT Dallas College of Law from the University of Oklahoma College of Law, where she served on the faculty from 2006 through 2013, and was Professor of Law and Director of Clinical Education. At UNT Dallas College of Law, Professor Wattley will teach Criminal Law in the first-year curriculum; she will also be the Director of Experiential Education and teach courses in professional skills, criminal law, and professionalism. Professor Wattley is the author of a new book, "A Step Toward Brown v. Board of Education: Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher and Her Fight to End Segregation," published in October 2014, and winner of the 2015 Oklahoma Book Award, Non-Fiction category.

>Professor Wattley graduated from Smith College, cum laude, with high honors in Sociology. She received her Juris Doctorate degree from Boston University College of Law, where she was a Martin Luther King, Jr. fellow and recipient of the Community Service Award. She also served as a summer intern for the General Counsel's Office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Professor Wattley began her legal career as an Assistant United States Attorney in the District of Connecticut representing the United States in civil litigation. Through her actions, the United States participated as litigant amicus curiae in Connecticut ARC v. Thorne, the lawsuit that led to the entry of a consent decree overhauling the system for serving persons with mental retardation in Connecticut.


She later transferred to the United States Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Texas, located in Dallas, where she focused on the prosecution of white collar crime and served as Chief of the Economic Crime Unit. During her service as a prosecutor, she received two Department of Justice Special Achievement Awards, the United States Postal Inspection Service National Award, and commendations from the Department of Treasury, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and the Customs Department.

Professor Wattley then went into private litigation practice, where her work included white-collar criminal defense, civil rights litigation, federal and state criminal defense, and post-conviction proceedings. After joining the OU College of Law faculty in 2007, Professor Wattley continued to represent clients on a pro bono basis, primarily involving post-conviction relief. Professor Wattley continues to work with Centurion Ministries, a non-profit organization based in Princeton, New Jersey, devoted to the vindication and liberation of persons wrongfully convicted and imprisoned. Through Centurion, she served as one of the attorneys for Kerry Max Cook, a former Texas death row inmate. In 2009, Professor Wattley represented Richard Miles in his release from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Professor Wattley has served on a variety of civic and professional boards and committees, including the State Bar of Texas Board of Disciplinary Appeals; District 6 Grievance Committee; Dallas Bar Foundation; and the Board of Regents for Texas Woman's University. She was appointed to serve on "Dallas Together," a mayoral committee appointed to address racial issues within the City of Dallas, and also was appointed Vice Chairperson for the 1990 and 2000 City of Dallas Redistricting Commissions. She has been an instructor for National Institute of Trial Advocacy programs.

Professor Wattley received the Dallas Bar Association's Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Award in 1994. She is also the recipient of the DaVinci Institute Fellow Award for Innovative Teaching (2013), the Oklahoma Bar Association's Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher Diversity Award (2012), the Association of Black Lawyers' Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher Award (2012), and the University of Oklahoma Regents' Award for Superior Professional and University Service and Public Outreach (2011).
