At a reception during the 45th Congressional Black Caucus Foundation (CBCF) Annual Legislative Conference, the National Newspaper Publishers Association honored five Black luminaries with its Leadership Awards.

The awards are given to those who have demonstrated leadership in the Black community and support of the Black Press. Held at the Washington Marriott Marquis, which is partially Black-owned, the reception drew a large crowd of conference attendees and Black Press supporters.

Misty Copland, Roland Martin, Congresswoman Donna F. Edwards (D-Md.), Rahiel Tesfamariam, and A. Shuanise Washington were the awardees for 2015, the NNPA's 75th anniversary year.

Denise Rolark Barnes, chair of the NNPA and publisher of The Washington Informer, along with Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr., president and CEO of the NNPA, emceed the event.

Roland Martin was recognized for his work in broadcast media and dedication to Black news, and was the first honoree of the night to address the audience.

"For folks who don't know, I've actually run three Black papers. I've always made it clear that the first dollar I earned in media was from a Black newspaper. My first television dollar was from a company that was Black-owned," he said. "When I'm sitting in the White House with the president, I'm sitting representing Black media, not mainstream media. I have never allowed White media to validate my skill set."

Each of the honorees

thanked the NNPA for its support and its dedication to keeping Black communities empowered and informed.

"When I came into Congress, I said we were going to do something different. I said that we were going to make our paper of record our Black newspapers," said Congresswoman Edwards. "When we reach out in my office...we reach out to our papers of record. When I decided I was going to embark on this journey to the U.S. Senate, our paper of record on that decision was The Afro and The Washington Informer."

Rahiel Tesfamariam, writer, activist, speaker, and founder of digital media platform, Urban Cusp, spoke on the Black press' role in social justice movements.

Cowboys Swap 2017 Draft Picks With Buffalo To Acquire QB Matt Cassel



For the second straight week, the Cowboys addressed a major injury with a Tuesday trade, as they swapped 2017 draft picks with the

Buffalo Bills for quarterback Matt Cassel.

The move came just hours after the team sent Tony Romo to the short-term injured reserve while he recuperates from his broken left collarbone. It will be an eight-week wait for Romo to return to the active roster, so the need for quarterback depth was obvious.

Cassel has made 72 career starts with four different teams during an 11-year career, giving the Cowboys an experienced option behind Brandon Weeden. The team had worked out four veteran quarterbacks earlier on Tuesday afternoon, but ultimately decided acquiring Cassel was the better route.

The USC product earned notoriety in 2008, when he filled in for the Patriots after Tom Brady tore his ACL in the season opener. Cassel completed 63.4 percent for 3,693 yards and 21 touchdowns in 15 starts that year, guiding New England to an 11-5 record - though ultimately missing the playoffs.

For his career, he's completed 59 percent of his passes for 15,727 yards with 96 touchdowns and 70 interceptions.

Cassel obviously has veteran status, but it seems like a safe bet the Cowboys will stick with Weeden as their starter for the time being. Weeden, the former first-round pick, has been in the Cowboys' system since spring 2014 and helped Dallas close out Sunday's 20-10 win in Philadelphia after Romo was injured.

It'll be a short turnaround for Cassel to learn a new offense in time for Sunday's game against Atlanta. To that end, it wouldn't be a surprise to see the Cowboys promote Kellen Moore from their practice squad to back up Weeden this week. Moore has been with the team for two weeks, and he worked with offensive coordinator Scott Linehan for a year with the Detroit Lions.

As of Tuesday afternoon Moore said he hadn't been told anything about his roster status, but he'll be prepared if he is called upon.

POPE FRANCIS FIRST VISIT OF HIS LIFE TO THE UNITED STATES

(AP) - Pope Francis arrived Tuesday on the first visit of his life to the United States, bringing his "church of the poor" to the world's wealthiest superpower and a country polarized over issues closest to his heart: immigration, social justice and economic inequality.

According to a rare honor to the pontiff, President Barack Obama and his wife and daughters welcomed Francis at the bottom of the stairs on the red-

carpeted tarmac at Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland after the pope's chartered plane touched down from Cuba. Presidents usually make important visitors come to them at the White House.

Emerging from the plane to boisterous cheers from a crowd of hundreds, the smiling 78-year-old pontiff removed his skullcap in the windy weather and made his way down the steps in his white robes.

He was met by a military honor guard, chanting schoolchildren, politicians, and Roman Catholic clergymen in black robes and brightly colored sashes of scarlet and purple. Joe Biden, the nation's first Catholic vice president, and his wife were among those who welcomed him.

During his six-day, three-city visit to the U.S., the pope will meet with the president, address Congress, speak at the United Nations in New York and take part in a Vatican-sponsored conference on the family in Philadelphia.

The Argentine known as the "slum pope" for ministering to the downtrodden in his native Buenos Aires is expected to urge America to take better care of the environment and the poor and return to its founding ideals of religious liberty and open arms toward immigrants.

He is the fourth pope ever to visit the United States.



"The Black Press is a tool of liberation, is it not?" she asked the audience after accepting her award. "Before I sit down, I want to ensure that we understand the power that we hold as Black press. Because at the end of the day, the power of words is the power of life and death, and that is the power of the Black Press."

A. Shuanise Washington, president and CEO of the CBCF Inc., and Misty Copeland were unable to attend the reception. CBCF vice president of communications and marketing,

Shrita Sterlin-Hernandez accepted the award on Washington's behalf, and Copeland sent her gratitude via video.

Several notables were also in attendance, including Congressmen Al Green (D-Texas) and Bobby Scott (D-Va.), Newport News, Va. Mayor McKinley Price, Sir Hillary McDonald Beckles, vice-chancellor of the University of the West Indies in Jamaica; Diane Watson former U.S. ambassador and former Congressional representative, and many more. Melanie Campbell, president and CEO of the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation,

and Baltimore Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake were also present and took a few moments to address and thank the crowd.

"I am here really to echo the comments that Roland [Martin] made, and to thank Black media for how you treated Baltimore during the unrest," Rawlings-Blake said. "I can say that Black media was particularly supportive in so many ways to make sure that...the riots wasn't the whole story of Baltimore. Thank you for making sure the whole story continues to be told in our communities."

Obama Recognizes Women, Pushes for Criminal Reform

President Obama presented a very "pro-women" message during the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation (CBCF)'s Phoenix Awards Dinner on Sept. 19. He stressed the importance of female strength, education and health, while also advocating for more positive opportunities for the youth.

"I'm focusing on women tonight because I want them to know how much we appreciate them, how much we admire them, how much we love them," Obama said during the event that capped the 45th Annual Legislative Conference.

"Because all of us are beneficiaries of a long line of strong Black women who helped carry this country forward. Their work to expand civil rights opened the doors of opportunity, not just for African Americans but for all women, for all of us - Black and White, Latino and Asian, LGBT and straight, for our first Americans and our newest Americans. And their contributions in every field - as scientists and entrepreneurs, educators, explorers - all made us stronger."

The president spoke of holding civil rights leader Amelia Boynton Robinson's hand

when they walked across the Edmund Pettus Bridge on the anniversary of Bloody Sunday, the seminal march on March 7, 1965, when Alabama State troopers attacked Blacks who were protesting for their right to vote.

"Like every parent, I can't help to see the world increasingly through my daughters' eyes," Obama said. "And on that day, when we were celebrating that incredible march in Selma, I had Ms. Amelia's hand in one of my hands, but Michelle had Sasha's hand, and my mother-in-law had Malia's hand, and it was a chain across generations. ... And that tells me that if we follow their example, we're going to cross more bridges in the future. If we keep moving forward, hand in hand, God willing, my daughters' children will be able to cross that bridge in an America that's more free, and more just, and more prosperous than the one that we inherited."

Robinson was posthumously presented one of the five Phoenix awards along with the Rev. Dr. William Barber II, who was instrumental in the release of the Wilmington Ten; Fred Gray, civil rights attorney for Rosa Parks and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.; civil right's activist Juanita Abernathy, who helped organize and lead the historic Montgomery Bus Boycott in Alabama (1965-1966) and Alpha Phi Alpha

Fraternity. According to a press release from the CBCF, the fraternity received the award for its diligence in cementing Dr. King's legacy with a memorial on the National Mall in Washington, D.C.

In addition to awarding the honorees, tributes were also given for Julian Bond and Congressman Louis Stokes. Both men died early this year, Aug. 15 and Aug. 18, respectively.

The honorees "remind us of the courage and sacrifices, the work that they've done - and not just at the national level, but in local communities all across the country," Obama said. "We couldn't be prouder of them. The heroes of the Civil Rights Movement whom we lost last month remind us of the work that remains to be done."

Obama also reflected on the need for criminal justice reform. "There is no contradiction between us caring about our law enforcement officers and also making sure that our laws are applied fairly," he said. "We need to make sure the laws are applied evenly. This is not a new problem. It's just that in recent months, in recent years, suddenly folks have videos and body cameras, and social media, and so it's opened our eyes to these incidents. ... But we can't avoid these tough conversations alto-

gether. That's not going to help our police officers, the vast majority who do the right thing every day, by just pretending that these things aren't happening. That's not going to help build trust between them and the communities in which they serve."

The dinner also put a spotlight on youth development and progression, highlighting the CBCF's internships and fellowship programs on Capitol Hill, the need for more entrepreneurship opportunities, and a greater push for the Black community to be involved in the science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields.

Obama said he would work with Congress and many in the CBC to try to make progress on legislation that addresses unjust sentencing laws and encourages prevention to influence youth to take different paths while also helping offenders.

Special guests attending the dinner included presidential candidate Hillary Clinton, Democratic Whip Rep. Steny Hoyer (Md.), Rev. Al Sharpton, Judge Greg Mathis and several other Congress members. Actors Larenz Tate and Nia Long emceed the event. Denise Ward, a senior at Boston University, sang the national anthem.

Black Homeownership Matters

housing opportunities regardless of race, creed or color. We all are aware, however, that there still remains a present-day reality of systematic racial discrimination in America when it comes to equal and fair housing issues.

There is more need for a professional trade organization such as NAREB today than in the 1940s. Black wealth in the U.S. in losing ground at a time when there should be advances and increases in Black American homeownership. According to Nielsen's latest research on consumerism within Black America, we spend in excess of \$1.2 trillion annually. With that kind of spending power, why should there be a decline in Black American homeownership?

The issue is not about having the money to purchase a home. The real issue here is a persistent and deliberate pattern of racial discrimination in the housing marketplace. Since the enactment of the Fair Housing Act of 1968, it has been illegal to discriminate in the U.S. housing market on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability, or family status.

The National Fair Housing Alliance recently filed a federal complaint against one of the leading national real estate

companies, RE/MAX Alliance/Lee Garland and Rita Jensen Team, located in Jackson, Miss. After months of investigations, the National Fair Housing Alliance documented racial discrimination against Black Americans seeking homeownership.

But that kind of racism was not limited to the deep South. The National Fair Housing Alliance also found racial discrimination prevented Black American homeownership in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Texas and in Illinois. It is a national problem that requires a national solution.

According to Princeton University scholars Douglas Massey and Jonathan Tannen, racial discrimination in housing leads to the perpetuation of "hypersegregation" that sustains "high levels of social isolation from mainstream society, but also high concentration of poverty and disadvantage." An effective strategy, therefore, to overcome poverty in Black America is to increase homeownership and to transform and to prevent racial hypersegregation.

In speaking to NAREB's President Ron Cooper about a "solution" to help Black America to regain and to retain its wealth, it was important to know that NAREB announced

at this year's Congressional Black Caucus Annual Legislative Conference that it is committed to a national goal of "Two million new Black American homeownerships over the next five years." Attaining this goal would go a long way toward increasing Black wealth and helping to overcome poverty in our communities.

Achieving NAREB's goal of increasing Black American homeownership across the nation will require a dedicated effort and coalition building to ensure greater access to mortgage capital, down payment assistance, increased housing inventory, and investment inclusion. We all should strive to support this effort also by raising public awareness about this important national campaign: "Black Homeownership Matters." Blacks Missing from Political Circus

Here is something to think about as we watch the political circus that is currently dominating the news: Black people are nowhere to be found in the real action, nowhere to be found in determining the candidates from which we will eventually choose to compete for the presidency, and nowhere to be found in the debate questions or answers. Yes, we have the individual choice to vote, but that's about it, y'all, and even in that act, we will only be choosing between the decisions that others have made.

Have you ever wondered why two small states, Iowa and New Hampshire, have so much impact on the national election? Is it simply because they are the first two states to conduct caucuses and primaries

every presidential election year? Is it because they have such a large number of electoral votes? Even though some candidates who win those states do not always get their party's nomination, these two states are held up as the political "trend-makers" and benchmarks for a candidate's success. That's why they all flock to those two little states long before the election really begins.

For all of you critical thinkers out there, try these stats on for size: Iowa is 91 percent White and 2 percent Black; it has six electoral votes. New Hampshire is 93 percent White and 1 percent Black, with four electoral votes. There are 538 electoral votes among the states, 270 of which are needed to win the presidency of the United States. I ask again, why are Iowa and New Hampshire so important in the scheme of things?

And I reemphasize that Black folks, comprising a grand total of 3 percent of the total population of these two small states, have absolutely no influence, not to mention power, in what is taking place right now in the political arena. We are relegated to being spectators if we care to watch this current show; it is a rerun, so many of us are not interested anyway.

By the time you read this article the séance for Ronald Reagan, known as the Republican debate, will have

taken place at the Presidential Library in Simi Valley, Calif. You remember that famous city, right? It's the place where the White cops beat Rodney King within inches of his life were declared not guilty. Of the 500 there, I saw just five Black people in the seats at the CNN debate. Another insult to Black voters, or another indication of political impotence?

We are just spectators, brothers and sisters, watching the Dems and Repubs race toward the finish line in November 2016. They will put on a great show for us though, as they invoke Rosa Parks' name and cite the sanctity of the Black vote. Each party will try to convince us that it can and will "take care of us" because God knows we can't take care of ourselves. Then, in January 2017, Black people will settle in, once again relegated to their plantation of "choice" for four more years, without having gotten one ounce of quo for our quid.

My article, "Black Political Dilemma" (2014), posed the possibility of Ben Carson running against Hillary Clinton for president. Some folks responded by saying, "That will never happen," "You're crazy, Jim," and "Carson will never be nominated." Some folks even laughed at the question, "What will Black people do if that happens?" Well, you may want to stay tuned.

Black people have dug our

elves a deep political hole, and now we must figure out how to get out of it. It really doesn't matter who wins the highest office in the land, Blacks will be in the same relative position as we have been under a Black President for the last seven years. In other words, we ain't got nothin' comin'. Only we can save us, not Hillary, Carson, Sanders, or Trump.

Because we have tried to play politics without having a strong economic base, we have become impotent and irrelevant. Reflect on the words of T. Thomas Fortune, journalist and co-founder of the National Negro Business League: "No people ever became great and prosperous by devoting their infant energies to politics. We were literally born into political responsibility before we had mastered the economic conditions which underlie these duties."

Knowing what is or isn't wrong with you physically can calm a frayed nerve and start you on your journey to reinventing yourself so you can enjoy life more, whatever your age.

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



Innocently many, many years ago, I mentioned my maiden name on television. We started receiving calls, asking if I was related to a "Captain Sadler", who was over a large prison guard unit at the time in Texas. Our marvelous family circle make up is largely educators, law enforcement officers and musicians. Of course, we have our prorate share of law breakers, career criminals and sympathizers. Several of our family gatherings have required empires and referrers. But, my cousin (Captain Paul Gene Sadler), who was always a serious leader, told us stories centered around the education/understanding of prison life. Even then,

the one thing that came out of these spirited discussions, was we knew who these potential beds in the prison system would be occupied by. And today, we know who these potential beds in the prison system will be occupied by. Bottom line, we know who these kids are. Are we fearful of ruffling feathers? Your creator did not give us the spirit of fear.

Statistics consistently tell us that 85% of all juveniles who come into contact with the system, are functionally illiterate. This is evident by the number of criminals who perform "dumb crimes". For example, stealing an ATM machine. Can I remove it from the premises? Can I haul it off? What is it made of? Can I open it? How do I dispose of it? Is it serially controlled with a tracking clip embedded? All relative questions that a respect for reading would answer.

Please parents, teach your three-year-at-home at home. The secret is to start early. Not at thirteen. It's as simple as that.

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

HBCU RIVALRY OPENS 2016 STATE FAIR

The Texas-Oklahoma game is usually the centerpiece of the Texas State Fair, but there's another game that draws just as many fans and just as much attention to Dallas' Cotton Bowl Stadium. The State Fair Classic game between Grambling State

University and Prairie View A&M is easily one of mostly highly anticipated games of the season. The two Historically Black [Colleges and] Universities have a long standing rivalry between them. Even during winless seasons the teams draw record crowds to the State Fair of Texas. The contest between the bands is just as intense as the play on the field. In fact, the halftime show for this game is actually longer to allow both bands to perform elaborate and highly entertaining routines. More often than not, fans show up for the first half and leave after the band performances conclude so that they enjoy the Midway fare and attempt to beat the traffic and attend the myriad of events following the game. But don't let that sour you on the game. Historically black colleges rarely get a platform like this, so the

game itself -- regardless of the records -- is a big deal for the members of the Grambling and Prairie View communities. This State Fair Classic, which has actually been in existence since 1925, but has featured Prairie View A&M and Grambling since 1985, is usually a one-sided affair. Grambling, which has won 14 SWAC championships and 23 Black College titles, has only lost five times to Prairie View -- and these games are rarely close. Since 2009 Prairie View has four of the last six matchups and looks to keep going strong against the Tigers. In their season opener PV under new Head Coach Willie Simmons started off on the right foot as the Prairie View A&M Panthers rolled up nearly 500 yards of total offense combined with a stingy defensive effort as they reclaimed the Labor Day Classic trophy after a 38-11

win over Texas Southern at BBVA Compass Stadium. Prairie View A&M finished with 457 yards (290 Rushing, 167 Passing) on 76 offensive plays while allowing 291 yards defensively. Green combined for three touchdowns as he rushed for 81 yards and two touchdowns on 18 carries while throwing for 167 yards and a touchdown on 13-of-27 passing. In his first game in two seasons, Brown led PVAMU with 88 yards on nine carries followed by 55 yards and a touchdown from Hebert and 50 yards and a touchdown from Anderson. Janan Coleman led the defense with nine tackles and sack while Barton finished with 2.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. After his performance against Texas State Coleman was named SWAC Newcomer of the Week after a 10-tackle performance at Texas State this past Saturday. Coleman has led PVAMU in tackles for two consecutive

games as he finished with nine tackles and a sack last week at Texas Southern. The Daphne, Ala. native currently leads the team with 21 tackles and two tackles for loss and is also tied for second in the SWAC in tackles. On the other side of the ball the Tigers enter with a 1-2 record. Tigers QB Johnathan Williams completed 21 of 38 passes for 296 yards as the GMen defeated Alabama State University at ASU Stadium 34-10 Saturday night. "I think our kids played well," said head coach Broderick Fobbs, "and we ran the ball well, which is good because it keeps the defense off the field." While ASU gave up 34 points, the G-Men's defense held ASU to only 3 points until less than 3 minutes left in the game when the Hornets scored their only touchdown.



Grambling State played a strong defensive game against ASU, and PV's Courtney Brown will test the GSU defense. As the Panthers were trailing in the fourth quarter against Alabama A&M, he ran two consecutive fourth-quarter scores to push his team on to a win.

Fact: Yard Waste Matters

Leaves and grass washed down the city's storm drainage system is a form of water pollution. Annually, it accounts for One Fifth of all garbage generated in the U.S. Yard waste decomposes in local creeks, ponds, lakes and the Trinity River causing algae to grow. Large algae blooms deplete water of life giving oxygen. And, without oxygen in the water, aquatic animals and plant life can suffocate.

Sweeping or blowing yard waste into storm drains can result in a \$2,000 fine.

Yard Work Tips:

- Never sweep or blow yard waste into the street or down storm drains.
- Sweep or blow grass clippings from your sidewalk, driveway and street back onto your yard because they will act as fertilizer.
- Fallen leaves can be mulched and left on the lawn.
- Leaves can be bagged and stored until bulk waste collection day in your neighborhood.
- Or compost your leaves and grass clippings turning them into wonderful natural fertilizer.
