District expands program proven to reduce number of disciplinary issues

Dallas ISD is expanding a program that has proven to significantly reduce the number of disciplinary issues that happen in a classroom.

Restorative practices, which was formerly referred to as restorative discipline, is designed to proactively address disciplinary and behavioral issues before they escalate. Dallas ISD piloted restorative practices at six schools last year and is implementing the program at an additional 14 schools this year. The district has also added a restorative practices specialist to help implement the program at the schools.

Middle school classrooms that used restorative practices last year saw a 70-percent reduction in in-school suspensions and a 77-percent reduction in out-of-school suspensions.

“The results so far have just been phenomenal,” said Jay Sheets, the dis-

trict’s restorative discipline coordinator. “We are thrilled to be able to expand the program this year.”

The restorative practices process has students gather in circles in their classrooms when a student is disruptive. Teachers ask questions, and then students – one at a time – have a chance to respond. The goal is to reduce the amount of time students must be disciplined outside the classroom, cutting into valuable instructional time.

“Restorative practices is a chance for the students to build a relationship with the teachers,” Sheets said. “And what we’re seeing is, if a student has a relationship with the teacher, a lot of the issues that come across as classroom management and classroom discipline can be solved with the teacher and student.”

What kind of love are you searching for? Are you looking for Eros or an Agape kind of love? Many of us want love in our lives, but we go about trying to get love in the wrong way. In the book of John, it speaks of a kind of love that is greater and more fulfilling. It references the kind of love that is freely given wanting

nothing in return. "By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). I'm sure many of you have heard this verse before. But have you ever thought about what this verse means? This verse has a deeper meaning about love than most people could not understand then or now. Jesus wanted them to love each other without wanting anything in return. He wanted His disciples to have an agape kind of love. This is the kind of love that Jesus has for all of us. Jesus loves us without wanting anything in return. Often we think of love in its

This precious gift was so freely given to all of us that we still have a difficult time understanding fully the price He paid for being unselfish and showing mankind an agape type of love. Is there someone whom you can show an agape type of love toward? If so, can you express it in a Christ-like manner? If you are willing to show people an agape type of love, then people will be able to get a glimpse of Christ in you. Are you willing to express God's agape love toward someone today? I know I am. Amen? Amen.

"A SURVEY OF THE BOOK OF ROMANS" ROMANS 9:1-13

THE SOVEREIGNTY OF GOD IN RELATION TO THE NATION OF ISRAEL

Having arrived at the 9th chapter of the grand book of Romans, we have discussed Paul's awesome argument that both the Gentiles and the Jews stood guilty before Holy God. The Gentiles had God's natural revelation (creation) and they spurned God's revelation, resulting in them being guilty of flagrant idolatry and gross sexual conduct (Romans 1:18-28). Moreover, the Jews were privileged with the Law but they did not live to the standard of the Law (Romans 2:17-29). As a rightful conclusion, Paul declared that both groups were guilty, for in Romans 3:10 it states—"As it is written, there is none right-

eous, no not one." To further emphasize the guilt of both groups, Paul declared in Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." Being in a lost position, mankind needed God's provided righteousness in Jesus Christ to secure a righteous standing before Holy God. Through faith in God's provided righteousness, mankind can be justified before God, for Romans 5:1 says – "Therefore, being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Despite mankind's lost condition, he needs to know that God expressed His unconditional love in the sending of His Son, Jesus Christ, to remedy his condition, for Romans 5:8 says – "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." In chapters 6-8, Paul discussed the area of sanctification with reference to the believer. Paul wanted the Roman believers to know that they had died to the reigning power of sin through identification with Christ's death, burial and resurrection (Romans 6:3-4), and that they

were no longer married to the Law, but to Christ (Romans 7:1-6). Therefore, victory in the Christian life is only achieved by walking in the freedom or liberty of the Holy Spirit (Romans 8:2, 5). In retrospect, as one carefully reads chapters 1-8 of this letter as it deals with the subject of salvation, it is evident that the next section of this great book will deal with the sovereignty of God in relation to Israel in God's prophetic program (chapters 9-11). As it relates to God's prophetic program for Israel, He has not totally abandoned her. He is presently dealing with a called-out group, the church; and after He finishes His program with the church He will resume His program with Israel (Acts 15:14-16). In Romans 9:1-2, the Apostle Paul's heart is anguishing, because his people, the Jewish nation, have rejected the gospel. Paul is really perplexed, acting even as a mediator for his people, for verse says – "For I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh." The love that Paul had for his people was certainly

astounding! Moses also expressed his sentiment for his people in Exodus 32:31-32. Having discussed his strong desire for Israel's salvation (v. 3), Paul will enumerate the various privileges that the nation of Israel possessed in verses 4-5, and they were: (1) adoption as a nation - Exodus 4:22; Deuteronomy 7:6; (2) glory - Exodus 40:35; (3) covenants - Ephesians 2:12; (4) law - Exodus 19:5, 31:13; (5) service of God - Exodus 19:6; (6) promises - Joshua 1:2; (7) fathers - Abraham, Isaac, Jacob; (8) Christ, the Messiah. Finally, the sovereignty of God is supremely expressed in relation to Israel, in that, He chose Isaac over Ishmael (9:6-9), and Jacob over Esau (9:10-13). And in so doing, Paul was expressing the fact that the spiritual offspring of promise was the remnant that was true Israelites, not the natural offspring of Abraham. Thus, the Israelites that believed the gospel were sovereignly chosen by God. Although chosen by God, the remnant had the responsibility to believe (Romans 4:1-3). **May God Bless!**

Are You Raising One of the Next Generation of Hoodlums: EXPECTATION FOR A NEW SCHOOL YEAR

Parents: Research has shown that parental expectations for children's academic achievement predict educational outcomes more than any other measures of parental involvement. So please know that the expectations parents have for their sons' behavior also matter! The expectations parents have for their sons' school attainment influence their sons' expectations and achievement. So please, make it clear to your son that you expect him to achieve and you expect him to behave appropriately. Parental expectations are more likely to affect children when parent-child relationships are characterized by closeness

and warmth. Parental expectations influence children's outcomes through numerous pathways. Parental expectations directly affect the amount of parent-child communication about school. Additionally, families with high educational aspirations for their sons take the time to provide out-of-school learning opportunities for them. Students who say their parents expect them to attend college have better attendance and more positive attitudes toward school, according to one study. Parental expectations also affect your sons' own aspirations and personal expectations. Studies suggest that parents' expectations for their children's academic attainment have a moderate to strong influence on students' own goals for postsecondary education. Further, both sets of expectations are moderated by characteristics of the parent, child, and community. Begin early in your sons' lives making them aware that you have expectations for them and assuring that they know what your expectations are. One of

the main reasons many boys get off track in school is because their parents do not talk with them on a regular basis regarding what they expect. Many parents wait until their sons get in trouble, either behaviorally or academically, before they have a serious conversation with them about appropriate behavior and the importance of putting forth their best efforts. They are seemingly reluctant to talk to their sons about what they, as parents, expect them to do and what they expect them not to do. Both are important! Summer is just about over. The new academic year is imminent. No matter what grade level your young son, tween or teen is entering this new school year, provide him the opportunity to enter with your clear, parental expectations firmly fixed in his psyche. This is one of the best things you can do for your son! Make sure you are clear and specific and that your son understands that certain expectations are not negotiable, that you expect this to always happen. Specific, non-negotiable

items should include:

- Respectful speech and attitude (most especially with adult authorities)
- All written communication sent by the school will be given to you promptly
- All homework and in-school assignments will be completed
- There will be no bullying (ever)
- You will choose appropriate friends and associates

Parents: It is very important for your sons to know that you have expectations for them and also equally important that they know what your expectations are. Clarifying your expectations prior to the beginning of the new school year, and then providing frequent reminders to keep the expectations fresh on your sons' minds serves to help them maintain their focus. **Special note:** Readers are invited to hear Dr. Teal's new internet radio talk show. 



A parade for Biles was planned later Wednesday in Spring, where her family operates a gymnastics center.



THE HALAL GUYS ANNOUNCE RICHARDSON RESTAURANT PARK AS THEIR SECOND DALLAS LOCATION



DCCCD students in management program apply job experience for college credit

Dr. Diane Minger, program coordinator for management at Cedar Valley College, said the management program in the Dallas County Community College District is unique because it allows students to earn college credits for their jobs. She added that students must have a job in order to enroll in the program, and if they're not employed, the college can help them find a job.

"The program is not industry-specific," Minger said. "Management cuts across all fields because every industry uses managers. Managerial skills are transferable because students learn leadership, problem-solving, decision-making, planning and many other abilities."

Gemmy Allen, management faculty at North Lake, said most people who enroll in the program already have been employed for several years, and they know they will not get a promotion without a credential such as an associate degree.

"We call it cooperative education," said Allen. "The student works with the faculty and the supervisor in the workplace to come up with a project. Then the student's supervisor evaluates that project, but the faculty mem-

ber assigns the grade." Management skills increase job potential. Bill Mynar, who works in a Dallas-based manufacturing company as a procedure writer and supervisor, said the program already has taught him valuable skills at his job.

"I take the lessons from class and use them directly in my job. I have learned time-management skills and how to deal with certain people," Mynar said. "The program puts you in real-life situations so that you can take what you learn and use it in life and work. It's practical knowledge."

Mynar and Rubio can expect to do well after they finish their degrees. According to data from EMSI, a Dallas-based economic data consulting firm, more than 3,500 management occupations are projected to be added in the Dallas-Fort Worth area between 2016 and 2017.

In addition, North Texas experienced a 3.6 percent job growth rate in management occupations from 2015 to 2016. That's better than the national rate of 2 percent.

Allen said many of the students she teaches already have taken some college but didn't graduate. "Life gets in the way for many of them," she said.

Mynar, who is 42, said he started his college career somewhat late in life and is now juggling a full-time job and a family, including a set of twins. He said the program's online aspect has helped him with his tight schedule.

"But what I've liked the most is the co-op," Mynar stated. "I like meeting with other students on Saturdays for a few hours and interacting with them. It's an environment that is really supportive, and everybody is pulling for each other to really succeed."

Moving ahead

Mynar said he's planning to get a bachelor's degree after he finishes the program and eventually move from his supervisory position into management at his company. Rubio said he hopes to enroll directly in Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University to earn a four-year degree. "I love aircraft, and this management degree will help me move along and get into the aviation industry," he added.

Minger said students in the program learn "hard and soft skills, such as understanding spread sheets, balance sheets and income statements. In addition, they learn how to communicate well, articulate ideas and deal with employees."
