The California Legislative Black Caucus (CLBC) Response To The Events In Ferguson, Missouri



CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE BLACK CAUCUS

Since Africans were first brought to the Americas as slaves nearly 400 years ago, they have been the target of perpetual discrimination, harassment and institutionalized racism. The recent events in Ferguson, Missouri, including the murder of another unarmed black male only highlight the decades of abuse that blacks-in particular black males- have suffered at the hands of police officers. However, this abuse is not isolated to parts of our country that have historically denied African Americans equal protection under the law. It also exists in California.

While we as a nation tout justice and fairness for all, one could argue that the seemingly callous disregard for young black males signals that our society not only condones, but lawfully supports the killing of unarmed black men.

Six years into the Obama era, young black men across the state and nation are still being gunned down by police officers, despite being unarmed. In 2009, Oscar Grant, a 20 year father of a young daughter was shot in the back by Bay Area Rapid Transit police while lying face down and motionless on the ground. Just one week ago on Tuesday, Ezell Ford was killed by a Los Angeles Police Department Officer, even after complying with officers' orders. The very next day, Dante Parker, a pressman at the Victorville Daily Press newspaper in Southern California, was shot with a Taser gun by a San Bernardino County Sheriff's Deputy, and eventually died in the hospital. Again, the common attributes among these young men, they were all unarmed and black.

The causes of these atrocities run far deeper than the interactions with law enforcement-- they stem from poor academic achievement, joblessness and poverty. Due to various factors including an insufficient, inequitable and unaccountable school funding system, black males have the lowest standardized test scores, high school graduation and college matriculation rates of all other genders and ethnicities.

On account of their limited access to business capital, lack of economic opportunities and an overall dearth of good paying middle class jobs, blacks endure an unemployment rate that is almost twice the national average, while also earning the lowest median income of all other races.

Furthermore, between the application of overly harsh sentencing policies stemming from the drug epidemic of the 1980's and 90's, racial profiling and an overall lack of cultural competence among law enforcement, African Americans are disproportionately incarcerated across the state. While only accounting for 6 percent of the California's population, blacks make up 29 percent of the state prison population.

The protesting in Ferguson, Missouri is symbolic of the extreme frustration felt by blacks all across the country. This frustration is the recognition of how law enforcement views the lives of black men-that we are simply not as valuable.

There is one thing that is certain. Change is absolutely necessary. We must change this pattern of treatment at the hands of law enforcement throughout our society that actively perpetuates racial injustice in America. If we can do this, then maybe...just maybe, we can ensure that no more Michael Browns, Oscar Grants, Ezell Fords, Dante Parkers or Trayvon Martins are killed.

The California Legislative Black Caucus (CLBC) believes that the solution to these problems lie in the creation of tangible policies that benefit young men of color across California. The CLBC has advocated for courses of action to expand early childhood education, boost funding for K-12 public schools and enhance access to rehabilitative services while also increasing the number of Californians who have health insurance. These policies not only improve the outcomes for young black men, but further the development of all people, despite their class, race, gender, sexual orientation or religion.

1. **Watch the Glue A Shoe Competition in Creative Arts.** Contestants create works of art out of a shoe and compete for the blue ribbon. Contest begins at 11:30 am in the Home Depot Competition Kitchen.

2. **Visit Farmer Mike and see his incredible pumpkin carvings.** Each weekend, Farmer Mike is busy in the Errol McCoy Greenhouse-on-the-Midway carving giant pumpkins that will be on display. Get there the first day to see it from the beginning.

Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson Commemorates the 20th Anniversary of the Violence Against Women Act



September 13, marks the 20th anniversary of President Bill Clinton signing the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) into law. The landmark legislation created critical protections for victims of domestic violence and dramatically strengthened our nation's criminal justice response to violence against women. Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson released the following statement recognize the 20th anniversary of this historic legislation:

"As a member of the United States Congress, and more

importantly as a woman, it is crucial to remember the positive ramifications of VAWA. Domestic and sexual violence are forms of abuse that have plagued communities both foreign and domestic. Women who fall victim to domestic and sexual violence should not feel ashamed of their situation.

By standing strong in support of Women's Rights, VAWA empowers victims by providing a voice for issues that have historically laid silent." said Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson. "We must continue to strengthen our response to these crimes and deepen our commitment to all survivors."

House Democrats are committed to continuing to strengthen domestic violence programs. As part of the Middle Class Jumpstart, House Democrats will strengthen

VAWA and make increased investments in shelters and other life-saving domestic violence services.

VAWA has been critical landmark legislation. According to a statement issued by the White House, between 1993—2010 the rate of intimate partner violence has declined by 67%, in addition to increased reporting of domestic and sexual violence to the police since its passing. VAWA has instituted stricter sentencing guidelines for repeat federal sex crime offenders and provides resources to tribal, local, and state law enforcement communities to address violent crimes against women. In addition, the National Domestic Violence Hotline, which responds to more than 22,000 urgent calls for help every month, was also created under this legislation.

Overall these measures in addition to countless others will contribute to protecting the rights of women across the country for years to come.

The Transaction on Mount Moriah - Genesis 22

Abraham to offer Isaac up as a human sacrifice. What a severe test of faith. What would we do if God should demand such a request upon us!

This man Abraham was severely tested, as will be the day when our faith will be placed upon the altar to determine its worth! I once heard a minister remark concerning this chapter that "Abraham did not wait for the day of the test to get prepared; He had already prepared before the test arrived; in other words, don't wait until the day before a test to cram; be prepared before the test is given! What solemn wisdom which flowed from his lips. The life of Abraham was filled with many crisis moments; He was instructed to separate from his kindred as he left Us of the Chaldees (Genesis 12:1); He was instructed to give up Lot, his choice nephew (Genesis 13:1-18); He was instructed to abandon his hope of Ishmael

and to abandon his plan about Ishmael (Genesis 17:17-18); and now, He is instructed to offer Isaac as a human substitute.

Although Abraham is faced with a severe test upon his faith, we find him obeying God, without any degree of doubt, knowing that what God commands, and permits, is best for him. What a picture of implicit obedience. Abraham was obedient even to the point of offering his only son of promise, a son who was dearly beloved, and a son whom he had waited for a period of twenty-five years. Abraham acted by faith, for he demonstrated the verity of his faith by his actions. Not only do we see the faith of Abraham (22:1-6) but we notice the obedient response of his son, Isaac (22:7). So, those of us who would transact business with God must have faith, and we must surrender and submit our will to the Father! Real faith in God defies good sense; moreover, it sur-

renders totally to the will of God.

In verses eight through eleven, as this account intensifies, we see Abraham's willingness to spare not his only son of promise. Of course, human sacrifice is morally wrong, but Abraham was about to offer his son as a human offering. As we view verses twelve through fifteen, we find that Abraham passed his supreme test, and Isaac was spared - a ram was offered instead of Isaac (v. 13). Isaac, a type of Christ, was spared; but, Christ, the matchless Son of God, was not spared (Romans 8:32). In conclusion, the real transaction that took place on Mount Moriah was between the Father and the Son. Likewise, the real transaction that took place on Calvary was between the Father who offered the substitute and the Son who was the substitute - He was the supreme Sacrifice who expiated the sins of humankind.

NFL Domestic Abusers Get Tap on Wrist

earns \$44 million a year, didn't admit was the NFL continues to get it wrong while serving as a high-profile enabler for other domestic abusers in the league. For example:

Rice's teammate, All-Pro Linebacker Terrell Suggs, continued playing after Candace Williams, the mother of his three children and his future wife, filed for two protective orders against him in the last five years. The first was in December 2009. The Baltimore Sun reported, "According to the complaint ...Williams said Suggs threw a soap dispenser at her head, hit her in the chest with his hand, and held a bottle of bleach over her and their 1-year-old son, which spilled on them and caused a rash. Baltimore City District Court Judge Ronald Alan Karasic wrote that a laceration was visible on Williams' chest." Though the protective order was granted, Suggs was never charged with a crime. Three years later, Williams filed for another protective order, alleging that Suggs "punched her in the neck and drove a car containing their two children at a 'high rate of speed' while she was being dragged alongside." The couple later married. In neither case did the Ravens or the NFL take any action against Suggs.

Carolina Panthers All-Pro Defensive End Greg Hardy was convicted last summer of assaulting and threatening to kill his former girlfriend, Nicole Holder, but no action was taken

against him until the Ray Rice story exploded on the national scene. In her request for a protective order, Holder said Hardy threw her into a tile tub, pulled her from the tub by her hair, choked her with both hands and picked her up over his head and threw her onto a couch filled with assault rifles and shotguns. At the trial, Holder testified, "He looked me in my eyes and told me he was going to kill me. I was so scared I wanted to die. When he loosened his grip slightly, I said, 'Just do it. Kill me.'" Hardy was found guilty of misdemeanor charges and sentenced to a 60-day suspended sentence and 18 months of probation. He is appealing the verdict. Hardy was deactivated for last Sunday's game against the Detroit Lions.

San Francisco 49ers defensive end Ray McDonald was allowed to play in last Sunday's game, despite being arrested and charged with felony domestic violence connected with allegedly striking his pregnant fiancée. A hearing scheduled for Monday was postponed, pending further investigation.

These are not isolated cases. A database maintained by USA Today shows that there have been 713 arrests of NFL players since 2000 – 85 for domestic violence. The database covers only incidents reported by the media.

Of the 56 known domestic violence cases that occurred on Goodell's watch, players were

suspended only a combined total 13 games, excluding Ray Rice. Typically, players involved in domestic disputes had charges dismissed after they were placed in a diversion program for first-time offenders, completed anger management counseling or performed community service. In many cases, the abused woman refused to file charges. Only 10 players were released by their team and three of those landed on other squads.

Overall, arrest rates among NFL players are lower than the national average for men in their age range. Among NFL teams, according to the New York Times, the Minnesota Vikings had the most players arrested since 2000, with 44, followed closely by the Cincinnati Bengals and the Denver Broncos. The Arizona Cardinals and the St. Louis Rams, with 11 each, tied for the lowest mark. Baltimore had 22 players arrested over that period, mirroring the league average.

Though the most common offense was driving while drunk, domestic violence has taken center stage.

The domestic cases are chronicled by Sidepin. The website stated, "Goodell is perceived as being tough on players. He's an authoritarian, the likes of which the league has never seen!! But there's one thing Goodell will tolerate, and that's NFL players abusing women."

Wura-Natasha Ogunji splits her creative time between Austin, Texas and Lagos, Nigeria. Her exhibit That's not the Atlantic (There's a disco ball between us) is a collection of new drawings that include an installation with video projection as well as small scale works. The title of the exhibit comes from Ogunji's installation of drawings on large-sheets of architectural sketch paper. Video projections intermittently illuminate areas of the drawing that have been stitched with fluorescent thread with much of the video originating from footage the artist took with her cell phone while in Lagos.

As we get older, we tend to think that many of our successes have happened because of our own ability. We fail to acknowledge that God has blessed us and met our needs even when we were not

deserving of it. God still showed us mercy.

God has stayed close to us because of the love He has for us. This is why the Psalmist is able to acknowledge that "...the Lord sustains me" (Psalm 3:5). Can you take this week and ponder how God has sustained you? If you do this, you will have a more thankful heart. I know I'll take the time to do it. Amen? Amen.


